PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Office of County Coroner," it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereinafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act. and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices

present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been therefore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the county of Monmouth (exclusive of the Manor of Chepstow) was for Coroners' purposes and for the purposes of the said Act, divided into three districts named respectively the Abergavenny District, the Monmouth District, and the Newport District, which said Districts comprised the several parishes, places, and boundaries respectively set forth in the Schedule to the said Order in Council:

And whereas, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act 1888 the powers and business of the said Justices in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to the County Council for the county of Monmouth:

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board dated the eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, made under the provisions of the Local Government Act and confirmed by "Local Government Board Provisional Orders (No. 9) Act, 1891" the Borough of Newport was created a County Borough.

And whereas, on the fourth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the County Council for the county of Monmouth presented a petition to Her Majesty praying that the said Newport District might be altered for the purposes of the hereinbefore first-recited Act in order that the said District might be wholly situate within and coextensive with the said

County Borough of Newport, which said petition with a description of the proposed Districts, with the reasons upon which the petition was founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first-recited Act in that behalf have been duly complied with in relation to the said petition.

And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty:

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, taken into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration and division as hereinafter mentioned:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared, that from and immediately

after the said Coroner for the said Newport District shall have ceased to hold his said office, the following provisions shall take effect:—

(1.) The county of Monmouth (exclusive of the Manor of Chepstow) shall be divided for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said first-recited Act, into four districts.

(2.) The said four districts shall be named respectively the Abergavenny District, the Monmouth District, the Newport District, and the South Monmouthshire District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the Schedule hereto.

(3.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette. C. L. Peel.

SCHEDULE.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of The Pluralities Act 1838 after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be "separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may "in some instances with advantage be annexed "to parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, "or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may "be, may be advantageously separated from any "parish or mother church, and either be consti-tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, "parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a "separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said "Archbishop for his consideration) describing the "mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to " ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, "rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all "parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such "modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full "consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall "certify the same and such consent as aforesaid "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, Lord Bishop of Newcastle, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the nineteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God William Dalrymple by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Primate of England and Metropolitan.

"We Ernest Roland by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one langle again.

T the Court at Windsor, the 28th day of | hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace as follows:

"There is in the city and county of Newcastleupon-Tyne within our diocese the vicarage and benefice of Saint Nicholas.

"The parish of Saint Nicholas according to the last census contains a population of three thousand seven hundred and twenty-six.

"The gross annual value of the benefice of Saint Nicholas is seven hundred and one pounds.

"The Right Reverend the Bishop of Newcastleupon-Tyne is the patron thereof and the Reverend Arthur Thomas Lloyd is the present vicar.

"The Cathedral Church of Saint Nicholas is situated within the said parish of Saint Nicholas.

"There is also in the same city and county and diocese and adjoining the said parish of Saint Nicholas the vicarage and benefice of Saint John.

"The parish of Saint John according to the last census contains a population of ten thousand. "The gross annual value of the benefice of Saint John is three hundred and twenty pounds.

"The patronage of the said vicarage of Saint John is vested in the vicar of Saint Nicholas, Newcastle-upon-Tyne and the Reverend Isaac William Milner is the present Vicar of Saint

"There is an ancient consecrated church called Saint John situated within the said parish of Saint John.

" It appears to us that under the provisions of the said Act of first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six section twenty-six as extended by the Act of second and third Victoria chapter forty-nine two portions of the said parish of Saint John may be advantageously taken and separated from it and be added and united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Saint Nicholas to the extent shown in the scheme to this representation. And we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents of the said patrons and incumbents. And in case your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith we request that you will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under our hand this nineteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two. " E. R. Newcastle."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows :-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to take from and separate those two portions of the parish of Saint John in the city and county and diocese of Newcastle-upon-Tyne shown on the plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured red and marked respectively with the letters A and B of which they at present form part and to annex the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Saint Nicholas in the same city and county and diocese also shown on the said plan and thereon coloured blue.

"That portion of the said parish of Saint John marked A on the said plan is bounded on the north by the North-Eastern Railway commencing at a point at the north-west angle where the ancient boundary of the parish of Saint Nicholas meets the railway in Forth-street, and continuing east along the south side of the railway until it meets the boundary of the parish of Saint Nicholas Thence southward, westward and northagain. ward following this ancient boundary of the parish of Saint Nicholas till it reaches the north-west

"That portion of the said parish of Saint John marked B on the said plan is bounded on the north by the North-Eastern Railway commencing at its north-western extremity at a point where the western boundary of the parish of Saint John meets the said railway. Thence eastward along the south side of the railway until it meets the ancient boundary of the said parish of Saint Nicholas. Thence southward along this boundary until it meets the River Tyne. Thence westward following the River Tyne to the point where it meets the western boundary of the said parish of Saint John and thence northwards until this boundary meets the said railway at its north-west

angle.
"That the vicar of the said parish of Saint Nicholas shall when the two portions shall be so annexed as aforesaid have exclusive charge of souls within the limits thereof. And shall be entitled to the fees for marriages, churchings burials and other ecclesiastical dues, offerings and emoluments arising within the said limits thereof. " E. R. Newcastle."

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twenty-ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninetytwo, which said report is in the words and figures following:

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned William Dalrymple by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan do hereby

report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle hath represented to us that it appears to him that it would be advantageous to separate two portions of the parish of Saint John in the city and county and diocese of Newcastle within our province of York from that parish and to annex the same for ecclesias-

tical purposes to the parish of Saint Nicholas in the same city county diocese and province.

