WHEREAS by an Order made by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council on the fifteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, Her Majesty did, by and with the advice of the said Council, order that George Henry Charles, Earl of Strafford, Sir George Webbe Dasent, Knight, Doctor of Civil Law, and William John Courthope, Esquire, or such other persons as Her Majesty might from time to time approve in the stead of them, or any of them, should be Her Majesty's Commissioners for testing, in conformity with Her Majesty's Order in Council dated the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy, or such further Order or Orders as Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, had issued or might issue in that behalf, the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed to situations or employments in Her Majesty's Civil Establishments, and also for testing, in conformity with regulations to be from time to time issued by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for War, the literary qualifications of candidates for first Commissions in the Army, and for admission to the Royal Military College at Woolwich, and should hold their offices during the pleasure of Her Majesty; the said George Henry Charles, Earl of Strafford being the First Commissioner; and should have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as might be required to assist them in the performance of the duties thereinafter assigned to them:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered that the said William John Courthope, Esquire, and the said Francis Hervey, commonly called the Lord Francis Hervey, or such other persons as Her Majesty may from time to time, approve in the stead of them, or any of them, shall be Her Majesty's Commissioners for testing, in conformity with the said Order in Council dated the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy, or such further Order or Orders as Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, has issued or may issue in that behalf, the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed to situations or employments in Her Majesty's Civil Establishments, and also for testing, in conformity with regulations to be from time to time issued by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for War, the literary qualifications of Candidates for first Commissions in the Army, and for admission to the Royal Military College at Woolwich, and shall hold their offices during the pleasure of Her Majesty; the said William John Courthope, Esquire, being the first Commissioner; and shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as may be required to assist them in the performance of their duties. THEREAS by section twenty-one of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of population, or "from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more benefices which have been "heretofore united or which may be hereafter " united under the provisions of this Act should "be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices " shall have been united, or may be hereafter "united into one benefice, and with respect to " his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese " shall represent to the said Archbishop of the "Province, that one or more of the benefices " within his diocese, of which such united benefice "shall consist, may be separated therefrom with " advantage to the interests of religion, the said "Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances "of the case, and if on such inquiry it shall "appear to him that such union may be usefully "dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or "benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before " certifying such inquiry to Her Majesty as here-"inafter directed, cause, with respect to his own "diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, "and in all other cases a copy in writing of " the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or "near the principal outer door of the church or in some public and conspicuous place in " each of the benefices forming part of the united "benefice, with notice to any person or persons

"interested that he, she, or they may within such " six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, " or their hands to the said Archbishop against "any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause " be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall " certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's "consent is necessary, to Her Majesty in Council, " and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty "to issue an Order for separating such last-"mentioned benefice or benefices from such united " benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage " of the several patrons, if there be more than one " patron, and such Order shall be registered in the " registry of the diocese to which such united " benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar " of such diocese, immediately on the receipt " thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, " and thereupon immediately if such united benefice " shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first " avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or " benefices so proposed to be separated from such "united benefice, but in all other respects shall " remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward " such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be " and be deemed and taken to be a separate and " distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and puroses whatever as if no such union had taken place, " and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may " according to the terms of such Order present or " nominate thereto respectively, and so from time " to time upon each and every avoidance of the " same: Provided always, that no benefices which "have been united for more than sixty years " before the passing of this Act shall be disunited " without the consent in writing of the patron or " patrons thereof."

And whereas by section twenty-three of the said Act it is further enacted "That whenever "two or more benefices which have at any time "been united into one benefice shall be disunited, " and become separate benefices under the provi-" sions of this Act it shall be lawful for Her " Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of "the Archbishop of the Province, with the con-sent of the patron or patrons of such benefices "respectively.... to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, " or other endowments or emoluments belonging "to, or arising or accruing within the limits " of such united benefice, to each of such bene-"fices respectively, as to Her Majesty in Council " shall seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion " of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, moduses, " or other endowments or emoluments, or any "part thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits of the benefice to which the same " shall be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, " or may not have belonged thereto, and also " to divide and apportion between such benefices " all such charges and outgoings as before the "disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole " united benefice."

