"ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other
things, enacted "That" when, with respect to his "own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the Bishop of any " diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop " that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop " shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme "of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said "Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall

"by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of York, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a Report dated the seventeenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninetyone to Her Majesty in Council in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"The undersigned William Dalrymple by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six hereby reports to Your Majesty in Council.

"1. That there is in the county and diocese of York the parish of the vicarage of Kirk Leavington which comprises the township of Low Worsall, the boundaries whereof are well known

and defined.

"That the population of the said parish of Kirk Leavington including the said township of Low Worsall is according to the last census five hundred and forty-eight, and that of the said township according to the same census is one hundred and eighty-four.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Kirk

Leavington is three hundred pounds.

"The patronage of the said vicarage is vested in the said Archbishop in right of his Archbishopric and the Reverend Frederick Davies Brock is the present vicar thereof, both of whom are consenting parties to the scheme hereinafter proposed.

"2. That there is in the same county and diocese the parish of the vicarage of High Worsall the boundaries whereof are well known and defined and immediately adjoin the said township of Low Worsall now as aforesaid comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Kirk Leavington.

"The population of the said parish of High

Worsall is sixty-nine.

"The net annual value of the benefice of High Worsall is seventy-two pounds.

"Consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "The patronage of the said vicarage is vested such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall in the Reverend Benjamin Charles Caffin vicar of certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, Northallerton in the said county and diocese in

right of his vicarage, and the Reverend Henry Oswald Crow is the present vicar thereof, both of whom are consenting parties to the scheme

hereinafter proposed.

"3. That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament the said township of Low Worsall may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Kirk Leavington to which it at present belongs and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the

said parish of High Worsall. ".4. That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect of patronage and the rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty certify the same to Your Majesty in Council with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and incumbents of the parishes to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty may in case it shall be thought expedient so to do make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said Archbishop's Report are in the words following :-"SCHEME.

"That the township of Low Worsall in the parish of Kirk Leavington in the county and diocese of York shall be separated from such parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining parish of High Worsall and that the same shall be known as the vicarage of High Worsall-with-Low Worsall.

" That the vicar of the parish of Kirk Leavington shall cease to have cure of souls within the limits of the said township of Low Worsall and the vicar of the parish of High Worsall shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of

such township.

"That the inhabitants of the said township of Low Worsall shall have the same rights as to pews and as to the performance of all offices and services of the church at the parish church of High Worsall as other inhabitants of the said parish of High Worsall.

"That the fees for all such offices and services so performed for the inhabitants of the said township of Low Worsall as aforesaid or arising within the limits of the same and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the vicar of High Worsall.

"That save as aforesaid no alteration shall be made in the endowment of either of the benefices

to be affected by this scheme.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said vicarage of High Worsall-with-Low Worsall shall be vested in the Archbishop of York and his successors in right of the See of York and the vicar of Northallerton and his successors in right of such vicarage who shall exercise the right of patronage as follows: -On the occasion of the next three vacancies which shall occur after the taking effect of this scheme the Archbishop of York shall be entitled to exercise the right of lastical Leasing Acts 1842 and 1857' being the

presentation, and on the fourth vacancy the vicar of Northallerton shall be entitled to exercise right and thereafter the Archbishop of York and vicar of Northallerton for the time being shall exercise the right of presentation successively provided always that the Archbishop of York for the time being shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation three times in succession after every presentation made by the vicar of Northallerton for the time

"And whereas the said William Haggar Barlow as such vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of Saint Mary Islington aforesaid and the Reverend Sir John Robert Laurie Emilius Laurie of Maxwelton in the county of Dumfries, Baronet, Clerk in Holy Orders the Reverend George Edward Tate now vicar or incumbent of the new parish of Saint Mary Kippington in the county of Kent Clerk in Holy Orders the Reverend Hanmer William Webb-Peploe of Onslowgardens in the said county of Middlesex Clerk in Holy Orders John Derby Allcroft of number one hundred and eight Lancaster-gate in the said county of Middlesex Esquire and Francis Augustus Bevan of number fifty-four Lombardstreet in the city of London Banker as the patrons of the said vicarage of Saint Mary, Islington by certain articles of Agreement duly stamped and dated the fifth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one have signified their willingness and desire that such portion of the improvement in the income or annual value which will accrue to the said vicarage of Saint Mary Islington under the provisions of the said Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts in consequence of the sale hereinbefore referred to as will consist of the income or dividends of the said sum of four thousand three hundred and fiftyseven pounds and six shillings India Three Pounds Per Centum Stock or of the income or dividends of I time received and invested) may be applied to:

