THE following Statutes, passed on the twenty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, by the Governing Body of Trinity College or Hall, in the University of Cambridge, and sealed on the thirtieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

STATUTES to add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877, 40 and 41 Victoria chapter 88 in relation to the College or Hall of the Holy Trinity in the University of Cambridge duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College or Hall specially summoned for this purpose held on the 21st day of December 1891 and passed at such Meeting by the unanimous vote of all persons present and voting, there being then present the Master and ten Fellows and now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

We the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of the said College or Hall do hereby in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th Section of the said Act add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College or Hall in the following manner:—

By substituting for Section 2 of Statute VII the

following section to form an amended Section 2 of such Statute.

2. Every vacant Fellowship other than the Professorial Fellowship shall be filled within two years from the date of vacancy, unless the Chancellor of the University, for special reasons, shall express his approval in writing of a delay in filling up the vacancy for a further period not exceeding two years; and in case the Fellowship is not filled within such period, the Master shall appoint, by writing, some person qualified as aforesaid for election.

By substituting for Section 2 of Statute IX the following section to form an amended Section 2 of such Statute.

2. The tenure of a Fellowship shall be for six years from the date of election or appointment and on the expiration of the Fellowship of any Fellow he shall not be re-elected.

Provided however as follows:—

(1a.) A Fellow who at the expiration of such six years shall hold the Office of Tutor or Assistant Tutor in the College or that of Professor in the University, shall continue to hold his Fellowship so long as he shall be retained in such office.

(1b.) A Fellow who at the expiration of such six years shall hold the Office of Bursar or shall be a member of the Educational Staff of the College may by the vote of a majority of the Governing Body be retained in his Fellowship so long as he shall continue to hold the said office, but the combined number of Fellowships so held in virtue of this sub-section at any one time shall never exceed four.

(1c.) A Fellow who at the expiration of such six years is the holder of a College Office, other than the Bursarship, under Statute XII for an unexpired term may, by the vote of a majority of the Governing Body, be retained in his Fellowship till the term for which he holds such College Office has expired but no longer.

(2.) Any Fellow or ex-Fellow who, holding or having held the Office of Tutor or that of Assistant Tutor in the College shall also have been a member of the Educational Staff for a period in all of twenty years and any Fellow or ex-Fellow, who being eminently distinguished as a man of science, learning or letters, shall have held the Office of Professor in the University for a period of fifteen years whether he continue to hold or have ceased to hold the said Office of Professor may be retained in his Fellowship for life or re-elected to a Fellowship for life by the vote of a majority of the Governing Body.

(3.) Provided however that the combined number of Fellowships held under sub-section 2 of this section of this Statute shall never exceed three at any one time, namely, two held by virtue of past service as a member of the Educational Staff and one held by virtue of past service on the Professoriate of the University.

By substituting for Section 7 of Statute X the following section to form an amended Section 7 of such Statute.

7. The Master shall have power, for sufficient reason, to suspend any member of the Educational Staff, or any College Lecturer, from the performance of his duties, but members of the Educational Staff, or any College Lecturer, shall be subject to dismissal only by a majority of the Governing Body, from whose decision there shall be no appeal, except in the case of a member of the Governing Body, when such dismissal if it involves the vacating of his position as such member, but not otherwise, shall be subject to an appeal to the Visitor.

By substituting for Section 12 of Statute X the

following section to form an amended Section 12 of such Statute.

12. Lecturers of the College who are not members of the Governing Body may be required to attend the ordinary College Meetings for the purpose of being consulted upon any matters relating to their province.

And by substituting for Section 2 of Statute XIII the following section to form an amended Section 2 of such Statute.

2. The tuition fees rendered chargeable as aforesaid shall constitute a separate fund under the name of the Tuition Fund, which, after defraying ordinary working expenses shall be applied by a majority of the Governing Body to the sole purpose of paying the salaries of the members of the Educational Staff and of the College Lecturers. A majority of the Governing Body shall from time to time regulate the proportions or amounts of the said fund which shall be paid as such salaries and shall have power to supplement the said fund out of the income of the College.

From the Adjutant-General in India to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

IN continuation of this Office, No. 232 M.M., dated 22nd June, 1891, I have the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward, for the favourable consideration of Government, the accompanying letter from the General Officer lately commanding the Miranzai Field Force, soliciting the addition to his Despatch, dated the 8th June, 1891, of a paragraph bringing to notice the services of Major the Honourable K. Turnour, 1st Battalion, the King's Royal Rifle Corps.

