Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The privilege of making presentations at a Drawing Room is restricted to these Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Maje ty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presenta-tion cards will be forwarded.

WHEREAS by "The Scal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Act, 1891," it is enacted that Her Majesty the Queen may by Order in Council prohibit the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea, or such part thereof as is defined by the said Order, during the period limited by the Order:

And whereas the expression "Behring's Sea" in the said Act means the seas known as Behring's Sea within the limits described in an Order under the said Act.

And whereas an Order in Council was issued on the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, prohibiting the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea, as therein defined, until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, in virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is hereby pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Order in Council, 1892.

2. From and after the date of the present Order until the first day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea as hereinafter defined is hereby prohibited.

3. For the purposes of the said recited Act and of this Order the expression "Behring's Sea" means so much of that part of the Pacific Ocean

known as Behring's Sea as lies between the parallel of 65° 30' north latitude and the chain of the Aleutian Islands, and eastward of the following line of demarcation, that is to say, a line commencing at a point in Behring's Straits on the said parallel of 65° 30' north latitude, at its intersection by the meridian which passes midway between the Islands of Krusenstern or Ignalook and the Island of Ratmanoff or Noonarbook; and proceeding thence in a course nearly south-west through Behring's Straits and the seas known as Behring's Sea, so as to pass midway between the north-west point of the Island of Saint Lawrence and the south-east point of Cape Choukotski to the meridian of 172° west longitude; thence from the intersection of that meridian in a southwesterly direction, so as to pass midway between the Island of Attou and the Copper Island of the Kormandorski couplet or group in the North Pacific Ocean, to the meridian of 193° west longitude. E. § 11. cl. 4 (6), (p. 56); the words "Human and" shall be struck out.

The above Statute was approved by Convocation on Tuesday March, fifteenth one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and in the same Convocation the seal of the University was ordered to be affixed that the Statute might be submitted to Her Majesty in Council for approval.

And to all others whom it may concern.
WHEREAS by a General Order dated the 24th day of July, 1847, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Saint Germans Union (amongst others), the Poor Law Com-missioners made certain Rules and Regulations with regard to the government of the Workhouse of the said Union;

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made as hereinafter mentioned:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us

by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order that, from and after the date hereof, the following regulations shall be in force in the said Saint

Germans Union, namely,-

ARTICLE I.—Tobacco or snuff may be allowed to such of the inmates of the Workhouse of the Union who are not able-bodied, or are employed upon work of a specially disagreeable character, as the Guardians may consider should be supplied with the same, the quantity to be allowed in each case, or in any class of cases, to be such as the Guardians may by resolution prescribe.

Guardians may by resolution prescribe.

ARTICLE II.—So much of Article 121 of the said General Order as provides that no pauper shall smoke in any room in the Workhouse except by the special direction of the Medical Officer shall be rescinded, so far as regards the said Union; but the Guardians may from time to time, by resolution, determine in what rooms and at what times smoking shall be allowed, and no pauper shall smoke in the Workhouse in any other room or at any other time than is so allowed.

POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS) ACTS, 1848 to 1883,

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS) ACTS, 1848 TO 1883.

WHEREAS the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880, provides that, subject to the Post Office Regulations, the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Treasury, may, for the purpose of the transmission of small sums through the Post Office, authorize his officers, or any of them, to issue orders (hereinafter referred to as Postal Orders) in the form set forth in the Schedule to that Act, subject, nevertheless, to the provisoes contained in the said Act.

And whereas by the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880, the Postmater-General is authorized, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to make Post Office Regulations relating to money orders, and to the persons by or to whom money orders shall be paid, and to the times at which, and the mode in which, the same shall be paid.

And whereas by the Post Office (Money Orders) Act. 1883, certain alterations in the form of Postal Orders, as set forth in the Schedule to the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880, are sanctioned, and the Postmaster-General is empowered, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to prescribe by Post Office Regulations further modifications of the form of Postal Orders, and the several amounts (not exceeding twenty shillings) of such orders, and the sums of poundage (not exceeding two-pence) to be taken in respect of such orders, and to authorize, by such regulations, the issue of Postal Orders by any persons holding office under the Crown.

And whereas under the authority of the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880, certain Post Office Regulations, dated the 28th January, 1884, were made by the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners

of Her Majesty's Treasury, in relation to the issue and payment of Postal Orders by officers of the Postmaster-General in the United Kingdom (including therein the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man), and in Gibraltar.

And whereas the Postal Service of Gibraliarhas ceased to be conducted by officers of the Postmaster-General.

And whereas it is expedient to repeal the said regulations, dated the 28th January, 1884, and to-make regulations in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Sir-James Fergusson, Baronet, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, in pursuance of the said Acts, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treusury, do hereby order as follows:—

1. These regulations shall come into operation on the 1st day of September, 1892, on and from which date the said regulations, dated the 28th day of January, 1884, are hereby repealed, without prejudice nevertheless to anything already

done in pursuance thereof.

