**T**HE French have put four Battalions into *Susa*, and about 600 Horse into *Pignerol* over and above the ordinary Garison, and the rest of their Troops, as we understand, are gone into Winter Quarters in *Savoie* and *Dauphine*. The Governor of *Milan* intends to return hither very suddenly with Money to pay the Spanish Auxiliary Troops, which will be considerably Reinforced against the Spring, besides the Succors our Duke expects from other Princes his Allies. The *Vaudois* have lately taken 60 Wagons laden with Wine, designed to *Pignerol*, killing 14 of the French Soldiers that conducted the Convoy. The German Troops in his Highness's Service have part of them their Quarters at *Vigone*, *Piosasco*, and other places on the side of *Pignerol*; and the rest at *Ivrea*, *Trino*, *Verelli*, *Rivoli*, and in this City.

**Zurich, December 17.** We have an account from *Piedmont*, that part of the Garison of *Pignerol* having lately marched out in the night, they surprised some Families, who were in the Villages of *St. Germain* and *Pramo's*; the Men, who were Armed, and were not above 12 together, fired several times upon the Enemy, and then retired to the Hills. The French plundered the Villages, and with their accustomed cruelty killed seven Women and 15 Children, and after that returned to *Pignerol*. A French Regiment of Horse surprised likewise *Lucerne*, and killed several People, but the *Vaudois* pursued and attack'd them so warmly in their retreat, that they cut off 150 of the Enemy, the rest retiring to *Pignerol*. The Duke of *Savoy* sent Prince *Eugene* with a Detachment of German Horse to intercept their Retreat, but he came about an hour too late; In the mean time the Duke's Troops destroy the Country round *Pignerol*, in return to the barbarous Ravages which the French commit wherever they come, and have burnt 6 or 7 Villages, the Garison not daring to venture out to oppose them. The *Marquis de la Parella* has made an Incursion as far as *St. Vincent* in *Provence*, and has taken the Castle of *Pontis*, but the Duke sent him Orders to retire for fear of the Snow, which might stop up the passages by which he might return.

**Venice, December 15.** By a Vessel from *Corfu* we have advice, that the Fleet separated after its arrival there, some of the Ships being sent to *Coron*, and others to *Modon*, *Navarin*, *Napoli di Romania*, and other places in the *Morea*, where they are to winter. The Master of a Vessel, which arrived here last week in 21 days from *Constantinople*, reports, that the taking of *Belgrade*, and the other late Successes of the Turks in *Hungary*, had extremely

raised the Reputation of the Grand Vicer, and of the French Ambassador, who is in a manner the second Minister of the *Ottoman* Court; that the Vicer was shortly expected at *Constantinople*, and that in the mean time it was whispered about, as if his arrival there would be attended with some great alteration in that Government.

**Vienna, December 17.** The Count de *Caraffa*, Commissary-General of the Army, is returned hither from the Empire, after having settled the Winter Quarters for the Imperial Troops (that were employed the last Summer on the *Rhine*) within the Circles of *Franconia* and *Swabia*. General *Caprara* remains in the Empire to command the said Forces during the Winter. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Prince *Louis* with Letters of the 12th instant, which give an account, that he was then encamped near a place called *Erdis*; that he had received advice, that a Body of 10 or 12000 Turks and Tartars, who had been some time about *Debreczen*, understanding that Prince *Louis* was come to *Zaimar*, and that he designed to march against them, they were again retired into *Transilvania*, which had obliged him to return towards *Clausenburg*. The Emperor is sending an Envoy to *Muscovy*, who will begin his Journey in few days; His business is to endeavour to persuade the Czar to bring his Army into the Field very early in the Spring in order to fall into the *Crimee*, and thereby divert the Tartars from sending any Assistances to the Turks. The Elector of *Bavaria* has, since his arrival here, assisted at several Councils of War; and we are told, that his Electoral Highness will part from hence before the end of this Month, and take his Journey to the *Hague* to meet His Majesty of *Great-Britain*.

**Frankfort, December 24.** The Garison at *Hydelberg* is now 4000 Men compleat. And the new Fortifications that are making there are carried on with great diligence. We have advice, that the *Suissers* have put 900 Men more into *Geneva* for the Reinforcement of that Garison.

