THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 23rd December, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Bucharest, containing the following information respecting quarantine:—

(1) The quarantine at Versiciova for articles coming by land is suppressed, and replaced by a medical observation of twenty-four hours of travellers entering the country, and the disinfection of their soiled linen.

(2) The quarantine at Turnu Severin on barges is reduced from eight to four days.

(3) The quarantine at Sulina for vessels having passengers on board and coming from Odessa and Nicolaieff is reduced from four to two days; vessels from the same ports without passengers on board are subjected to twenty-four hours' medical observation.

(4) The sanitary revision made at Burdu-Jeni, Mihaileni, and Predeal is suppressed; and the points on the frontier of Bucovina and Transylvania are open for traffic between Mamornita and Rui Vadelui inclusive.

THE PROHIBITION OF MOVEMENT FROM LONDON ORDER OF 1893.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1892, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Prohibition of Movement out of County of London and City of London.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved either by land or by water out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order: Provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals by railway through the said district from a place outside the said district to another place outside the said district without untrucking within the said district.

Offences.

2. If a head of cattle or a sheep or a goat or a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time

being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as THE PROHIBITION OF MOVEMENT FROM LONDON ORDER OF 1893.

NORWAY—WEST COAST.

TRONDHEIM CHANNEL.

(1.) *Alternating Light at Annöen.*

The light at Annöen, on Lille Tranholmen, is an alternating white and red light, visible from the bearing of N. 7° W. (leading westward of Store Tranholmen) to N. 41° E. (leading eastward of Vadskjær), also northward through Djupsundet from eastward of Kalvöen until westward of Annöen, and is obscured in other directions. (6.) *Fixed Light on Melövær.*

(leading eastward of Kua); is obscured from N. 31° E. to N. 38° E., over Kua; again white from N. 38° E., through east, to S. 15° W.; red from S. 15° W. (leading westward of Svartoksboen) to S. 35° W. (leading westward of Gaasvær); and is obscured in other directions. It is elevated 36 feet above the sea (10 feet above the ground), and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of six miles.

Approximate position, lat. 66° 49' 40" N., long. 13° 20' 10" E.

(7.) *Alternating Light on Femris Island.*

Femris Light, on the north-west point of the island, is an alternating white and red light, visible from the bearing of N. 51° E., through east, to S. 61° W. (leading northward of Snaget), and is obscured in other directions; it is also partially hidden on south-easterly and southerly bearings by Rösöen. The light is elevated 82 feet above the sea (10 feet above the ground), and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of six miles.

(8.) *Occulting Light on Vedö.*

Ucluelet Arm—Particulars of Sutton and other Sunken Rocks.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 627 of 1891:—

The Government of the Dominion of Canada has given further notice, dated 23rd November, 1892, that an examination of Ucluelet Arm by the Master of the Dominion Steam Vessel "Quadra," shows that Sutton Rock consists of two rocks, each of small extent, lying 93 yards apart in a N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. direction. The southern rock has 7 feet water on it, the northern one 10 feet, with a depth of 5 fathoms between them. The water deepens quickly at each end of the rocks to $5\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms. Each rock has 4 fathoms close to it, deepening rapidly to 6 fathoms on the east side, and 8 fathoms on the west side. Between the northern rock and Channel Island, the depth increases gradually to 12 fathoms, with $6\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms close to the island.

A spar buoy, coloured red and black in horizontal stripes, is moored on the shoalest of the Sutton Rocks.

Approximate position, lat. $48^{\circ} 56' 45'' N.$, long. $125^{\circ} 32' 55'' W.$

A little more than one cable north-east of Sutton Rock, and 30 feet from low water mark, is a narrow rocky ledge, 40 feet in length, which dries 2 feet.

The shoal off the first point north-west of the Indian Village extends farther out than heretofore charted, there being a rocky patch, a few feet in diameter, marked by kelp and eel grass, nearly three-quarters of a cable from the shore, with 3 feet water on it, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms close around, the depth increasing quickly to 7 fathoms in the fairway.
