**A**T the Court at *Balmoral*, the 26th day of *September*, 1891.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by the eleventh section of the Volunteer Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that "Her Majesty in Council may from time to time declare what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to be given by the Volunteer, and the course of instruction to be gone through by him, and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to be attained by him and his Corps, such proficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting Officer at the Annual Inspection of the Corps, or otherwise, as by Order in Council is from time to time directed;" and that "the draft of any scheme to be from time to time submitted to Her Majesty in Council for approval under the present section shall have been laid before both Houses of Parliament for one lunar month at least, either before or after, or partly before and partly after, the passing of this Act during the present, or for the like period during any subsequent Session of Parliament before such scheme receives the approval of Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be amended so far as relates to the particulars shown in the schedule hereof, a draft of which schedule was on the sixth day of July last, laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words therein mentioned and set forth, and one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the amendment of the Scheme of Efficiency for which provision is made in the said schedule hath this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having this day taken the said amendment into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in Her Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby amend, in the words of the said schedule the aforesaid Order in Council of the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight

hundred and eighty, and doth declare Her Royal approval of the amendment.

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order in Council.

AMENDMENT of the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers, in force under Her Majesty's Order in Council dated thirty-first July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty,—or Orders since issued in amendment thereof,—made under the provisions of the Volunteer Act, 1863.

I. In the Form of Certificate of Efficiency for men belonging to the First Class Army Reserve serving with Engineer Volunteer Corps,—appended to the abovementioned scheme,—to substitute for the existing preface to the third and fourth paragraphs of the foot-note the following words:—

"Second and subsequent years after recruits' course"; and to make an addition to such foot-note as follows:—

"Railway Reservists transferred from the First Class Army Reserve (Infantry) will be required, during the first year, to perform the number of drills prescribed for Reservists of the Engineer Volunteer Corps to which they are attached."

II. In the Form of Certificate of Efficiency for Artillery Volunteer Corps appended to the same scheme to substitute for the present fifth and sixth paragraphs of the foot-note new paragraphs in the following words:—

<p>"Third and fourth years, and in subsequent years also in the case of ordinary Volunteers."</p>	<p>"If present at inspection, nine gun and three other drills, including the inspection. "If absent from inspection with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, eleven gun and three other drills."</p>

**W**HEREAS by "The Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1873," it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to direct that there

"shall be District Registrars in such places as shall be in such Order mentioned for districts to be thereby defined, from which writs of summons for the commencement of actions in the High Court of Justice may be issued, and in which such proceedings may be taken and recorded as are hereinafter mentioned; and Her Majesty may thereby appoint that any Registrar of any County Court, or any Registrar or Prothonotary or District Prothonotary of any local Court whose jurisdiction is thereby transferred to the said High Court of Justice, or from which an appeal is hereby given to the said Court of Appeal, or any person who, having been a District Registrar of the Court of Probate, or of the Admiralty Court, shall under this Act become and be a District Registrar of the said High Court of Justice, or who shall hereafter be appointed such District Registrar, shall and may be a District Registrar of the said High Court for the purpose of issuing such writs as aforesaid, and having such proceedings taken before him as are hereinafter mentioned":

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did, on the twelfth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, order that there should be District Registrars in certain places in England:

Whereas it is expedient that there should be a District Registrar at West Bromwich:

Her Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirty-first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, there shall be a District Registrar at West Bromwich, and that the Registrar of the County Court held at West Bromwich is hereby appointed the District Registrar at West Bromwich, and that the district shall be the district for the time being of the County Court of Staffordshire holden at West Bromwich.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to make Regulations for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of Her Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of Her Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make Rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by Her Majesty's vessels, and other vessels navigating the waters of the Port, and of the approaches thereto:—

And whereas, in pursuance of the said Act, certain Regulations were made by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-ninth day of February

one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Pembroke:

And whereas it appears expedient that the Regulations before-mentioned should be amended, and that Rules should be established concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by Her Majesty's vessels and other vessels navigating the waters of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

#### PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

2. On this Order taking effect all previous Orders, and all previous Rules and Regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order, shall cease to operate, and in lieu of such Rules and Regulations, the Rules and Regulations set forth in the First and Second Schedules attached hereto shall become operative.

