A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

HEREAS Our Parliament stands pro-YV rogued to Tuesday, the thirteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two; We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Tuesday, the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three; and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal will and pleasure that the said Parliament shall, on the said Tuesday, the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, assemble and be holden for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Tuesday, the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this twenty-sixth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and in the fifty-sixth year of Our reign.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," as amended by "The Pluralities Act, 1850," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear " to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect " to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be " represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, " or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two " or more benefices, or that one or more benefice " or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure " rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in " his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in "the same parish or contiguous to each other, " and of which the aggregate population shall not " exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, " with advantage to the interests of religion, be " united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of " the Province shall inquire into the circumstances " of the case; and it on such inquiry it shall " appear to him that such union may be usefully " made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, "and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting " thereto, such consent being signified in writing " under the hands of such patron or patrons, the

" said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certify-" ing such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as " hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his " own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, "and in other cases a copy in writing of the "aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or "near the principal outer door of the church, or " in some public and conspicuous place in each of "such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, " with notice to any person or persons interested, "that he, she, or they, may, within such six "weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or "their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, "against such union; and if no sufficient cause " be shown within such time, the said Archbishop " shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid "to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it "shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting "such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, " vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with "cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in " Council to give directions for regulating the " course and succession in which the patrons, if "there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to "time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to

Your Majesty in Council

"That the Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage of Wiggenhall Saint German and the vicarage of Wiggenhall Saint Peter both in the county of Norfolk having represented unto Us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice We enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to Us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Very Reverend William Lefrey Doctor in Divinity Dean of the Cathedral Church of Norwich and the Chapter of the same Church (being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said benefices of Wiggenhall Saint Peter and Wiggenhall Saint German if the same respectively were now vacant) consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council We caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to Us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto-annexed.

"And We do hereby certify the enquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say: the right of presentation shall be exercised alternately, the patron of Wiggenhall Saint Peter having the first turn or right of presentation.

"As witness our hand this twenty-seventh day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Wiggenhall Saint German, in the county of Norfolk and diocese of Norwich, and the vicarage of Wiggenhall Saint Peter, in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons, for the time being, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised alternately, the patron of Wiggenhall Saint Peter having the first turn or right of presentation.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly

lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew Bruntcliffe situate within the limits of the district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend, Morley in the said county and diocese, and of the parish of Batley in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such cures respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend, Morley, and of the said parish of Batley should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew Bruntcliffe situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Walsham, Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Gateward Davies Clerk in Holy Orders the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Batley, and as such Vicar or Incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) and also the alternate patron of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul Townend Morley with the consent of the Reverend Henry Jackson, Clerk in Holy Orders, the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) and as such Vicar or Incumbent, the other alternate patron of the said perpetual curacy of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul Townend Morley aforesaid with the consent of the Right Honourable Seymour John Grey, Earl of Wilton as the alternate patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Batley, and with the consents of the Right Honourable Algernon William Fulke Baron Greville and of the Right Honourable William Frederick Baron Stratheden and Campbell, the Trustees under the will of the Right Honourable James Thomas, Earl of Cardigan, deceased, and as such Trustees the other alternate patrons of the said vicarage of the parish of Batley aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend, Morley, and the said parish of Batley, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew Bruntcliffe situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew Bruntcliffe.

"We therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew

Bruntcliffe comprising :-

"All those several contiguous portions of the district parish of Saint Peter (Morley), of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend, Morley, and of the parish of Batley all in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary which divides the district parish of Gildersome in the said county and diocese from the district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) aforesaid, at the centre of the bridge which carries the Leeds, Bradford, and Halifax Branch Line of the Great Northern Railway over Nibshaw-lane otherwise called Nepshaw-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of one mile and thirty-seven chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend Morley aforesaid) to the point where the same branch line of railway crosses the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Townend, Morley from the parish or parochial chapelry of Woodkirk otherwise called or known as West Ardsley in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence first south-westward, then generally westward, and then southward, along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and thirtynine chains or thereabouts to its junction with the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul Townend Morley from a portion of the parish of Batley aforesaid which is now isolated from the main portion of such parish but in which the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls, and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fiftythree chains or thereabouts thereby following in: part the middle of the occupation road which leads from Howley Hall to the point where such occupation road joins Scotchman's-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where the same lane crosses Howley Beck, upon the boundary which divides the said isolated portion of the parish of Batley from the new parish of Saint Thomas Batley in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence generally north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of Howley Beck aforesaid to the boundary which divides the said isolated portion of the parish of Batley from the new parish of Saint Saviour Brownhill, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and continuing thence still generally north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and twenty-one chains or thereabouts thereby first continuing to follow the course of the said Howley Beck and then following the course of Holden Clough Beck to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said isolated portion of the parish of Batley from the district parish of Gildersome aforesaid and extending thence first generally north-eastward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the high road leading from Wakefield to Bradford where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said district parish of Gildersome from the district parish of Saint Peter (Morley) aforesaid, and extending thence northeastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to the firstly-mentioned point at the centre of the bridge which carries the Leeds Bradford and Halifax Branch line of railway aforesaid over Nibshaw-lane otherwise called Nepshaw-lane as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Wakefield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following, that is to say:

say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Archdeaconry of London and now vested

