REGULATIONS AS TO TELEGRAPH MONEY ORDERS.

WHEREAS by the Post Office Money Orders Acts, 1848 and 1880, the Postmaster-General is author zed, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to make Regulations relating to Money Orders and to the payment thereof, and to the persons by or to whom Money Orders shall be paid, and to the times at which and the mode in which the same shall be paid.

Whereas by the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1889, the Postmaster-General is authorized, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to make Regulations for the general

conduct of Telegraphic business.

Now I, the Right Honourable Sir James Fergusson, Bart., M.P., Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, in pursuance and by virtue of the said Acts and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, do, with the consent of Her Majesty's Treasury, make the following Regulations, that is

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Money Order (Telegraph) Regulations, 1892.

2. In these Regulations unless the context otherwise requires-

The expression "the Postmaster-General" means the Postmaster-General for the time

The expression "Postmaster" means any Officer in charge of a Money Order Office, and includes any Officer of the Post Office

acting under the instructions of the Post-

The expression "Telegraph Money Order" means a Post Office Money Order the payment of which at the office of payment is authorized by Telegraph.

The masculine includes the feminine, and the plural includes the singular, and the singular

includes the plural.

3. These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, on and from which date the Regulations dated the seventeenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, are hereby repealed, without prejudice nevertheless to anything already done in pursuance thereof.

- 4.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of these Regulations, Telegraph Money Orders may be issued and paid at any Post Office in the United Kingdom at which Telegraph and Money Order business is transacted: provided that (2.) at a Post Office at which Telegrams are received from the public for transmission, but are not received over the Postmaster-General's Telegraphs for delivery to the public, Telegraph Money Orders may be issued, but shall not be paid unless in the case of any such office the Postmaster-General shall so direct.
- 5. Any person requiring the issue of a Telegraph Money Order, must fill up the Money Order Requisition Form prescribed from time to time by the Postmaster-General, and must write in some conspicuous place on the said form the words "By Telegraph.
- 6. Upon receipt of a requisition for a Telegraph Money Order, and of the amount of the said Order and all charges payable in respect of the said Order, under these Regulations the Postmaster shall-
 - (a.) Prepare a Money Order and Advice for the sum required, and write or stamp across the face of the Order the words "Telegraph Money Order," and across the face of the Advice the words " Permitted by Telegraph."

(b.) Hand to the person, at whose request the Order is issued, a receipt in the form specified in the First Schedule hereto for the amount of the Money Order and all charges

for the remission thereof.

- (c.) Send to the Postmaster of the office of payment a telegram, stating the number of the Order, the name of the person at whose request the Order is issued, the name of the person to whom payment is to be made and the amount remitted, such amount to be telegraphed in words (which Telegram is hereinafter referred to as a Telegram of Advice).
- 7. Where any person requires at one time the issue of several Telegraph Money Orders in favour of the same person, and the aggregate amount does not exceed the sum of £50, the Postmaster shall specify all the particulars (as prescribed by the last preceding Regulation) of each and all of the said Orders in one Telegram of Advice.
- 8. The following rules shall apply to a Telegram of Advice-
 - (a.) It shall be written by the Postmaster at the office of origin on the form used for the ordinary telegrams of the public known and hereinafter referred to as the "A" Form.

(b.) It shall be repeated from office to office, to

insure accuracy.

(c.) The form shall bear postage stamps representing the amount payable (in accordance with the provisions of the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1885), and the regulations for the time being made thereunder for the transmission and repetition of the Telegram as an ordinary Telegram.

(d.) Such stamps shall be cancelled by the dated stamp of the office of origin as in the

case of an ordinary Telegram.

9. Any person requiring payment of a Telegraph Money Order must attend at the Money Order Office of payment, and

(a.) Produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Postmaster that he is the person entitled to receive the amount of such Order, and (b.) Sign a receipt in the form specified in the

Second Schedule hereto.

đ.

10. The following poundage shall be paid in [respect of Telegraph Money Orders:

0 For sums not exceeding £1 For sums above £1, but not exceed-6 ing £2 0 For sums above £2, but not exceed-8 ·· 0 ing £4 For sums above £4, but not exceeding £7 0 10 For sums above £7, but not exceeding £10 ... Such poundage shall in every case be prepaid.