2. The addition should, it is suggested, be inserted at the end of paragraph 7 of the Despatch.

WITH the approval of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, I have the honour to request that the following supplement may be added to my Despatch on the Miranzai Expedition and submitted to the home authorities with a view to publication in the London Gazette:—

"After Colonel Cramer was wounded the command of the King's Royal Rifles devolved on Major the Honourable K. Turnour, who commanded this fine battalion of young soldiers to my entire satisfaction throughout the subsequent operations."

FIELD OPERATIONS.—BURMA.

THE Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication, for general information, of the subjoined correspondence and despatch relating to the operations carried on in the Wuntho territory from February to April, 1891, by the forces under the command of Brigadier-General G. B. Wolseley, C.B.

No. 5642-A—"Field Operations—Burma,"—dated Simla, 22nd August, 1891.

From Major-General W. Galbraith, C.B., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

IN submitting, for the consideration of the Government of India, the accompanying report* on the operations carried on in the Wuntho

territory from the 16th February to the end of April, 1891, I have the honour, by the direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to state that His Excellency concurs in the commendation bestowed by the Commander-in-Chief, Madras, on Brigadier-General Wolseley, C.B., and the officers and troops employed under his command, in the suppression of the rebellion in that State; and in the high terms in which Sir James Dormer speaks of the services of Captain H. D'U. Keary, Commandant, Shwebo Military Police Battalion, and of the other officers specially mentioned by Brigadier-General Wolseley.

No. 2170-W, dated Ootacamund, 30th July, 1891.

From Lieutenant-General the Honourable Sir J. C. Dormer, K.C.B., Commander-in-Chief, Madras Army, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to forward, for submission to the Commander-in-Chief in India, the report on the operations carried on in the Wuntho territory by Brigadier-General Wolseley, C.B., from February to the end of April.

2. I fully endorse Major-General Stewart's appreciation of the manner in which the operations were conducted; for, although the capture of the Sawbwa was not effected, the rebellion in his territory was effectually stamped out.

3. Captain Keary, of the Military Police, seems to be an officer of great intrepidity and decision; for, at a most critical moment, he assumed with a portion of his mounted infantry the rôle of cavalry, and dispersed the enemy who were attacking Kawlin on three sides—a result which justified this mode of employing mounted infantry.

4. The death of Captain Bray, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General for intelligence for Upper Burma, was a great loss to the column, as he was a most valuable and capable officer.

5. In conclusion, I submit that credit is due to Brigadier-General Wolseley, ably assisted as he was by all the officers and troops under him for the successful termination of the operations, which were unavoidably carried on at a most trying time in the year; and I would desire to bring to notice specially the conduct of the officers and men of the Military Police, who assisted in the operations and materially contributed towards the result attained.

From Major-General R. C. Stewart, C.B., Commanding the Burma District, to The Adjutant-General, Madras Army.

I HAVE the honour to submit, for the information of the Commander-in-Chief, a report by Brigadier-General G. B. Wolseley, C.B., and enclosures as per margin,† of the operations in the Wuntho territory, which commenced on the 16th February and terminated on the 30th April.

2. General Wolseley's report leaves me little to say but to express my appreciation of his

conduct of the operations, which, though short, were perhaps, from the rapidity with which the troops took the field, and from the fact that the operations commenced at a very late season, of even a more trying nature than is usual in Burma.

3. General Wolseley's forces were successful throughout, except in the capture of the Sawbwa, who fled precipitately on the approach of our troops; and his advance on the jade-mines, as having opened out a hitherto unknown country and anticipating an expedition which would have been forced upon us at a very early date, has been of very great advantage.

4. I cordially endorse General Wolseley's opinion of the conduct of the troops under his command, and I cannot too strongly bring to favourable notice the admirable conduct of the military police—the Inspector-General, Brigadier-General Stedman, C.B., and subsequently Major Peile, having done their utmost to cooperate with the military authorities.

5. I fully concur in the recommendation of the officers named by General Wolseley, and I would specially mention for services worthy of recognition Captain H. D'U. Keary, Commandant, Shwebo Police, and Second-Lieutenant H. C. Holman, of the Devonshire Regiment.

6. In conclusion, I cannot say how fully I appreciate the assistance and advice rendered by Mr. G. D. Burgess, C.S.I., Commissioner, Northern Division, who, from his knowledge of the circumstances which necessitated the expedition, his appreciation of the situation at the earliest date, and his control of the political operations, helped so much to bring the expedition to a satisfactory and speedy conclusion.

