PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting "Whereas in some instances tithings, " hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts " may be separated from the parishes or mother "churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra paro-"chial may in some instances with advantage " be annexed to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the " Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, " chapelry, place or district within the diocese of " such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, "as the case may be, may be advantageously " separated from any parish or mother church and "either be constituted a separate benefice by "itself or be united to any other parish to which " it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any "other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesias-"tical purposes: and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the " said Archbishop for his consideration) describing "the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the " changes consequent on such alteration in respect "to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested: and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or "their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may ap-" prove, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, I

"by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section eight of "The Church Building Act 1839" it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order "of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a "separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is "constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of "the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the control or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend John Wogan, Lord Bishop of Saint Albans, hath represented in a writing dated the twentieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan.

"I, John Wogan by Divine Permission Bishop of Saint Albans do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Hertford in my diocese of Saint Albans the rectory of Bishops Hatfield the parish whereof comprises (amongst other places) the chapelry of Totteridge the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the said chapelry contains a church or chapel long since erected which is distant from the

parish church ten miles or thereabouts.

"That the population of the said parish (exclusive of the said chapelry) is according to the last Census four thousand and fifty-nine and the population of the said chapelry is six hundred and fifty-seven according to the same Census.

"That the said chapelry appears to have been treated from time immemorial as a separate parish for all civil purposes and that baptisms churchings marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the church or chapel of the

said chapelry.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry have from time immemorial resorted to the church or chapel of the said chapelry have repaired it by rates levied on the said chapelry and have elected from among themselves churchwardens and other parish officers for the said chapelry and the said inhabitants have not been liable to repair the parish church of Bishops Hatfield.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the parish of Bishops Hatfield are entitled to accommodation in any of the pews or sittings in the church or chapel of the said chapelry nor are any of the inhabitants of the said chapelry entitled to accommodation in any pews or sittings in the parish church of Bishops

Hatfield.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Bishops Hatfield with the chapelry of Totteridge arising from tithe rent-charge glebe land dividends on invested capital sums Easter offerings and fees amounts to one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one pounds fifteen shillings and eight pence or thereabouts of which amount the net annual sum of two hundred and eighty-two pounds four shillings and six pence arising from tithe rent-charge glebe land dividends on invested capital sum Easter offerings and fees arises within the said chapelry of Totteridge.

"That there is a glebe house belonging to the parish of Bishops Hatfield sufficient for the residence of the rector and that a new glebe house for the said chapelry sufficient for the residence of the curate serving the same being provided by means of subscriptions of the parishioners of Totteridge aforesaid and others.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the said Act of the first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six and of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign chapter forty-nine the said chapelry of Totteridge may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Bishops Hatfield and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a vicarage and benefice.

"That the Most Honourable Robert Arthur Talbot Gascoyne Marquess of Salisbury the patron of the said benefice has consented in writing under his hand to the scheme set forth in this representation the Reverend Lord Rupert Ernest William Gascoyne Cecil is the present incumbent of the said benefice and has consented

in writing to the said scheme.
"That pursuant to the directions of the firstmentioned Act of Parliament I have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the separation before proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the l

said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the said chapelry of Totteridge shall be separated from the said parish of Bishops Hatfield to which it now belongs and that the same shall be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a benefice by the name and style of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Totteridge' of which the said church or chapel shall be the parish church.

"That the said separate parish and benefice of Cotteridge shall henceforth be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Bishops Hatfield and the incumbent of the said separate parish and benefice shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the

same.

"That the incumbent of the said separate parish and benefice shall henceforth be entitled to the tithe rent-charge glebe lands and other profits (if any) and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments belonging to and arising from or in respect of the said separate parish and benefice of Totteridge and also to the dividends and income payable in respect of the sum of three hundred and sixty-three pounds six shillings and fivepence Three pounds per centum Local Loans Stock in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England representing the proceeds of the sale of a portion of the glebe situate within the said chapelry of Totteridge.

