Circular.

Vessels from cholera-infected districts to be forbidden entry unless provided with Certificates of Disinfection.

Washington, D.C., July 8, 1892.
To Collectors of Customs, Medical Officers of the
Marine Hospital Service, and others whom it
may concern:—

The Act approved April 29, 1878, entitled "An Act to prevent the introduction of contagious or infected diseases into the United States," provides that no vessel coming from any foreign port or country where any contagious or infectious disease exists, nor any vessel conveying infected merchandise, shall enter any port of the United States, or pass the boundary line between the United States and any foreign country except in such manner as may be prescribed under said Act.

Information has been received that cholera prevails in the Caucasus, in Eastern European Russia, in Persia, in Calcutta, and on the western littoral of the Red Sea; and in view of the threatened further spread of the disease, and because of the danger which attaches to rags, furs, wool, hides, &c., which may have been gathered in the infected districts, and to articles of personal wear therefrom, it is hereby ordered that no vessel having rags, furs, skins, hair, feathers, boxed or baled clothing or bedding, or any similar article liable to convey infection, hailing from any port in the districts aforesaid, and no vessel from any port carrying the above-mentioned merchandise or immigrants from the present infected districts or from districts that shall hereafter be officially declared infected, will be allowed entry to any port in the United States unless provided with either a consular certificate or a certificate from a

medical officer of the Marine Hospital Service, or State or local quarantine officer of the United States, to the effect that the vessel, cargo, personal effects, &c., have been disinfected in accordance with the methods herewith prescribed.

A.—Disinfection of Vessels.

The disinfection of the vesel must be in accordance with the most efficient quarantine practice, and will be by one or more of the following methods:

- a. Bichloride of mercury.
- b. Sulphurous oxide.

c. Steam heat.

In addition to the above, thorough cleansing, flushing with sea water, &c.

B.—Disinfection of Articles of Merchaedise, Personal Effects, &c.

For the disinfection of the articles of merchandise, personal effects, &c, mentioned in the circular, one or more of the following methods will be used, all articles to be unbaled:

1. Boiling in water not less than one hour.

2. Exposure to steam not less than one hour, the steam to be of a temperature not greater than 115 degrees centigrade (239 degrees Fahrenheit), and unmixed with air.

All bedding and clothing must be subjected to method No. 1 or No. 2.

- 3. Exposure not less than six hours to sulphurous acid gas, made by burning not less than three pounds of roll sulphur to each 1,000 cubic feet of space.
- 4. Exposure not less than six hours to an atmosphere containing 3 per cent. of sulphurous acid gas liberated from its liquid state (liquid sulphur dioxide).

5. Solution of carbolic acid of a 2 per cent.

This method (No. 5) may be applied only to leather goods, such as trunks, satchels, boots, shoes; to rubber goods, etc., the articles to be saturated with the solution.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Representative at Bucharest, containing the following information with respect to quarantine in Roumania, viz.:—

Boats, barges, &c., coming from the Pruth will have to undergo quarantine in front of the mouth of that river upon the right bank of the Danube, in a creek named Cotul-Pisici, under the superintendence of the Captain of the port of Galatz, of a doctor, and of a vessel of the Roumanian Fleet.

Vessels arriving from Russian ports will undergo quarantine in the Soulina Arm, between miles four and six. Large steam vessels in the roadstead itself. Sailing vessels from the Black Sea, when not in large numbers, will undergo quarantine at the mouths of the Soulina Arm.

In the month of September during bad weather, larger vessels will also be admitted into the Soulina Arm, between miles four and six.

With regard to the notice from the Ministry of Justice, on the 13th of July, 1892, respecting the prohibition of importation of rags from ports of the Black Sea and the Sea of Azov, extending that prohibition to all importation of rags from Russia.

The prohibition, as contained in the notice of the Ministry of Justice of the 13th of this month, of importation into Denmark of rags from the ports of the Black Sea and the Sea of Azov, is hereby extended to the importation of all rags from Russia into Denmark.

FOREIGN AND COLONIAL POST WARRANT, 1892.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts, or any of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), order direct and declare as follows:—

PRELIMINARY.