From Brigadier-General G. B. Wolseley, C.B., Commanding Wuntho Expedition, to the Adjutant-General, Madras Army (through the General Officer, Commanding the Burma District).

I HAVE the honour to submit the following report upon the operations of the Northern, Southern, and Mogaung columns of the Wuntho expedition.

2. The objects of the expedition, as defined for my guidance, was briefly:

Firstly. To suppress a sudden outburst of rebellion which had broken out almost simultaneously in the extreme northern and southern limits of the hitherto independent State of Wuntho.

Secondly. To depose and, if possible, capture the Sawbwa and his father; failing which, to drive them and all their adherents out of the country.

Thirdly. To annex, disarm, and permanently secure the future peaceful administration of the country.

3. To enable me to carry out these objects, the following troops were placed at my disposal:

In addition to these regular troops, the Katha Battalion of Military Police and portions of the Ye-u, Shwebo, and Môn-ywa Battalions of Military Police, as well as all military and civil police holding posts in or bordering on the Wuntho State, were placed under my orders.

4. The first pressing necessity was the immediate despatch of troops to Kawlin, which was reported to be in a state of siege, surrounded by hundreds of temporarily emboldened rebels who had burnt Kawlin and other Government police posts and numerous bordering villages.

5. The first intelligence of this alarming state of affairs reached Mandalay on the 15th February, and within three days of that date Lieutenant Nesbitt, with 100 rifles of the 20th Madras Infantry, arrived in Kawlin from Ti-gyaing, followed on the 19th of the same month by Captain Keary with a detachment of the Shwebo Battalion of Military Police, and on the 21st by 105 rifles of the Devonshire Regiment under Captain Davies, 100 rifles of the 20th Madras Infantry under Lieutenant Sandford, 25 mounted infantry of the 20th Madras Infantry under Lieutenant Hodding, and 50 mounted infantry of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry under Captain Custance, and finally, on the 23rd, by Major Smyth, Royal Artillery, with a section of his battery, 50 rifles of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry under Captain Eveleigh, and 50 mounted infantry of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry under Lieutenant the Honourable W. J. H. de Montmorency. Meanwhile Captain Hutchinson with 130 rifles of the Ye-u Battalion, and Captain Hodges with 134 rifles of the Môn-ywa Battalion, were marching on Kawlin, and reached Okkan on the 22nd and 23rd February respectively.

6. The arrival at Kawlin of Captain Keary with his detachment on the afternoon of the 19th February may be regarded as the critical turning point of this southern outburst, as the enemy was actually at the time of his arrival engaged in attacking Kawlin on three sides; and Captain Keary's gallant charge on their centre was a brilliant feature in the campaign, which, followed as it was by a dismounted party of his men, under Subadar Prakasa Rai, attacking and capturing a strongly stockaded position in which the enemy, dispersed by the charge, had sought refuge, and killing every man inside it, completely changed the whole aspect of affairs.

In this engagement our losses were—

Shwebo Battalion, Military Police.

1 sepoy killed, 4 sepoy severely wounded, 1 sepoy slightly wounded.

Katha Battalion, Military Police.

1 sepoy mortally wounded.

20th Madras Infantry.

1 sepoy mortally wounded, 1 sepoy severely wounded.

On the enemy's side 18 dead bodies were found on the ground, but 30 were reported to have been killed.

The enemy were vain enough to think that, although their attacking powers had been crushed, they still might oppose us in fortified positions. The simultaneously successful attacks on the 22nd February upon their entrenched and stockaded positions at Kyaingkwintaung and near Ôkkan must undoubtedly have convinced them even of this folly, for after that date they never again really stood against us, and after the turning movement on their final position on the Mankin pass between Wuntho and Pinlebu on the 25th February, and the subsequent shelling of the stockaded village of Mankin on the same day, all armed resistance in Southern Wuntho ceased.

7. In the engagements on the 22nd I regret to say our losses were heavy.

AT ÔKKAN.

Captain Hutchinson, Commanding the Ye-u Battalion, Military Police, mortally wounded.

1 sepoy killed, 2 sepoy's dangerously wounded, 3 sepoy's severely wounded, 2 sepoy's slightly wounded.

Whilst Captain Pond, who successfully concluded the fight after Captain Hutchinson was wounded, narrowly escaped a similar fate by receiving a bullet through his helmet.

AT KYAINGKWINTAUNG.

Devon Regiment.

3 privates killed, 1 private dangerously wounded, 6 privates severely wounded.

Second-Lieutenant H. C. Holman slightly wounded.

