The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the office of County Coroner," it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereinafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas prior to the coming into operation of "The Local Government Act 1888" that part of the county of Middlesex for which Coroners were elected under writs de coronatore eligendo was by Orders in Council made under the provisions of the said recited Act and dated the seventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two and the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight divided for Coroners' purposes into four districts known respectively as the North-Eastern, the South-Eastern, the Central, and the Western Districts of the county of Middlesex, and the county of Surrey was by an Order in Council made under the provisions of the said recited Act and dated the third day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three divided for Coroners' purposes into five districts known respectively as the Newington, the Camberwell, the Croydon, the Kingston and the Guildford Districts of the county of Surrey, and the county of Kent was by Orders in Council made under the provisions of the said recited Act and dated the thirteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven and the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety divided for Coroners' purposes into six districts known respectively as the Cranbrook, the Greenwich, the New Romney, the Sittingbourne, the Ashford and the Tonbridge Districts.

And whereas by "The Local Government Act 1888" the powers and business of the Justices in Quarter Sessions in respect of the division of counties into Coroners' districts have been transferred to the Councils of such counties.

And whereas by the said "Local Government Act 1888" the metropolis as therein defined became an administrative county for the purposes of the said Act by the name of the Administrative County of London and such portion of the said administrative county as formed part of the counties of Middlesex, Surrey and Kent was severed from those counties and formed into a separate county for all non-administrative pur-Eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the poses by the name of the County of London : and it was further provided by the said Act that of the proposed districts and of the boundaries in the case of any Coroner's district being situate partly within and partly without the said county of London, the County Councils of the counties in which such district was situate should arrange for the alteration in manner provided by law of the district, so that on the next avoidance of the office of Coroner, or at any earlier date fixed when the alteration should be made, the Coroners' districts should not be situate in more than one county.

And whereas all the said Coroners' districts of the county of Middlesex are now situate in part within the said county of London, and in part within the said county of Middlesex with the exception of the south-eastern district which is now wholly within the county of London.

And whereas the Kingston and Croydon Coroners' Districts in the county of Surrey are now situate in part within the said county of London and in part within the said county of Surrey while the Newington and Camberwell Coroners' districts of the said county are now wholly situate within the county of London and the Guildford district is now wholly within the county of Surrey.

And whereas the Greenwich Coroner's District of the county of Kent is now situate in part within the said county of London and in part within the said county of Kent and the other Coroners' Districts of the county of Kent are now wholly within the said county of Kent.

And whereas the County Councils of London, Middlesex, Surrey and Kent, have presented petitions to Her Majesty praying that the Coroners' districts of each of the said counties may be altered in order that such districts may henceforth be wholly situate within one county.

And whereas the London County Council has further petitioned Her Majesty that the county of London may be divided into eight Coroners' districts in such manner and with such boundaries as hereinafter described.

And whereas such petitions with a description |

thereof with the reasons upon which the petitions were founded were duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petitions.

And whereas George Perceval Wyatt one of Her Majesty's Coroners for the counties of London and Surrey has petitioned Her Majesty that so much of the parish of Lambeth as lies south and south-east of the centre of the Clapham Kennington and Westminster Bridge roads may form part of the proposed Southern Coroner's District of the county of London.

And whereas no other Coroner of the counties aforesaid has presented a petition to Her Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, taken into consideration the petitions of the aforesaid County Councils, and the petition of the said George Perceval Wyatt, and is minded to make such alteration and division as is herein provided.

Now therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed and declared that from the date hereof,

1.) The county of London shall be divided into eight districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said first recited Act.

(2.) The said eight districts shall be named respectively the Eastern Coroner's District, the North-eastern Coroner's District, the Central Coroner's District, the Western Coroner's District, the Penge Coroner's District, the Southern Coroner's District, the South-western Coroner's District, and the South-eastern Coroner's District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the schedule hereto.

(3.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette. C. L. Peel.

(1.) The county of Middlesex shall be divided into three districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said first-recited Act.

(2.) The said three districts shall be named respectively the Eastern Coroner's District, the Central Coroner's District, and the Western Coroner's District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and

And whereas the Kingston and Croydon Coroners' districts in the county of Surrey are now situate in part within the said county of London and in part within the said county of Surrey while the Newington and Camberwell Coroners' Districts of the said county are now wholly situate within the county of London and the Guildford Coroner's District is now wholly within the county of Surrey.

And whereas the County Councils of London, Middlesex, Surrey, and Kent have presented petitions to Her Majesty praying that the Coroners' Districts of each of the said counties may be altered in order that such districts may henceforth be wholly situate within one county.

And whereas the Surrey County Council has further petitioned Her Majesty that the county of Surrey may be divided into three Coroners' Districts in such manner and with such boundaries as hereinafter described.

