Privy Council Office, November 13, 1891.

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the Improvement Commissioners for the Local Government District of Mansfield, in the county of Nottingham, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

"Whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Act to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Act named and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularized:

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders from the Local Government District of Mansfield, in the county of Nottingham (the area of which district is co-extensive with the parish of Mansfield) petitioned Her Majesty the Queen, praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation:

"And whereas the said petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter:

"And whereas by Charter dated the second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, a part of the said district and parish was created a Municipal Borough by the name of the borough of Mansfield and the said Charter extends the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 to the said borough of Mansfield:

"And whereas under and by virtue of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth entitled 'An Act for Improving, Paving, Lighting. Cleansing and Watching the town of Mansfield in the county of Nottingham,' hereinafter called the Mansfield Improvement Act certain Commissioners called or known by the name of the Mansfield Improvement Commissioners (hereinafter called the 'Improvement Commissioners') were appointed for carrying into execution the said Act, which authorized the making of certain rates and generally provided for the government of the town of Mansfield aforesaid:

"And whereas the said town of Mansfield was an Improvement Act District within the meaning of the Public Health Acts 1872 and 1875 and became under the provisions of the said Act of 1872 and as from the date thereof an Urban Sanitary District and the said Commissioners became from the same date the Urban Sanitary Authority for such district under the said Acts of 1872 and 1875:

"And whereas by 'The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1874 (No. 5),' a Provisional Order was confirmed for partially repealing and amending the Mansfield Improvement Act:

And whereas the said Improvement Commissioners have borrowed certain sums of money upon the security of rates leviable by them under the provisions of the said Acts of Parliament:

"And whereas by 'The Mansfield Improvement Commissioners Gas Act, 1878,' and a deed made in pursuance thereof the undertaking was transferred to the Improvement Commissioners their successors and assigns for ever, and the same Act empowered the Improvement Commissioners to supply gas within the limits defined in the said Act as well without as within their district:

"And whereas the said Act of 1878 was amended by a Provisional Order confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act 1885, and by a further Provisional Order confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1889 (No. 8) the said Act of 1878 was further amended and the said Mansfield Improvement Act was repealed:

"And whereas by an Order under the seal of The Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales' made on the twenty-second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, in the matter of the Charity called 'The Eight Men's Intake' in the parish of Mansfield in the county of Nottingham; and in the matter of 'The Charitable Trusts Acts, 1853 to 1869,' the Charity Commissioners did order that the Chairman of the Local Board for the Local Government District of Mansfield aforesaid should be one of the three ex-officio Trustees of the said Charity, and that if and whenever a representative Trustee of the said Charity vacated office before the expiration of his full term his successor should be appointed by the said Local Board:

"And whereas by the scheme made by the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of The

Endowed Schools Act, 1869,' for the management 1 of the Free Grammar School of Queen Elizabeth at Mansfield aforesaid, approved by Her Majesty in Council at a Court held at Windsor on the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, it is provided that one of the three ex-officio members of the governing body of the said school shall be the Chairman of the Local Board for the Local Government. District of Mansfield, and that if and whenever a representative governor of the said school vacates office before the expiration of his full term, his successor shall be appointed by the said Local Board:

"And whereas it is expedient that provision be made for the continuance, transfer, and vesting and extension of the gas undertaking of the Improvement Commissioners as such Local Board, and other the property, rights, powers and privileges conferred by, or acquired under the said Gas Act of 1878, and Acts if any amending the same, and also conferred by or acquired under the said order of the Charity Commissioners and the said order of the Endowed School Commissioners, as by this scheme mentioned:

"And whereas it is expedient that a scheme should be made and settled containing the pro-

visions hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, pursuant to the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the said Committee of Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby direct, order and declare as follows:-

"1. This scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Mansfield Scheme, 1891.

"2. This scheme shall come and be deemed to have come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter, and this scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is hereinafter referred to as the commencement of this scheme. So far as may be necessary this scheme shall operate retro-

"3. The Municipal Borough created by the said Charter shall be placed immediately on, from and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough aforesaid, and thenceforward within the jurisdiction of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Mansfield, acting by the Council of the borough as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

4. The Improvement Commissioners, their powers, duties, obligations, and privileges shall continue, and shall be deemed to have continued until the commencement of this scheme unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the creation of the said borough, and immediately from and after the commencement of this scheme, the Local Board shall be, and the same is hereby abolished and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist.