"That the said sum of three hundred and sixtythree pounds six shillings and five pence Three pounds per centum Local Loan Stock shall be transferred to the separate account of the incumbent of the said separate parish and benefice.

"That the first fruits and yearly tenths chargeable upon the benefice of Bishops Hatfield with the chapelry of Totteridge shall be apportioned as follows that is to say one-sixth part shall be charged to or payable in respect of the said separate benefice of Totteridge and five-sixth parts thereof in respect of the rectory of Bishops

"That no change shall be made by this scheme in respect to the glebe lands tithe rent-charges or other endowments or emoluments of the said rectory of Bishops Hatfield except as mentioned

in the preceding clauses.

" That the patronage or right of nominating a minister or incumbent to the said separate parish and benefice of Totteridge shall be vested in and be exercised by the rector for the time being of the rectory of Bishops Hatfield.

"That the parishioners of the said separate parish and benefice of Totteridge shall not be entitled to accommodation in the said church of Bishops Hatfield nor shall the parishioners of the said parish of Bishops Hatfield be entitled to accommodation in the said church or chapel of Totteridge.

" And I do hereby submit the foregoing representation and scheme to your Grace and in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents of the patron and incumbent thereto by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:

"That the Right Reverend John Wogan Bishop of Saint Albans has represented unto us (amongst

other things),-

"That there is in the county of Hertford and his diocese of Saint Albans the parish and benefice or rectory of Bishops Hatfield.

"That the said benefice or rectory of Bishops Hatfield comprises (amongst other places) the chapelry of Totteridge the limits and boundaries

whereof are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838, and of the Act second and third Victoria chapter forty-nine, the said chapelry of Totteridge may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Bishops Hatfield and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a vicarage and benefice by the name and style of the perpetual curacy of Totteridge of which the church or chapel belonging to the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the said Phralities Act 1838 the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan.

"I Randall Thomas by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Rochester, do hereby in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' represent to Your Grace as follows:

"1. There is in the county of Surrey and my diocese of Rochester the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Giles Camberwell with the chapelry of Saint John Forest Hill. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe rent-charge ground rents of glebe plots and surplice fees is one thousand four hundred and fifty pounds or thereabouts.

"2. There is also in the said county of Surrey and my diocese of Rochester the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish) of Saint Paul Herne Hill. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe rent-charge, surplice fees and pew rents is five hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"3. A portion of the said parish of Saint Giles Camberwell lies at a distance of two miles or thereabouts from the church of the said parish but is in close proximity to the church of the said new parish of Saint Paul Herne Hill and the persons residing in such district are in the habit of attending the church of Saint Paul Herne Hill aforesaid.

"4. The population of the parish of Saint Giles Camberwell is nineteen thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and the population of the portion proposed to be severed is two hundred or there-The population of the new parish of Saint Paul Herne Hill is four thousand two hundred and twelve.

"It appears to me that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act 1838 the portion of the said parish of Saint Giles Camberwell hereinbefore referred to and hereinafter described may be advantageously separated from that parish and be united to the contiguous parish of Saint Paul Herne Hill for ecclesiastical purposes.

"The Reverend Frederic Festus Kelly is both the patron and the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Giles Camberwell and William Henry Stone of Lea Park Godalming in the county of Surrey Esquire is the patron and the Reverend Stephen Frederick Bridge the incumbent of Saint Paul Herne Hill.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the said twenty-sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' I the said Randall Thomas Bishop of Rochester have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do hereby submit the same to Your Grace together with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of both the said benefices affected thereby to the intent that if Your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

#### "SCHEME.

"That all that portion of the parish of Saint Giles Camberwell which is situate south of Half Moon-lane in the angle formed by the London | us (amongst other things):—

Brighton and South Coast Railway crossing the London Chatham and Dover Railway and which said portion of the parish of Saint Giles Camberwell is bounded on the north by Half Moon-lane aforesaid on the south-east by the said London Brighton and South Coast Railway and on the south-west by the London Chatham and Dover Railway shall be separated from the said parish of Saint Giles Camberwell and be united to and be deemed part of the said vicarage and new parish of Saint Paul Herne Hill for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Paul Herne Hill shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That the inhabitants of the said described portion of the said parish of Saint Giles Camberwell shall henceforth be entitled to accommodation in the church of the said benefice of Saint Paul Herne Hill.

