*Killala Bay—Buoy Marking Wreck in Fairway.*

THE Commissioners of Irish Lights have given  
 notice, that a wreck buoy has been placed 20  
 fathoms N.E. of the steam-ship "Thames," lying  
 sunk in the fairway of Killala Bay. The wreck  
 lies in 13 fathoms (the mastheads being covered  
 about two feet at low water spring tides), with  
 Inishcrone (Inisherone) Pier bearing S. 4° W.,  
 distant 2½ miles, and St. Patrick Rock (Iron  
 Perch) in line with Ross Point N. 85° W.

*Occulting Light on Old Orchard Shoal.*

THE United States Government has given  
 notice, that on or about 25th April, 1893, a light  
 would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently  
 erected, in about 17 feet at low water, on Old  
 Orchard Shoal, Lower Bay, New York  
 Approach:—

Old Orchard Shoal Light is an occulting light  
 of the fourth order, visible twelve seconds, and  
 eclipsed three seconds; it shows white from the  
 bearing of S.S.W. ¾ W., through west and north,  
 to E. ½ S., and red from E. ½ S., through south,  
 to S.S.W. ¾ W.; through an arc of about 90°  
 towards Staten Island it shows faintly. The light  
 is elevated about 52 feet above high water, and  
 should be seen in clear weather from a distance of  
 about 12 miles.

The lighthouse consists of a conical tower on a  
 black cylindrical pier. The lower half of the  
 tower is painted brown, the upper half white,  
 lantern black.

Approximate position, lat. 40° 30' 44" N., long.  
 74° 6' W.
