HEREAS by "The Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power when within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being citizens of the United States) who desert from British merchant ships in the territories belonging to the said United States will be given under a treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the United States signed at Washington on the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two the ratifications of which were exchanged on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant ship,

belonging to citizens of the United States shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained till he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence, if any, has been carried into effect:

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accord-C. L. Peel.

HEREAS by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," Her Majesty the Queen is authorized by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees, and to create new

And whereas, by "The Foreign Marriage Act, 1892," and by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1892," made in pursuance of that Act, it is provided that certain things may or shall be done on payment of the proper fee, and that Act further provides that the proper fee shall be such fee as may for the time being be fixed under the first recited Act, and that the fee so fixed as respects a Consul shall be the fee which may be taken by any Marriage officer:

And whereas, under "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," Her Majesty in Council has power to make Orders in Council, and also to revoke and vary Orders in Council made, or deemed to have been made, in pursuance of that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that the Table of Fees fixed by "The Consular Fees Order in Council, 1892," should in certain respects be amended, and that the whole of the fees to be taken by Consular officers and Marriage officers should be fixed by an Order in Council made under the provisions of "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1831":

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the before-mentioned Acts, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as "The Consular 'Fees (General) Order in Council, 1892."

2. The several fees set forth in the Tables annexed to this Order are hereby established, and the said Tables and notes thereto shall be construed as part of this Order.

3. Such provisions of any Order in Council made or continued in force under the provisions

of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," as are inconsistent with anything in this Order are hereby revoked, and the provisions of this Order and of the said Tables shall be and are hereby substituted for such first-mentioned provisions, and the fees herein prescribed may or shall be taken accordingly.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the first January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, or at such later date as in the case of any particular Consular jurisdiction, or part thereof, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by any general or particular instructions, may from time to time direct.

5. On and after the day on which this Order comes into operation in any place to which this Order applies, "The Consular Fees Order in Council, 1892," shall be repealed as to that place, but this repeal shall not revive any Table, provision, or Order in Council abolished or repealed by the said Order, or affect any right or liability existing at the commencement of this Order in any place.

6. In this Order the expression "Consular jurisdiction" means and includes the district, place, or places for which a Consular officer

7. This Order shall not extend to any place in China, Japan, or Corea.

HEREAS, by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," Her Majesty the Queen is authorized by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees, and to create new fees:

And whereas, by "The Foreign Marriage Act, 1892," and by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1892," made in pursuance of that Act, it is provided that certain things may, or shall, be done on payment of the proper fee, and that Act further provides that the proper fee shall be such fee as may for the time being be fixed under the first recited Act, and that the fee so fixed as respects a Consul shall be the fee which shall be taken by any Marriage officer:

And whereas, under "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," Her Majesty in Council has power to make Orders in Council, and also to revoke or vary Orders in Council made, or deemed to have been made, in pursuance of that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that the Table of Fees fixed by "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1892," should in certain respects be amended, and that the whole of the fees to be taken by Consular officers and Marriage officers in places to which this Order extends should be fixed by an Order in Council made under the provisions of "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891":

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the before-mentioned Acts, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows :-

1. This Order may be cited as "The Consular Fees (China, Japan, and Corea) Order in Council,

2. The several fees set forth in the Tables annexed to this Order are hereby established, and the said Tables and notes thereto shall be construed as part of this Order.

8. Such provisions of any Order in Council made or continued in force under the provisions of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," and relating or applicable to China, Japan, or Corea, as are inconsistent with anything in this Order, are hereby revoked, and the provisions of this Order, and of the said Tubles, shall be, and are, hereby substituted for such first-mentioned provisions, and the fees herein prescribed may or shall be taken accordingly.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the first January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, or at such later date as, in the case of any particular Consular jurisdiction, or part thereof, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by any general or particular instructions, may from time to time direct.

5. On and after the day on which this Order. comes into operation in any place to which this Order applies, "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1892," shall be repealed as to that place, but this repeal shall not revive any Table, provision, or Order in Council abolished or repealed by the said Order, or affect any right or liability existing at the commencement of this Order in any place.

6. In this Order the expression "Consular jurisdiction" means and includes the district, place, or places for which a Consular officer acts.

7. This Order shall extend to all places in China, Japan, and Corea.

HEREAS by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the Regulations contained in the schedule thereto should, so far as regards British ships and boats, be substituted for the Regulations contained in the First Schedule to an Order in Council made as aforesaid, and dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine:

And whereas by two Orders in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid, and dated respectively the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the twentyfourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, certain modifications and additions were made to the said Regulations contained in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, as regards British

fishing vessels and boats:

And whereas by the said Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it is, amongst other things, provided as follows, namely:—

ARTICLE 9. - A pilot vessel, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall not carry the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the masthead, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

A pilot vessel, when not engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to

those of other ships.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have, in pursuance of the said recited Act, jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the said Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, should be further mod fied by adding to the said recited Article Nine thereof of the provision contained in the schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that from the date of this Order the Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall be further modified by the addition to the said recited Article Nine thereof the provisions con-C. SCHEDULE.