2. Such officer or officers for the time being of the Post Office, and such other persons holding office under the Crown as the Postmaster-General from time to time directs shall superintend the execution of these regulations, and subject to the Post Office Regulations, and to such directions as may be from time to time issued by the Postmaster-General, may exercise any authority given by these regulations to the Postmaster-General, and exercise such powers and give such directions as may seem necessary or proper for carrying into effect these regulations.

3. An officer in charge of a money order officein the United Kingdom, and any such other officer of the Post Office, and any such other personholding office under the Crown as may from time to time be authorized in this behalf by the Postmaster-General (which officers are in these regulations referred to as Postmasters) may issue and pay money orders in the form set forth in theschedule hereto, which orders are in these regula-

tions referred to as Postal Orders.

A Postmaster may, subject to any restrictions or directions from time to time given by the Postmaster-General, do by deputy anything under these regulations.

4. Every such Postal Order shall be for one of the following amounts, and in respect thereof the following poundage shall be paid:—

5. Before a Postmaster issues a Postal Order, the amount of the order and the poundage thereon shall be paid to him; and he shall sign the order and stamp it with the proper stamp, specifying the day of the month on which the order is issued.

6. The Postal Order shall be printed on such paper and in such characters and with such distinctive marks, whether on the face of it or in the

paper or otherwise, and the amount of the poundage shall be denominated by means of such stamp or mark as the Postmaster-General, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Treasury, from time to time directs.

7.—(a.) The blanks in a Postal Order for the name of the person entitled to the money (in these regulations referred to as the payee) and for the name of the money order office at which it is to be paid may be filled in before or after issue.

- (6.) If the blanks are not filled in before issue, the person to whom the order is issued, must before parting with it fill in the name of the payee, and may fill in the name of the money order office at which the amount is to be paid. Even where an order is crossed with a view to its payment through a banker the name of the payee must be filled in.
- (c.) Except when the order is paid through a banker, the payee must sign the receipt at the foot of the order, and must also fill in the name of the money order office if that has not been already done.
- (d.) No alteration can be made in the name of the payee, or of the money order office, when once filled in, except by the direction of the Postmaster-General.
- 8. A Postal Order presented by or through a banker for payment will not (in the absence of an express arrangement between such banker and the Postmaster-General to the contrary) be paid until after such order has been examined at the chief ·office in London.
- 9.—(a.) When a Postal Order is presented for payment otherwise than through a banker, the Postmaster shall ascertain that the receipt for the amount of the order is signed, and may refuse payment until he is satisfied that it is signed by or under the authority of the person appearing to be the payee.

(b.) He may also, if the receipt is not signed in his presence, take reasonable means to satisfy himself that the person presenting the order is

either the payee or his agent.

(c.) He may also require the person presenting the order to sign his name on the order before its payment, although the receipt has been already signed.

- (d.) Nevertheless, the signature to the receipt shall in all cases be a sufficient authority to the Postmaster for the payment of the amount of the order, if that signature purports to be the signature of the payee; and it shall not be necessary to prove that the receipt was signed by or under the authority of the payee.
- 0.—(a.) A Postal Order may be crossed; it may be crossed generally by the addition on its face of the words "and Company," or any abbreviation thereof, between two parallel transverse lines, or of two parallel transverse lines simply; it may be crossed specially by the addition on its face of the name of a banker, in which case the order shall be deemed to be crossed to that banker.
- (b.) A Postal Order which is crossed generally may be crossed specially.
- (c.) A banker to whom a Postal Order is crossed may again cross it specially to another banker as his agent for collection.
- (d.) Where a Postal Order is crossed generally, a Postmaster shall refuse to pay it except to a
- (e.) Where a Postal Order is crossed specially, a Postmaster shall refuse to pay it except to the banker to whom it is crossed, or to his agent for collection.

(f.) Where a Postal Order is crossed specially to more than one banker, except when crossed to an agent for the purpose of collection, a Postmaster shall refuse payment thereof.

11. If a Postal Order which is crossed, whether generally or specially, is presented for payment

by or through a banker, with the name of such banker written or stamped upon the face thereof, that name may be accepted as a sufficient receipt for the amount of the order, and the order may be paid without any other receipt.

Provided that where the order is crossed specially to a second banker as agent for collection, the name of such second banker, written or stamped upon the face of the order, may be accepted as a receipt under this regulation.

An order which is crossed generally or specially, if presented for payment by or through a banker, may be paid at any money order office in the United Kingdom, notwithstanding that the blank has been filled in with the name of some particular money order office.