Short Title.

1. This Warrant may be cited as the Foreign and Colonial Post Warrant, 1892.

Repeal.

2. The Warrants and Regulations made respectively by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and by Her Majesty's Postmaster-General and mentioned in the Schedule to this Warrant shall be repealed, revoked, and annuled on and as from the day upon which this Warrant comes into operation.

Provided that-

(1.) Where any provision of any Warrant or Regulations not comprised in the said Schedule, has been repealed by any Warrant or Regulations hereby repealed, such repeal shall not be affected by the repeal effected by this Warrant.

- (2.) The repeal by this Warrant of any Warrant or Regulations shall not affect—
 - (a.) Anything done or suffered before this Warrant comes into operation; or
 - (b.) Any legal proceeding commenced before this Warrant comes into operation in pursuance of any Warrant or Regulations hereby repealed. And any such legal proceeding may be carried on and completed as if this Warrant had not been made.

Schedule part of Warrant.

3. The Schedule to this Warrant shall be deemed part of this Warrant.

Definitions.

4. In this Warrant—

" Letter."

(1.) The expression "Letter" includes any communication in the nature of à Letter.

"Post-card."

(2.) The expression "Post-card" means a card recognized as a Post-card in accordance with the terms of the Postal Union Convention, and (except where otherwise expressed) includes a "Reply Post-card."

"Reply Post-card."

(3.) The expression "Reply Post-card" means a Post-card in two parts, one of which (hereinafter called "the reply half") may without further payment be again transmitted through the post.

" Commercial Packet."

(4.) The expression "Commercial Packet" means a packet of papers or documents (whether printed or written) not containing anything having the character of actual and personal correspondence except so far as may be expressly allowed by this Warrant, and includes anything which may be contained in a Printed Packet.

" Printed Packet."

(5.) The expression "Printed Packet" means a packet containing one or more of the following articles or documents, that is to say:—

(a.) Newspapers, printed books, periodicals, literary works, and pamphlets, either stitched

or bound.

- (b.) Sheets of music, visiting cards, address cards, proofs of printing, either with or without the manuscript thereof, papers impressed with points in relief for the use of the blind.
- (c.) Prospectuses, announcements, and notices, whether printed, engraved, lithographed, or autographed.

(d.) Engravings, photographs when not on glass or in frames containing glass, pictures, drawings, plans, maps, and catalogues; and

- (e.) In general all impressions or copies upon paper, parchment, or cardboard obtained by means of printing, lithography, autography, or any other mechanical process (except the copying press and the type writer) employed for the purpose of printing and easy to recognize.
- (f.) Anything, not being of glass, usually attached or appurtenant to any of the before mentioned articles in the way of binding, mounting, covering or otherwise, and anything necessary or convenient for their safe transmission by post which shall be contained in the same packet.

"Sample Packet."

(6.) The expression "Sample Packet" means any Packet consisting of trade patterns or samples of merchandise.

" Open Packet."

(7.) The expression "Open Packet" means and includes a Commercial Packet, a Printed Packet, and a Sample Packet.

" Postal Packet."

(8.) The expression "Postal Packet" means and includes (except where otherwise expressed) a letter, post card, and open packet.

" Inland."

(9.) The expression "Inland," when used in relation to any Postal Packet or any description thereof, means posted within and addressed to the same country or place.

" United Kingdom."

(10.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

" British Post Office Abroad."

(11.) The expression "British Post Office Abroad" means a British Post Office which, though situated out of the United Kingdom, is directly under the management and control of the Postmaster-General.

" British Post Office."

(12.) The expression "British Post Office" means and includes any Post Office in the United Kingdom, and any British Post Office abroad.

" Outgoing."

(13.) The expression "outgoing" applied to a Postal Packet of any description means posted at a British Post Office for transmission to some country or place other than that in which such Post Office is situate.

" Incoming."

(14.) The expression "incoming" applied to a Postal Packet of any description means received at a British Post Office through the post from some country or place other than that in which such Post Office is situate.

Application of Warrant.