3. The terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act.

#### DOCKYARD PORT OF PEMBROKE.

4. The Dockyard Port of Pembroke shall comprise such portions of Milford Haven as lie between a straight line drawn from the extremity of Thorn Point through Stack Rock to Southhook Point on the west, and a straight line drawn from Pembroke Ferry Point to the western extreme of Barnlake Point on the east, and shall include all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools, and rivers, between the above-mentioned limits, as far as the tide flows.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### FIRST SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS for the protection of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke and of Her Majesty's property therein, and for Anchoring, Berthing, Mooring, and Breaming in that Port.

##### *Limits of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke.*

1. On the west, a straight line drawn from the extremity of Thorn Point through Stack Rock to Southhook Point; on the east, a straight line drawn from Pembroke Ferry Point to the western extreme of Barnlake Point; and including all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools, and rivers, between the above limits, as far as the tide flows.

##### *General.*

2. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any Government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the master or other person having the charge or command of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Naval Superintendent or Queen's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

3. No merchant nor other private vessel or boat shall, without license in writing from the Naval Superintendent, or Queen's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the forts, nor to any Government moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the Dockyard Port.

4. No merchant nor other private vessel of

above five tons, compelled or allowed to anchor in or near any of the navigable channels of the Dockyard Port, shall be left at any time without a shipkeeper.

5. No fishing from boats shall be carried on within one hundred feet of Her Majesty's Dockyards or other Government Establishments.

6. No ballast, stones, earth, clay, refuse, ashes, rubbish, dust, filth of any description, nor refuse from any quarry, mine, or pit, shall be unladen, cast, nor allowed to fall into the waters of the Dockyard Port, nor into, nor upon the banks, nor any portion of the shore of the said Dockyard Port, nor into, nor upon the shores of any rivers or streams discharging into the said Dockyard Port, where the same may be liable to be washed into the waters of the Dockyard Port by rain, tide, or otherwise.

7. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Dockyard Port, except on the shore at Pembroke, or to the westward of the Pennarmouth.

#### *Protection of mine-fields and electric cables.*

8. Whenever it may be necessary for mining experiments, or other similar Naval or Military purpose, to reserve any area for such experiments or purpose, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white, and, after twenty-one days' warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette, no vessel shall anchor within or pass through the area so marked, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather or to avoid accident.

9. No vessel shall anchor on the line of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port, when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore, and twenty-one days' warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette.

#### ANCHORAGE REGULATIONS.

10. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored or anchored within the following limits, namely:—

Between a straight line drawn from the north-west angle of Pater Battery in a N. 53° W. (true) direction to the opposite shore, and a similar line drawn from the eastern extreme of the Dockyard in a north (true) direction unless she is forced thereto by unavoidable accident, or unless she is consigned to the Dockyard.

11. No vessel shall anchor in the fairway of Milford Haven nor in the fairway into, or in, the Dockyard Port in such a position as to obstruct the entrance of Her Majesty's ships, unless compelled thereto by stress of weather or unavoidable accident.

12. Merchant and other private vessels moored, anchored, or placed in other parts of the Dockyard Port shall, at the owner's expense, when directed to do so by the Queen's Harbour Master, remove to such position as he shall direct. If from having no crew on board, or from any other cause, the vessel does not remove as directed, the Queen's Harbour Master may remove the said vessel, and recover the expense incurred in so doing from her owner.

#### *Delineation of Limits.*

13. On the chart accompanying this Order are marked all the limits referred to in the several sections thereof.

#### *Penalties.*

14. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall

observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as relates to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

#### *Local Authorities.*

15. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Milford Docks Company and the Queen's Harbour Master under the Milford Docks Act, 1874, and other Acts of Parliament applicable to that Company; nor the authority of the Harbour Master of the Great Western Railway Company at New Milford under the South Wales Railways Consolidation Act, 1855, or other Acts of Parliament relating to that Company.