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said Archdeaconry which occurred on the seventeenth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two by the resignation of the Venerable Joseph Holden Pott the then Archdeacon all the lands and hereditaments theretofore belonging to the said Archdeaconry (except rights of patronage) became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of an Order of Your Majesty in Council made under the provisions of the said Act and bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two and duly published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of September in the same year absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

M' And whereas the lands and hereditaments aforesaid are not subject to any outstanding lease or grant but are now in our possession but some portions thereof are on account of their character or situation unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands and hereditaments or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improve-

ment of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign all or any of the said lands and hereditaments formerly belonging to the said Archdeaconry and so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as 'he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the proceeds in some Government or parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England bave, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of Her Majesty (Session two) chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the third day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the fifth year of Your Majesty (Session two) chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now

humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain further additions and improvements at the episcopal residence belonging to the See of London which is situate at Fulham in the county of Middlesex and is known as Fulham Palace.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, now Bishop of the diocese of London is desirous that certain permanent additions and improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence known as Fulham Palace and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed improvements and we have

approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed additions and improvements a sum of four hundred pounds (being a sum which together with the several sums of six hundred and fifty pounds, four hundred and sixty pounds, two hundred and fifty pounds and two hundred and ten pounds already borrowed upon the same security by the Bishop of London under the authority of the statutes hereinbeforementioned, does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of further mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of London.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts a sum of four hundred pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty-five years or until the said sum of four hundred pounds with the interest for the same as hereinaftermentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say: - during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of thirty-five years computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one-thirtieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid pay interest at the rate of four pounds per cent. per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid; and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbeforementioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall bave become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like

manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale. And that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall bind as well the said Frederick now Bishop of the said diocese of London as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and

" And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of four hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the receipt of our joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed additions and improvements at the episcopal residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other

Act of Parliament.'

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London. for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirtysecond and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the third day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetytwo, in the words and figures following, that is to

say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint James Clapham in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of I Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eighth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four and published in the London Gazette upon the ninth day of the same month a part of the parish of Clapham in the said county of Surrey and at that time in the diocese of Winchester but now in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James situate within the limits of such parish and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint James Clapham.

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint James Clapham has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your

Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Saint James Clapham should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Randall Thomas, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James Clapham shall be altered (first) so that all that portion of the said parish of Clapham which is described in the first part of the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint James Clapham and (secondly) so that all that portion of such new parish which is described in the second part of the said schedule and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint James Clapham and shall be restored to and shall again form part of the parish of Clapham aforesaid.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"I. The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint James Clapham in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester being:

"All that portion of the parish of Clapham in the same county and diocese which is bounded upon the south-east by the said new parish of Saint James, Clapham and generally upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Clapham from the parish of Clapham aforesaid at the junction of Crescentlane with Abbeville-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to a point midway between the roads called or known respectively as Harbonne-avenue and Shandon-road upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Clapham from the new parish of Saint James Clapham aforesaid.

"II. The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint James Clapham and to be restored to the parish of Clapham aforesaid

being:

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint James Clapham which is bounded upon the south partly by the consolidated chapelry of the Ascension Balham Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north-west by the said parish of Clapham and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the remaining part of the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Clapham from the new parish of Saint James Clapham aforesaid at the said point in the middle of Abbeville-road aforesaid midway between the roads called or known respectively as Harbonneavenue and Shandon-road as aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Abbeville-road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cavendish-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five and three-quarters chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the same road opposite to the entrance (on the eastern side of the same road) to the house and grounds called or known as Oak Park and opposite to the boundary post (on the western side of the same road) situate at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Clapham from the consolidated chapelry of the Ascension Balham Hill aforesaid strikes the said western side of the same road and extending thence that is to say from the said point in the middle of the last-named road westward and in a straight line to the said boundary post upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Clapham from the consolidated chapelry of the Ascension Balham Hill aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such amendment:

Amendment of Statute XXVI made by The New Governing Body of Eton School under the provisions of the Public Schools Act 1868 and submitted by the said Governing Body for the

approval of Her Majesty in Council.

Whereas by the Public Schools Act 1868
Section 11 the Governing Body of any School to
which that Act applies is empowered from time to
time to repeal or alter any Statute made in
exercise of the powers of that Act subject to
certain conditions and restrictions therein specified.
And whereas the said Governing Body of Eton
School in exercise of the aforesaid powers made a
Statute under the head of "Scholarships other
than on the Foundation and Exhibitions"
numbered XXVI (b) tenable after quitting the
School, consisting of five Sections. Section I
being as follows.