5. The provisions of this Warrant shall, except where otherwise expressed, be deemed to apply exclusively to Postal Packets transmitted by post in either direction between a British Post Office and some country for place other than that in which such Post Office is situate.

LETTERS.

Rates of Postage.

6. Subject to the provisions of this Warrant on every outgoing Letter there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage; (that is to say,)

On every Letter not exceeding half-an-ounce in weight two pence halfpenny.

On every Letter exceeding half-an-ounce in weight, for every half-ounce, or fractional part of half-an-ounce, two pence halfpenny.

POST-CARDS AND REPLY POST-CARDS.

Rates of Postage.

7.—(1.) On every outgoing Post-card (other than a Reply Post-card) there shall be charged and paid the rate of postage of one penny.

(2.) On every outgoing Reply Post-card there shall be charged and paid the rate of postage of two pence.

Address only to be written on Stamped Side of Card.

8.—(1.) The address and the sender's name and address, and any postal directions recognized by the Postal Union Convention, but nothing else, shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on the side of a post-card which bears the impressed ! say :-

stamp, and nothing shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed across such stamp.

Letter may be Written, Printed, &c., on Unstamped Side of Card.

(2.) Anything (including a letter) may be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on the side of a post-card which does not bear the impressed stamp.

(3.) Nothing whatever shall be in any manner

attached to a post-card except-

Nothing to be Attached to Card.

(a.) a postage stamp or stamps in payment of any deficient postage or additional sum payable for registration or for acknowledgment of delivery or for express delivery, and

(b.) (on the side of the card which bears the impressed stamp) a gummed lable, not exceeding two inches in length by three-quarters of an inch in breadth, and bearing the address at which the card is to be delivered.

(4.) For the purposes of a reply, the reply half of a reply post-card shall be severed from the other half, but subject to this provision no post-card shall be cut or folded or otherwise altered.

Disposal of Cards not in Conformity with Warrant.

(5.) If any post-card is sent by post otherwise than in conformity with the provisions of this clause, it shall be dealt with and charged as an insufficiently prepaid letter.

OPEN PACKETS. Rates of Postage.

9. On every outgoing Open Packet there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage,

that is to say:-For every two ounces, or fractional part of two

ounces, one halfpenny. Provided that-

(a.) The minimum rate of postage on a Commercial Packet shall be twopence balfpenny,

(b.) The minimum rate of postage on a Sample Packet shall be one penny.

Conditions of Posting.

10.—(1.) Every open packet shall be subject to examination in the Post, and no open packet shall contain anything sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

(2.) Subject to the provisions of this Warrant, no open packet shall contain or bear anything of the nature of an actual and personal correspon-

dence.

COMMERCIAL AND PRINTED PACKETS.

Mode of Posting and Contents.

11.—(1.) Every commercial or printed Packet shall be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in a cover open at both ends, and in every case such band, envelope, or cover shall be easily removable for the purpose of examination, without breaking any seal or tearing any paper or separating any adhering surfaces.

(2.) No commercial or printed Packet shall contain postage stamps whether obliterated or not, or any printed article constituting the sign of a

monetary value.

(3.) No printed Packet shall contain printed papers of which the text has been modified after printing, either by hand or by means of a mechanical process, or bears any marks whatever of such a kind as to constitute a conventional language;

Provided that by way of exception to this regulation the following rules shall obtain, that is to

(a.) There may be indicated on the outside of | the missive, the name, commercial standing, and address of the sender;.

(b.) There may be added in manuscript, on printed visiting cards, the address of the sender, his title, and any conventional initials;

- (c.) There may be indicated or altered in a printed paper, in manuscript or by a mechanical process, the date of despatch, the signature, and the commercial standing or profession, as well as the address of the
- (d.) In printer's proofs, alterations and additions, and instructions as to printing, may be made in writing; and in case of want of space such additions may be made on separate sheets.