A steam Pilot vessel exclusively employed for the service of Pilots licensed or certified by any Pilotage Authority or the Committee of any Pilotage District in the United Kingdom when engaged on her station on Pilotage duty and in British waters and not at anchor shall in addition to the lights required for all Pilot boats carry at a distance of eight feet below her white masthead light a red light visible all round the horizon and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least two miles and also the coloured side lights required to be carried by vessels when under

way.
When engaged on her station on Pilotage duty and in British waters and at anchor she shall carry in addition to the light required for all Pilot boats the red light above-mentioned but not the coloured side lights.

When not engaged on her station on Pilotage duty she shall carry the same lights as other steam

vessels.

vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese " or dioceses, being either in the same parish or "contiguous to each other, and of which the "aggregate population shall not exceed conc "thousand five hundred persons, may, with " advantage to the interests of religion, be united " into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the province shall inquire into the circumstances of "the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear " to him that such union may be usefully made, " and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that " the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sine-" cure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages " respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such " consent being signified in writing under the hands " of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop " shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry "and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter "directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other "cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid repre-" sentation to be affixed on or near the principal "outer door of the church, or in some public and " conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sine-"cure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, " may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing " under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the " said Archbishop, against such union; and if no " sufficient cause be shown within such time, the " said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and con-" sent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and " thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to make and issue an Order or Orders 44 for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or " rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, "with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninetytwo, in the words following, that is to say: -

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to

Your Majesty in Council:

"That the Right Reverend Augustus Lord Bishop of Lichfield as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage or chapelry of Dunston and the vicarage or chapelry of Coppenhall, both in the county of Stafford having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Edward George Percy Baron Hatherton of Tiddesley in the county of Stafford (being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefices if the same respectively were now vacant) consents to the

proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lichfield our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before-

mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew Woodside in the parish of Caddington which parish is situate partly in the county of Bedford and partly in the county of Hertford and wholly in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew Woodside situate as

aforesaid.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas in conformity with the terms of the will of the late Mrs. Catherine Thompson of Seabrook Vale in the said parish of Cheriton, Widow, William Henry Dowling Reeves Welman, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, a Major-General on the Retired List of Your Majesty's Army, and George Wilks, of Hythe in the said county of Kent Solicitor, the trustees of the said will have contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of eleven thousand three hundred and eighty-seven pounds nineteen shillings and five pence upon trust to apply a portion of the said sum amounting to five thousand pounds sterling, with certain accumulations of interest thereon as and for the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and (so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act) then of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the last-mentioned Act a sum which will amount to not less than one hundred and fifty pounds per annum.

"And whereas the said William Henry Dowling Reeves Welman and the said George Wilks have nominated to us the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of the said diocese of Canterbury as the person to whom they desire that the first turn of patronage and appointment of the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish should be assigned and the Reverend William Blackwall Buckwell Clerk in Holy Orders the present rector of the said parish of Cheriton and his successors rectors of the same parish for ever as the persons to whom the second and every succeeding turn of patronage and presentation should be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward White, Archbishop of the said diocese of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Cheriton and of the said parish of Folkestone which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of All Souls Cheriton-street' and shall be endowed as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All those contiguous pertions of the parish of Cheriton and of the parish of Folkestone both in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury wherein the present incumbent of each such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls, all which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing

The King has resolved to prohibit the entry into our territory by the land frontier of used bedclothes, leather, skins, and feathers, and hair of animals, wool, silk, cotton, linen, and hemp (unmanufactured), rags, paper, birds, sheep, goats, and swine, fruits, and vegetables (of which the roots are below or slightly above ground), arriving from the Empire of Russia.

Cereals and goods of the same origin will be subjected to disinfection and purification which the medical inspection established on the frontier considers proper to apply to them according to their state and nature.

As far as arrivals by sea are concerned, the Directors of foul lazarets will recollect that at the season of the chief import of grain from that country, the shovelling of the wheat and other grain shall be done with all care, submitting the sacks which contain it to most strict disinfection, and taking care that the purification, &c., of such grain shall last as long as shall be deemed necessary and conducted by the staff whose duty it is, |

and with the intervention of the consignee or the captain of the vessel which brings it.

His Majesty's Gracious Notification containing regulations for preventing the entrance of cholera

into the Kingdom

Given at Stockholm Palace, August 5, 1892. We, Oscar, &c., make known that We, in view of the spread of cholera in Europe, and by the advice of our Medical Board, have found good, in order to prevent the entrance of cholera into the Kingdom, to annul our notification of June 12th, 1885, relative to the quarantine regulations which were to come into force on the occurrence of cholera in or near an European port, and instead to ordain as follows:

ART. I.-1. Should a case of cholera occur at or near any port in Europe, the Board of Trade shall, by public notification, declare such port to be infected with cholera, as also its neighbourhood. according to the circumstances of the case.

2. A district which has accordingly been declared as infected with chclera, shall continue to be regarded as infected, until the Board of Trade shall notify that the disease has ceased there.

3. Even if a notification has not actually been issued by the Board of Trade, any port in Europe shall be considered as infected with cholera, so. soon as trustworthy information shall have been received that a case of cholera has occurred in such port.