And whereas such petitions with a description of the proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petitions were founded were duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petitions.

And whereas George Perceval Wyatt one of Her Majesty's Coroners for the counties of London and Surrey has petitioned Her Majesty that so much of the parish of Lambeth as lies south and south-east of the centre of the Clapham Kennington and Westminster Bridge roads may form part of the proposed Southern Coroner's District of the county of London.

And whereas no other Coroner of the counties aforesaid has presented a petition to Her Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has with the advice of Her Privy Council taken into consideration the petitions of the aforesaid County Councils and the petition of the said George Perceval Wyatt, and is minded to make such alteration and division as is herein provided.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered directed and declared that from the date hereof

(1.) The county of Surrey shall be divided into three districts for Coroners' purposes and for the

purposes of the said first-recited Act.

(2.) The said three districts shall be named respectively the Kingston Coroner's District, the Reigate Coroner's District, and the Guildford Coroner's District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the schedule hereto.

(3.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette. C. L. Peel.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Office of County Coroner," it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as

often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereinafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas the Coroners for the said county of Kent have not presented any petition to Her

Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, taken into consideration the said petition and is minded to make such alteration as aforesaid.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared, that from the date hereof:—

1. The county of Kent shall be divided into six Districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the

purposes of the said first-recited Act.

- 2. The said six districts shall be named respectively the Cranbrook Coroner's District, the Greenwich Coroner's District, the New Romney Coroner's District, the Sittingbourne Coroner's District, the Ashford Coroner's District, and the Tonbridge Coroner's District, and the said Districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the Schedule hereto.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the office of County Coroner" it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said justices, in general or quarter sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereinafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two under the provisions of the said recited Act the county of Hertford including the liberty of Saint Alban's was divided into four Coroners' Districts known respectively as the Hemel Hempstead District, the Saint Alban's District, the Hitchin District and the Hertford

District.

And whereas by "The Local Government Act 1888" the powers and business of the justices of the county of Hertfordfordshire in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to the

Hertfordshire County Council.

And whereas by the further operation of the said "Local Government Act 1888" the parish of Hadley, and so much of the parishes of South Mimms and Enfield in the county of Middlesex as were situate within the districts of the Barnet Local Board and of the East Barnet Valley Local Board became as from the first of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine transferred for all purposes to the administrative county of Hertford.

And whereas the Hertfordshire County Council have presented a petition to Her Majesty praying that the county of Hertford may be divided into six Coroners' Districts and that the said parish of Hadley and portions of the parishes of South Mimms and Enfield may be constituted a part of the Saint Alban's Coroner's District in the manner hereinafter provided, which said petition with a description of the said proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty.

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petition.

And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty.

And whereas Her Majesty has with the advice of Her Privy Council taken into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration and division as aforesaid.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered directed, and declared, that from the date hereof

(1) The county of Hertfordshire shall be divided

into six districts for Coroners' purposes, and for h e purposes of the said first recited Act.

(2) The said six districts shall be named respectively the Bishops Stortford Coroner's District, the Hemel Hempstead Coroner's District, the Hertford Coroner's District, the Hitchin Coroner's District, the Royston Coroner's District, and the Saint Alban's Coroner's District, and the said districts shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the schedule hereto.

(3) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette. C. L. Peel.

WHEREAS by the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, it is provided that in the case of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation for which rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters thereof, or concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by such vessels are not, and cannot be made, by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the harbour trust or body corporate, if any, owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of such harbour, river, or inland navigation, or, if there is no

such harbour trust or body corporate, upon application from persons interested in the navigation of such waters, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters; and such rules, when so made, shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in Table (C) in the Schedule to the said Act, notwithstanding anything therein or in the Schedule thereto contained:

And whereas the Corporation of the City of Bristol, being the body corporate owning and exercising jurisdiction upon the tidal waters of the River Avon, have applied to Her Majesty in Council to make, and have submitted for approval, certain rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried in the tidal part of the River Avon by barges, trows, and other vessels to which the regulations for preventing collision at sea now in force issued in pursuance of the said recited Act do not apply:

And whereas the rules so submitted as afore-

said appear to be reasonable and proper.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby make the said rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto, and Her Majesty doth hereby direct that the same shall come into operation on the twenty-fifth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

#### SCHEDULE.

Rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried in the Tidal Part of the River Avon, by Barges, Trows, and other Vessels, to which the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea now in force, issued in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, do not apply.

1. Every such barge, trow, or other vessel shall, while affoat in or navigating the tidal part of the River Avon between sunset and sunrise, carry at the bow a bright white light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, and so fitted as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side of such barge, trow, or other vessel, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least one mile.