(e.) Errors in printing in printed documents other than proofs may be corrected;

(f.) Erasures of certain parts of a printed text may be made in order to render them illegible;

(g.) Passages of the text to which it is desired to draw attention may be made prominent by means of marks;

(h.) In prices current, tenders for advertisements, stock and share lists and trade circulars, insertions or corrections of figures. of the name of a traveller, and of the date of his visit, may be made in manuscript, or by a mechanical process;

(i.) In advices of the departures of ships, the dates of those departures may be indicated in

manuscript;

(k.) In cards of invitation and notices of meetings the name of the person invited, the date, the object, and the place of the gathering may be indicated in manuscript;

(l.) In books or on sheets of music, newspapers, photographs, and engravings a dedication may be added, and the invoice relating to any such work may be enclosed in the same packet;

- (m.) In requisitions sent to libraries (printed and open, and intended as orders for books, newspapers, engravings, or pieces of music) there may be indicated on the back, in manuscript, the works required cr offered, and the whole or part of the printed communications may be erased or underlined on the front:
- (n.) Fashion plates, maps, and similar sheets may be painted.
- (4.) Where printed packets contain documents produced by chromography, polygraphy, hectography, papyrography, velocigraphy, or any other similar process, such packets must be posted by being handed in at a Post Office, and such documents shall number at least 20 copies, all which copies must be precisely identical.

(5.) If any Packet of commercial papers or printed papers be posted otherwise than in conformity with the provisions of this clause, it shall be detained and returned or given up to the sender

thereof.

Sample Packets.

Mode of Posting and Contents.

12.-(1.) No Sample Packet shall contain any article of any intrinsic value or of a saleable nature or having a value of its own apart from its use as a pattern or sample.

.: (2.) Patterns or samples shall, when practicable, be placed in covers open at both ends and so that the same may be easily removed for the pur- !

pose of examination. Nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, or other articles which cannot be placed in open covers, may be enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened so as to enable the officers of the Post Office to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

(3.) There shall be no writing in or upon any Sample Packet, or in or upon the cover thereof, except the name, address, and trade or profession of the person for whom it is intended, the name of the sender or that of his firm, a manufacturer's or trade mark and numbers, prices, and particulars relative to the weight, size, and quantity of the article to be disposed of or necessary to determine its origin and nature.

(4.) If any Sample Packet be posted otherwise than in conformity with the provisions of this clause, it shall be detained and returned or given

up to the sender thereof.

MAXIMUM WEIGHT AND DIMENSIONS.

13. Except by the special permission of the Postmaster-General no postal packet shall be forwarded or delivered by post which exceeds the following respective weights and dimensions, that is to say:-

(a.) In the case of a letter,

Two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or depth;

(b.) In the case of a commercial or printed packet,

(1.) Four pounds in weight,

(2.) Two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or depth, or if the packet be made up in the form of a roll, thirty inches in length or four inches in diameter;

(c.) In the case of a sample packet, (1.) Twelve ounces in weight,

(2.) Twelve inches in length, eight inches in breadth, or four inches in depth, or, if the packet be made up in the form of a roll, twelve inches in length or six inches in

Provided that this regulation shall not apply to petitions or addresses forwarded to Her Majesty or to petitions or addresses to Her Majesty or petitions to either House of Parliament forwarded to any member of either House of Parliament.

PREPAYMENT.

Postage must be Prepaid.

14. Subject to the provisions of this Warrant the postage payable on every Postal Packet must be prepaid.

Manner of Prepaying Postage.

15. The postage payable on any Postal Packet except a Post-Card may be prepaid either by adhesive postage stamps or by the use of a stamped envelope or cover.

Letters not Paid.

16. Any letter upon which no part, or a part only, of the postage payable thereon is prepaid shall be charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

Post-Cards and Reply Post-Cards Partly Paid. 17.—(1.) A Post-Card upon which a part only of the postage payable thereon is prepaid shall be charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

Unpaid Post-Cards and Reply Post-Cards. (2.) A Post-Card upon which no part of the postage payable thereon is prepaid, shall be deemed

to be liable to letter postage, and shall be charged with double the amount of such postage.

Post-Cards not Posted in Country of Issue.