11. In addition to the poundage payable for a Telegraph Money Order, the person at whose request a Telegraph Money Order is issued shall pay for the telegram authorizing payment at the office of payment, and for the repetition thereof after the rates authorized by the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1885, and the regulations made from time to time thereunder.

12.—(1.) In case payment of a Telegraph Money Order is required, and no authority to make such payment has been received by the Postmaster, the Postmaster may, at the request of the person requiring payment, send to the Postmaster of the alleged office of issue a telegram enquiring whether payment has been authorized as alleged (which telegram is hereinafter referred to as a Telegram of Enquiry).

(2.) The following rules shall apply to a Tele-

gram of Enquiry:

(a.) It shall be written by the Postmaster at the office of origin on the "A" form.

(b.) The "A" form shall bear postage stamps representing the amount payable (in accordance with the provisions of the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1885, and the regulations for the time being made thereunder) for the transmission of the Telegram as an ordinary Telegram, and for a reply thereto.

(c.) Such stamps shall be cancelled by the dated stamp of the office as in the case of

an ordinary Telegram.

(3.) The Postmaster of the alleged office of issue shall reply by Telegraph to a Telegram of

Enquiry

- (4.) The person requiring payment of a Telegraph Money Order, at whose request a Telegram of Enquiry is sent shall prepay the charges for such Telegram, and for a reply thereto, after the rates authorized by the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1885, and the regulations made from time to time thereunder.
- (5.) If it shall appear that there has been default on the part of any Officer of the Post Office in transmitting authority for payment of the Money Order in question with reasonable despatch, the amount paid for the Telegram of Enquiry and the reply thereto shall be refunded to the person at whose request such Telegram was sent.
 - (6.) In any such case as last specified where

any question arises as to whether reasonable despatch has been used the decision of the Postmaster-General upon such questions shall be final.

13. No Telegraph Money Order shall be issued for a greater amount than £10.

14.—(1.) Payment of a Telegraph Money Order: will be made at the office specified in the original; requisition, or at such other office as the person! at whose request the Order was issued, or the person to whom payment of the said Order is to: be made, may request.

- (2.) In any case in which payment is desired' at an office other than that specified in the original requisition application for such payment must be made in the case of an Order issued at an office in England or Wales to the Controller of the Money Order Office, General Post Office, London; in the case of an Order issued at an office in Scotland to the Accountant, General Post Office, Edinburgh; and in the case of an Order issued at an office in Ireland to the Accountant, General Post Office, Dublin. Such application must state the particulars of the Order and the name of the office at which payment is desired.
- (3.) If from any cause payment cannot be made to the person in whose favour the Money Order has been issued, the amount of the Telegraph Money Order will be paid to the person at whose request the Order was issued; in the case of an Order remitted from any office in England or Wales on application to "the Controller of the Money Order Office," General Post Office, London; in the case of an Order remitted from any office in Scotland on application to "the Accountant," General Post Office, Edinburgh; and in the case of an Order remitted from any office in Ireland on application to "the Accountant," General Post Office, Dublin.

(4.) Repayment will in all cases be made in accordance with the Rules for the time being in force as to the payment of Money Orders.

- 15. Payment of a Telegraph Money Order will in all cases be subject to the possession by the Postmaster at the office of payment of sufficient funds for the payment thereof, and all Telegraph Money Orders shall be deemed to be issued subject to this condition.
- 16. Subject to the provisions of these Regulations the Regulations made under the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880 (other than such as relate to Postal Orders as defined by such Regulations), shall apply to Telegraph Money Orders.

THE SHEEP-SCAB MOVEMENT ORDER OF 1892.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Regulations of Local Authorities in Schedule as to Movement of Sheep into their District from other Districts.

1.—(1.) The Local Authority of any of the Districts named in the Schedule to this Order may, with the view of preventing the introduction of sheep-scab into their District, make such Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or by water of sheep into their District from the District of any Local Authority in England or Wales or Scotland.

(2.) Where a Local Authority have made a Regulation under the provisions of this Article prohibiting the movement of sheep into their District from the District of any other Local Authority in England or Wales or Scotland, it shall not be lawful, so long as such Regulation is in force, for any person to move into the District of such first-mentioned Local Authority any sheep so prohibited that may have been at any time since the making of such Regulation within the District of such other Local Authority.