"That the said Lord Bishop hath drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices affected have been submitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed together with the plan

referred to in the said scheme.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act 1838 after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may in "some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Arch-"bishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of "any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the " case may be, may be advantageously separated "from any parish or mother church and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be " united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that "any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said "Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme "in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his "consideration) describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be

" effected, and how the changes consequent on " such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, "and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, " by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make " an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

"That the said District Number 2 contains one cottage and part of a cottage inhabited by ten persons which cottages are distant one mile or thereabouts from the parish church of Matson and not more than half a mile from the parish church of Upton Saint Leonards.

"That the inhabitants of the said District Number 2 can more conveniently attend for Divine worship the parish church of Upton Saint Leonards than the parish church of Matson.

"That the said parish church of Upton Saint Leonards is capable of affording accommodation No. 26306.

to the inhabitants of the said District Number 2 as well as the parishioners of Upton Saint Leonards.

"That the said District Number 3 is bounded on the north by Prinknash Park on the east by the parishes of Cranham and Painswick and on the west by the parish of Upton Saint Leonards and consists of a piece of land called Pope's Wood containing sixty acres one rood and fifteen perches and is more particularly delineated on the map Number 3 hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink.

"That the said District Number 3 contains a cottage inhabited by three persons which cottage is distant two miles and a half from the parish church of Matson and one mile a half or thereabouts from the parish church of Upton Saint Leonards.

"That the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Upton Saint Leonards belongs to me Charles John, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol and the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Matson belongs to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester.

"1. That the District Number 1 belonging to the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards may be separated from the residue of the said parish and be united to the said parish of Matson for ecclesiastical purposes.

"2. That the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3 belonging to the said parish of Matson may be separated from the residue of the said parish and

be united to the said parish of Upton Saint

Leonards for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consents thereto of the patrons and incumbents respectively of the said parishes of Upton Saint Leonards and Matson I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

That the said District Number 1 belonging to and forming part of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards and in the aforesaid representation particularly described shall be separated from the residue of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards and be united to and be deemed part of the said parish of Matson for ecclesiastical purposes.

purposes. "That the said District Number 1 shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory and parish of Matson and the incumbent of Matson shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said District

Number 1.

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said parish of Matson in respect of the said District Number 1 shall henceforth belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Matson.

"That the parishioners within the said District Number I shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Matson aforesaid, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Upton Saint Leonards except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the said parish church of Upton Saint Leonards and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That such parishioners of Upton Saint Leonards who at the date of this scheme shall be resident in any part of the said District Number 1 (proposed to be annexed to the parish of Matson) shall have the right of burying their dead, and of being buried, in the churchyard of Upton Saint Leonards provided the death shall have taken place within the said district.

"2. That the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3 belonging to and forming part of the said parish of Matson and in the aforesaid representation particularly described shall be separated from the residue of the said parish of Matson and be united to and form part of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3 shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory and parish of Upton Saint Leonards and the incumbent of Upton Saint Leonards shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3.

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards in respect of the said Districts Numbers

2 and 3 shall henceforth belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Upton Saint Leonards.

"That the parishioners within the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3 shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Upton Saint Leonards except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the said parish church of Matson who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That all and singular the tithe rent-charges or other payments in lieu of tithes arising or which shall from time to time arise or become payable from or in respect of any of the lands and hereditaments in either of the said districts shall continue to be payable to the several persons and bodies corporate who are at present entitled to receive the same respectively.

WHEREAS cases of an Infectious Disease alleged to be Cholera now exist in certain parts of France, and it is expedient that Regulations should be made, as hereinafter mentioned, with reference to Ships having on board bales of Rags from that Country;

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs have signified their consent to the Regulations herein contained so far as the same apply to the Officers of Customs;

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board, do, by this Our Order, and in exercise of the power conferred on Us by Section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, by the Public Health Act, 1889, by Section 113 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, and every other power enabling Us in this behalf, make the following Regulations, and declare that they shall be enforced and executed by the Authority or Authorities hereinafter specified:—

ARTICLE 1.—In this Order—

The term "Sanitary Authority" means Port Sanitary Authority, Urban Sanitary Authority, or Rural Sanitary Authority;

The term "Ship" includes vessel or boat;
The term "Officer of Customs" includes any
person acting under the authority of the

The term "Master" includes the officer, pilot,

or other person for the time being in charge or command of a ship.

ARTICLE 2.—From and after the twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and until We shall, by Order, otherwise direct, no rags from France shall be delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, nor landed in any port or place in England or Wales.

ARTICLE 3.—If any rags shall be delivered overside or landed in contravention of this Order, they shall, unless forthwith exported, be destroyed by the person having control over the same, with such precautions as may be directed by the Medical Officer of Health of the Sanitary Authority within whose jurisdiction or district the same may be found.

ARTICLE 4.—All masters of ships, consignees, and other persons having control over any rags prohibited under this Order from being delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, or landed, are required to obey these regulations.

ARTICLE 5.—All Officers of Customs are empowered to prevent the delivery overside or landing of rags in contravention of this Order.

ARTICLE 6.—It shall be the duty of the Sanitary Authority to take proceedings against masters of ships, consignees, or other persons having control over any rags, who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to obey or carry out, or shall obstruct the execution of any of these regulations.

PYE-LAWS and Regulations made by the Matlock Trumway Company Limited, under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870.

No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.
- 8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.
- 9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Company the fare legally demandable for the journey.
- 10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Company, and shall also when required so to do either deliver up his ticket, or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.
- 11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the

ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise

than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a con-

spicuous position on the carriage.
17. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

- 19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.
- 20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded firearms.
- 21. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

22. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws
