REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to

the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS on the thirtieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, a Convention was made at London between Her

Majesty and the President of the French Republic respecting the postal service between France and the French Possessions and the United Kingdom and British Possessions ;

And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged on the twenty-third March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one :

And whereas by "The Mail Ships (France) Order in Council, 1892," "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," is applied during the continuance of that Order as regards the said Convention, and as regards the French Republic and the postal service and mail ships described in that Convention ;

And whereas by section eight of the said Act it is provided that an Order in Council may, for the purpose of a Convention with a Foreign State, apply the said Act, subject to any exceptions or modifications not inconsistent with the provisions of the said Act, to any British Possession, and that the said Act, when so applied, should, subject to those exceptions and modifications, and subject as hereinafter mentioned, have effect as if it were re-enacted, with the substitution of such British Possession for the United Kingdom, provided that, before it should be applied to any British Possession named in the Schedule to the said Act, the Government of such Possession should have adhered to the Convention.

And whereas the Government of India, one of the possessions named in the Schedule to the said Act, has adhered to the said Convention, and it is expedient that the said Act should, for the purposes of the said Convention, apply to India, subject to the exceptions and modifications in this Order contained ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" shall for the purpose of the said Convention apply to India, subject to the provisions of section eight of the said Act, and also to the exceptions and modifications following, that is to say :

(1.) The expression "Officer of Customs" means an officer of Customs authorized under "The Sea Customs Act, 1878," or other Law for the time being regulating sea customs in India.

(2.) The provisions of the said Act as to the amount of fines shall be read as if the amounts were stated in rupees at the rate of ten rupees to the pound sterling.

(3.) In lieu of sub-sections one and two of section seven of the said Act, the following provisions shall be substituted, that is to say :

Every fine under the said Act, if exceeding five hundred rupees, may be recovered by suit in the principal Civil Court having original jurisdiction in the place in which the person liable to the fine may be found.

A fine under the said Act not exceeding five hundred rupees may be recovered by criminal proceedings before a Presidency Magistrate, or Magistrate of the First Class, having jurisdiction in the place in which the person liable to the fine may be found, provided that (a) every offence for which a fine exceeding five hundred rupees can be imposed under the said Act may be prosecuted before such Magistrate, but the fine imposed on such conviction shall not exceed five hundred rupees ; and (b) in every case of conviction and fine by a Magistrate there shall be an appeal to the same Court as in other cases of fine of such

amount as, under the law for the time being in force in India, to give a right of appeal.

Every Court, whether of original or appellate jurisdiction, may reduce the amount of any fine.

(4.) The regulations required to be made under sub-section four of section seven of the said Act by the Commissioners of Customs with the consent of the Treasury shall in India be made by the Governor-General in Council.

(5.) Section five of the said Act, so far as relates to the Commissioners of Customs, shall not apply to India.

2. The said Act shall apply as regards any public ship of the French Republic when employed as a mail ship in the cases authorized by Article V of the said Convention.

3. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (France) Order in Council (India), 1893."

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Rosebery, K.G., and the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS Her Majesty, by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, and having regard to the provisions of a Convention, the ratifications of which were exchanged on the fifth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, between Her Majesty and the Governments of the foreign countries named in the said Order, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in one of the said foreign countries :

And whereas it has been intimated to Her Majesty's Government that the Government of the Principality of Montenegro have notified the accession of that country to the said Convention :

And whereas Her Majesty in Council is satisfied that the said Principality of Montenegro has made such provisions as it appears to Her Majesty expedient to require for the protection of authors of works first produced in Her Majesty's dominions :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Acts, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, that the provisions of the said Order hereinbefore specified shall extend to the said Principality of Montenegro.

This Order shall come into operation on and from the date hereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has jurisdiction within the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Any act which if done in British India would be an offence against the law for the time being in force in British India relating to trade-marks, merchandise-marks, copyright, designs, or inventions, shall, if done in Zanzibar by a person subject to the Orders in Council relating to Zanzibar, be an offence, whether such act is done in relation to any property or right of a British subject, or of a foreigner or native, or otherwise; and any person guilty of such offence shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with a fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees, or with both.