**Cologne, December 26.** General *Beck*, who went lately from hence for *Vienna*, is come back by the Emperor's Order, to command here as he did before. Four thousand Foot and 2000 Horse, of the *Brandenburg* Forces quartered in this Diocesis, were to Rendezvous the 22d instant at *Aldenhoven*, between *Juliers* and *Aix la Chapelle*, from whence they are to march towards the *Meuse*. The Baron de *Spaen*, Lieutenant-General of the said Forces, is, upon the receipt of an Express from Prince *Waldeck*, returned to *Maestricht*. The Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order is very shortly expected at *Menz*, where he will reside this Winter, being appointed by the Emperor to command his Troops quartered along the *Rhine* between *Menz* and *Hydelberg*; And General *Caprara* is to command the

of the 17th instant, that the Marquis d'Uxelles, and  
several other French Officers of note, were come  
from *Strasbourg* to *Hannover*, where the itop still

City of *Staffe*.

*Paris, December 21.* This week was published  
here an Edict, containing the Creation of two new  
Presidents, four Masters in Ordinary, four Con-  
sellers, and other Officers in the Chamber of Accounts  
of this City, who are for these Employments to  
pay a certain Sum of Money to the King. We are  
told, that tis resolved to augment the Marine Com-  
panies from 60 to 100 Men each, by which means  
these Troops will amount to 8500 Men. They  
write from *Rochede* of the 17th, that a Vessel was  
arrived there from a place called *St. Anne* near *Le-*  
*becke* in *Cannada*, and brought an account of the  
taking the last of these Towns by the English;  
the particulars, as related here, are, That the Eng-  
lish had about 35 Ships, and 3000 Land Soldiers;  
that their approach put the Inhabitants of *Quebeck*  
into a great consternation for several days; that the  
chieffest of them fled towards *Doufacke*, where they  
thought to Embark on some Fisher-boats, and so  
make their escape, having buried what rich Goods  
they could carry away in the adjacent Woods;  
that the rest thereupon submitted, and the English  
were in full possession of the Town when this Vessel  
came away. There are Letters from *Domingo* of the  
29th of *July*, which say, that the French Governor  
in that Island had with 1000 Men plundered and  
burnt the Spanish Town of *St. Jago de las Caval-*  
*eras*, situate towards the North end of that Island.  
The Posts between *France* and *Italy* are again  
opened by the way of *Savoy*.

*Brussels, December 24.* The Heer *Van Dyckvelt*,  
deputed by the States-General, arrived here the 21st  
instant from the *Hague*, and the next day had his  
Audience of the Marquis *de Gassanaga* our Gover-  
nor-General, and has since had several private Con-  
ferences with his Excellency concerning the present  
Juncture of Affairs. The Regiment commanded by  
the Marquis *de Noyelles*, arrived here on Wednesday  
last from *Breda* to reinforce our Garison, and we  
understand, that several other Dutch Regiments, as  
also some *Brandenburg* Horse, are moving this way  
for the greater security of the Country against the  
Enemies Incurfions, who continue to receive daily  
Reinforcements from *Germany*. The Count *de*  
*Ercoy*, who was lately sent by our Governor for  
*England*, to Compliment His Majesty upon his hap-  
py Expedition into *Ireland*, is returned hither this  
week.

*Hague, Dec 29.* The Count *de Solms* and the Count  
*de Noyelles* arrived here this week from *England*, and at  
the same time came over some of the King's Horses  
and Baggage, &c. The *Sieur d'Opdam*, who was  
lately sent by the States to Treat with the French  
Commissioners about the mutual exchange of Pri-  
soners, has remitted hither a Project of an Agree-  
ment made between them for that purpose, which  
it's believed the States will approve of. The Ofi-  
cers in the Army of this State have strict Orders to  
complete their Recruits by the middle of *February*  
at farthest. We hear from *Ostend*, that the late  
great Winds at N. W. had raised the Tides so high,  
that the Town received considerable damage there-  
by, the Palisadoes towards the Water side were all  
swept away, together with the Point of one of the  
Bastions, and several Vessels were driven out of the  
Haven to Sea, of which they have not yet any news.  
The Letters from *Turin* inform us, that the French

of *Pignerol* having made an Incurfion towards *Lu-*  
*cerne*, a Party of the *Vandis* fell upon them in their  
retreat and cut off above 150 of them, and put  
the rest to flight; and that about the same time the  
Marquis *de la Parella* had made an incurfion into  
*Provence*, where he had set divers Villages under  
Contribution.
