

ter in the county of Leicester and in the diocese of Peterborough and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave in the same county and diocese being:—

“All that part of the said new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester which is bounded upon the west by the parish of Saint Margaret Leicester upon the north by the parish of Belgrave both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north-east by the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave from the new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester aforesaid at a point in the middle of Belper-street distant one chain or thereabouts to the south-east of its intersection by Catherine-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Belper-street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its present north-western end and extending thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a further distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Belgrave-road at or near to its junction with Cooper-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Belgrave-road for a distance of thirty yards or thereabouts to its junction with Law-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its present north-western end at its junction with the street proposed to be called “Cross-street” which leads into Bruen-street and extending thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing Ross Walk) to the point in the middle of the Leicester Canal upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester from the parish of Saint Margaret, Leicester aforesaid.

“II. The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester aforesaid being:—

“All that part of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave which is bounded upon the south-east by the consolidated chapelry or new parish of Saint Barnabas New Humberstone in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south by the new parish of Saint Matthew Leicester in the same county and diocese upon the west and upon the south-west by the new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist Leicester from the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Belgrave aforesaid at the point in the middle of Belper-street mentioned in the first part of the schedule to this scheme or representation and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to its present south-eastern end and extending thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a further distance of fifteen and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby intersecting part of the premises and buildings of the Phoenix Iron Works) to the point in the middle of the main line of the Midland Railway upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Michael and

All Angels Belgrave from the consolidated chapelry or new parish of Saint Barnabas New Humberstone aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.