the investments for the time, being representing the stock lastly-mentioned shall be appropriated. or applied (1) in augmentation of the endowments of the three new parishes or vicarages of . Saint James, Holloway, Saint Peter Islington. and Saint Stephen Islington being the three separate and distinct benefices or ecclesiastical. districts or new parishes within the ancient limits of the said parish of Saint Mary Islington which are now in the patronage of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Saint Mary Islington and (2) in or towards the endowment of any other ecclesiastical district. or new parish which may hereafter be constituted. within or assigned to any church or chapel within or. partly within the vicarage or ecclesiastical parish. of Saint Mary Islington as now constituted and of which other ecclesiastical district or new parish the vicar for the time being of the said. vicarage of Saint Mary Islington shall be the patron.

"And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England deem it to be expedient. that such portion as aforesaid of the said improvement in the income or annual value of the said. vicarage of Saint Mary Islington as aforesaid. shall be paid to us in manner contemplated by the. provisions of the said Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts; in order to be applied in making additional or

better provision for the cure of souls.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Haggar Barlow as such vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Saint Mary Islington: as aforesaid and with the consent of the said. John Robert Laurie Emilius Laurie George Edward Tate Hanmer William Webb-Peploe John Derby Allcroft and Francis Augustus Bevan as such patrons of the same vicarage as: aforesaid (in testimony of which consents they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the annual income or dividends of the said sum of four thousand three hundred and fifty-seven pounds and six shillings India Three Pounds Per Centum Stock or the income or dividends of the investments for the time being representing such last-mentioned sum of stock shall be payable and paid over to our common fund to be applied to and for the purposes of the said common fund and particularly (afterwe shall have consulted the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of London for the time being) in or towards:the future augmentation. of the endowments of the said new parishes or vicarages of Saint James Holloway Saint Peter: Islington and Saint Stephen Islington or in or towards the endowments of any other separate. ecclesiastical district or new parish which may hereafter be constituted or assigned within or partly within the said vicarage and parish of Saint Mary Islington and of which other ecclesiastical district or new parish the patronage shall become. and be vested in perpetuity in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Saint Mary Islington or in or towards augmenting the endowment of or endowing all or any one or more of the aforesaid new parishes or ecclesiastical districts. And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of four thousand three hundred and fifty-seven pounds and six shillings India Three Pounds Per Centum Stock: or the investments representing such stock and the income or dividends from time to time arising or accruing due thereon shall be accumulated to the intent that the accumulated fund so formed. (including the income or dividends from time to

the objects hereinbefore mentioned but that no such application of the accumulated fund so formed shall be made before the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven save and except at the instance or with the consent in writing of the said William Haggar Barlow if he shall so long continue vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Saint Mary, Islington aforesaid, and after we shall have consulted the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of London for the time being and after we shall have also consulted the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Saint Mary, Islington, if the next vacancy in that vicarage shall occur prior to the said first day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or in accordance with any other Act or Acts of Parliament.

"THE LEICESTER EXTENSION ACT, 1891.

"Borough of Leicester.

"WHEREAS by the Leicester Extension Act 1891, it was provided that the extended Borough of Leicester should be divided into such number of wards with such boundaries and names and such number of councillors as may be determined by a Commissioner to be for that purpose appointed by a Secretary of State within three weeks after the passing of the said Act.

"And it was further provided that the said extended borough should have sixteen aldermen

and forty-eight councillors.

