

therein and on the plan accompanying the same as District Number 1 lie intermixed with and are contiguous to the parish of Matson.

"That a part of the parish of Matson distinguished in the said representation and scheme as District Number 2 is bounded on all sides by the parish of Upton Saint Leonard and a further part of the said parish of Matson distinguished as District Number 3 is also contiguous to the said parish of Upton Saint Leonard.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838 (first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six) the following alterations may be advantageously made, namely:

"That the District Number 1 belonging to the said parish of Upton Saint Leonard may be separated from the residue of the said parish and be united to the said parish of Matson for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Districts Numbers 2 and 3 belonging to the said parish of Matson may be separated from the residue of the said parish and be united to the said parish of Upton Saint Leonard for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the said Pluralities Act 1838 the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes the rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.