2. Any Act of the Governor-General of India in Council, or of the Governor of Bombay in Council, amending or substituted for any of the Acts of those Legislatures respectively which are made applicable to Zanzibar by or under the provisions of Article 8 of "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1884," or shall hereafter be made so applicable, shall apply to Zanzibar without any order of the Secretary of State in that behalf, subject, however, to the provisions made in that Article for facilitating the application of enactments.

3. This Order shall be read and construed as part of "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1884," and may be cited as "The Zanzibar (Trade-marks, &c.) Order in Council, 1893."

4.—(a.) This Order shall come into operation at the expiration of one month after it is first exhibited in the public office of the Consulate at Zanzibar: provided that any Act of the Imperial Parliament, extending to India, or any Act of the Governor-General in Council which is passed after the commencement of this Order, and applies to Zanzibar by virtue of this Order, shall not take effect until the expiration of one month after such Act has been exhibited in like manner.

(b.) The Consul-General shall cause a copy of this Order and of every such Act to be exhibited, and for the said period kept exhibited, in the public office of the Consulate accordingly.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Rosebery, K.G., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

WHEREAS by the provisions of "The Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883," as amended by "The Patents, Designs,

and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885," it is, amongst other things, provided:—

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any Foreign State or States for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such State shall, subject to the conditions further provided and set forth in the said Act, be entitled to a patent for his invention, or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants, and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such Foreign State:

And whereas it has pleased Her Majesty to make an arrangement with His Excellency the President of Ecuador by and in virtue of a Convention entered into between Her Majesty and that State, dated the twenty-sixth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and duly ratified on the third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, as regards the rights to which subjects of each of the contracting parties shall be entitled in the dominions and possessions of the other in regard to designs and trade marks:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said first-mentioned Act, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, that the provisions of the said Acts hereinbefore specified shall apply to the following country, viz.:—

Ecuador.

And it is further ordered and declared that this Order shall take effect, so far as regards designs and trade marks, at the expiration of four months from the day and date first above written.

WHEREAS by "The Seal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Act, 1891," it is enacted that Her Majesty the Queen may by Order in Council prohibit the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea, or such part thereof as is defined by the said Order, during the period limited by the Order:

And whereas the expression "Behring's Sea" in the said Act means the seas known as Behring's Sea within the limits described in an Order under the said Act.

And whereas an Order in Council was issued on the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, prohibiting the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea, as therein defined, until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

And whereas a further Order in Council was issued on the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, prohibiting the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea, as therein defined, until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

Now therefore Her Majesty in virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is

hereby pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Order in Council, 1893.

2. From and after the date of the present Order until the first day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, unless Her Majesty in Council shall otherwise direct, the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea as hereinafter defined is hereby prohibited.

3. For the purposes of the said recited Act and of this Order the expression "Behring's Sea" means so much of that part of the Pacific Ocean known as Behring's Sea as lies between the parallel of 65° 30' north latitude and the chain of the Aleutian Islands, and eastward of the following line of demarcation, that is to say, a line commencing at a point in Behring's Straits on the said parallel of 65° 30' north latitude, at its intersection by the meridian which passes midway between the Islands of Krusenstern or Ignalook and the Island of Ratmanoff or Noonarbook and proceeding thence in a course nearly south-west through Behring's Straits and the seas known as Behring's Sea, so as to pass midway between the north-west point of the Island of Saint Lawrence and the south-east point of Cape Choukotski to the meridian of 172° west longitude, thence, from the intersection of that meridian in a south-westerly direction so as to pass midway between the Island of Attou and the Copper Island of the Kormandorski couplet or group in the North Pacific Ocean, to the meridian of 193° west longitude.

WHEREAS in pursuance of "The Bishops' Resignation Act 1869" a representation has been made to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, at the instance of the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Norwich, and as such a Bishop of a diocese within and of the said Province of Canterbury, that the said Bishop is desirous of resigning his Bishopric by reason that he is incapacitated by age and permanent physical infirmity from the due performance of his duties as Bishop.