"And the said Commissioner was by the said Act empowered to alter and re-arrange the boundaries of the existing wards, and reduce or add to the number thereof, and to form the whole or any portion of the added area into new wards or a new ward, or to add any portion or portions thereof to any existing ward or wards. "And I hereby do determine that Ward No. 13 otherwise 'West Humberstone' Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the extended borough of Leicester as is contained within a line commencing from the point of intersection of the northern boundary of Ward No. 5 with the Midland Railway near the Phoenix Iron Works, thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of the said railway to the boundary of the extended borough, thence in an easterly and southerly direction along the said boundary to the Great Northern Railway, thence in a westerly direction to the bridge crossing Green-lane thence to and along the centre of Green-lane to Mere-road thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Mere-road to a point opposite to the centre of Mount-road, thence to and along the centre of Mount-road to the boundary of Ward No. 6 thence in a north-westerly direction along the said boundary to the boundary of Ward No. 5, thence in a north-easterly direction along the said boundary to the point of commencement afore-

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a copy of the Cyprus Gazette, containing the following Quarantine Regulations:-

No. 1475.

Quarantine Regulations under the powers conferred on him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner has been pleased to make the following Regula-

QUARANTINE.

1. Quarantine shall be of two kinds, viz.:-Quarantine of observation and strict quarantine.

2. Quarantine of observation may be imposed for any period not exceeding five days, during which period the vessel will be isolated and will be daily visited by the Health Officer approaching on the windward side within speaking distance to ascertain the state of health on board, and whether proper hygienic measures are being taken on board to secure ventilation and cleanliness.

A vessel undergoing quarantine of observation may be subjected to strict quarantine if a case of infectious or contagious disease appears, or is

suspected to have taken place on board.

3. Strict quarantine consists of isolation for such period as the Health Officer (with the approval of the High Commissioner), having regard to the circumstances, shall think fit to impose, together with such measures of purification and disinfection as the Health Officer shall consider necessary.

Passengers.

- 4. Passengers arriving in Cyprus by any ship which shall be placed in strict quarantine, may be landed at a quarantine station, there to perform quarantine. The duration of such quarantine shall be the same as that which the ship has been ordered to undergo, but quarantine commenced on board ship may be completed in the quarantine station.
- 5. Passengers who have performed their term of quarantine on board ship shall, before being allowed free pratique, be landed at the quarantine station with their baggage, and their baggage and clothing shall undergo such process of disinfection as the Health Officer shall direct.
- 6. In the event of a case of cholera, yellowever, plague, or small-pox occurring on board a

tine station during a term of quarantine, the term shall recommence from that date, and the person attacked by the disease shall be at once isolated and all possible measures shall be taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

Goods.

7. For the purposes of quarantine, goods may be divided into three classes, viz. :-- Very suscep-

tible, susceptible, and non-susceptible.

(i.) Very susceptible goods consist of every description of rags, all worn clothing of suspected origin, all effects known to have been in the possession of persons who have died from cholera, yellow fever, plague, or small-pox, and the clothing and effects in use of persons suffering from any of the above diseases.

(ii.) Susceptible goods are the following, whether in an unmanufactured state or manufac-

tured or dressed in any way:-

Hides, skins, hair, feathers, wool, flax, hemp, tow, cotton, silk, vegetable fibres, hay, straw, herbs, pressed or in bale, letters, newspapers, paper packets, carpets, and all objects which are mixed, connected, gummed, sewn, or in any way united with susceptible material so that separation cannot take place.

(iii.) Non-susceptible goods are all goods not comprised in the categories of very susceptible

and susceptible goods.

8. Very susceptible goods may not be landed from a vessel in quarantine, but must be repelled or burnt.

- 9. Susceptible goods may be landed from a vessel in quarantine in a quarantine station, and will there undergo such process of disinfection as the Health Officer shall direct.
- 10. Non-susceptible goods may be landed in such manner as the Health Officer shall direct, and shall be delivered to the owners thereof without disinfection.

Mails.

11. Mails conveyed to Cyprus in vessels arrivarriving from infected ports will be landed at a quarantine station, and will there be subjected to such process of disinfection as the Health Officer shall think fit, except mails arriving from uoninfected countries and properly protected in tarred bags. Such mails after the removal of the outside covers will be delivered, without any further process, to the Post Office Authorities.

General.

