HER Majesty the Queen has been graciously pleased to confer the Decoration of the Albert Medal of the Second Class on—

WILLIAM BORLAND, Sapper of the Partially Paid Submarine Mining Corps, Sydney, N.S.W.

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the Decoration has been conferred:—

On the 3rd April, 1891, a boat, containing twelve men and two officers, was engaged in submarine mining operations, about half a mile from the shore at Middle Head, Sydney, N.S.W. By the accidental explosion of a 100lb. gun-cotton mine, the after part of the boat was blown to pieces, and the two officers and two of the men were instantly killed, while the others were all more or less severely injured.

SAPPER WILLIAM BORLAND, finding the boat sinking, jumped overboard in order to lighten her, and, whilst holding on to the gunwale, supported Sapper Brentnall, who was semi-conscious. Another of the crew, named Adams, in the excitement of the moment, jumped overboard, but when some yards away, called out for help, as he was unable to swim. BORLAND at once swam to his assistance, and supported him until a boat arrived from the shore some considerable time after.

BORLAND was nearest to the explosion of any of the crew, and received severe wounds on the face, arms, abdomen, and legs, besides injuries to both ears. He was in hospital several weeks, and could not follow his ordinary work for some months.

The pratique is extended to all ports within 165 kilometres of the above places, provided that they are not within 165 kilometres of any port declared foul.

Merchandise classed as dangerous goods, as laid down by the Royal Order of the 29th October, 1886, shall also be admitted.

The pratique granted to ships from Antwerp is for departure since the 11th (not 7th) instant.

Crown Lands.

(To Repeal, Alter, and Enlarge, wholly or in part, the Provisions of the several Acts of Parliament relating to Crown Lands; Amendment of Acts; and other Purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the Session of 1893 for leave to introduce a Bill, and to pass an Act for the objects and purposes following, or some of them, that is to say:—

1. 2. IV, and 1 Will. NOTICE is hereby given that the South Level Drainage and Navigation Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as "the Commissioners"), the Padnal and Waterden Commissioners, and the Eau Brink Navigation Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as "the Eau Brink Commissioners") respectively, or one or more of those Bodies intend to apply to Parliament in the ensuing Session for leave to bring in a Bill for the following, or some of the following, among other purposes, that is to say:—

3. To repeal Section 85 of the said Act, and make other provisions with respect to the application of the said tolls, or of the tolls leviable by the Commissioners in lieu of the Eau Brink Commissioners, and to define or provide for the defining of the works to or for which any such tolls shall be applicable.

4. necessary of the following Local Acts so far as they relate to the said several bodies of Commissioners respectively, namely:—35 Geo. III., Cap. lxxvii., the Ouse Outfall Act, 1860, and all other Acts relating directly or indirectly to the Eau Brink Commissioners, 7 and 8 Geo. IV., Cap. xlvii., and all other Acts relating directly or indirectly to the Commissioners, or to the Padnal and Waterden Commissioners respectively.

To authorize any corporation or other body, justice, or other person by law authorized to grant licences for the sale by retail of wines, spirits, beer, exciseable liquors, or cider, to grant a licence to any person or persons nominated by the Company for such sale at any refreshment room managed by the Company, although the structure of the premises may not be in conformity with the provisions of the Acts regulating the granting of such licences, and although the person so nominated is not the real resident owner or occupier of such Refreshment Room.

To authorize the Company to purchase, hire, and provide, employ, and maintain boats, lighters, and vessels for the purposes of pleasure, and for conveying passengers and goods of every description to and from the pier, and to demand and recover charges in respect thereof.

In Whitegate-lane, between points respectively 1.50 chains north and 1.50 chains south of the centre of Hornby-road.

Tramway No. 7.—In Whitegate-lane, between a point opposite the north gable end of the house numbered 15 in Whitegate-lane, and a point 7 chains north of the same house.

In Whitegate-lane, between points respectively 2 chains north and 2 chains south of the north gable end of the house numbered 23 in Whitegate-lane.

In Whitegate-lane, between a point opposite the south-east gable end of the house numbered 51 in Whitegate-lane and a point 8 chains north of the same house.

Tramway No. 10.—In Tyldesley-road between points respectively 1 chain south, and 4 chains south of the centre of Princess-street.

Tramway No. 11.—In Lytham-road between a point 1.78 chains south-east, and a point 6 furlongs, 6.47 chains south-east of the centre of the Carriage Drive.

In Lytham-road between points respectively 2.57 chains south, and 0.43 chains north of the south gable end of the house numbered 283 in Lytham-road.

In Lytham-road between points respectively 0.45 chains north, and 3.45 chains north of the centre of Watson's-lane.

Tramway No. 12.—In Lytham-road, between points respectively 1 furlong, 6.19 chains north, and 1 furlong, 9.19 chains north of the centre of Harrow Side-lane, or Gipsies-lane.

