Board of Trade (Harbour Department),

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of Despatches from Her Majesty's Representatives at Budapest and Vienna, enclosing the following Circulars, issued by the Austrian and Hungarian Maritime Authorities, relating to quarantine:—

No. 3177, 1892.

Fiume, July 14, 1892.

CIRCULAR of the Royal Hungarian Maritime Government of Fiume, directed to all the Royal Harbour offices, branch offices, and Lazareth at Martinschizza.

By despatch, dated the 13th June, a.c. No. 76261, his Excellency the Royal Minister of Commerce has given the following instructions:—

Being informed that the cholera in Russia is progressing and the danger of an invasion increased, it is decreed that no rags, old and used clothes, old linen and old ropes are allowed to be imported or transhipped, if intended for the trade.

These instructions will be in force as soon as the harbour and custom-house authorities have taken notice of the tenor.

Should a vessel, whatever flag, enter into one of the Hungarian or Croatian Harbours of the Royal Hungarian District having the above-mentioned goods on board, these have at once to be delivered to the Lazareth of Martinschizza, and if not re-exported within a fixed interval all the goods will be destroyed.

Translation of Circular No. 6575.

By Order of 15th instant from the Home Office and the Minister for Commerce and Finance, together with the Hungarian Government, the introduction of rags, old clothes, old ropes, and soiled or old linen is prohibited, as well as their passage in transitu through the country from Russia. This Order will be enforced from the day it is received by the different port offices.

Should any such goods reach a port on board Austrian or foreign ship, they are to be sent to the nearest lazaretto for disinfection, and re-exported within the shortest time, otherwise they will be destroyed.