(1) The Scholarships and Exhibitions known as the "Reynolds" "Bryant" "Berriman" "Hetherington" "Davies" and "Chamberlayne" shall be open by competition to all Boys in the School. But none of these Scholarships or Exhibitions shall be tenable with any other Scholarship or Exhibition connected with the School with the exception of the "Newcastle" Scholarship. Which Statute was on the 3rd day of November 1871, approved by Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas it was on the eleventh day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety Resolved by the said Governing Body of Eton that it was expedient to alter Section No. 1 of Statute No. XXV1 being the Section hereinbefore particularly referred to and set out.

Now therefore We the New Governing Body of Eton School do hereby alter the form and effect of the said Section and the said Section as altered by us will be in the terms following.

Statute XXVI.

Section 1 as proposed to be amended.

The Scholarships and Exhibitions known as the "Reynolds" "Bryant" "Berriman" "Hetherington" "Duvies" and "Chamberlayne" shall be open by competition to all Boys in the School. But none of these Scholarships or Exhibitions shall be tenable with any other Scholarship connected with the School with the exception of the "Newcastle" Scholarship.

ART I of Decree of November 18.

Should a case of cholera occur in or near a port in or out of Europe, the Board of Trade shall declare such port infected with cholera as also its neighbourhood, so far as the situation, the extent of the spread of the disease, or other circumstances d-mand.

ART. II Vessels which have sailed from or touched at or otherwise come into contact with a place regarded (under Art. I) as infected with cholera, or which have been in communication with some other ship having had on board sick or dead from cholera or disease suspected to be cholera, can nevertheless proceed to a port without first going to a quarantine station so long as they have not themselves, nor have previously had on board during their journey, sick or dead from cholera or disease suspected to be cholera, but vessels arriving under these circumstances may not come into communication with land until they have been examined as regards the state of health on board, and until they have received permission to communicate freely with the land in the way laid down in this decree.

If a vessel arriving from abroad has or had had on board during the journey sick or dead from cholera, or disease suspected to be cholera, she shall, before communication can be held with Swedish territory or its inhabitants, immediately proceed to a quarantine station to undergo

quarantine there.

ART. III. The Board of Trade shall by notification make known which places are set apart as

quarantine stations.

ART. V. Vessels which have arrived at the quarantine station shall remain in quarantine with crew, passengers, and cargo, for six days and nights from the moment of arrival and from the time when the last sick or dead person has been removed from the vessel.

2. Vessels put in quarantine, and such things on board as have been used by or come into immediate contact with a person sick with cholera or illness suspected to be cholera, shall undergo cleansing and disinfection at the quarantine place to such a degree as circumstances call for.

3. When a proper cleansing and disinfection has taken place, and the quarantine time has ended, the vessel may be permitted, together with crew, passengers, and cargo, to continue her

journey.

4. If it be with certainty established at the quarantine place that the case or cases of sickness, by reason of which the vessel is undergoing quarantine, is or are not cholera, then the abovenamed permission to depart may be given to the vessel although the appointed number of days of quarantine have not come to an end.

ART. VI. Notwithstanding anything in this Decree, letters and newspapers may be given out from the vessel immediately after her arrival at

a port or at a quarantine station. .

ART. IX. Moreover the different rules laid down in the abovenamed Order of March 19, 1875, shall continue to be in force.

ART. X. If a vessel which ought to proceed to a quarantine station be prevented from doing so by ice, the Board of Health can give directions as to what is to be done with the vessel so as to prevent cholera being spread by her means.

1. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term

"Borough" shall mean the borough of Lan-

"Corporation" shall mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Lancaster.

"Tramcar" shall include any public vehicle used on a tramway within the said borough.

"Driver" shall include every driver of a tramcar within the borough.

"Conductor" shall include every person who collects passengers fares, or who attends upon

passengers when upon a tramcar within the borough.

"Tramway" shall include every tramway for passenger traffic for the time being within the borough.

Every word importing the singular number only shall include the plural, and every word importing the masculine gender only shall include the feminine.

2. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the

1st day of February, 1893.

3. The driver of every tramcar shall drive the same at a speed of not less than four miles an hour, and not more than eight miles an hour, provided always that no driver of a tramcar shall drive the same round any corner without sounding a whistle or other sufficient signal, or drive the same across North-road, from Rosemary-lane to Chapel-street, at a speed of more than four miles an hour, or without sounding a whistle or other sufficient signal.

4. The driver of every tramcar shall so drive the same that it shall not follow another tramcar

at a less distance than 100 yards.

5. Every driver or conductor of a tramear shall stop the same when required so to do by any passenger desirous of leaving the same or by any person desirous of travelling thereby, and for whom there is room, or by any police-constable of the borough.

6. The driver of a car on coming into sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road, so as not to leave sufficient space for the car to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall with reasonable despatch cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the car.

7. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

8. In those portions of the tramways where alternative lines are laid, the driver of every tramcar shall drive the same upon such line as he may be required by any police-constable of the borough.

9. No tramcar shall be stopped for the purpose of delivering any goods or parcels except at such places as the Corporation may from time to time

appoint or direct.

10. Any person offending against any of the above Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, provided nevertheless that the Justices or Court before whom any complaint may be made or proceedings taken in respect of any such offence, may, if they think fit, adjudge the payment as a penalty of any less sum than the full amount of the penalty imposed by this Bye-law.
