THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Place described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.
2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after this fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

A Place comprising the premises, including the byres and sheds, at Windlestrawlee, in the parish of St. Cuthberts, Midlothian, in the occupation of Mr. Thomas Lawrie.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. In the case of cattle exhibited at the Smithfield Club Show intended to be held at the Agricultural Hall, Islington, in the county of London, on the seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh days of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and of cattle exposed for sale at the Metropolitan Cattle Market, Islington, on Monday the fourteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, a Local Authority in granting Licences under Regulation B of Article 12 of The Pleuro-Pneumonia Order of 1891 for the movement of such cattle out of the Metropolitan Pleuro-Pneumonia Scheduled District may if they think fit substitute in such Licences eight days instead of the four days mentioned in condition (c.) of the said Regulation B as the limit of time within which cattle so moved must be slaughtered.
2. For the purpose of the movement of the above-mentioned cattle under this Order The Pleuro-Pneumonia Order of 1891 shall be read as amended by this Order.