-"5. The Gas Undertaking of the Improvement Commissioners, and every power, right, duty, capacity, liability, obligation, or property, exercisable by, attaching to, or vested in the Improvement Commissioners under the Gas Act of 1878, and Acts amending the same, shall pass to, be exercisable by, attach to and vest in the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Mansfield acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

"6. The right and privilege of the Chairman of the Improvement Commissioners to be an ex-1 them for a period of five years shall not be em-

officio Trustee of the Eight Men's Intake beforementioned, and also to be an ex-officio Governor of the Grammar School aforesaid, shall pass to, be exercisable by, attach to, and vest in the Mayor of the borough of Mansfield; and the right and privilege of the Improvement Commissioners to fill up vacancies among the representative Trustees of the said Charity and among the representative Governors of the said Grammar School shall pass to, be exercisable by, attach to, and vest in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Mansfield, acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

" 7. All rights, property, liabilities, or obligations vested in or attached to the Improvement Commissioners under the Public Health Act, 1875, or any Act amending or enlarging the same with respect to or for the purposes of so much of the Local Government District of Mansfield as is included within the borough of Mansfield, and all such rights, property, liabilities, or obligations vested in or attached to the said Improvement Commissioners as are not transferred under clause 10 hereof, shall pass to be exercisable by or against, vest in or attach to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgecses of the said borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

" 8.. All loans or debts attached to and owing by the Improvement Commissioners at the date of the commencement of this scheme and charged upon any rates leviable by the Commissioners shall attach to and be due from the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough, acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough and shall be charged upon the general district rate leviable by them within the

said horough.

"9. That part of the Local Government District of Mansfield which is not included within the limits of the said Municipal Borough, shall for all the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1875, and any Act amending or enlarging the same or incorporated therewith, be within and be part of the district of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Mansfield Union, and be within and subject to the jurisdiction of the said Rural Sanitary Authority, and shall be free and discharged from all liability in respect of any loans or debts attached to the Improvement Commissioners and charged on the general district or any other rate or rates leviable by the said Improvement Commissioners and all the powers, rights, privileges, franchises, duties, and obligations of the said Sanitary Authority shall apply to and be exercisable in the same as being part of the district of the said Sanitary Authority.

"10. All rights, property, liabilities, or obligations (other than loans or debts charged on the rates) vested in or attached to the Improvement Commissioners under the Public Health Act, 1875, or any Act amending or enlarging the same, solely with respect to or for the purposes of so much of the Local Government District of Mansfield, as is not included within the said borough shall pass to be exercisable by or against vest in or attach to the Rural Sanitary Authority

of the Mansfield Union.

"11. In the event of any question arising as to the meaning and effect of this scheme, such question shall be submitted to the Local Government Board, and their decision stated by them in writing and under their seal shall be final and conclusive for all purposes whatever.

"12. In case any officer of the Improvement: Commissioners who shall have been employed by

ployed by the Council of the said borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character, and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid, by way of compensation for the loss of his position, out of the funds of or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Mansfield, acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said Municipal Borough, such gratuity or annual allowance as, on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case, may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two or more of them, to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Commissioners, in awarding the said compensation, shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation under the provisions of the Superannuation Act, 1859, to a person retiring or removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office. Provided that no special minute within the meaning of the said Act, stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary, or be made. Provided, nevertheless, that if any such officer be so employed by the said Council, and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct), within two years of the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Council. Provided that the term "officer" shall include only persons employed by the Improvement Commissioners whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons. Provided, also, that the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, shall be the sole judges as to the right, title, or claim, of any officer to any compensation whatever, and as to the amount thereof, and the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, shall be the only judges upon any question which may arise under this clause, and, further, every determination of the said Lords Commissioners upon any such right, title, claim, amount, or question, shall be absolutely final and conclusive, and every such officer shall have such rights only under this clause as the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, consider just and reasonable. Any determination of the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, may be evidenced by writing under the

No act or omission done or made, or purporting to be done or made, under the said Act of 1878, or the said Intake and Grammar School schemes respectively, between the commencement of this scheme and the confirmation thereof by Parliament, or Order in Council (as the case may be) shall be invalidated by this scheme, but such act or omission shall be and continue valid, if the same would have been valid but for the retrospective operation of this scheme.

"14. The Accounts of the Improvement Commissioners and their officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the District Auditor of the Local Government Board in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted; the provisions of sections 247 and 250 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the District Auditors Act, 1879, and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board, with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards, and of their officers, shall apply to such audit; and the provisions of this scheme,

with respect to the Improvement Commissioners, shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation to the purposes of such audit. Any money certified by the District Auditor to be due from any person shall be paid to the Borough Treasurer.