Sergeant-Major Birch slightly wounded, 1 private slightly wounded.

Commissariat Department.

Sergeant A. G. Seward severely wounded.

Shwebo Battalion, Military Police.

3 sepoy's severely wounded.

20th Madras Infantry.

1 sepoy severely wounded.

Enemy's losses.

At Kyaingkwintaung 53 dead bodies were counted, and at Ôkkan the enemy lost 27 killed. Number of wounded in both actions unknown.

Our losses on the 25th were nil.

8. Thus, within ten days of the first outbreak of hostilities at Kawlin, the first object of the expedition had been successfully accomplished in Southern Wuntho before even the expeditionary force had been regularly organized. This unique feature of the expedition—namely, the suddenness with which it had to take the field—rendered it necessary for me to remain in Mandalay until the 24th February to make all those preliminary arrangements which should ordinarily be made before any concentration of troops for field service is effected. Luckily the General Officer Commanding in Burma was in Mandalay at the time, and, thanks to his advice and help, and the liberal manner in which he supported all my demands, I was enabled to facilitate the equipment and organization of the force. It was decided that for the troops operating in Southern Wuntho, Tigyain, a military post on the right bank of the Irrawaddy, 180 miles from Mandalay and 41 from Kawlin, should become the base; whilst Katha, a military police station some 40 miles higher up, on the same bank of the Irrawaddy, was chosen as the base for the Northern Column.

9. At this time the Mogaung Column was working altogether independently, and operating beyond the sphere of Wuntho territory; so it had not to be taken in consideration.

10. Meanwhile the Northern Column was be-

ing concentrated at Katha, and pushed on as rapidly as possible to Mawteik, where Colonel Macgregor assumed command on the 26th February.

11. The delay in the concentration of this column was owing to the increased distance of its base, Katha, from Mandalay, whence the greater portion of its troops had to be drawn. On the 27th February the advance guard of this column was opposed soon after leaving Mawteik on the road to Banmaux, but easily overcame the resistance after interchanging a few shots. Further on fire was again opened on it from the stockaded village of Banmaux, which it was found necessary to shell, and, on flanking parties being sent out, the enemy retired, and the column occupied it without any casualties on our side. On the morning of the 28th Lieutenant Caulfeild advanced on Kyank-tonlon, where the Wuntho Sawbwa's father, Maung Shwe Tha, was reported to be holding a strong position. It was successfully carried by flank attacks, with a loss on our side of only one Karen slightly wounded, whilst on the enemy's side nine dead bodies were found and 25 wounded were reported. In this engagement the old ex-Sawbwa narrowly escaped capture, and it was the last occasion on which any opposition was offered to our troops throughout the expedition.

12. I assumed the personal control of the operations at Wuntho on the night of the 26th February, and proceeded next day with Major Smyth's column towards Pinlebu.

13. My first care on arriving in the country was to circulate freely throughout the country the proclamation in Burmese which had only just been got ready in time to be taken with me on leaving Mandalay on the 24th, and to encourage the people to return to their villages and bring their arms into Wuntho. This I found they had already begun to do on my arrival there.

14. On my arrival at the deserted village of Pinka next afternoon, I found a letter in the village from the young Sawbwa, asking me not to proceed further, and offering to pay any reasonable fine I might think fit to impose for the damage already done by his people; also informing me that he had forbidden his people to offer any further resistance to our troops.

15. To this I sent on at once a reply to the effect that, until he surrendered to me in person, I was precluded from making any terms with him beyond offering him his life and protection to his family and private property. His object in addressing me in these terms may have been, as he stated in his letter, to give him time to induce his father to surrender or to gain time to further strengthen his and his father's powers of resistance. But as I was impressed with the conviction that he had tried to dissuade his father in the first instance from hostilities, and had himself only taken up arms against us because of his having failed to influence his father, my duty seemed clearly to accept the latter interpretation of his letter.

16. Whatever his real object was, the fact remains that he bolted from Pinlebu on the morning of the 27th, which was occupied the same afternoon by Captain Hodges and Captain Pond with their military police. From information subsequently received, it appears that he was actually reading a letter from Mr. Fowle, who, previous to my arrival in Wuntho, had written to him in the same terms as I did on the 27th, when he received information of the

fight at Okhan, and that that column was pushing on to his capital.