(3.) Where a Post-Card is posted in a country other than that in which such Post-Card is issued, any impressed stamp upon such Post-Card shall not be accepted in payment or part payment of postage either in the country in which the Post-Card is posted or in that to which it is addressed.

Provided that this provision does not apply to the Reply half of a Reply Post-Card re-transmitted to the country in which the card was originally posted.

Outgoing Open Packets Not Paid.

18.-(1.) Any outgoing open Packet upon which no part of the postage payable thereon is prepaid shall be detained and returned, or given up to the sender; but if a part of the postage payable on such Packet be prepaid the Packet shall be forwarded charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

Incoming Open Packets Not Paid.

(2.) Any incoming open Packet upon which no part of the postage payable thereon is prepaid, shall be detained and returned to the country of origin; but, if a part of the postage payable on such Packet be prepaid, the Packet shall be forwarded charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

PROHIBITIONS.

19. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post under this Warrant any Postal Packet-

Obscene Prints, &c.

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book, or card, or any indecent or obscene article, whether similar to the above or not, or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

Explosives and Dangerous or Noxious Articles.

- (3.) Consisting of or containing-
- (a.) Any explosive substance,
- (b.) Any dangerous substance, (c.) Any filth,
- (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance,
- (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly pro-
- (f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature,
- (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Postal Packets in course of conveyance or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Packet.

Contraband.

(4.) Containing-

(a.) Any article liable to Customs duty,

(b.) Any article which by the laws of the country or place in which the Packet is posted or to which the Packet is addressed it is unlawful to send by post.

Any such Postal Packet if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

EXPRESS DELIVERY.

Express Delivery Fee on Outgoing Packets. 20. Upon every outgoing Postal Packet marked with the words "Express delivery," or with such other words as may indicate the desire of the sender that the Postal Packet may be delivered by special messenger (which words are hereinafter

referred to as an "express marking,") there shall be charged and prepaid the fee of threepence.

Delivery of Incoming Packets by Special Messinger

21. Any incoming Postal Packet marked with an express marking shall, in the United Kingdom, be conveyed and delivered by special messenger, subject to the regulations and conditions for the time being in force with respect to the express delivery of inland Postal Packets in the United

RE-DIRECTION.

Incoming Packets.

22. Any incoming Postal Packet may be re-directed to any address in the United Kingdom or in any other country or place free of British postage in respect either of such re-direction or of the re-transmission thereof by post to the new address.

Inland Packets.

23. On every Postal Packet

(1.) re-directed in any country or place abroad, and thence transmitted by post to the United Kingdom or to a British Post Office abroad, or,

(2.) re-directed in the United Kingdom, or in the district of any British Post Office abroad, and thence transmitted by post to some other

country or place,

there shall be charged and paid on the delivery thereof (in addition to any postage charge-able thereon in respect of the inland service of the country or place in which the Packet was posted) the same postage as would have been payable thereon if the same had been originally addressed to the place to which it shall have been re-directed. Provided that credit shall be given for any postage prepaid thereon.

REGISTRATION.

Outgoing Packets may be Registered.

24.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of this Warrant any outgoing Postal Packet may be registered.

(2.) This regulation shall not apply to any Packet addressed to initials or in pencil.

Rules as to Registration.

25. The following rules shall apply to the registration of Postal Packets:

(1.) The packet must be posted by-

(a.) Delivery for registration at a Post Office to an officer on duty at such office; or

(b.) Delivery for registration to a rural post messenger when on duty on his outward or inward walk, or to some other officer of the Post Office authorized to receive packets for registration though not on duty at a Post

(?.) All sums chargeable on the registration of the packet and all postage chargeable thereon

must be prepaid at the time of posting.

(3.) On delivery of the packet for registration a certificate of posting, bearing thereon an acknowledgment that the registration fee has been paid, shall be obtained. This certificate must be filled up and signed by the officer of the Post Office receiving the packet.

Registration Fees.