#### SECOND SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning Lights and Signals to be used, and the steps to be taken for avoiding Collisions in the Dockyard Port of Pembroke, and the approaches thereto:—

#### *Limits of Dockyard Port of Pembroke.*

1. On the west a straight line drawn from the extremity of Thorn Point through Stack Rock to Southhook Point; on the east a straight line drawn from Pembroke Ferry Point to the western extreme of Barnlake Point; and including all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools, and rivers between the above limits as far as the tide flows.

#### *Observance of "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea."*

2. All sea-going vessels, when within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke, shall carry such lights as are prescribed by the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea"; as set out in the Schedule annexed to an Order in Council made in pursuance of the "Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and dated the eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or other Order in Council for the time being in force relating thereto; and all vessels of every description shall also observe the steering and sailing rules set forth in the abovementioned Schedule, except in so far as they are affected by the Regulations hereinafter contained.

#### *Lights for vessels at anchor.*

3. Vessels of one hundred and fifty feet or upwards in length at anchor within the limits of the Port, shall carry, in addition to the anchor light prescribed by the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," a bright light at the stern not less than fifteen feet lower than the forward light.

#### *Lights for small steam craft.*

4. Steam launches and other small craft propelled by steam, of a length over all of, or exceeding, thirty-five feet, shall, between sunset and sunrise, when within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke, carry the lights prescribed for sea-going steamships, in the abovementioned Schedule; or shall, when under way, in lieu of the coloured side lights, carry a single lantern amidships, with a green glass on the one side, and a red glass on the other side; such lantern to be not less than two feet above the hull, and so constructed and placed that the green light shall show from right ahead to two points abaft the starboard beam; and the red light, from right ahead to two points abaft the port beam;—without being obscured by other objects in the vessel. The bright light is to be in the middle line of the craft, and not less than two feet above the coloured light or lights, and may, when there is no fore-

mast, be carried on a pole, or otherwise at the forepart of the vessel; and at a height above the hull not less than the breadth of the vessel. These lights are to be of such a character, that on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, the coloured lights shall be visible at least one mile and the bright light at least two miles.

5. Steam launches, and all other boats propelled by steam, of a length over all of less than thirty-five feet, when under way between sunset and sunrise within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Pembroke, shall not be obliged to carry the white light, but shall carry the coloured side lights mentioned in Article 3, paragraphs B and C, of the above-mentioned schedule, or in lieu thereof the single lantern amidships, with parti-coloured glass, as set forth in the foregoing paragraph.

*Vessels not to approach Her Majesty's Ships carrying Royal or other Standard at masthead.*

6. No vessel shall unnecessarily approach within two cables of any ship of war, troopship, or Royal yacht, carrying Royal or any other standard at the masthead, when under way in the waters of the Dockyard Port.

*Vessels to keep clear of Her Majesty's Ships.*

7. When any of Her Majesty's Ships or other vessel in charge of one of Her Majesty's Officers, about to pass into, through, or out of the Dockyard Port, hoists the Union Jack at the fore top gallant masthead, all other of Her Majesty's Ships present in the port shall hoist the Pilot Jack as a general warning, and the Pilot Jack will also be hoisted on the masthead of the Guard Ship for the same purpose; and all other vessels, craft, and boats, of every description, under way in the Dockyard Port, shall keep out of the way of the said ship flying the Union Jack, provided always that the said ship shall be navigated with due care, and at a moderate speed, and that she shall, so far as is practicable, be kept on the side of the fair way which lies on her own starboard side.

*Regulations for Sailing and Small Steam Craft to keep clear of Steamers.*

8. When any sea-going steamship within the limits of the Dockyard Port shall, by reason of the crowded nature of the channel or anchorage, or from other cause, find it unsafe or impracticable to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel, or of a boat under oars or sail or steam, she shall signify the same to the sailing vessel or said boat by four or more short blasts of the steam whistle, blown in rapid succession, when the sailing vessel or boat shall keep out of the way of the sea-going steamship, provided always that the sea-going steamship shall be navigated with due care, and at a moderate speed.