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied of such incapacity and that the said Bishop has canonically resigned.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to declare and it is hereby declared that the said Bishopric of Norwich is vacant, and Her Majesty by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct and it is hereby directed that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Norwich.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act,

1882," it is, amongst other things, enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may, from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days:

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Durham Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, the Northumbeland Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, the Yorkshire Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, the Mid-Ulster Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Limerick City Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Tipperary Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Waterford Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, and also of the Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, and of the several Divisions of the Engineer Militia, Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-mentioned Regiments and Divisions of Militia, shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Durham Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

Yorkshire Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

WHEREAS by "The Sea Fisheries Act, 1868," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council from time to time to do all or any of the following things (amongst others), that is to say:—

To make regulations for carrying out, enforcing, and giving effect to both the entry and registry of British Sea Fishing Boats; and

To adopt in such regulations any existing system of registry or lettering and numbering of boats;

To apply to the entry and registry respectively of sea-fishing boats, and to all matters incidental thereto, such (if any) of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British Ships, and with such modifications and alterations as may be found desirable;

To impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for the breach of any regulations made by any Order in Council for the breach of which a punishment cannot be provided by the application of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British Ships;

To alter and revoke an Order so made;

And it is by the said Act further enacted that every such Order shall be of the same force as if it were enacted in the said recited Act:

And whereas by the Sea Fishing Boats (Scotland) Act, 1886, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to make regulations for carrying out, enforcing, and giving effect to the provisions of that Act, and that every such Order shall be of the same force as if it had been enacted in that Act; and it is also enacted that the said last-mentioned Act shall be construed as one with the hereinbefore recited Act of 1868, and with any Orders in Council made thereunder:

And whereas in pursuance of the power contained in the first hereinbefore recited Act, an Order in Council, dated the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, was duly made and issued, and by Regulation 2 of the said Order, provision was made (amongst other things) for the registering of fishing boats by the Collectors of Customs at the various Customs Ports:

And whereas by Regulation 6 of the said last-mentioned Order, it is provided that there shall be a series of numbers and distinguishing letters for the boats belonging to each Collectorship of Customs, and that the letters hereinafter given shall be the distinguishing letters:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, further provision was made, subject to the Regulations set out in the Schedule thereto, as to the registering of sea fishing boats at the following places in Scotland, viz.:—Ullapool, Broadford, Oban, Ardrishaig, Rothesay, Castlebay (Barra), and Saint Margaret's Hope (Orkney):

And whereas in pursuance of an Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, one of the said places, namely, Saint Margaret's Hope, ceased to be a place for such registration as aforesaid:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, it was directed that a register of sea fishing boats should, in addition to the ports and places indicated in the hereinbefore recited Orders, be kept at Fraserburgh, within the Port of Peterhead:

And whereas the place of Irvine, formerly a creek within the Port of Troon, has been created into an independent Port or Collectorship for Customs purposes:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient that a register of sea fishing boats shall in future be kept at the said Port or Collectorship of Customs of Irvine, and that numbers and letters shall be assigned to fishing boats belonging thereto:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Acts, and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to declare that a register of sea fishing boats shall, from and after the date of this Order, be kept at the Port or Collectorship of Irvine by the Collector of Customs there stationed, such register to be kept in manner provided by the hereinbefore recited Acts, and Orders in Council dated the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and that the distinguishing letters for the said Port or Collectorship of Irvine shall be IE.

The expression "Collector of Customs" in the hereinbefore mentioned Order of the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in all other Orders made and to be made under the hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and in all schedules to such Orders, shall mean and include "the Officer of Customs superintending the Port;" and the meaning of the expression "Collectorship of Customs" in such Orders and Schedules shall be extended accordingly.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that Her Majesty may, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time reduce all or any of the dues for the time being payable in respect of existing or future lighthouses, buoys, or beacons under the management of the General Lighthouse Authorities, and may also, by and with the like advice, from time to time increase or vary such dues:

And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted that each of the said General Lighthouse Authorities shall have power, with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, *inter alia*, to exempt any ships or any classes of ships from the payment of light dues receivable by such authority, and to annex any terms or conditions to such exemptions:

