Queen Regents Ratification of the Treaty lately concluded at Aix la Chappelle, went to attend His Majerty therewith at St. Gormaines en Laye, where the Ratifications were mutually exchanged, and the Publication of the Peace agreed upon; which hath been folemnly proclaimed: and this day To Deum is to be lung for the happy conclusion of hat great Work, and the Evening to be thent in Bonfires and other demonstrations of joy; and 'tissaid Orders will be speedily dispatche into Flanders and other parts concerned, for the with-drawing of the forces.

Since the arrival of the Ratification, His Majelly has ordered his Masters of the Camp of the Old Regiments which are now in Pown, to repair to the Low-Countries, to re form t eir respective Regiments, and to reduce them to half their number. His Majetty has already disbanded to Companies of his Regiment of Swiffes, and has lignified his pleature, that for the future all Swifes who are under his pay, shall leave in what Countrey scever they shall be commanded.

'I is faid that His Majesty has given the Gove amont of all his late Conquests in the Netherlands to the Mareshal d'Aumont, who is to relign the Government of Paris to the Duke

of Rognelaure.

Bruges, May 30. The Army which we thought to have been resired with inten ions of lying quietly in their Garifons and Quarters, till some certain advice were brought them of the Ratification of the Peace, only withdrew to a place appointed them for a Rend zvous; where having rec ived an addition of fresh Forces, they returned again with geat r stron the tothe River of Ghent, their Army being thought to consist of at least 30000. men, commanded by Maresh I Turenne, with Cannon and a lio. ts of preparations convenient for a fiege : Some other Forces at the same time being fent to lye about Bruffels.

Great preparations are also making at Lille for the carrying on of the War, if the Ratification of the Peace arrive not at the time allotted. From Douay also all the great Guns for Battery are fent down the River towards Turnay, with ica ling Ladde s.and other Necessaries for Asfaults, which keeps us in this City upon our Guards, which are now trebled, and the great Guns which were planted upon the great Rampart by the Dam-post (designed for the saluring Don Juan upon his arrival) were yeste day removed, and again distributed upon the Works, and all the Spaniards lately arrived brought

under the Town. The last night a strong party of the French palled the Ghens. River into the East-Country, entring into a Parish about a League and half from this place, seiting all the Horses they

could find, and carrying them to the A my.

Bruffells, May 29. On Friday the Marqui's de Caffel Rodrigo went from hence to Antwerps, and the next day the Duke of Reannez, with a Body of between 5 or 6000 French, appeared within half a mile of the City, where he has continued ever fince; giving frequent Allarms to this place, and every day falling in upon our Out-guards: and twice he charged with so much violence upon the Mainguards, that they were obliged for their security to shelter themselves under the shot of the Spanish Infantry which lodge in the Ost-Works.

This Morning a strong party of them charged our Guards and pursued them to the Out-Works, but by the addition of fresh forces, they were after a smart dispute repulsed and driven into their Main Body; in this Encounter about 7 or 8 onely were killed, but many hurt on both fides, and on our party the Count de Gravenbanke, but ('tis believed) not mortally. The French Officer who commanded the party, was killed, for whose body the Duke de Coassin has tent a Trumpet with a Coach and fix hor es into the Town.

Yesterday arrived an Express from Paris, bringing with him the welcome News of t e arrival there of the Rati cation of the Peace from Spain, which has been Exchan.ed, and this day appointed there for the solemn Proclamation of the Peace: whereupon Letters were immediately dispatcht away to Antwerp to acquaint the Marquis with the News, Who thereupon repaired hither, where he arrived about 11.0f the clock the same Night. This day or the day following tis believed the Peace will be also proclaimed here, and speedy order taken for the final ceffation of all hoftilities.
