Re-Exhibition of Chassiron Point Permanent Light, and Discontinuance of Provisional Light.

WITH reference to Notices to Mariners, Nos. 159 and 391 of 1891:—

The French Government has given further notice, that the necessary works being completed, the permanent light will be re-exhibited at Chassiron Point, on the 27th September, 1891, and the provisional light discontinued:—

Chassiron Point permanent light will be a flashing white light of the first order, showing flashes every ten seconds, preceded and followed by total eclipses; over île d'Oléron the character of the light will be altered by occultations through an arc of about 30°, or from the bearing of N. 12° W. to N. 42° W. The light is elevated 164 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 19 miles. It is antici-