"That marriages baptisms churchings and burials shall be solemnized and performed in the church of the said benefice of Saint Paul Herne Hill for the inhabitants of the said separated portion of Saint Giles Camberwell but all fees dues ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments arising therefrom shall belong as hitherto and be paid over to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Giles Camberwell during the incumbency of the said Frederic Festus Kelly but shall after the cesser of such incumbency belong to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint Paul Herne Hill.

"That no alteration shall be made in the endowments or in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

And whereas by section eight of the Church Building Act, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, it is amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of Her "Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate "parish for ecclesiastical purposes is consti-"tuted, the same shall, on registration thereof, " and with the consent in writing of the incum-" bent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices "to be thereby affected, become a perpetual " curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, "duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may "receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in "anywise be subject to the control or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Mandell, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath represented in a writing dated the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I, the Right Reverend Mandell Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent unto your Grace that there is in the county of Northampton and my diocese of Peterborough an ancient hamlet or chapelry known by the name of the hamlet or chapelry of Denton the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the said hamlet or chapelry belongs to the rectory of Whiston and the rectory of Yardley Hastings both in the said county and diocese and the rectors thereof have jointly the care of the said hamlet or chapelry.

"That the Right Honourable George Florance Lord Boston is patron of the said rectory of

Whiston.

"That the Most Honourable William Maclean Marquess of Northampton K.G. is the patron of the said rectory of Yardley Hastings.

"That the Honourable and Reverend Llewellyn Charles Robert Irby is the Rector of Whiston and the Reverend George Henry Righy the Rector of

Yardley Hastings.

"That the population according to the Census of 1891 is as follows: Denton four hundred and eighty-seven persons, Whiston sixty-seven persons, Yardley Hastings one thousand and seventy persons.

"That the net annual value of the said rectory of Whiston (including the sum of nineteen pounds derived from the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton) estimated pursuant to the provisions of the Act one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six is two hundred and fourteen pounds.

"That the net annual income of the said rectory of Yardley Hastings (including the sum of one hundred and seventy-one pounds two shillings and ten pence derived from the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton) estimated pursuant to the provisions of the same Act is five hundred and fourteen pounds ten shillings and five pence.

"That there is a church or chapel in the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton which affords accommodation for three hundred and seventy-five

persons.

"That the church at Whiston affords accommodation for one hundred persons and the church at Yardley Hastings for five hundred persons.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Whiston and Yardley Hastings or either of them possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church or chapel of Denton or that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Denton possess any such legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the churches of Whiston and Yardley Hastings or either of them.

"That the church or chapel of Denton is distant from the parish church of Whiston two miles or thereabouts and from the parish church of Yardley Hastings one mile and three-quarters

or thereabouts.

"That there is a house of residence within the said rectory of Whiston and also a house of residence within the said rectory of Yardley Hastings and that the said Marquess of Northampton has agreed if the scheme hereinafter proposed is carried into effect within one year from that time to convey gratuitously to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England or to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty a suitable freehold site in fee simple for a parsonage house for the Incumbent for the time being of the proposed separate benefice of Denton and to build thereon at his own expense a suitable parsonage house.

a suitable parsonage house.

"That the said chapelry of Denton appears to have been from time immemorial treated as a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes and baptisms marriages churchings and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the church or chapel of the said chapelry and the burial ground thereto

belonging and such chapelry has its own churchwardens overseers and other parish officers and is in no way connected with the parishes of Whiston and Yardley Hastings or either of them in respect of rates of any kind.