And whereas by various Orders in Council, Her Majesty has been pleased to approve certain Consolidated Tables of Light Duties (Oversea Section)

and (Coast Section) respectively, together with the several reductions, variations, abatements, regulations and exemptions therein contained; and in particular a certain exemption approved by Order in Council dated the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in favour of steam-vessels calling for bunker coal as in the said Order mentioned; and also to direct certain tolls to be paid for oversea vessels, and for coasting vessels, respectively, in respect of certain new Lights, subject to a certain abatement or discount, and the regulations and exemptions mentioned in the Tables aforesaid; and further to direct that a certain abatement or discount should be allowed upon the amount of tolls specified in the Tables aforesaid, and in certain of the said Orders in Council hereinbefore referred to, in the case of oversea vessels, and of coasting vessels respectively:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively intend on and after the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, with the consent of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid to make the following further exemption by way of addition to and variation of the said Order in Council of the seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven; viz., to exempt from the payment of the light dues receivable by either of the said authorities at any port in the United Kingdom or in the Isle of Man, all steamships which shall on or after that day put into or touch at such port for the purpose of filling up with coal their permanent bunkers in which cargo is never carried notwithstanding that such steamships may also take on board at the port aforesaid provisions to be consumed on board or stores required for the proper navigation or equipment of the vessel during the voyage on which she is engaged; provided nevertheless, that the said exemption shall be subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter appearing:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to consent that on and after the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, all steamships which shall put into or touch at any port in the United Kingdom or in the Isle of Man for the purpose of filling up with coal their permanent bunkers in which cargo is never carried shall be exempted by the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively from the payment of the Light Dues receivable by either of the General Lighthouse Authorities at such port notwithstanding that such steamships shall also take on board at the port aforesaid provisions to be consumed on board or stores required for the proper navigation or equipment of the vessel during the voyage in which she is engaged; provided nevertheless, that the said exemption shall be subject to the terms or conditions following, that is to say, that the said exemption shall not apply to any such steamship as aforesaid unless the person or persons liable to pay light dues in respect thereof shall satisfy the person appointed to collect the same, that such steamship has not taken on board at the port aforesaid a larger quantity of coal than was sufficient with the coal already on board the same to fill up her said permanent bunkers in which cargo is never carried, and that such coal has been placed in such permanent bunkers and not in any other part of the said vessel, and that such steamship has not called for or received orders, or broken bulk, or taken

on board mails, cargo, or passengers at the port aforesaid.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices within the metropolis namely the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Botolph without Aldgate situate partly in the city of London and partly in the county of Middlesex and wholly in the diocese of London and the benefice (being a vicarage) of the Holy Trinity Minories situate in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

“Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the said Act and were approved by the said Frederick Bishop of London as such bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and were assented to by the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley Baron Halsbury who as Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain was then the patron in right of the Crown of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minories and the same proposals were also assented to subject to certain modifications by the vestry of the parish of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and by the vestry of the parish of the Holy Trinity Minories.

“And whereas it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the matters hereinafter referred to should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas the Right Honourable Farrer Baron Herschell is now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain.

“And whereas the said Bishop of London, the patrons of the said two benefices, and the vestries of the said parishes respectively, are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Frederick Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his Episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Farrer Baron Herschell Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and seal) and with the

consents of the vestries of the said parish of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and of the said parish of the Holy Trinity Minorities (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the Chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

“PART I.

“As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof we recommend and propose

“1. That the said benefice of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities be united into one benefice under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Saint Botolph Aldgate and Holy Trinity Minorities’ which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

“2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present benefices shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect and if one only shall be then vacant the said union shall also forthwith take effect if with the approval of the said Bishop of London the incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the first incumbent of the united benefice but if he shall not so consent or if the said Bishop of London shall not approve of his becoming the first incumbent of the united benefice then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of his benefice and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present benefices shall be full then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of them if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said present benefices shall with the approval of the said Bishop of London consent to become the incumbent of the united benefice but if he shall not so consent or if the said Bishop of London shall not approve of his becoming the first incumbent of the united benefice then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice and in any case it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit to the united benefice such first incumbent (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the said present benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united benefice, until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