*Locomotive Torpedo Practice.*

9. Whenever practice with locomotive torpedoes takes place, a red flag will be hoisted at the firing point to warn vessels and boats not to cross the range. While the practice is proceeding, no craft shall anchor for fishing or other purpose, nor shall any cruising or pleasure sailing take place in the area considered dangerous, details of which are to be published from time to time in Notices to Mariners issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette.

*Penalties.*

10. The master of every merchant or other private vessel, or person in charge of any boat, to which this Order relates, shall observe, and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order, as far as it relates to his vessel or boat; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of the

Second Schedule of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect, any of those provisions, he shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanour.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Office of County Coroner," it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said Justices, in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration, and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette:

And whereas by virtue of the operation of the Municipal Corporations Act 1883, certain places formerly within the jurisdiction of certain Corporations, or reputed Corporations, mentioned in the Schedules to the said Act, became in the year 1886 for Coroners' purposes subject to the same jurisdiction as that part of the county of Sussex

in which they were situate, or to which they were adjoining.

And whereas previous to the coming into operation of the Local Government Act 1888, the city and borough of Chichester and the ancient town and borough of Rye in the said county respectively were municipal boroughs within the meaning of the Municipal Corporations Act 1835 and the Municipal Corporations Act 1882, and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions was theretofore holden in and for each of the said boroughs;

And whereas the said boroughs, each having a separate Court of Quarter Sessions as aforesaid, and each containing, according to the census of 1881, a population of less than ten thousand, became, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act 1888, on the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and since have been parts of the said county of Sussex for all purposes relating to Coroners, and subject to the jurisdiction of the County Coroners;

And whereas, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act 1888, the powers and business of the Justices of the said county in General or Quarter Sessions assembled in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to a Joint Committee of the County Councils of the separate administrative counties of East and West Sussex as constituted by and under the provisions of the said Local Government Act.

And whereas a petition was, on the third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, presented to Her Majesty by the Joint Committee of the respective County Councils of the administrative counties of East and West Sussex praying that the county of Sussex might be divided into four districts for the purposes of the hereinbefore firstly recited Act, which said petition, with a description of the said proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty;

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petition;

And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty;

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, taken into consideration the said petition and is minded to make such alteration and division as aforesaid;

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared that from the date hereof:—

(1.) The county of Sussex shall be divided into four districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said firstly recited Act.

(2.) The said four districts shall be named respectively "The Rye Coroner's District"; "The Lewes Coroner's District"; "The Horsham Coroner's District"; and "The Chichester Coroner's District"; and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the schedule hereto.

(3.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

#### SCHEDULE.

The Districts herein described are to be deemed not to include any parishes, or places, or parts thereof which are exempt from the jurisdiction of the Coroners for the county of Sussex,

whether such parishes, places, or parts thereof are hereinafter named, or included, or not:—

#### I. The Rye Coroner's District.

This District shall comprise the following parishes and places:—

The ancient town or borough of Rye.

All that part of the parish of Icklesham (including such part of that parish as was formerly part of the parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Winchelsea), which is not within the jurisdiction of any Franchise Coroner.

The parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Winchelsea.

All such part of the parish of Pett as is not within the jurisdiction of any Franchise Coroner.

All such part of the parish of Broomhill as is in the county of Sussex.

#### II. The Lewes Coroner's District.

This District shall comprise the following parishes and places:—

In the Chailey Union:—Barcombe, Chailey, Chilmington, Ditchelling, Harnsey, Newick, Plumpton, Ringmer, Street, Westmeston, Wivelsfield.

In the Cuckfield Union:—Ardingly, Balcombe, Bolney, Clayton, Cuckfield, Horsted Keynes, Hurstpierpoint, Keymer, Lindfield, Newtimber, Piecombe, Slaugham, Twineham.

In the Eastbourne Union:—Alfriston, Eastbourne, Eastdean, Folkington, Friston, Jevington, Litlington, Lullington, Pevensey, Seaford-with-Sutton, Westdean, Westham, Willingdon, Wilmington.

In the East Grinstead Union:—East Grinstead, Hartfield, West Hoathly, Withyham, Worth.

In the Hailsham Union:—Arlington, Chidingly, Hailsham, Hellingly, Laughton.

In the Horsham Union:—Crawley.