"That the rectors of Whiston and Yardley Hastings aforesaid have respectively agreed that the whole of the glebe lands, tithes rent-charges in lieu of tithes and all other profits arising from the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton and belonging to and received by them or either of them as such rectors as aforesaid shall upon the completion of the scheme hereinafter proposed belong to and be received by the incumbent of the newly-constituted benefice of Denton and his successors.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and of the second and third years of the same reign chapter fortynine the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated from the said rectory of Whiston and the said rectory of Yardley Hastings and constituted a separate benefice and perpetual curacy by the name or style of the Perpetual Curacy of Denton for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Acts of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same to Her Majesty in

Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents of the patrons and of the incumbents of the said benefices are as follows:—

#### "SCHEME.

"That the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton shall for all ecclesiastical purposes be separated from the rectory and parish church of Whiston and the rectory and parish church of Yardley Hastings and shall be constituted a separate benefice by the name or style of the perpetual Curacy of Denton.

"That the said proposed separate benefice shall be under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory of Whiston and the said rectory

of Yardley Hastings.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of a perpetual curate or incumbent to the said proposed separate benefice shall be vested in the Most Honourable William Maclean Marquess of Northampton and his heirs and assigns.

"That the rector for the time being of the said rectory of Whiston and the rector for the time being of the said rectory of Yardley Hastings shall be exempt from all cure of souls within the said proposed separate benefice of Denton and that the perpetual curate or incumbent thereof shall have the exclusive cure of souls within the same.

"That the inhabitants of the hamlet or chapelry of Denton shall not be entitled to any accommodation within the parish churches of Whiston and Yardley Hastings or either of them and shall be discharged from all rates charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the churches and chancels of Whiston and Yardley Hastings aforesaid.

"That the inhabitants residing within the said parishes of Whiston and Yardley Hastings shall not be entitled to any accommodation within the church or chapel of the said proposed separate benefice but shall have the exclusive right to the use and occupation of the whole of the parish church of their respective parishes and together rates charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the church or chapel and chancel within

the proposed separate parish.

"That the glebe lands tithes, rent-charges and other profits now belonging to the said rectory of Whiston described in the first schedule hereto and the glebe lands, tithes rent-charges and other profits now belonging to the said rectory of Yardley Hastings and described in the second schedule hereto shall from and immediately after the proposed separation belong to and be paid to the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said intended separate benefice of Denton to and for his own separate use and benefit.

"The First SCHEDULE referred to.

"Annual value.

"About sixty-eight acres of glebe land now let at ... subject to land tax, of five pounds eleven shillings and four pence a year and to drainage charge in favour of the Lands Improvement Company of twenty-four pounds a year.

"The Second SCHEDULE referred to. "Farm of one hundred and thirteen acres two roods two perches let to Mr. Thomas Sargeant at the yearly rent of one hundred and forty pounds. Allotment ground of about twentysix acres let at the yearly rent of thirty-nine pounds sixteen shillings and two pence. Fees about two pounds. Value of shooting about three pounds six shillings and eight pence.

"That the two charchwardens shall be appointed in the usual way for the said perpetual

curacy or separate benefice of Denton.

"That the church or chapel now locally situated within the said hamlet or chapelry of Denton shall be the parish church of the said separate benefice for all ecclesiastical purposes and the inhabitants of the said hamlet or chapelry shall have the right to the use and occupation of the said parish church and shall be charged and chargeable with such rates charges and assessments as shall from time to time be made for or in respect thereof.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name this twenty-eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and

ninety-two.

Copy of a Notice issued on the 15th current by the Ministry of Justice.

By this Notice, in conformity with section 1 of the Law of the 30th March, 1885, concerning ulterior measures against the introduction of Asiatic cholera, quarantine has been established with regard to ships coming from the Russian ports of the Baltic and of the Gulf of Finland, and from Finland ports, as well as with regard to ships having communicated with those ports, or, during the voyage, with any vessels coming from those ports. At the same time, in conformity with section 10 of the above-quoted Law, and with section 32 of the Law of 2nd July, 1880, with respect to measures for the prevention of contagious diseases, the importation from the said ports of horses, hides, fruits, vegetables, and flowers has been prohibited. If bedding, linen, and woollen wearing apparel forming part of the luggage of travellers are found in an unwashed condition, and are not at once sent back (?), the authorities may take steps to have them burned.