And whereas on the sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two Charles John, Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, made a representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words following, that

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I Charles John Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol do hereby represent to your Grace that it appears to me that the disunion of the united benefice of the rectory of Brimpsfield and the with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased

rectory of Cranham in the county of Glou-cester and my diocese of Gloucester and Bristol by the separation of the said rectory of Brimpsfield from the said rectory of Cranham may be made with advantage to the interests of religion. Witness my hand this sixth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

And whereas on the twenty-ninth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two the said Archbishop inquired into the circumstances of the case.

And whereas on the fourteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two the said Archbishop certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say :-

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Arch-bishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Charles John Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Brimpsfield and the rectory of Cranham in the county of Gloucester having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the rectory of Cranham from the rectory of Brimpsfield may be made with advantage to the interests of religion we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully dissolved and that the Reverend Richard Henry Denne, Clerk M.A. of Brimpsfield aforesaid being the patron or person entitled to present to the said united benefices if the same were now vacant consents to

the proposed disunion.
"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of each of the parish churches of the said united benefice with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for separating the said rectory of Cranham from the said rectory of Brimpsfield and in accordance with the consent in writing of the patron above referred to we recommend that each benefice when disunited shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and out-

order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice consisting of the rectory of Brimpsfield and the rectory of Cranham, situate in the county of Gloucester and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, shall be disunited by separating the said rectory of Brimpsfield from the said rectory of Cranham,

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council is further pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, with the consent of the patron of the said benefices, to assign and attach to each of such benefices respectively its own original endowments and emoluments and to direct that each benefice shall bear its own charges and outgoings.

HEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear " to the Archbishop of Province, with respect to "his own diocese, and whenever it shall be " represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, " or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two " or more benefices, or that one or more benefice " or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure " rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in " his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in "the same parish or contiguous to each other, " and of which the aggregate population shall not " exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, "with advantage to the interests of religion, be " united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of " the Province shall inquire into the circumstances " of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall " appear to him that such union may be usefully " made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, "and that the patron or patrons of the said "benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting "thereto, such consent being signified in writing " under the hands of such patron or patrons, the " said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certify-" ing such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as "hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his " own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, "and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or " near the principal outer door of the church, or " in some public and conspicuous place in each of "such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, " with notice to any person or persons interested, "that he, she, or they, may, within such six "weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or "their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, "against such union; and if no sufficient cause " be shown within such time, the said Archbishop " shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid "to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it "shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting "such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with "cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the eighteenth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words and figures following, that is to say :- | "To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to

Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend William Lord Bishop of Oxford as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Hartwell and the vicarage of Stone with the chapelry of Bishopstone both in the county of Buckingham having represented unto Us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice We enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to Us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Edward Dyke Lee of Hartwell House Aylesbury Esquire (being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefices if the same respectively were both now vacant) consents to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council We caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to Us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Oxford our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before

mentioned are hereunto annexed.
"And We do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The VV Pluralities Act, 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may "be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong with great advan-" tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to "parishes or districts to which they are con-tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his "own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop " that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, "parochial, or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said " Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and "rights to pews, may be made with justice to all "parties interested; and if the patron or patrons
of the benefice or benefices to be affected by "such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas by section six of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is amongst other things, further enacted, "That any such scheme or "modification as aforesaid may be drawn up " according to the regulations and directions in " the hereinbefore in part recited Act contained, " subject to the consent in writing of the patron " or patrons of the said benefice or benefices to be "affected thereby, under his or their hands, not-" withstanding the vacancy of such benefice or " benefices, and that it shall be lawful for Her " Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order " for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, " as the case may be, into effect; and that such "Order being registered in the registry of the "diocese as directed by the hereinbefore in part " recited Act, shall come into operation, and shall " be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever " notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies."