(3.) For the purposes of Regulations made under this Article sheep shall not be deemed to be smoved into or from the District of a Local Authority when they are moved through such District by railway without untrucking within such District.

Regulations of Local Authorities in Schedule as to Movement of Sheep within their District.

2. The Local Authority of any of the Districts named in the Schedule to this Order, may, with a view to the prevention of the spreading of sheep-scab, make such Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or by water of sheep in the whole of their District or in any part or parts thereof.

Limitation as to Regulations of Local Authorities.

- 3. No Regulation made by a Local Authority under either of the last two preceding Articles shall be deemed to apply to the movement of—
 - (a.) sheep in or into or out of a Cattle-Plague Infected Place; or
 - (b.) sheep in or into or out of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place; or
 - (c.) sheep in or into or out of a Sheep-Pox Infected Place; or
- (d.) sheep affected with sheep-scab; which movement is regulated by the Acts of 1878 to 1886 and Orders thereunder.

Power to make Regulations not to be deputed.

4. The power to make Regulations under this Order shall be exercised only by a Local Authority or their Executive Committee, and shall not No. 26266.

be deputed to any other Committee nor to a Sub-Committee.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.
5.—(1.) Every Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board of Agriculture a copy of every Regulation made by them under the provisions of

this Order.

(2.) If the Board of Agriculture are satisfied on enquiry with respect to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Production of Licences: Names and Addresses.

6.—(1.) Every person in charge of sheep being moved, where, under any Regulation of a Local Authority under this Order, a Movement Licence may be necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

7.—(1.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of a Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If a person in charge of sheep being moved, where under a Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(3.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of a Regulation made under this Order, allows a sheep to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Revocation of Order.

8. The Shropshire (Sheep-Scab) Movement. Order of 1891, dated the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Existing Regulations.

9. Any Regulation made by the Local Authority of the county of Salop under the Shropshire (Sheep-Scab) Movement Order of 1891, and in force at the commencement of this Order, shall.

unless altered or revoked by the Local Authority, remain in force for such time and in such manner as if this Order had not been made, and for the purposes of this Order shall be deemed to have been made under this Order.

Interpretation.

10. In this Order-

The Act of 1878 means the Contagious

Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:
The Acts of 1878 to 1886 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

Short Title.

11. This Order may be cited as THE SHEEP-SCAB MOVEMENT ORDER of 1892.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the tenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

METROPOLITAN MARKET (MOVEMENT OF LAMBS) ORDER OF 1892.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Movement of Lambs to Metropolitan Cattle Market for Slaughter.

- 1. Notwithstanding anything in the several Orders mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order, lambs intended for slaughter may be moved out of any of the Districts and parts of Districts of Local Authorities described in the Second Schedule to this Order to the Metropolitan Market on the following conditions, and not otherwise:
 - (i.) The lambs shall be accompanied with a Movement Licence as hereinafter provided, and such Licence shall be delivered to the officer of the Metropolitan Market appointed to receive the same on the arrival of the lambs at the Metropolitan Market;
 - (ii.) The Movement Licence shall be a Licence of the Local Authority of the District from which the lambs are to be moved, and shall be in the form set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order or to the like effect, and shall be granted only on such a Declaration as hereinafter provided;
 - (iii.) The Declaration shall be a Declaration of the owner of the lambs or of his agent authorized in writing for this purpose declaring that the lambs to be moved have been in the possession of the owner, and have been exclusively grazed or otherwise fed on the premises from which they are to be moved, for a period of at least twentyone days immediately before the making of the Declaration, and that the said lambs have not during that period been in any market, fair, sale-yard, or place of exhibition, and have not at any time during that period been at any place situate within two miles of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place, and have not to the best of his knowledgeand belief been in any way exposed to the infection of foot-and-mouth disease;
 - (iv.) The lambs moved under the provisions of this Order shall be moved by railway only, and shall be trucked at the nearest available railway station to the place from which they are moved, and shall be untrucked at the railway station which is the nearest of those available to the Metropolitan Market, and shall be forthwith moved from the lastmentioned station by the nearest available route to the Metropolitan Market.

Granting of Movement Licences.