“3. That if after this scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council and before the said union shall have taken effect the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices shall with the consent of the Bishop of London retire from his incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect then the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be entitled during the period hereinafter specified to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice and as a retiring

pension an annual sum equal in amount to the net annual value of all the endowments belonging to the incumbency from which he shall so retire computed at the date on which the said incumbent shall so retire which annual sum shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect and a proportionate part of such retiring pension shall be payable to such retired incumbent on the first day of any payment being made by the Governors of Queen Anne’s Bounty to the incumbent of the united benefice and that thereafter the said retiring pension shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in each and every year the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the first accruing payment in respect of such retiring pension shall become due and the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life if he continue to be a member of the Church of England but not otherwise or until he shall accept other church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent. And upon his accepting such preferment the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable but if he shall accept other church preferment of a less net annual value (to be ascertained without reference to and exclusively of the house of residence if any) than as aforesaid then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum payable to him for the same year in respect of such other preferment. Provided always that if such retiring incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension his right to receive such annual sum payable by way of a retiring pension as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also that if the same annual sum payable by way of a retiring pension as aforesaid shall determine by his ceasing to be a Member of the Church of England as aforesaid or by his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid or by his acceptance of such church preferment or by his death (as the case may be) on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment then he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the current half-year which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current half-year. Provided also that the amount of the retiring pension which may be payable as aforesaid shall be subject to proportionate diminution in the event of a reduction in the receipts from the endowments of the said united benefice consequent upon legislation or other causes over which the incumbent of the united benefice has not control and provided also that if the Reverend Samuel Kinns Clerk in Holy Orders the present incumbent of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities should be the retiring incumbent his retiring pension shall be two hundred and fifty pounds per annum or such lesser sum which may be payable in the event of the diminution as aforesaid in the amount of the endowments belonging to the said united benefice such retiring pension to the said Samuel Kinns to be subject also to such cessation or diminution as would under this clause result were such retiring pension made to an incumbent other than the said Samuel Kinns.

4. That the said retiring pension shall be charged upon the annual income of the united benefice and shall be payable out of the same by the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and as between the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and the retiring incumbent and his assigns the said retiring pension shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the united benefice the incumbent of which united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring incumbent or his assigns the said retiring pension out of the income of the said united benefice and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice and that if such retiring pension or any part thereof shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said half-yearly days of payment and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London it shall be lawful for the said bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied but the power to be so conferred upon the said bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns to recover the said retiring pension and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity or with the legal or equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united benefice his executors or administrators any arrears of the said retiring pension which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

" PART II.

" As to the parish church of the united benefice and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose.

" 1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Botolph without Aldgate shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of the united benefice.

" 2. That upon the union taking effect if the table of fees used in the two churches of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and the Holy Trinity Minories be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes but if such table of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

" 3. That upon the union taking effect the persons who at the time of such union shall hold the respective offices of organist and sexton or sextoness of Saint Botolph without Aldgate shall be respectively organist and sexton or sextoness of the united benefice but no church servants of the united benefice shall have any larger estate and interest in their respective offices than they shall have possessed in their original offices before the union.

" PART III.

" As to the endowment and parsonage house of the united benefice we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose

" 1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties revenues and income constituting the present and prospective endowments of the said benefice of Saint Botolph without Aldgate shall belong to and become the endowments of the united benefice.

" 2. That certain monies which have been derived from a sale to the Commissioners of Sewers for the City of London of a portion of the churchyard of the parish of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and are now available towards the cost of providing a parsonage house for the said benefice of Saint Botolph without Aldgate shall be available towards the cost of providing a parsonage house for the united benefice.

" PART IV

" Upon the subject of patronage we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose.

" 1. That upon the union taking effect the patronage of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minories which is now vested in Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and is exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than the duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be transferred from Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Frederick Bishop of London and his successors for ever and that in exchange for such patronage so transferred the patronage of the benefice of All Saints Hockerill in the county of Hertford and in the diocese of Saint Albans which patronage is now vested in the said Frederick Bishop of London as such bishop shall in like manner and by the same authority and upon and as from the same date be transferred from the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London and his successors bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and such patronage shall and may from time to time be exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the said Farrer Baron Herschell or other the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

" 2. That by means of such exchange of patronage as is recommended and proposed as aforesaid the whole of the patronage of the United Benefice herein proposed to be created shall be wholly and absolutely vested in the said Frederick Bishop of London and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

" PART V.

