THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from the German Ambassador in London, enclosing the following Circular, relating to quarantine measures, issued by the Imperial Chancellor:—

(Translation.)

Berlin, October 22, 1892.

It has been officially ascertained that the number of daily cases of cholera in Germany has latterly diminished to such an extent that the disease is nowhere prevalent to any great extent. In Hamburg especially the disease is nearly extinct. In consideration thereof and taking into account the fact that during the course of the epidemic nothing has hitherto shown that the cholera germ has been propagated by consignments of goods, the Cholera Commission formed in the Department of Public Health have unanimously declared in favour of the removal of all restrictions on the goods traffic which have been ordered by the various local authorities against the danger of cholera from Hamburg and other infected German towns.

As there are no objections from the point of view of sanitary police against freeing the inland

goods traffic from restrictions, and this measure is urgently required in order to avoid any further damage to commercial and industrial circles, I have to request you to be so good as to cause the withdrawal of the prohibitions as soon as possible.

WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Board of Health of the State of Louisiana, held in the city of New Orleans, on the 6th day of October, A.D. 1892, a Resolution was adopted requesting the Governor to issue a Proclamation withdrawing quarantine restrictions against vessels arriving at the port of New Orleans, "excepting vessels arriving from