26. For the registration of outgoing Postal Packets there shall be charged and paid the

following sums, that is to say:—
(1.) When the packet is registered by delivery to an officer of the Post Office authorized to receive the same though not on duty at a Post Office, or when the packet is registered at a Post Office before the expiration of the time appointed for the registration at such Post Office (without extra fee) of postal packets intended to be forwarded by the next despatch therefrom, the sum of twopence (hereinafter called the ordinary registration fee).

(2.) When the packet is registered at a Post Office after the expiration of the time appointed for the registration at such Post Office (without extra fee) of postal packets intended to be forwarded by the next despatch therefrom but within such further time (if any) as the Postmaster-General may from time to time provide with reference to such office, such extra sum in addition to the ordinary registration fee as the Postmaster-General may prescribe. Provided that-

(a.) In the case of the Chief or Head Post Office in London such sum shall not exceed

one shilling, and

(b.) In the case of any other Post Office such sum shall not exceed fourpence.

Acknowledgment of Delivery.

27. The sender of any outgoing registered postal packet may obtain an acknowledgment of the delivery thereof to the addressee by payment, at the time of the registration of such postal packet, of a sum of twopence halfpenny, in addition to any postage or other sum chargeable or payable in respect thereof. Provided that this Regulation shall not apply to a postal packet addressed to a country or place which does not for the time being undertake to obtain or give acknowledgments of delivery.

Compulsory Registration.

28.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of this Warrant every outgoing postal packet marked with the word "registered," or otherwise obviously intended to be registered, but not posted in the

manner prescribed by this Warrant,

(a.) If the registration fee thereon has been prepaid, shall be registered before the same is forwarded, and may be detained for that purpose until the ordinary despatch of packets next after that by which such packet would otherwise be forwarded, and,

(b) If the registration fee has not been prepaid, shall be forwarded as an ordinary postal

packet.

(2.) Every outgoing postal packet which contains coin, jewellery, or watches, and which is addressed to a country to which such articles are transmissible by post, shall be registered, and, if posted without registration, shall be returned to the

(3.) Every incoming postal packet which contains coin, jewellery, or watches, and which is not registered, shall be treated in accordance with the rules for the time being in force with respect to a similar inland postal packet in the United

Kingdom.

Compensation for Loss.

29. Subject to the provisions of this Warrant, if any article of pecuniary value, enclosed in or forming part of a registered postal packet, be lost whilst in the custody of the Postmaster-General, I

the Postmaster-General may pay to any person or persons who may in the opinion of the Postmaster-General establish a reasonable claim to compensation (having regard to the nature of the article, the care with which it was packed, and other circumstances) such sum not exceeding £2 as he may think just.

POSTAL PACKETS ON BRITISH SHIPS.

30. The following provisions shall apply to postal packets deposited in a letter box on board a British ship or in the hands of the commander of

such ship, that is to say :-

(1.) If such packet is deposited when the ship is on the high seas, such packet shall, with reference to the several rates of postage and to the other provisions of this Warrant (so far as such provisions are applicable), be treated as an outgoing postal packet of the same description.

(2.) If such packet is deposited when the ship is in a foreign or colonial port, such packet shall, with reference to the several rates of postage and to the other provisions of this Warrant (so far as such provisions are applicable), be treated as an incoming Postal Packet of the same description.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Other Postal Packets not to Interfere with Letter Post.

31. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Postal Packets of any other description, such Packets or any of them may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Compensation may be paid out of aids provided by Parliament.

32. The Postmaster-General may give effect to the provisions of this Warrant as to the loss of articles enclosed in or forming part of registered postal packets out of such aids or supplies as may be from time provided and appropriated by Parliament for that purpose, but nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render him liable either personally, or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of any such loss. And the decision of the Postmaster-General on all questions arising between him and any person claiming payment in respect of the loss of any article enclosed in or forming part of a registered postal packet shall be final and conclusive.

Remission of Postage.
33. The Postmaster-General may in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

34. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNTY OF LONDON.

BY-LAWS-OVERHEAD WIRES.

BY-LAWS made by the London County Council in pursuance of the London Overhead Wires Act, 1891.

N.B.—The Act (see section 18) does not extend to any wire placed by any person for his private use over land belonging to him or in his occupation, which does not extend over any street, and is so constructed and placed that neither the wire nor any support thereof, or attachment thereto, would be liable to fall into any public street.]