Vessels arriving from the Black Sea shall be allowed to enter the harbour in quarantine for the purpose of coaling, taking provisions and discharging cargo; provided the coals are brought alongside and put into the vessel by labourers, who shall be kept in quarantine for 21 days, and the trimming in bunkers is effected by the resources of the vessel. No susceptible goods, however, shall be landed, and live stock shall be disinfected in the usual way.

Such vessels shall quit the harbour as soon as they shall have coaled, taken provisions, or dis-

charged cargo.

The unshipping of cargo from such vessels shall be effected by the crew on lighters within a period to be fixed in each case by the Collector of Customs.

Passengers arriving by such vessels shall not be allowed to land.

Vessels which have been in any port of the Black Sea, but which have afterwards been admitted to free pratique in other ports, shall not be admitted to free pratique in these islands before 28 days have elapsed from their departure from a port in the Black Sea.

To all Port Sanitary Authorities ;— To all Masters of Ships ;-

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by an Order dated the 28th day of August, 1890, We, the Local Government Board, made Regulations under Section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and the Public Health Act, 1889, with a view to the treatment of persons affected with Cholera, and preventing the spread of Cholera;

And whereas Article 12 of those Regulations provides as follows:

"The Medical Officer of Health shall, as soon "as possible after any such ship has been "certified to be infected with Cholera, " examine every person on board the same, "and in the case of any person suffering "from Cholera or from any illness which " the Medical Officer of Health suspects may " prove to be Cholera, shall certify accord-"ingly; and any person who shall not be so

" immediately on giving to the Medical "Officer of Health his name and place of " destination, stating, where practicable, his

" certified by him shall be permitted to land

" address at such place.

"The name and address of any such person "shall forthwith be given by the Medical "Officer of Health to the Clerk to the Sani-"tary Authority, and such Clerk shall there-"upon transmit the same to the Local Autho-"rity of .the District in which the place of "destination of such person is situate

And whereas it is desirable that the said Order should be amended as hereinafter appears:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, do, by this Our Order, in the exercise of the powers enabling Us in that behalf, make the following Regulations, and declare that they shall be duly enforced and executed:-

ARTICLE I.—Article 12 of the recited Order shall be amended by the omission therefrom of the words, "and any person who," and the following words to the end of the first paragraph, and the insertion of the following words in place thereof: "and a person who shall not be so certified shall "not be permitted to land, unless he satisfy the "Medical Officer of Health as to his name, place of destination, and address at such place."

ARTICLE II.—Where a vessel is not infected with Cholera, but has passengers on board who are in a filthy or otherwise unwholesome condition, the Medical Officer of Health may, if in his opinion it is desirable with a view to checking the introduction or spread of Cholera, give a certificate in duplicate in the following form, or to the like effect, and shall deliver one to the master, and retain the other or transmit it to the Sanitary Authority:—

, and I find that she has passengers on board in a filthy or otherwise unwholesome condition, and that in my opinion, it is desirable with a view of checking the introduction or spread of Cholera, that the persons on board the ship should not be allowed to land unless they satisfy me as to their names, places of destination, and addresses at such places.

ARTICLE III.—When such certificate has been given, no person on board the ship shall leave or be allowed to leave the same unless he satisfy the Medical Officer of Health as to his, name, place of destination, and address at such place, and such name and address shall forthwith be given by the Medical Officer of Health to the Clerk to the Sanitary Authority, and such Clerk shall thereupon transmit the same to the Local Authority of the district in which the place of destination of such person is situate.

In this Article the term "Local Authority" means any Urban or Rural Sanitary, and in the Administrative County of London any Sanitary Authority as defined by the Public Health (London) Act, 1891.

ARTICLE IV.—This Order shall be read as one with the recited Order, and words herein shall have the same meaning as words in that Order.