2. The Order will or may provide that no part of the said intended tramways shall be laid in Tyldesley-road, or Station-road respectively, until such road shall have been declared a highway repairable by the inhabitants at large.

In Church-lane, on both sides thereof, between points respectively 1·86 chains north-east, and 0·30 chains south-west of the north-east gable end of the Oxford Hotel.

Tramway No. 8.—In Cow Gap-lane on the north-east side thereof, between points respectively 0·56 chains north-east, and 0·45 chains south-west of the south-west gable-end of the Oxford Hotel.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between a point opposite the east gable end of the house numbered 40 in Cow Gap-lane, and a point 9·30 chains east of the same gable end.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 1·28 chains west and 6·37 chains west of the east gable end of the house numbered 40 in Cow Gap-lane.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 8·58 chains west and 1 furlong 0·09 chains west of the east gable end of the house numbered 40 in Cow Gap-lane.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 1·51 chains north-east and 4·51 chains north-east of the boundary of the townships of Marton and Layton-with-Warbreck.

Tramway No. 9.—In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 2·35 chains west and 6·98 chains west of the boundary of the townships of Layton-with-Warbreck and Marton.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 1 furlong 7·73 chains west and 2 furlongs 0·73 chains west of the boundary of the townships of Layton-with-Warbreck and Marton.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 0·50 chains west and 3·50 chains west of the centre of Middle-lane.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively, 1 furlong, 1·07 chains west, and 1 furlong 4·07 chains west of the centre of Middle-lane.

In Cow Gap-lane on both sides thereof, between points respectively 8·25 chains east, and 2·12 chains east of the centre of Lytham-road.

Tramway No. 11.—In Lytham-road, on both sides thereof, between points respectively 3·84 chains north, and 1·59 chains north of

the south gable end of the house numbered 283 in Lytham-road.

Tramway No. 14.—In Station-road, on both sides of that street, for the entire length thereof.

3. To empower the Corporation to make from time to time such crossings, passing-places, sidings, loops, junctions, and other works in addition to those specified herein as may be necessary or convenient to the efficient working of the tramways, or any of them, or for affording access to the stables, carriage, engine, boiler, and dynamo houses, stations, buildings, sheds, and works of the Corporation.

4. To empower the Corporation from time to time when, by reason of the execution of any work in, or the alteration of any street, road, highway, or thoroughfare in which any tramway shall be laid, it is necessary or expedient so to do, to alter, remove, or discontinue all or any part of such tramway, and to make and lay down temporarily in the same or any adjacent street, road, highway, or thoroughfare a substituted tramway or substituted tramways.

5. To empower the Corporation for all or any of the purposes of the Order, to stop up, break up, alter, remove, cross, and interfere with, temporarily or permanently, public and private streets, roads, highways, footways, railways, tramways, sewers, drains, gas, water, and electricity mains valves, hydrants, pipes, tubes, and street boxes, and telegraph, telephone, electric lighting, and other apparatus.

6. To provide for the repair by the Corporation, their lessees, or other persons, bodies, or authorities, of any streets, roads, highways, or thoroughfares, in which any tramway may for the time being be laid, and for the use or disposition of any materials or things found in the construction or repair of any of the tramways.

7. To constitute the said intended tramways part of the Tramway Undertaking of the Corporation.

8. To enable the Corporation for any of the purposes of their Tramway Undertaking to purchase or otherwise acquire by agreement, and to take on lease, lands and hereditaments and easements thereover, and to use any lands now belonging to them, and to erect offices, buildings, stables, sheds, carriage, engine, boiler and dynamo houses, and other conveniences thereon.

9. To reserve to the Corporation and their lessees the exclusive right of using on any of the tramways carriages drawn or propelled by animal, steam, gas, compressed air, electricity, or any mechanical power, or having wheels adapted to run on or in an edged, grooved, or other rail on such tramways.

10. To empower the Corporation to provide and place and run carriages on the said intended tramways, and to demand and take tolls and charges in respect of the use of such carriages.

11. To authorise the Corporation and their lessees, or other the person or persons working the said tramways, to levy tolls, rates, and charges, for the use of the proposed tramways by carriages passing along the same, and for the conveyance of passengers, goods, minerals, animals, merchandise, and other traffic upon the same, and to confer exemptions from tolls, rates, and charges.

12. To empower the Corporation to make regulations and by-laws for all or any of the purposes mentioned in Section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, and in Section 19 of the Order of 1884, and to extend all or any of such by-laws to the existing as well as to the said intended tramways.