In the Lewes Union:—All Saints, Lewes; Precinct of the Castle, Lewes; Saint John the Baptist, Southover; Saint John-under-the-Castle, Lewes; Saint Michael, Lewes; Saint Peter and Saint Mary Westout, otherwise Saint Ann, Lewes; Saint Thomas à Becket, Cliffe; South Malling.

In the Newhaven Union:—Bishopstone, Blatchington, Denton, Falmer, Heighton, Iford, Kingston, Newhaven, Ovingdean, Piddinghoe, Rodmell, Rottingdean, Southcote, Stanmer, Tarring Neville, Telscombe.

In the Steyning Union:—East Aldrington, Fulking, Hangleton, Hove, Patcham, Portslade, Poyning, Preston (so much as is not within the county borough of Brighton), West Blatchington.

Dean and Chapter have caused their common or corporate seal to be affixed to this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Mark Peterborough, of the said new parish of Saint Paul Peterborough of the said new parish of Mary Boongate and of the said parish of Paston which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints Peterborough situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints Peterborough.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints Peterborough comprising:—

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Flowery Field Newton comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Mary Newton-in-Mottram, (commonly called Saint Mary Newton Moor) in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester, which is bounded upon the north

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-sixth day of July in the same year a part of the parish of Crondall in the said county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church situate at Crookham within the limits of the said parish and the same district was called 'The Chapelry District of Crookham-cum-Ewshott.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three and published in the London Gazette on the day following certain contiguous portions of the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott, of the particular district of Cove, in the said county and diocese, and of the parish of Elvetham, in the same county and diocese, were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints situate at Fleet within the limits of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Fleet.'

"And whereas both the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints Fleet have each of them under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and of the said new parish of All Saints Fleet should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries both of the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and of the said new parish of All Saints Fleet shall be altered so that all that portion of the last-named new parish which is described in the first schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green and shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and that in like manner all that portion of the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott which is described in the first part of the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dis severed from the last-named new parish, and, together with that portion of the parish of Elvetham in the county and diocese aforesaid which is described in the second part of the said second schedule and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan and is thereon



coloured yellow, shall be annexed to, and shall in future form part of, the said new parish of All Saints Fleet.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dismembered from the new parish of All Saints Fleet in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester, and to be restored to the new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott, in the same county and diocese being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of All Saints Fleet which is bounded upon the south-east and upon the west by the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and upon the remaining side that is to say generally upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott from the new parish of All Saints Fleet aforesaid at the point in the middle of the Basingstoke Canal where the said boundary bends in a north-westerly direction from the said canal towards the boundary stone inscribed 'F.A.S.C.C. 1863, No. 2,' and placed upon the eastern side of the road which leads from Crookham to Yateley opposite to the north-eastern extremity of the road numbered 1911 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Croadall in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence that is to say from the said point in the middle of the Basingstoke Canal aforesaid first north-eastward then eastward then again north-eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the boundary stone inscribed 'F.A.S.C.C. 1863, No. 5,' upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints Fleet from the new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid.

#### "The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be annexed to the said new parish of All Saints Fleet being:—

"1. All that portion of the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott which is bounded upon the north-west by the said new parish of All Saints Fleet upon the north-east by the particular district or new parish of Saint John the Baptist Cove in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district or new parish of Saint John the Baptist Cove from the new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid at a point, near Pyestock Hill, in the middle of the Basingstoke Canal aforesaid, distant thirteen chains or thereabouts to the west of Norris Bridge and extending thence that is to say from the said boundary generally westward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of sixty-seven chains or thereabouts to a point, opposite to the boundary stone inscribed 'F.A.S.C.C. 1863, No. 6,' upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Crookham-cum-Ewshott from the new parish of All Saints Fleet aforesaid.

2. And also all that isolated portion of the parish of Elvetham in the county and diocese aforesaid which said portion is situate on the

eastern side of Black Lake Copse and a little to the north of the road numbered 1911 as aforesaid and is surrounded upon all sides by the said new parish of All Saints Fleet."

And, whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

"And I do hereby determine that the said First or North Ward shall comprise so much of the parish of Berwick-upon-Tweed as lies to the north and west of the following boundary line, which, when the same passes along the modern walls of the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, shall be deemed to pass along the outer edge of the top of the said walls; and when it passes along any street or lane shall be deemed to pass along the centre thereof, that is to say, a line commencing at a point on the sea coast due east of the north-eastern extremity of the said modern walls of the

town of Berwick-upon-Tweed and drawn from that point in a straight line to the said north-eastern extremity of the said modern walls, thence along the said modern walls in a westerly or south-westerly direction to the centre of the gateway, through the said modern walls at the end of Marygate, thence along Marygate to the Townhall, thence at right angles to a point in the centre of that part of Marygate which runs to the south of the Townhall, thence along the last-mentioned part of Marygate to Hide Hill, thence along Hide Hill and Sandgate through the gateway at the end of Sandgate, thence in a north-westerly direction along the street or lane which passes from the said gateway along the north-eastern side of the close of land known as Wilson's Ship Building Yard as far as the northern corner of the said close; thence to the south-west along the centre of the street or lane which passes along the north-western side of the said close and between the same and the building known as Caverhill's Smithy and from the end of the said last-mentioned street or lane in a direct line across the quay to the River Tweed.

"To the said First or North Ward six Councillors that is to say John Davidson, George Alfred Harrison, Robert Marshall (of New East Farm) George Alexander Turnbull, John Richardson, and William Young.

"To the said Second or Middle Ward six Councillors, that is to say James Russell, William Wilson, Thomas Crow, Thomas Marshall Morrison, Walter Paterson Carr, and Joseph Weatherstone.

"To the said Third or Tweedmouth Ward three Councillors, that is to say George Nesbitt, Robert Marshall (of Tweedmouth) and John Robert Brough.

"To the said Fourth or Spittal Ward three Councillors that is to say the person to be elected in the place of Robert Boston deceased, Robert Liddell Wilson, and James Gilroy.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

*Definition.*

1. In this Warrant—

(1.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

(2.) The expression "British Colonies of Australasia" includes New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New Zealand, British New Guinea, and the Fiji Islands.

2. All Treasury Warrants at any time heretofore made relating to the conveyance by post of postal packets (which term in this Warrant means and includes all letters, postcards, reply postcards, newspapers, packets of commercial papers, packets of printed papers, and pattern or sample packets) between the United Kingdom and the British Colonies of Australasia, and also between any other British colony or foreign country and the British Colonies of Australasia, are hereby annulled to the extent to which such Warrants respectively relate to the several matters comprised in this Warrant as aforesaid.

3. On every letter transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the British Colonies of Australasia, there shall be charged and paid for every half of an ounce in weight of such letter or fractional part of half of an ounce in weight a rate of postage of two pence halfpenny.

4. On every postcard transmitted by post from the United Kingdom to the British Colonies of Australasia there shall be charged and paid in lieu of any rate now payable a postage of one penny.

5. On every reply postcard transmitted by post from the United Kingdom to the British Colonies of Australasia there shall be charged and paid a postage of two pence.

6. On every newspaper transmitted by post from the United Kingdom to the British Colonies of Australasia there shall be charged and paid for every four ounces in weight thereof or fractional part of four ounces in weight thereof a rate of postage of one penny.

7. Subject to the foregoing provisions of this Warrant the rates of postage and additional sum for registration now chargeable and payable by the authority of the Treasury Warrants of the 14th day of January, 1880, the 15th day of June, 1880, and the 9th day of March, 1886 (the last-mentioned Warrant relating to reply postcards), or the schedules thereunder, respectively, written on postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to British India to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of the said Warrants, or any of them, and all regulations and conditions now in force as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between British India and any other country or place as aforesaid, shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to the British Colonies of Australasia to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of the said Warrants, in the same way as if the British Colonies of Australasia had been named or referred to in the said Warrants and the schedules thereunder written, in the same manner as British India is named or referred to therein. Provided always that on every packet of printed papers or patterns or samples not exceeding one ounce in weight there shall be charged and paid a rate of postage of one penny.

8. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.