In these By-laws-

The expression "the Act" means "The London Overhead Wires Act, 1891."

The expression "wire" has the same meaning as in the Act, except that it does not include any

support or attachment.

The expression "cable" means any covered or insulated wire, of which the diameter to the outside of the covering exceeds twice the diameter of the bare wire, and where more wires than one are enclosed in the same covering or insulation, includes all such wires and covering, without reference to diameter.

General.

1. The Company shall deliver to the Council and the Local Authority full particulars of the material and gauge of the wires of the Company, and the nature and position of the several supports, and the length of span between the several supports. The Company shall also deliver to the Council a plan, on a scale of not less than 25 inches to the inile, showing the routes of such wires, and the position of the supports, or, at their option, shall cause the routes of such wires and the position of the supports to be marked upon a map, to be supplied for the purpose, at the office of the Council.

Existing Wires. · 2. In the case of wires or supports existing at the date of the approval of these By-laws, the Company shall comply with requirements of Bylaw I within six months after that date.

New Wires.

after the date of the approval of these By-laws, the Company shall comply with the requirements of By-law 1 within one month after the placing thereof.

4. A wire shall not be placed so as at any point to be at a less height above the ground than 20 feet, or where it crosses a street 35 feet, or at a less beight above the roof of any building than 6 feet, except where it is brought into any building for use in that building, or is attached to a chimney or other part of a building in accordance with these By-laws.

. 5. Every wire shall be supported at intervals not exceeding 115 yards unless permission in writing be obtained from the Council and the

Local Authority for a longer span.

- 6. Every support for a wire shall be of durable material, and properly stayed against forces due to wind pressure, change of direction of the wires, and unequal length of span; and all independent conductors and suspending wires shall be securely attached to the supports.
- 7. The factor of safety for all stresses arising from the weight of conductors and suspending wires shall be at least four at a temperature of 22° F. The factor of safety for all other parts of the structures shall be at least ten, taking the maximum possible wind pressure against a support acting in a horizontal direction at 30 lbs. per square foot. No addition need be made for a possible accumulation of snow.

8. Every support for a wire shall be marked in such manner, to be approved in the case of each Company by the Council, as to identify the Company to whom it belongs.

9. Where a support is used for the wires of more than one Company, the Company owning the support shall be responsible for the support and the attachment of the wires thereto.

10. No cable shall exceed one pound per lineal foot in weight; and every cable shall be carried by independent suspending wires, and attached to the same by efficient slings.

11. Every iron or steel wire, and every iron or steel support or attachment, shall be efficiently

protected from oxydation.

12. All poles erected on buildings as supports for wires, unless fixed through the roof, shall be carried on shoes or saddles properly protected from oxydation, and shall be efficiently stayed, so that in the event of a pole breaking it shall be impossible for it to fall into any street.

13. Every wire attached to a chimney, wall, or other part of a building, shall be efficiently supported by angle plates of iron or bronze or other device approved by the Local Authority.

14. Every wire support and attachment shall be duly and efficiently supervised and maintained by the Company.

- 15. No wire support or attachment shall be in such a condition that danger to the public using the streets may be apprehended therefrom, and the Company to whom any wire, support, or attachment being in such condition belongs, shall be guilty of an offence against these By-laws.
- 16. No wire support or attachment shall remain erected after it has ceased to be in use unless the Company intend within a reasonable time to take it again into use, and give notice of such intention to the Council and the Local Authority.
- 17. On reasonable notice being given by the Council or the Local Authority to the Company, access at all reasonable times for the purpose of inspection of the Company's wires, supports, and 3. In the case of new wires or supports placed attachments shall be given or secured by the

the Local Authority.

Penalties.

18. Any Company or person failing to comply with any of these By-laws, or of the provisions of "The London Overhead Wires Act, 1891," or delivering any particulars which to their or his knowledge are incorrect, shall be guilty of an offence against these By-laws, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, and to a further penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each day during which such offence is continued after conviction thereof.