And whereas the Right Reverend James Lord Bishop of Hereford, hath represented in a writing, dated the twenty-sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury follows:-

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We the Right Reverend James Lord Bishop of Hereford do hereby represent to Your Grace as follows.

our diocese of Hereford are the rectory and parish church of Ribbesford the parish whereof comprises part of the borough of Bewdley.

"2. That the population of the parish of Ribbesford including the part of the borough of Bewdley is two thousand and three the population of the part or portion of the borough of Bewdley described and comprised in the schedule hereto being estimated at one thousand nine hundred and

"3. That the parish church of Ribbesford aforesaid affords accommodation for four hundred persons or thereabouts and is distant from one to four miles from the part or portion of the borough of Bewdley described as aforesaid.

"4. That the area of the ecclesiastical parish of

Ribbesford exceeds four thousand two hundred and seventy acres.

"5. That the net annual income of the said rectory of Ribbesford amounts according to the Title Averages for one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one to two hundred and seventy-six pounds or thereabouts.

"6. That within the county of Worcester and our diocese of Hereford are the perpetual curacy and district or ecclesiastical parish church of

Saint Ann Bewdley.

"7. That the part or portion of the said borough of Bewdley described as aforesaid although forming part of the said parish of Ribbesford is in fact contiguous to the district or ecclesiastical parish of Saint Ann Bewdley and the inhabitants of the said part or portion of the said borough of Bewdley can and do more readily attend the said church of Saint Ann Bewdley and can be more easily attended to for spiritual purposes by the vicar of the said district or ecclesiastical parish of Saint Ann Bewdley.

"8. That the district or ecclesiastical parish of Saint Ann Bewdley contains a population of nine hundred and seventy-four and the church of the said district or ecclesiastical parish affords accommodation for eight hundred persons or thereabouts.

"9. That the net annual income of the said vicarage of Saint Ann Bewdley amounts to two hundred and eighteen pounds or thereabouts.

"10. That the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Ribbesford belongs to Maria Louisa Winnington Ingram of Bickenham, Cavendish-place, Bournemouth and of Ribbesford House in the county of Worcester Widow and the patronage of the said perpetual curacy and district or ecclesiastical parish church of Saint Ann Bewdley belongs to the rector of Ribbesford for the time being.

"11. That the rector of the rectory and parish church of Ribbesford is the Reverend Edward Henry Winnington Ingram who is consenting to the scheme hereby proposed and the perpetual curacy and district or ecclesiastical parish church

of Saint Ann Bewdley is vacant.

"12. That it appears to us that under the provisions of . (a.) Used bed and body linen, unwashed, introduced as article of commerce.

(b.) Worn clothes, rags for paper making, and scraps of stuffs of all sorts and of paper.

(c.) Fur and goods of fur, skins, and leathers of all kinds and under all forms.

(d.) Felts, wool (washed or not), ox-hair, horsehair, pig-bristles, camel-hair, feathers, downs, and cottons.

(e.) Bladders and guts (fresh, dry, or salted).

(f.) Caviar, fish, dried, smoked, salted, or prepared with oil, and fresh butter.

(g.) Specimens of merchandise.

The following Translation is a résumé of the same :-

By this notice the Regulations of Ch. 2 I of the Law of the 2nd July, 1880, concerning preventive measures against the introduction of contagious diseases, are put in force, until further orders, with respect to vessels coming from Russian ports of the Baltic, or having communicated with these ports, or during their voyage with other ships sailing from these ports.

At the same time, in conformity with section 32 of the said Law, importation from the said ports of the following objects is forbidden:-

Linen, wearing apparel, and bedding, having been used, unless they belong to travellers' luggage, rags, used cotton-wadding, wool-flock, and paper-scrapings.

Linen, clothing, and bedding belonging to travellers, and coming from the said ports, shall be disinfected under the superintendence of the

authorities.

His Majesty's Gracious Notification prohibiting the introduction of used bedding and wearing

apparel, &c., &c.