17. On my arrival at Pinlebu on the morning of the 1st March, I found Captain Hodges and his men in occupation of this very strongly stockaded position. Many of the people had returned to the village, and others were coming in freely with their arms; but I could obtain no reliable information as to the Sawbwa's line of retreat beyond the fact that he fled from the place on the morning of the 27th. Here the great difficulty faced me that before I could proceed northwards in pursuit of the ex-Sawbwa I must again return to Wuntho to obtain fresh supplies; for so urgent was the necessity for pouring troops into Kawlin and Wuntho, and so great was our difficulty in obtaining transport, that our troops were obliged to advance with only a few days' rations carried on such mules and coolies as could be impressed at Tigyaing, whilst the troops from Shwebo brought only ten days' rations with them, carried on carts which were useless beyond Wuntho.

18. However, even had I been able to despatch a column at once in pursuit of the ex-Sawbwa, I believe it could not have overtaken him, as during my advance on Pinlebu on the 28th February the mounted infantry under Captain Custance and the Shwebo Mounted Police under Captain Keary had been given a free hand, and had pushed well forward in a northerly direction without finding any trace of the ex-Sawbwa or his followers.

19. This great difficulty of rationing the troops and improvising transport had engaged the earnest attention of the General Officer Commanding the Burma District and myself before I left Mandalay, and with the help of the civil authorities we were enabled to procure hired Panthay mules; but these animals had to be brought from Bernardmyo to the Irrawaddy, a distance of 65 miles by land, and then by steamer from Thabeitkin to Tigyaing and Katha. All this took considerable time.

20. Meanwhile rations had to be poured into both these bases of operations, which, together with the already existing strain on our marine transport in conveying troops from Mandalay to Tigyaing and Katha, considerably hampered my movements.

21. However, on the 4th March, having satisfied myself as to the peacefulness of Pinlebu and the peoples round about, and having arranged for the establishment of certain posts along that frontier as well as around Wuntho, I was enabled to proceed with a small column—110 rifles of mounted troops—towards Mansè, where I felt mounted troops were then more required than in Southern Wuntho, and making forced marches reached that place, a distance of 71 miles, on the 7th, to find all quiet there, and the place in possession of Colonel Macgregor's advance guard. The first object of the expedition had been accomplished throughout the country by the 28th February; the second and third were so intimately connected that whilst engaged in the one I was giving effect to the other. Thus by the 30th March I was enabled to report that the whole country south of Mansè had been disarmed, and was so peaceful as to be ripe for civil administration. During this time posts had been established throughout the country, and all old Wuntho officials who had accepted the terms of our proclamation deposing the Sawbwa and annexing the country, and established their claims to office, had been reinstated, and other appointments made.

22. In order to bring about this peaceful state of affairs and thoroughly restore confidence, troops were kept moving throughout the country—notably a column under Lieutenant-Colonel Clark, consisting of 100 rifles of the Oxfordshire Light Infantry, a few of whom were mounted, which was despatched from Banmank on 16th March towards Mawnaing and thence, travelling southward, scoured the whole western frontier of the country, reaching Wuntho on the 3rd April, via Mettaung.

23. Two other columns were despatched from Mansè in pursuit of the ex-Sawbwa and his father—one under Lieutenant-Colonel Macgregor, D.S.O., to Indawgyi, to open up communication with the Mogaung column under Captain O'Donnell; and the other, consisting of mounted infantry, under Captain Custance, to Shwe-dwin via Seyua, at which place it was then reported that the young ex-Sawbwa was hiding; whilst a third column, with 50 Karens, under Mr. Prendergast, and 30 Gurkhas, proceeded under Lieutenant Owen, Oxfordshire Light Infantry, to the top of Taungtônlon, 5,652 feet high, to endeavour to establish a signalling station there. This was found to be impracticable owing to the density of the jungle and the utter absence of water within five or six miles from the summit.

24. During these movements I found my presence needed at Mansè for the organization of transport, and for making the necessary arrangements (in the event of neither of these columns succeeding in capturing the ex-Sawbwa or his father) for continuing the pursuit on to the jade-mines.

25. The Northern and Mogaung Columns first joined hands at Payani on the 30th March without, I regret to say, effecting the capture of either the young or the old ex-Sawbwa, who were then both reported to have taken refuge at the jade-mines.

26. From this place I found it necessary to despatch the Mogaung Column to punitively visit the Sana Sawbwa in his capital, whilst the Northern Column, under Lieutenant-Colonel Macgregor, marched by the direct route to Indawgyi.

27. Captain O'Donnell having satisfactorily carried out his instructions with regard to Sana, where no opposition was offered and the place found deserted, both columns concentrated at Indawgyi on April 7th. From this the two columns marched by converging routes on to Sauka jade-mines, where I arrived on the 15th without any opposition, and was well received by the people.