13. To empower the Corporation on the one

hand, and any local authority, company, or person owning or lawfully working or using any tramways adjacent to the said Borough on the other hand, to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements for and in relation to the interchange, accommodation, and forwarding of carriages, passengers, and traffic on, from, or to any of such tramways on, to, or from the existing and said intended tramways of the Corporation or any of them, and for and in relation to the user by the contracting parties, or any or either of them, of the whole or any part of their respective tramway undertakings, or of any or either of them respectively.

To empower the Corporation to apply to the purposes of the Order their district fund and general district rates, and borough fund and borough rate, and any revenues over which they have control, and any moneys they are now authorised to borrow, and to borrow further sums by debentures, mortgage, debenture stock, or annuities, and to charge such moneys on all or any of the before mentioned funds, rates, and revenues.

18. The Order will vary or extinguish all rights and privileges which might in any way interfere with its objects, and will confer other rights and privileges, and will or may incorporate with itself, and with or without alteration, all or some of the provisions of "The Tramways Act, 1870," "The Lands Clauses Acts" (except the compulsory powers thereof), and "The Local Loans Act, 1875," and enable the Corporation (in addition to the powers herein specifically mentioned) to exercise all or any of the powers by "The Tramways Act, 1870," conferred on the persons therein referred to as promoters, and to acquire and hold patent rights in relation to tramways and the motive power thereon, and will or may authorise the use on the existing tramways of the Corporation and on the proposed tramways, or any part or parts thereof respectively, of carriages and engines propelled by animal, steam, gas, compressed air, electricity, or any mechanical power, and will or may, so far as may be necessary, alter, amend, extend and repeal the necessary provisions of the Blackpool Corporation Tramways Order, 1884, "The Blackpool Improvement Act, 1879," and any other Act and any other Order relating directly or indirectly to the Corporation, "The Locomotives Act, 1861," and "The Locomotives Act, 1865," and of any and every other Act and Order which will interfere with its objects.

To deviate laterally from the lines of the intended works shown on the plans hereinafter mentioned to such extent as will be shown on the said plans, or as may be provided by the Bill, and to deviate vertically from the levels thereof to such extent as will be shown on the sections hereinafter mentioned or as may be provided by the Bill.

To temporarily or permanently cross, divert, widen, alter, stop up, remove, or otherwise interfere with all such public and private roads, highways, byeways, footways, towpaths, canals, navigations, navigable and other rivers, streams, springs, watercourses, drains, culverts, sewers, aqueducts, arches, bridges, streets, railways, tramways, mains, pipes, telegraph, telephone, electric, and other wires, posts, and apparatus and other works, as it may be necessary or convenient to cross, divert, widen, alter, stop up, remove, or interfere with for the purposes of the intended works or any of them or of the Bill, and the Bill will or may provide that all altered or diverted portions of roads, rivers, canals, drains, and other works which may be made under the powers of the Bill shall form respectively parts of the existing roads, rivers, canals, drains, and works in lieu of or in connection with portions of which the same are respectively substituted or made, and shall be managed and maintained by the parties liable to manage and maintain the existing roads, rivers, canals, drains, and works, or such other parties as shall be specified in the Bill, and extinguish all rights of way or water or other rights or easements in or over the same, and vest in the Board any superseded portions of diverted roads, rivers, canals, drains, or other works.

To divert into, take, or appropriate and use for the purposes of the intended variations and other works, or any of them, the waters of the River Lee Navigation, Hackney Cut Navigation, the said Old River Lee, the Waterworks River, the City Mill River, and the Pudding Mill River, which waters now flow into the Three Mills Wall River, the Three Mills Back River, Channelsea River, Abbey Creek, Bow Creek, and the River Thames; and also into the River Lee Navigation, Limehouse Cut, and the River Thames.

To levy and recover tolls, rates, and charges upon or in respect of all barges, boats, and other craft using the said Old River Lee, the Waterworks River, the City Mill River, and the Pudding Mill River, and the River Lee Navigation, both above and below Old Ford Lock, and on all goods, wares, materials, merchandise, manure, gas, lime, hard and soft core, mud and rubbish conveyed upon the same, or any part thereof, to compound for the payment of any such tolls, rates, and charges, and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from the payment of tolls, rates, and charges, and to alter the tolls, rates, and charges now leviable by the Board, and the places upon the River Lee Navigation at which such tolls are or shall become due and payable, and to fix other and additional places for the purposes.

To purchase, take on lease, or otherwise acquire (by compulsion or agreement), and hold any lands, manufactories, houses, tenements, or hereditaments, springs, streams, waters, and other property in the said parishes, or places, or any of them, and any interest, easement, or right in or over such lands, manufactories, houses, tenements, or hereditaments, springs, streams, waters, and other property for the purposes of the intended works, and of the Bill, and the Bill will or may vary or extin-

guish all rights and privileges in any manner connected with such lands, manufactories, houses, tenements, or hereditaments, springs, streams, waters, or property.