2.—(1.) A Local Authority may if they think fit withhold a Movement Licence in any case where the movement of the lambs proposed to be moved would be in their judgment inexpedient

or improper.

(2.) No Licence for movement of lambs to the Metropolitan Market granted under this Order shall be available if granted by the owner of the lambs to be moved or by his agent, or by the consignee, or by the person selling the lambs or exposing the lambs for sale, or by the occupier of the farm or premises from which the lambs are to be moved.

Delivery of Declarations.

3.—(1.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order is not available except when accompanied by the Declaration on which it is granted.

(2.) The person granting such Movement Licence under this Order, shall, for the identification of the Declaration produced to him, mark the same by signing his name thereon, with the date of the production thereof to him.

(3.) The person granting such Movement Licence shall deliver the Declaration produced to him, when so marked, with the Licence, to the

person receiving the Licence from him.

Production of Licences: Names and Addresses.

4.—(1.) Every person in charge of lambs being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence may be necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

5.—(1.) If a lamb is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the lamb, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or per-

, Farm or premises includes two or more adjoining farms or premises in the same occupation: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

Public and Private Sales.

4. No public or private sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, shall be held in the borough of Kendal except as expressly authorized by this Order.

Public Sales of Fat Cattle, Sheep, or Swine by

Licence of Local Authority.
5.—(a.) A public sale of fat cattle, or fat sheep, or fat swine may be held with a licence of the Local Authority, on the following conditions (namely):

(i.) Cattle, sheep, and swine exposed at the public sale so licensed shall, after their arrival thereat, and before they are moved therefrom, be marked by and at the expense of the owner, consignee, or other person exposing them, as follows:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow, about five inches long, on the left hind

quarter of each of the cattle.

Sheep and Swine. - By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on the left side of each of the sheep or swine with the following composition, namely: -Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm: or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

(ii.) Every head of cattle, and every sheep, and every pig that is exposed at the public sale so licensed, whether it is sold thereat or not, shall be slaughtered within six days after the day on which the sale is held.

(iii.) Cattle, sheep, and swine exposed at the public sale so licensed shall not afterwards be

exposed at any other public sale.

(b.) A licence of the Local Authority for a public sale of fat cattle, sheep, or swine under this Article shall be signed by the clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall be granted to the person entitled to hold the sale (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall specify the place where the sale is to be held, and may authorize the holding of periodical sales on stated days, but may be renewed from time to time, and shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same.

(c.) If the Board of Agriculture are of opinion, with respect to any licence of the Local Authority for a public sale of fat cattle, sheep, or swine under this Article, that the holding of the public sale thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall there-

upon cease to operate.

Public or Private Sales, Fat or Store, without Licence of Local Authority.

6. A public or private sale of a head of cattle, or of a sheep, or of a pig, or of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, may be held without a licence of the Local Authority, in any case where the sale is held in accordance with the following conditions (namely):

(i.) That the sale is held on a farm or premises not in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected

Place:

(ii.) That no animal on the farm or premises is affected with foot-and-mouth disease:

(iii.) That the animal or each animal exposed at the sale has been on the farm or premises not less than fourteen clear days immediately before the day on which the sale is held.

Sales by Licence of the Board of Agriculture. 7. Without prejudice to the foregoing provi-

sions and in addition thereto, a public or private

sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, may be held in any circumstances, with a licence of the Board of Agriculture.

Saving.

8. Nothing in this Order shall apply to any sale of swine in any Swine-Fever Infected Area (for which Area provision is made as regards public and private sales of swine by the Animals Order of 1886).

Offences.

9.—(a.) If a public or private sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, is held in contravention of this Order or of the conditions of a licence of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture thereunder, the person holding the sale, and the occupier of the place or farm or premises where the sale is held, and the owner or consignee of each animal exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale, and the person, if any, taking entrancemoney or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereat of any animal, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the sale to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(b.) If a head of cattle, or a sheep, or a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person exposing the same, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the purchaser thereof, and the person holding the sale, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(c.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark clipped, painted, or stamped on any cattle, sheep, or swine, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(d.) If a head of cattle, or a sheep, or a pig is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered shall be deemed guilty of an offence

against the Act of 1878.