12.—(1.) The holder of a Postal Order may, in writing, on the face of such order, direct that payment of such order be deferred for any period not exceeding 10 days; but, in such case, the name of some money order office at which the order shall be paid must be inserted in the body

(2.) In any such case, payment of the Postal Order shall not be made till the period specified

by the holder has elapsed.

13. After the expiration of three months from the last day of the month in which any such order is issued, the order shall be payable only on payment in the manner for the time being directed by the Postmaster-General of a commission equal to the amount of the original poundage, with the addition, if more than three months have elapsed since the said expiration, of the amount of the original poundage for every further period of three months which has so elapsed, and for every portion of any such period of three months over and above every complete

14. A Postal Order will be payable during the hours for the time being appointed for money order business, at the office at which it is presented for payment, or during such other hours as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint with reference to any office or offices.

15. If a Postal Order presented for payment has any erasure or alteration, or is cut, defaced, or mutilated, the Postmaster may refuse payment, and refer the person presenting it to the Postmaster-General.

- 16. A Postmaster may refuse or delay the payment of a Postal Order, but shall immediately report such delay or refusal, with his reasons for it, to the Postmaster-General.
- 17. A Postmaster, upon paying a Postal Order, shall immediately stamp it with the proper stamp, specifying the date, and thereby cancel the order.
- 18. The payment of the amount of a Postal Order, to whomsoever made, shall discharge the Postmaster-General and his officers from all liability whatsoever in respect of that order, notwithstanding any forgery, fraud, mistake, or loss which may have been committed or may have occurred in reference to such order, or to the procuring thereof, or to obtaining the payment thereof, and notwithstanding any disregard of these regulations, and notwithstanding anything whatsoever.
- 19: These regulations shall apply to the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, and the expression

Revocation.

1. The Orders described in the Schedule to this Order, to the extent described in that Schedule, Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to are hereby, from and after the commencement of this Order, revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not revive any Order or part of any Order revoked by or otherwise affect the past operation of, or invalidate or make unlawful anything done under, any part of either of the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, any part of either of the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Iceland Declared a Free Country.

2. From and after the commencement of this Order, unless and until the Board of Agriculture otherwise order, animals brought from Iceland are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under the Animals Order of 1886, to slaughter or to quarantine, and, subject to the provisions of this Order, Chapter 32 and Part I of the Fifth Schedule of that Order shall be read and have effect as if Iceland were included in the list of Free Countries named in that part of that Schedule, and as if Iceland were not included in the list of Prohibited Countries named in the Second Schedule to the Animals (Amendment) Order of 1892, No. 3.

Amendment of Article 130 of The Animals Order of 1886.

3. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 130 of the Animals Order of 1886, and shall be deemed to be Article 130 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

130.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the Fourth Schedule, or from a port or place in Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or in Norway, or in Sweden, or in Spain, or in Portugal, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Second. That the vessel has not within twentyone days before taking them on board or at
any time since taking on board the animals
imported, entered any port or place in any
of the countries mentioned in Part I of the
Fourth Schedule, or any port or place in
Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or
in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or in
Norway, or in Sweden, or in Spain, or in
Portugal, or any port or place from which
the landing of animals is for the time being
prohibited.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the Fourth Schedule, or from any port or place in Malta, or in Belgium, or in Germany, or in Denmark, or in the Netherlands, or in Norway, or in Sweden, or in Spain, or in Portugal, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Amendment of Article 151 of The Animals Order of 1886.

4. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 151 of the Animals Order of 1886, and shall be deemed to be Article 151 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

151.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for foreign animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America (provision as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or the Isle of Man.

Second. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the United States of America.

Third. That the vessel in which they are imported has not; within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America, or the Isle of Man.

Fourth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal experted or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for foreign animals unless and until—

(a.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions: and

going conditions; and
(b.) The master of the vessel has on each
occasion of importation of foreign animals
therein satisfied the Commissioners of
Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all
the animals then imported therein are properly
imported according to the provisions of this
Article.

Interpretation.

THE PROHIBITION OF MOVEMENT FROM MIDLOTHIAN ORDER OF 1892.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as sfollows:

Prohibition of Movement.

1. Notwithstanding anything in any Order of the Board of Agriculture no cattle, sheep, or swine shall, from and after the commencement of this Order, be moved either by land or by water out of the district described in the Schedule to this Order without a licence granted by an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture, or by a person appointed for the purpose by the Board, which licence will only be granted where the Board, after inquiry, are satisfied that exceptional circumstances render the movement necessary or expedient.

Provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals by railway through the said district from a place outside the said district to another place outside the said district without untrucking within the

. said district.

Offences.

2. If a head of cattle or a sheep or a pig is moved out of the district described in the Schedule to this Order in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as The Prohibi-TION OF MOVEMENT FROM MIDLOTHIAN ORDER OF 1892.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after this sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