We, Oscar, &c., make known that, in consequence of cholera having occurred in various places in Russia, and having already by our Decree of July 11 last, commanded that rags, as conveying infection, shall be imported into the Kingdom from no other place excepting only from Norway and Denmark, We do now, upon the advice of Our Medical Board, ordain that used bedding, bed clothes, and wearing apparel, and other similar goods and effects, so far as they are not brought with them for their own use by travellers or ships' crews, shall, until further notice, not be allowed entrance excepting only if they come from Norway and Denmark; and such import may only take place on the condition that when the goods arrive it be proved, by a certificate of a Swedish-Norwegian Legation, Consulate or Vice-Consulate, or in default thereof, of a proper local authority, that the goods do not come from any other country but only from the abovenamed countries. The certificate in question may also be issued by any person whose trustworthiness is testified to by one of the above authorities.

What is above said does not prevent the continued application of a prohibition against the import of goods from those countries, which may have been issued for some other reasons.

Let all concerned obediently follow the above orders.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Altering General Dispensaries Order (Metropolis): Appointment of Stocktaker:—

Saint Olave's Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Saint Olave's Union, in the county of London :-And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order of the Poor Law Board, dated the 22nd day of April, 1871, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Saint Olave's Union (among others), regulations are prescribed in respect to the management of any Dispensary provided for such Union under the powers conferred upon the said Guardians by "The Poor Law Amendment Act, 1834," "The Metropolitan Poor Act, 1867," and the other authorities in that behalf;

And whereas by the said Order it is required that an Account shall be kept by the Dispenser of the drugs, medicines, medical and surgical appliances, and medical stores submitted to his charge, and, as nearly as may be, of the consumption or disposal of the same, and that from time to time such Account shall be laid before the Dispensary Visiting Committee; and such Committee are required, as soon as practicable after the end of every half-year ending on the 25th day of March and the 29th day of September respectively, to compare the stock of drugs, medicines, and medical and surgical appliances in the Dispensary with the account to be kept by the Dispenser as aforesaid;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the said Guardians to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stock of drugs, medicines, medical and surgical appliances, and medical stores in any Dispensary provided for the said Union as aforesaid, and to perform the other duties hereinafter set forth;

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows :-

ARTICLE I .- The Guardians of the Poor of the said Saint Olave's Union may, as and when they shall think fit to do so, appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II .- Every such appointment shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations as to the appointment of Officers in force in the said Union for the time being.

ARTICLE III.—The Guardians shall pay to the person or persons appointed under this Order such salary or remuneration as We may from time to

time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV.—Every person appointed under this Order shall hold office until he shall die, or resign, or be dismissed by the Guardians, subject to Our consent, or be removed by Us, or be proved to be insane by evidence which We may deem sufficient; and the said Guardians shall give notice to Us of every such death or resignation, and state the cause of such resignation, so far as it may be known to them.

Provided nevertheless, that the Guardians may, if they think fit, with Our assent, appoint a person or persons to discharge for a limited period only,

the duties hereby prescribed for the Stocktaker.

ARTICLE V.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stock of drugs, medicines, medical and surgical appliances, and medical stores in any Dispensary provided for the said Union, and shall compare the same with the Account kept by the Dispenser as aforesaid, showing the receipt and consumption or disposal of the stock committed to his charge.

ARTICLE VI.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article V., the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be, as nearly as may be, correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of the aforesaid Account in the following form :-

"Submitted to me this , and found to be, as nearly 18 " as may be, correct as regards the quantities of " stock remaining in store." (Signed)

"Stocktaker."

If he'find the stock to be incorrect, he shall make such addition to the said certificate as he may deem necessary, specifying the particulars in which he finds the quantities of stock to be incorrectly stated.

ARTICLE VII.-The Dispenser shall, when required by the Stocktaker to do so, on the days and at the times referred to in Article V., submit to him the stock and Account therein mentioned, and render to him such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such examination and comparison as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VIII.—The Dispenser shall lay the

said Account before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

ARTICLE IX.—So long as a Stocktaker is appointed it shall not be necessary for the Dispensary Visiting Committee to examine the stock in pursuance of Article 7 of the above-cited Order.