"15. All bye-laws or orders made under or in pursuance of the Public Health Act, 1875, and all regulations made in pursuance of section 34 of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and section 9 of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1886, shall continue in force and be enforced in the said borough to the same extent in which they are now in force and enforceable within the Local Government District of Mansfield, substituting only the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Mansfield and their officers for the Improvement Commissioners and their officers. The said bye-laws and regulations may be altered, amended, or revoked as if they were bye-laws and regulations duly made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Mansfield acting by the Council of the Borough under the said Acts."

> Extract from the Cyprus Gazette. No. 1449.—Quarantine.

Under the powers vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner is pleased to direct that all vessels arriving in any port or part of Cyprus, except the port of Larnaca, from Tripoli and the coast to the south thereof as far as and including Jaffa, shall be repelled unless they have undergone quarantine at an intermediate port and are provided with a clean bill of health.

Vessels arriving at the port of Larnaca from Tripoli and the coast to the south thereof as far as and including Jaffa, unless they have undergone quarantine at an intermediate port and are provided with a clean bill of health, shall undergo quarantine of inspection of five clear days.

Vessels arriving in Cyprus from any part of the coast above referred to, unless they have cargo or passengers for Cyprus, shall be repelled absolutely.

Nothing in the foregoing regulations shall be held to prevent the Chief Superintendent of Quarantine, should he think it advisable, from refusing to admit any vessel to pratique.

Extract from the Cyprus Gazette. No. 1457.—Quarantine

Under the powers vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner is pleased to direct that—

1. All vessels arriving in any port or part of Cyprus, except the port of Larnaca, from any part of the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea, unless they have both undergone quarantine at an intermediate port, and are provided with a clean bill

of health, shall be repelled.

2. Vessels arriving at the port of Larnaca from any part of the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea, shall be placed in quarantine for at least ten clear days, unless such vessels have both undergone quarantine at an intermediate port, and are provided with a clean bill of health. Any passengers permitted to land from such vessels shall be landed in quarantine and shall undergo a quarantine of at least ten clear days from the date of leaving the ship. Passengers' baggage and merchandise shall be landed in quarantine and shall undergo, at the risk and cost of the owner or consignee, such disinfection as may be considered necessary by the Superintendent of Quarantine. Rags shall be repelled. Mails, except those forwarded in tarred bags, from non-infected countries, shall be landed in quarantine, disinfected, and delivered to the postal authorities with all possible

Under the powers vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1870," His Excellency the High Commissioner is pleased to direct that—

1. All vessels arriving in any port or part of Cyprus, except the port of Larnaca, from any part of the coast of Syria between the ports of Tripoli and Jaffa inclusive, unless they have both undergone quarantine of not less than ten clear days at an intermediate port and are provided with a clean bill of health, shall be repelled.

2. No passengers, except those domiciled in Cyprus, or coming to Cyprus on Government business, shall be allowed to land under any circumstances from vessels arriving at the port of Larnaca from any part of the coast of Syria between the ports of Tripoli and Jaffa inclusive, unless such vessels have both undergone a quarantine of at least ten clear days at an intermediate port, and are provided with a clean bill of health.

3. Vessels arriving at the port of Larnaca from any part of the coast of Syria between the ports of Tripoli and Jaffa inclusive shall be placed in quarantine for at least ten clear days, unless such vessels have both undergone quarantine of at least ten clear days at an intermediate port, and are provided with a clean bill of health. Any passengers permitted to land from such vessels shall be landed in quarantine, and shall undergo a quarantine of at least ten clear days from the date of leaving the ship. Passengers' baggage and merchandise shall be landed in quarantine and shall undergo at the risk and cost of the owner or consignee such disinfection as may be considered necessary by the Superintendent of Quarantine. Rags shall be repelled. Mails, except those forwarded in tarred bags from non-infected countries,

shall be landed in quarantine, disinfected, and delivered to the postal authorities with all possible despatch.

4. All vessels arriving in Cyprus from any part of the coast referred to in the preceding paragraphs, unless they have cargo for Cyprus or arrive in ballast to take cargo, shall be repelled absolutely.

5. Nothing in the foregoing regulations shall be held to prevent the Chief Superintendent of Quarantine, should he think it advisable, from refusing to admit any vessel to pratique.

conical and can shaped buoys.