4. The above-named Notifications, wherein also the places still considered as infected under previous notifications, shall be immediately published by the newspapers, and by the "Författningssamling," and also be forwarded, in sufficient numbers of copies, to the General Customs Board, the Medical Board, the Pilotage Board, and to all the superior local authorities for immediate distri-

bution to persons concerned.

ART. II.—1. A ship which has sailed from or touched at, or otherwise had communication with, a place regarded as infected with cholera, likewisea ship which has come into communication with any other ships having had on board death or sickness from cholera or other sickness suspected. of being cholera, shall, before having communication with Swedish territory or inhabitants of Sweden, touch at one of the stations for observation established along the coasts of the Kingdom, in order that she may be examined by one of the appointed doctors as regards the state of health on board, and accordingly such ship shall, if she tries.

to touch at any other place, be at once sent to the observation station.

2. Should there be on board a ship arriving from abroad any case of death or illness from cholera, or disease suspected of being cholera, such ships shall at once proceed to the quarantine station, before holding communication with Swedish territory or inhabitants of Sweden.

ART. III. The Board of Health shall, by a public notification, similar to that set forth in paragraph 4 of Article I, declare what places are fixed upon for quarantine and observation stations.

ART. IV.—1. When a ship, according to the rules in Article II, has arrived at the place of observation, she shall, with crew, passengers, and cargo, except in the case mentioned in paragraph 3, remain there for 48 hours in order to be examined by the appointed doctor of the place.

2. Should no reason be found for supposing that cholera can be introduced by the persons or goods on board, the ship may, with crew, passengers, and cargo, after the expiration of the abovementioned 48 hours, continue her journey, as soon as the doctor has given his permission in writing, on a form supplied by the Medical Board

for that purpose.

3. If, on the other hand, it occurs that the ship during her journey has had on board death or sickness from cholera, or disease suspected to be cholera, or should such disease show itself on board whilst the ship is at the observation station, or should there exist on board clothes or bedding, or other similar goods or objects, through which it is suspected that cholera might be introduced, then the ship shall at once be sent to the quarantine station in order to undergo quarantine there.

ART. V.—1. A ship which by virtue of Articles II or IV has arrived at the quarantine station, shall there be kept in quarantine with her crew, passengers, and cargo until six periods of twenty-four hours have passed by from the time that the ship arrived at the quarantine station, and that the last sick or dead person has been removed from the ship.

2. A ship which has been placed in quarantine, and the goods and objects on board which are suspected of possibly introducing cholera, shall undergo cleansing and disinfection in such a degree as circumstances call for. This shall be done according to the regulations issued on June 2, 1892, for the use of the quarantine station at Kansö, and according to any rules which the Medical Board may issue.

3. After the proper cleansing and disinfection has taken place, and the appointed quarantine period has expired, the ship may be permitted to continue her journey with her crew, passengers, and cargo. Such permission shall be given in writing on a form provided by the Board of

Health.

ART. VI. As for the fees at the quarantine station, the already named rules issued for the quarantine station at Känsö shall be applicable.

ART. VII. The Medical Board shall draw up instructions for the doctors appointed to the observation and quarantine stations, and the Board can also in other matters issue suitable regulations for the conduct of the persons employed at those stations.

ART. VIII. In general, the regulations of March 19, 1875, on steps taken to prevent the introduction and spread of infectious diseases among the inhabitants of the Kingdom, shall continue to be observed.

Let all concerned obediently follow what is above ordered.

- 7. Vessels arriving from the Black Sea shall be allowed to enter the Harbour in quarantine for the purpose of coaling, taking provisions, and discharging cargo; provided the coals are brought alongside and put into the vessel by labourers, who shall be kept in quarantine for 21 days, and the trimming in bunkers is effected by the resources of the vessel. No susceptible goods, however, shall be landed, and live stock shall be disinfected in the usual way.

Such vessels shall quit the Harbour as soon as they shall have coaled, taken provisions, or dis-

charged cargo.

The unshipping of cargo from such vessels shall be effected by the crew on lighters within a period to be fixed, in each case, by the Collector of Customs.

Passengers arriving by such vessels shall not allowed to land.

12. Soiled linen and wearing apparel shall not be allowed to be landed from any ship which may be under any suspicion of having had recently on board a case of contagious or infectious disease, or from any ship arriving through the Suez Canal, or from Syria, Karamania or Spain, except after disinfection at the Lazaretto or at such other places as may be appointed by the Port Authority.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Cosford Union, in the County of the Western Division of Suffolk :

And to all others whom it may concern. WHEREAS by General Orders bearing

date the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the twentyseventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Poor Law Board made rules and regulations relating to the appointment and remuneration of certain Officers, therein named Collectors of the Guardians, by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the said Cosford Union; and by Article 5 of the Order first above-cited it was provided as follows:-

"The Board of Guardians shall pay to the " Officer appointed to the office of Collector " under this Order such salary, either by a "fixed sum or by a poundage, as the Poor "Law Board shall from time to time direct "or approve; and shall also repay the " amount expended or disbursed by him on " their behalf according to the account ren-"dered by him, so far as it shall be found to " have been duly and properly incurred."

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Cosford Union:
