THE Queen has been pleased to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, granting the dignity of a Knight of the said United Kingdom unto Ellis Ashmead Bartlett, of Grange House, Eastbourne, in the county of Sussex, and of Grosvenor-street, in the parish of St. George, Hanover-square, in the county of London, Esq.

THE Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease of Harry George, fourth Duke of Cleveland and eighth Baron Barnard, on the twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, the Dukedom of Cleveland with other titles became extinct and the Barony of Barnard devolved upon his kinsman, Henry De Vere, now Baron Barnard, as eldest son and heir of Sir Henry Morgan Vane,

Knight, Secretary to the Charity Commissioners, who at the time of his death was heir presumptive to the said Barony of Barnard, whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the brothers and sister of the said Henry De Vere, now Baron Barnard, cannot enjoy that place, rank, and precedence which would have been due to them had their father survived and succeeded to the title and dignity of Baron Barnard, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Gilbert Holles Farrer Vane, Clerk, Master of Arts of the University of Cambridge, and Vicar of High Ercall, in the county of Salop, William Lyonel Vane, Esquire, a Captain in the First Battalion Durham Light Infantry, and Louisa Henrietta, wife of William Blackstone Rennell, of Eaton-place, in the parish of Saint George, Hanover-square, Esquire, shall have, hold, and enjoy the same rank, title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if their late father, the said Sir Henry Morgan Vane, had survived his kinsman, Harry George, late Duke of Cleveland, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Baron Barnard :

And to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