12. No vessel shall be placed in quarantine without a cause being assigned, which shall be communicated to the captain or officer in charge of the vessel.

13. One or more guards shall be placed on board every vessel in quarantine with instructions to prevent communication, and to make such reports to the Health Officer as he shall

require.

14. A vessel to which free pratique has been refused may put to sea again before being placed in quarantine, or while undergoing quarantine. In such case the original bill of health shall be returned to the vessel, endorsed by the Health Officer, with a statement clearly showing the fact that the vessel was not admitted to free pratique the length of her stay, and the state of health of those on board.

In such cases passengers whose destination is Cyprus, and cargo for Cyprus or for transhipment at Cyprus, shall be landed at a quarantine station to undergo the quarantine imposed on the vessel.

15. Every person hindering or evading, or ship undergoing strict quarantine, or in a quaran- lattempting to hinder or evade, the carrying out of these regulations shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence under these regulations, within the meaning of clause 32 of the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879."

Sanitary Measures at the Port of Arrival.

1. Immediately on the arrival of a vessel, or as soon after as practicable, a Health Officer shall approach the vessel on the windward side, within speaking distance, and should he find that she carries a foul bill of health or has called at and communicated with a country scheduled as infected with cholera, plague, yellow fever or small-pox, he shall at once order the vessel to proceed to the quarantine ground, there to undergo such quarantine as may have been directed to be imposed on such arrivals. Should the Health Officer find that the vessel carries a clean bill of health, and has not called at and communicated with a country scheduled as infected with cholera, plague, yellow fever, or small-pox, he will enquire as to the health at the port of departure, and any intermediate port at which the vessel may have called, and the state of health of the passengers, if any.

Note.—All vessels which may enter a port in Cyprus, from whatever port they may arrive, will, before communicating with the shore, or before allowing any boat to approach, have to be

admitted to pratique.

2. Should the answers be satisfactory the Health Officer will go alongside, examine the bill of health, and, if this is satisfactory, will board the vessel where he will receive the usual pratique depositions signed by the master and surgeon (if any). Should this deposition be satisfactory, and should the Health Officer have no reason to doubt its correctness, he will admit the vessel to free

pratique.

3. If, on the contrary, the answers or depositions are unsatisfactory, or the Health Officer entertains any doubt respecting the condition of the vessel, he will not admit her to pratique, but will receive the bill of health, &c., in the special receptacle, in the same manner as from a foul vessel; and he will direct the Master to deliver any mails he may have to the Post Quarantine Department and await further instructions. Should the Health Officer employed on this duty be other than the Medical Health Officer of the port or district, he will without delay acquaint the latter of the circumstances and of the preliminary steps taken.

14. The following are the cases in which the provisions of section 3 shall be applied—

(a.) When a vessel, though provided with a clean bill of health, has had on board during the voyage ascertained cases of disease.

(b.) When a vessel has communicated at sea with anything likely to compromise her sanitary condition.

(c.) When a vessel on her arrival presents an infected sanitary condition connected with either her passengers or cargo.

(d.) When there exists any doubt as to the truth of the tenor of the bill of health.

(e.) When a vessel arrives from any port in Syria or Asia Minor where a British Consul is stationed without having the bill of health endorsed by such Consul, as required by the Orders of His Excellency the High Commissioner contained in Gazette Nos. 83, paragraph 7, of 3rd March, 1882, and 130, paragraph 8, of 1st May, 1884. (This sub-section does not apply to vessels of war.)

(f.) When a vessel is without a bill of health, or when the bill of health is irregular or incorrect. or when the vessel has touched at an intermediate port without obtaining the required endorsement.

(g.) When a death has occurred on board during the voyage.

(h.) When a vessel arrives from an infected port, but has received pratique at an intermediate port without having performed quarantine.

5. When a vessel has been refused pratique, or pratique has been delayed for any of the causes mentioned, the Medical Health Officer of the port or district will, as soon as possible, visit the vessel and act according to circumstances, as follows:—
i. If the vessel has not been allowed pratique

i. If the vessel has not been allowed pratique for reasons stated in section 4, sub-sections (b.), (c.) or (d.), he will investigate the case and medically inspect the passengers and crew, and, if he finds that the condition of the vessel is such as is stated in any one of those sub-sections, he will order the vessel to proceed to the quarantine ground, and will report the case with full particulars to the Chief Medical Officer, who will recommend to the Government the adoption of such measures as the circumstances of the case may seem to him to render necessary.

ii. If the condition of the vessel comes under sub-sections (a), (e), (f), (g), or (h), he will medically inspect the vessel, and if he finds no suspicion of communicable disease he will allow pratique. The case of vessels arriving without a bill of health or without having the bill of health properly viséd, will be dealt with by the imposition of a fine or otherwise as provided by

law

iii. If the condition of the vessel comes under sub-sections (a), (e), (f), (g), or (h), and the Medical Health Officer has any suspicion as regards the health of the vessel he will proceed as in paragraph 5, sub-section i.

6. Except under special circumstances pratique shall not be granted except between the hours of

sunrise and sunset.

FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1878. 41 Vict., c. 16, s. 53.

OVERTIME -ADDITIONAL Two Hours. Order of Secretary of State extending Special Exception.

WHEREAS the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, section 53, provides as follows:-

The regulations of this Act with respect to the employment of young persons and women shall not prevent the employment in the factories and workshops or parts thereof to which this exception applies of young persons and of women during a period of employment beginning at 6 o'clock in the morning and ending at 8 o'clock in the evening,

or beginning at 7 o'clock in the morning and ending at 9 o'clock in the evening, or beginning at 8 o'clock in the morning and ending at 10 o'clock in the evening, if they are employed in accordance with the following conditions; namely

(1.) There shall be allowed to every such young person and woman for meals during the period of employment not less than two hours, of which half an hour shall be after five o'clock in the evening; and

(2.) Any such young person or woman shall not be so employed on the whole for more than five days in any one week, nor for more than 48 days in any 12 months:

This exception applies to the factories and workshops and parts thereof specified in Part of the Third Schedule to this Act.

Where it is proved to the satisfaction of a Secretary of State that in any class of non-textile factories or workshops or parts thereof it is necessary by reason of the material which is the subject of the manufacturing process or handicraft therein being liable to be spoiled by the weather, or by reason of press of work arising at certain recurring seasons of the year, or by reason of the liability of the business to a sudden press of orders arising from unforeseen events, to employ young persons and women in manner authorized by this exception, and that such employment will not injure the health of the young persons and women affected thereby, he may, by order made under this part of this Act, extend this exception to such factories or workshops or parts thereof.

And whereas Part 2 of the same Act, section 63, provides as follows :

Where it appears to a Secretary of State that the adoption of any special means or provision for the cleanliness or ventilation of a factory or workshop is required for the protection of the health of any child, young person, or woman employed, in pursuance of an exception under this part of this Act, either for a longer period than is otherwise allowed by this Act, or at night, he may by order made under this part of this Act direct that the adoption of such means or provision shall be a condition of such employment:

And whereas it has been proved to my satisfaction that in the non-textile factories and workshops of the class mentioned in the Schedule hereunder, it is necessary, by reason of press of work arising at certain recurring seasons of the year, and of the liability of the business to a sudden press of orders arising from unforeseen events, to employ young persons and women in manner authorized by this exception, and that such employment will not injure the health of the young persons and women affected thereby, provided that it be subject to the condition hereinafter appearing.

Now I, the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under Part 2 of the said. Act, extend this exception accordingly: Provided that it shall be a condition of the employment of any young person or woman under this extended exception that there shall be a cubic space of at least four hundred feet for every young person and woman so employed.

This Order shall come into effect on the 1st day of December, and shall continue in force until the 24th day of December, 1891, inclusive, and no longer.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definition.

1. In this Warrant-

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same:

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of

man.

· Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the New Hebrides via Sydney.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage; that is to say,

On every Parcel not exceeding two pounds in

weight two shillings.