28. Next day I marched a column to Tawmaw, one of the workings of the jade-mines, but finding no ground suitable for an encampment, I returned the same day to Sauka. Having selected a good site on which to construct the new post, I detailed the following garrison to hold it:—Two guns of No. 6 (Bombay) Mountain Battery and 132 rifles of the Mogaung Levy under Captain O'Donnell. Here, as elsewhere throughout the pursuit, I could obtain no reliable information as to the whereabouts of the ex-Sawbwa or his father beyond the fact that they had fled towards China, having failed to obtain assistance or protection from the Kansì Sawbwa and other officials in and about the jade-mines.

29. It being impossible to follow up the pursuit, I made a final attempt at cutting off their retreat by blocking the road to Laban, through which the only direct road from the jade-mines to China passes, with a column of the Mogaung Levy under Inspector Crawther; but from in-

formation received there, it appears that the fugitives avoided all main tracks, and were making for China by the round-about road via the amber-mines, whither it was impossible to follow them.

30. The movement of the Northern and Mogaung Columns on the jade-mines, and the establishment at that place of a military post, brought the operations of the Wuntho expedition, I think, to a satisfactory conclusion, as the establishment of this fort forms a connecting link in the chain of posts on our northern frontier, extending from the Irrawaddy to the Chindwin river, and thence to Kohima. The Northern Column returned to Katha via Mohnyin, thus opening up another bit of hitherto unexplored country, whilst the rest of the troops returned via Mogaung, where in personal consultation with the Commissioner, Northern Division, and with the sanction of the General Officer Commanding the Burma District, field operations were closed on the 30th April.

31. Although the ex-Sawbwa and his father have not been captured, I still confidentially claim for the troops engaged that all three objects of the expedition were successfully accomplished. No troops could have behaved better, and throughout the operations but one single case of undiscipline came under my notice.

From the start to finish they evinced throughout a cheerful and willing spirit, which, considering the hard and trying marches, reflects great credit upon all the officers and men concerned.

32. From the time the troops took the field to the close of the operations not a single village was burnt or damaged which had not offered resistance to us, with the solitary exception of Sana, which, for political reasons, it has long been intended to have destroyed, and it was at the time of its destruction abandoned.

Bearing in mind the heat of the sun by day and the heavy dews which usually prevailed by night, the absence of camp equipage and all other shelter usually found in Burma, beyond such temporary cover as the men themselves could hastily improvise after long fatiguing marches, often not reaching camp till five and six in the evening, the health of the force was, I think, on the whole satisfactory.

33. The medical and sanitary arrangements were, as I knew they would be, thoroughly well worked out, at first by Surgeon R. S. F. Henderson, and subsequently by Surgeon G. E. Hale. I cannot speak in too high terms of these valuable medical officers.

I am also pleased to endorse Lieutenant-Colonel Macgregor's warm approval of the good services rendered to his column by Surgeon R. H. Castor, Indian Medical Service (Madras).

34. The commissariat arrangements were well looked after by Lieutenant-Colonel W. H. M. Francklyn at Mandalay, and rations admirably supplied to the different troops in the field under the careful supervision of Lieutenant Taylor, Chief Commissariat Officer to the expedition.

35. The transport and general supervision along the line of communications were energetically and intelligently conducted by Major H. E. C. Kitchener, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry. My special thanks are due to Captain Barwick, of Her Majesty's Indian Marine, for the energetic and eminently successful way in which he conducted the marine transport during the expedition.

36. The lateness of the season at which the operations were begun, precluded all hope of constructing new roads, but the services of the Public Works Department were conspicuous by the energetic and willing way in which Mr. Richard, Superintendent Engineer, met all my wishes with regard to the construction of posts and the improvement of the roads between Tigmaing and Wuntho and between Wuntho and Pinlebu, in which work he was ably assisted by Mr. Bligh, Lieutenant Fraser, Royal Engineers, and Mr. Walling. This latter officer is also brought prominently to my notice by Lieutenant-Colonel Macgregor. The Queen's Own Sappers and Miners under Lieutenant L. P. Chapman, Royal Engineers, also rendered valuable service in the construction of other posts.

37. My thanks are also due to the Telegraph Department for the speed with which they completed the line of wire to Wuntho, and hurried on the opening up of the line from Katha to Mansè; and to the Postal Department for the arrangements made by them for the speedy delivery of the letters and papers to the several columns engaged in the operations.

