THE Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by Letters Patent under Her Royal Sign Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the Statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to Installation, and to grant unto His Majesty Charles King of Roumania, Knight of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, and duly invested with the Ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the aforesaid Most Noble Order, in as full and ample a manner as if His Majesty had been formally installed; any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

(Translation.)

Circular of the Royal Hungarian Maritime Government, directed to all the Royal Harbour Offices and Branch Offices.

By Despatch dated the 3rd June, a. c., No. 43460, to the Royal Hungarian Maritime Government, I am directed to issue the following instructions:—

In consequence of the cholera having been officially ascertained to exist in the south of Russia, all vessels arriving from the Russian ports of the Black Sea and Sea Azoff are being subjected to quarantine of seven days.

The effects of the crew and passengers will be subjected to disinfection, conform to the respective regulations.

All vessels arriving from the Turkish Black Sea ports are being subjected to a severe medical observation.

This proceeding will take place in case of vessels arriving in perfect normal sanitary conditions; the proceeding in any other case will be ordered specially by the Maritime Government in