On every Parcel exceeding two pounds and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight for the first two pounds two shillings, and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight one shilling.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, there shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such parcel), or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable as hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hoursduring which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

 It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall, subject as hereinbefore mentioned, be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he thinksfit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained or returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say,

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

(2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of one penny in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel: Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage. or other sum charged under this clause. Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

11. With regard to-

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason;

the following provisions shall (subject to the provisions of the Warrant of the said Commissioners of the 12th day of December, 1888, relating to Foreign and Colonial Parcels) apply; (that is to say):

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by post to the sender through the Post Office of Sydney, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of Sydney that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

(4.) In any case the notice shall state that, in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such a manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and

contents of Parcels.

6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:-

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery

of the Parcel.

(b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for re-direction or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act,
- 1882. (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rate fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not prepaid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct

Re-direction to places out of United Kingdom.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or the New Hebrides is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

Re-direction to places within United Kingdom.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be redirected by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed:

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel-

(1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article, whether similar to the above or not; or

(2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(3.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of the United Kingdom or New South Wales.

(4.) Containing or bearing any letter or communication in the nature of a letter.

(5.) Consisting of or containing:

(a.) Any explosive substance. (b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.
(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptucle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that hy which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage. 20. Nothing contained in or done under or in

pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

THE SHROPSHIRE (SHEEP-SCAB) MOVEMENT ORDER OF 1891.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1490, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Regulations of Shropshire Local Authority as to Movement of Sheep into their District from other

- 1.—(1.) The Local Authority of the county of Salop may, with the view of preventing the introduction of sheep-scab into their District, make such Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or by water of sheep into their District from the District of any other Local Authority in England or Wales or Scotland.
- 2.) Where the Local Authority of the county of Salop have made a Regulation under the provisions of this Article prohibiting the movement of sheep into their District from the District of any other Local Authority in England or Wales or Scotland, it shall not be lawful, so long as such

Regulation is in force, for any person to move into the District of the county of Salop any sheep tha may have been at any time during the continuance of such Regulation within the District of such other Local Authority: Provided that the provisions of this paragraph shall not extend to any such sheep moved by railway through such lastmentioned District without untrucking.

(3.) No Regulation made under this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of—

(a.) Sheep into a Cattle-Plague Infected Place or a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Circle or Area; or

(b.) Sheep affected with sheep-scab; or

(c.) Sheep by railway through the District of the Local Authority of the county of Salop, without untrucking;

which movement is regulated by the Acts of 1878 to 1890 and Orders issued thereunder.

Regulations of Shropshire Local Authority as to Movement of Sheep within their District.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority of the county of Salop may, with the view of preventing the spreading of sheep-scab, make such Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or by water of sheep in the whole of their District or in any part or parts thereof.

(2.) No Regulation made under this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of—

(a.) Sheep in or into or out of a Cattle-Plague Infected Place, or a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Circle or Area; or

(b.) Sheep affected with sheep-scab; or

(c.) Sheep by railway through the District of the Local Authority of the county of Salop, without untrucking;

which movement is regulated by the Acts of 1878 to 1890 and Orders issued thereunder.

Limitation on Power of Shropshire Local Authority to make Rejulations.

3. The power to make Regulations under this Order shall be exercised only by the Local Authority of the county of Salop or their Executive Committee and shall not be deputed to any other Committee or Sub-Committee.

General Provisions as to Regulations.

4.—(1.) The Local Authority of the county of Salop shall forthwith send to the Board of Agriculture a copy of every Regulation made by them under the provisions of this Order.

(2.) If the Board of Agriculture are satisfied on enquiry with respect to any Regulation made under the provisions of this Order that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Production of Licences: Names and Addresses.

5.—(1.) Every person in charge of sheep being moved, where, under any Regulation made by the Local Authority of the county of Salop under the provisions of this Order a Movement Licence may be necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.
6.—(1.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of any Regulation made by the Local Authority

of the county of Salop under the provisions of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If a person in charge of sheep being moved, where under any Regulation made by the Local Authority of the county of Salop under the provisions of this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false rame or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an

otience against the Act of 1878.

(3.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of a Regulation made under the provisions of this Order allows a sheep to stray he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Interpretation.

7. In this Order—

The Act of 1878 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

The Acts of 1878 to 1890 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as THE SHROP-SHIRE (SHEEP-SCAB) MOVEMENT ORDER of 1891.