38. My duties as Chief Political Officer to the expedition were materially lightened by the ever-willing and energetic manner in which Mr. E. Fowle assisted me throughout. This officer joined me at Wuntho on my assuming personal control of the operations, and remained with me till they closed. I cannot speak too highly of the valuable services he rendered to the expedition. Colonel Macgregor brings to notice the good service rendered to him and his column by Mr. Emile Martini, and my personal experience of that officer enables me, I am happy to say, to endorse Colonel Macgregor's favourable report. I am also much indebted to Mr. Collins for his assistance to the Northern Column and advice and help afforded to me throughout the operations. My thanks are also due to the civil officers acting under him, all of whom have done well.

39. I would here also mention the good services rendered by Mr. George, Survey of India, who volunteered to remain in Kawlin during the trying times when it was in a state of siege, and actively employed himself in the defence of the place.

40. I desire to bring to special notice the services of the Military Police. They have been associated with regular troops throughout the operations, and have invariably done well. This was the first occasion on which men of the Karen Police were associated with regular troops on field service. They were always very keen to fight.

41. I have much pleasure in furthering Colonel Macgregor's wishes that the names of Mr. Prendergast and Mr. Folger should be brought to favourable notice, whilst respectively in command of this detachment of the Karen Battalion. Had Captain Hutchinson lived, it would have been my pleasing duty to have specially mentioned him for favourable consideration. Captain A. D. C. Pond, who succeeded him in command of the Ye-u Battalion, deserves mention; also Lieutenant W. G. H. Stirling, Katha Battalion, and Inspector Trotter, Burma Police.

42. I desire to bring prominently to notice the brilliant services of Captain H. D'U. Keary, Commanding the Shwebo Battalion of Military Police. I consider that the advancement of this officer would be to the benefit of the service. The spirit of dash and confidence inspired by his presence at Kawlin, and the prompt manner

in which he grappled with the situation and turned the hitherto needlessly cautious state of defence into one of vigorous and determined attack, is worthy of special acknowledgment.

43. I submit the names of the following officers for favourable consideration for good service during the operations:—

Lieutenant-Colonel C. R. Macgregor, D.S.O., who commanded the Northern Column throughout the operations; Major O. S. Smyth, D.S.O., who commanded the Southern Column; and Captain H. O'Donnell, D.S.O., 44th Bengal Infantry, who commanded the Mogaung Column. These officers maintained the high reputation they have already gained for good and gallant service. Captain T. A. H. Davies, Devonshire Regiment, for the gallant manner in which he conducted the attack on the enemy's entrenched position at Kyaingkwintaung on the 22nd February, as also for the determined manner in which he hurried up with his ever-willing men from Shwebo to Kawlin, covering nearly 100 miles, with cart transport, within five days. Captain S. Custance, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, for excellent service when in command of the mounted infantry of his regiment. He and his men had, perhaps, harder work than any other men during the operations, and their services deserve special recognition.

44. Had Captain N. A. Bray, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, lived, I should have brought his name to notice as deserving special recognition, as I cannot overrate his valuable services to the expedition.

45. The health of Captain A. B. Murray, 10th Regiment (1st Burma Battalion) Madras Infantry, my senior staff officer, I regret to say, broke down soon after arrival in Wuntho, but he struggled bravely to carry on his duties, although his health would not admit of his doing so. He was always keen and willing.

46. My orderly officer, Second-Lieutenant Bruce, Royal Artillery, ably and energetically performed his varied duties, and I consider him an officer of much promise.

47. Since the death of Captain Bray, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, Intelligence Branch, the official diary of the campaign has been admirably carried on by Second-Lieutenant H. C. Holman, Devonshire Regiment. I have tried this gallant young officer in many duties, and for one so young I have never met one who so successfully achieved all that he was called upon to perform. I anticipate a brilliant career for this young officer, and I commend his good services to special notice.

48. In conclusion, I beg to offer my special thanks to Mr. G. D. Burgess, C.S.I., Commissioner, Northern Division. I could never have carried out my orders so expeditiously and, I trust, satisfactorily had it not been for the invariable help and support I received from this officer. I therefore desire to close this despatch by soliciting that his valuable services on this occasion may be brought specially to the notice of the local and supreme Governments.

FREE PORT OF ZANZIBAR.

INFORMATION has been received from Mr. Gerald Portal, C.B., Her Britannic Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar, that on the 1st instant he publicly declared that on and after that day import duties on all goods coming from foreign countries into the Port of Zanzibar would cease and be abolished.