2. Every such barge, trow, or other vessel, as aforesaid, shall when affoat in or navigating the tidal part of the River Avon have, in addition to the before-mentioned light at the bow, a bright white light of the like power ready in the stern, which shall be exhibited over the stern or quarter of such barge, trow, or vessel on the approach of, or to other vessels passing in either direction in sufficient time to prevent collision.

" And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 10 otherwise Eaton Ward shall comprise so much o the area of the city of Norwich as is contained within a line commencing from the point in the centre of Brunswick-road opposite to the centre of Union-street, thence in a southerly direction along the western boundary of Ward No. 9 to the boundary of the city near Harford Bridges, thence in a westerly and northerly direction along the boundary of the city to the point of its intersection with Earlham-road, near Earlham Bridge, thence in an easterly direction to and along the centre of Earlham-road to a point opposite the centre of Park-lane, thence to and along the centre of Park-lane, to the centre of Unthanksroad, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Unthanks-road to a point opposite to the centre of Trinity-street, thence to and along the centre of Trinity-street to the centre of Cambridge-street, thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of Cambridge-street to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 11 otherwise Nelson Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the city of Norwich as is contained within a line commencing from the point of intersection of the boundaries of Wards No. 3 and No. 4 (known as Saint Giles Gates) thence along the western boundary of Ward No. 3 to the boundary of Ward No. 9, thence in a southwesterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 9 to the boundary of Ward No. 10 thence in a north-westerly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 10 to the centre of Earlham-road, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Earlham-road to Saint Giles-road, thence along the centre of Saint Giles-road to the point of

commencement aforesaid.

Every person is, in addition, required to present to the Mayor of the said commune, within twentyfour hours from arrival, the sanitary passport which has been handed to him at the frontier.

At Paris, this presentation of the sanitary passport should be made at the Prefecture of Police or at the offices of the Mayors.

ART. 2. Every person who receives into his house one or more travellers entering France under the conditions foreseen by Article 1, must report the same at the office of the Mayor of the commune upon the arrival of the traveller.

At Paris this report must be made at the Prefecture of Police or at the offices of the Mayors.

This obligation applies not only to innkeepers, and lodgers in furnished lodgings, but to private individuals.

ART. 3. Every Mayor to whom shall have been made, in conformity with Articles 1 and 2, the report of the arrival of a traveller should cause the traveller in question to be visited during a period of five days at least, beginning from the day of entry of the traveller into France or Algeria. If any suspicious accident occurs, and notably diarrhea, the Mayor shall have the traveller visited by a doctor. If this be impossible, he should consult the Prefect or Sous-Prefect through the most expeditious channel.

ART. 4. The traveller is bound to submit to the visits prescribed by the preceding article.

If the traveller goes to a fresh commune before the period of five days has elapsed, he must make a fresh declaration in conformity with that prescribed by Article 1.

ART. 5. Any traveller prevented by any cause from going to the commune indicated by him to the sanitary authorities of the frontier, is bound, within twelve hours of his arrival, to report the fact to the Mayor of the commune where he stops. The Mayor will then proceed to have him visited as prescribed by Article 3.

ART. 6. The report at the office of the Mayor of every case which is suspected to be one of cholera is obligatory, within a period of twenty-four hours, upon every medical man or sanitary officer who has become cognizant of it, as well as upon every head of a family, or any one with whom the patient is lodged.

At Paris this report should be made at the Prefecture of Police or at the offices of the

ART. 7. The importation into France, until fresh orders, of drills and rags, as well as of bedding, such as mattresses, bedclothes, &c., coming from Russia, Germany, or Belgium, is prohibited.

ART. 8. The importation into France of fruits and vegetables growing in the soil or on a level with the soil, and coming from Russia, Germany, and Belgium, is prohibited.

ART. 9. The provisions of the present decree are applicable to persons and goods entering one of the ports of France or of Algeria and coming from Russia, Germany, or Belgium.

ART. 10. Contraventions of the provisions of this decree shall be embodied in proces-verbaux, and dealt with in conformity with Article 14 of the Law of the 3rd March, 1822, which punishes by an imprisonment of fifteen days and a fine of five to fifty francs anyone who in sanitary matters has acted in defiance of the competent sanitary authorities.

ART. 11. The Law of the 3rd March, 1822, and the present decree shall be published and posted in all the communes of the territory of the Republic.

The Minister of the Interior and Finances, Doctor Proust, Inspector-General of Sanitary Services, Doctors Netter and Thoinot, auditors to the Consultative Committee of the Public Hygiene of France, the Prefects, the Mayors of France and Algeria, are deputed in conformity with Article 1 of the Law of 3rd March, 1822, to secure the execution of this decree, which shall be published in the Journal Officiel and inserted in the Bulletin des lois.