The following articles are, however, for the public good, excepted from the terms of this declaration:—

1. Arms and munitions of war.
2. Alcoholic liquors, with the exception of beer and wines of lower strength than fifty degrees centigrade.
3. Kerosine and all other explosive oils or dangerous substances.

The duty on these latter articles will be remitted under certain conditions of storage.

All the abovementioned articles will still remain subject to the duties leviable under existing treaties with foreign powers or under the provisions of the General Act of the Brussels Conference, so soon as the latter shall come into force.

The above notice applies only to the Port of Zanzibar itself.

Prohibition of Markets &c. in Metropolitan Police District.

1. The holding of all markets and of all public and private sales of cattle, sheep, goats, or swine, fat or store, within any of the districts or parts of districts of Local Authorities mentioned in the Schedule to this Order is hereby prohibited.

Provided that this Order shall not apply to the Foreign Cattle Market at Deptford in the port of London.

Offences.

2. If a market or sale is held in contravention of this Order the person or company holding the same and the occupier of the premises where the sale is held, and the owner or consignee of each animal exposed at the market or sale, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale, and the person, if any, taking entrance money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereof of any animal, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the sale to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

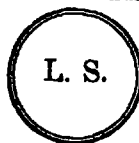

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Revocation.

1. The Orders of the Board of Agriculture described in the Schedule to this Order to the extent described in the said Schedule are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not affect the past operation of the Order or part of Order hereby revoked, or invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order or part of Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order or part of Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Animals from the Netherlands prohibited.

2.—(1.) Unless and until the Board of Agriculture otherwise order, animals brought from the Kingdom of the Netherlands shall not be landed in England or Wales or Scotland.

(2.) The Animals Order of 1886 shall be read and have effect as if the Kingdom of the Netherlands were included in the List of Prohibited Countries named in Part I of the Fourth Schedule to the Order.

Amendment of Article 130 of the Animals Order of 1886.

3. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 130 of the Animals Order of 1886, and shall be deemed to be Article 130 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

130.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the Fourth Schedule, or from a port or place in Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Second. That the vessel has not within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the Fourth Schedule, or any port or place in Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the Fourth Schedule, or from any port or place in Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Amendment of Article 151 of the Animals Order of 1886.

4. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 151 of the said Animals Order of 1886, and shall be deemed to be Article 151 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

151.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for foreign animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Norway, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America (provisions as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or Sweden (provision as to which country is made by the third condition of this Article), or the Isle of Man (provision as to which Isle is made by the fourth condition of this Article).

Second. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the United States of America.

Third. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Sweden.

Fourth. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the Isle of Man.

Fifth. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Norway, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America, or Sweden, or the Isle of Man.

Sixth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Norway, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or (subject to the seventh condition of this Article) Sweden, or (subject to the eighth condition of this Article) the Isle of Man.

Seventh. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Sweden.

Eighth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the Isle of Man.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for foreign animals unless and until—

(a.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered

into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and

(b.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Interpretation.

5. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as THE ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1892, No. 2.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Extension of Acts of 1878 and 1886.

1. Sarcoptic Mange of horses, asses, and mules (in this Order called Sarcoptic Mange) shall be a disease for the purposes of the following Sections of the Act of 1878 and the Act of 1886 (namely):
Section thirty of the Act of 1878 (slaughter and compensation).

Section thirty-two (Orders of Council).

Section fifty (powers of police).

Section fifty-one (powers of inspectors).

Section six of the Act of 1886 (slaughter).

and of all other Sections of the said Acts containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those Sections including such Sections as provide for offences and procedure.

Slaughter and Compensation.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority of the county of Orkney may, if they think fit, cause to be slaughtered all or any of three horses belonging to Mr. Peter Thomson, of Kirkwall, which are affected with sarcoptic mange.

(2.) If the Local Authority cause the said horses, or any of them, to be slaughtered under the authority of this Order, the Local Authority shall, out of the local rate, pay a compensation the value of each horse immediately before it was slaughtered.

Record of Slaughter.

3. The provisions of Article 181 (*Record of Slaughter*) of the Animals Order of 1886 shall apply to the case of each horse slaughtered under the provisions of this Order.

Movement.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to move any horse, ass, or mule, or any fodder, litter, or other thing out of any stable, building, field, or other place in which any horse or horses now are or have been while affected with sarcoptic mange, except with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority.

Offences.

5. If a horse, ass, or mule is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the horse, ass, or mule, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the horse, ass, or mule, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Extent.

6. This Order extends to the county of Orkney only.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall commence to take effect on the eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Interpretation.

8. In this Order—