" As to the church of the Holy Trinity Minories and other matters connected therewith we the Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose—

" 1. That upon the union taking effect the fabric of the church of the Holy Trinity Minories shall be left standing and shall be used for the purpose of a Sunday School or for any other purpose or purposes authorized by section nineteen of the said Act so long as the Bishop of the diocese shall by his licence permit.

" 2. That upon the union taking effect the font communion table and sacramental plate now in the church of the Holy Trinity Minories shall if

the joint vestry of the united benefice desire it and if the Bishop of London approves of such course be transferred to the church of the united benefice but if not so transferred then the said font communion table and sacramental plate shall be transferred to any other church or chapel or churches or chapels within the diocese of London which the Bishop of London may select and that in the event of the said church of the Holy Trinity Minorities being hereafter taken down so much of the carved work and other fittings and furniture now in use in the same church as are not required by the vestry of the united benefice for the church of the united benefice shall be disposed of or sold as the Bishop of London shall direct and if sold the amount realized shall be added to and form part of the fund created by the twenty-second section of the said Act.

" 3. That upon the union taking effect the register books of baptisms marriages and burials of the parish of the Holy Trinity Minorities shall be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice and also so many of the monuments tablets and antiquities (which may not be claimed by those who under the provisions of the said Act have a right to claim them) as the Bishop of London shall direct shall also be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

" 4. That upon the union taking effect the present organist pew opener vergier and organ blower of the church of the Holy Trinity Minorities shall cease to hold such respective offices and that as compensation for such loss of office the organist Mr. John Bellman shall receive an annuity of ten pounds and the pew opener Miss H Lesk the vergier Mr. George Jones and the organ blower Mr. George Braker shall each receive an annuity of five pounds such compensation to be advanced by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners out of the said fund created by the twenty-second section of the hereinbefore mentioned Act upon the understanding that in the event of the church of the Holy Trinity Minorities being taken down that fund is to be recouped for such advance out of any moneys which may be realized by a sale or sales of the site or fabric of the same church as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

" 5. That in the event of the bishop of the diocese refusing or with drawing his licence or permission to use the said church of the Holy Trinity Minorities for the purpose of a Sunday school or for any purpose or purposes authorized by the nineteenth section of the said Act the said bishop shall certify this fact in writing to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the said church shall as soon as may be after the receipt by us of such certificate from the bishop be taken down and its materials and site together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act.

" 6. That in the event of the materials and site of the said church of the Holy Trinity Minorities being sold so much of the net proceeds of such sale or sales as shall be necessary to meet the annuities hereinbefore proposed to be granted to the organist pew opener vergier and organ blower of the said church of the Holy Trinity Minorities shall be set apart and appropriated for that purpose and that the remainder of the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be divided into two equal portions one of which portions shall be invested and left at compound interest until it

amounts to a sum sufficient to defray the cost of building a new church within the limits of the Metropolis and that the other portion of such proceeds shall at the discretion of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the Bishop of London be applied either towards supplementing if necessary the funds for the provision of a parsonage house for the united benefice or towards the increase of the fund which is available for maintaining the fabric of the church of the united benefice and the performance of Divine Service therein or towards both of such objects.

" 7. That upon the union taking effect and in the event of the said Samuel Kinns the present incumbent of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities having retired on a pension as hereinbefore contemplated the incumbent of the said united benefice shall be entitled to receive the whole of the existing endowments of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities until the two following events shall have happened that is to say until the pension payable to the said Samuel Kinns shall have ceased and determined and until the incumbent of the said united benefice shall be entitled to receive the clear annual sum or yearly charge of four hundred pounds which under the provisions of an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the seventh day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven and published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of the same month was as from the then next avoidance of the rectory and benefice of Saint Eichelburga Bishopsgate in the said city of London made chargeable on the endowments of that rectory and benefice in favour of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Botolph without Aldgate and that as from the date on which both of the two said events shall have occurred the incumbent of the said united benefice shall be entitled to receive out of the present endowments of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities a sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum such sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum to be devoted exclusively to the payment of the salary or stipend of an assistant curate for the said united benefice and that the residue of the endowments of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities after the payment of the aforesaid sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum shall under the provisions of the eleventh section of the said Act be applied for the endowment or further endowment of some specified benefice being in the patronage of the Bishop of London for the time being situate in the Metropolis or in the vicinity thereof Provided always that so long as the fabric of the said church of the Holy Trinity Minorities shall be left standing and shall be used for the purposes prescribed in his scheme and shall be kept in repair to the satisfaction of the Bishop of London by the incumbent of the said united benefice the said incumbent shall be entitled to receive out of the residue of the said endowments of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity Minorities a sum of thirty pounds per annum Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure or measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said

Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and Her Majesty by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the said diocese of London, and by the registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the ninth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words and figures following, that is to say;

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John Upperby and of the new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle both in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirtieth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty and published in the London Gazette upon the third day of July following a part of the parish of Saint Cuthbert Carlisle in the said county and diocese was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John situate at Upperby within the limits of such parish and the said district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Upperby.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint John Upperby has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fifth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and published in the London Gazette on the seventh day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the new parish of Christ Church Carlisle in the county and diocese aforesaid, of the said parish of Saint Cuthbert Carlisle and of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby were assigned as a consoli-

dated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen situate within the limits of the said new parish of Christ Church Carlisle and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Stephen Carlisle.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Stephen Carlisle has under the provisions of the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four also become a new parish.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby and of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Wareing Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries both of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby and of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle shall be altered in the manner following, that is to say, firstly so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby; and secondly so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John Upperby in the same county and diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle which is bounded upon the south by the said new parish of Saint John Upperby upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Carlisle from the new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle aforesaid at the middle of that part of the road called or known as Saint Nicholas Bridge where it crosses over the original line (now used as a goods siding) of the Lancaster and Carlisle section of the London and North Western Railway and extending thence

south-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing over the main line of the same railway) to its junction with Regent-street and with Blackhall-road and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the fence which forms the north-eastern boundary of the plot of land which is situate on the north-western side of the same road and which by a deed dated the twelfth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two was conveyed to the Right Reverend the Bishop of Barrow-in-Furness, Mr. George Arthur Heysham Mounsey-Heysham, Miss Elizabeth Benson, the Reverend Abraham Hodges, and the Reverend Henry Lonsdale as a site for the Goodwin Mission School and extending thence north-westward to the said fence and then still north-westward for a distance of one hundred and eight feet or thereabouts along the same fence to its junction with the fence forming the north-western boundary of the said plot of land and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned fence for a distance of one hundred and fourteen feet or thereabouts to its junction with the fence forming the south-western boundary of the same plot of land and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned fence for a distance of ninety-five feet or thereabouts to its south-eastern end on the north-western side of the last above-mentioned road and extending thence first south-eastward to and then south-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle from the new parish of Saint John Upperby aforesaid.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint John Upperby and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle aforesaid, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint John Upperby which is bounded upon the north and upon the west by the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle from the new parish of Saint John Upperby aforesaid at the junction of Currock-road with Blackhall-road aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Upperby from the new parish of Saint Stephen Carlisle aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and

with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Jude, Mildmay Park, Islington, is vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the district parish of Saint Paul, Balls Pond, Islington in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London.

"And whereas the Reverend James Fox, Clerk in Holy Orders now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Paul Balls Pond, Islington, is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Jude Mildmay Park, Islington, now vested in him as aforesaid as such vicar or incumbent should be transferred to and be vested in the five persons who are now the present patrons of the lastly-mentioned benefice that is to say the Venerable Robert Long, Clerk in Holy Orders now Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of Auckland in the diocese of Durham the Reverend William Hagger Barlow Clerk in Holy Orders, now vicar of the vicarage of the parish of Islington, in the said county of Middlesex, the Reverend Henry Woodhouse Dearden, Clerk in Holy Orders, now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of Saint Peter, Southborough, in the diocese of Canterbury, John Deacon of number 20 Birch-lane in the city of London Esquire and Francis Augustus Bevan of number 54 Lombard-street, in the said city of London Esquire and their heirs and assigns.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick now Bishop of the said diocese of London is consenting to the said pro-

posed transfer and in token of such consent, which by the Acts hereinbefore recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James Fox vicar or incumbent of the said district parish of Saint Paul, Balls Pond, Islington acting as such vicar or incumbent (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Jude Mildmay Park, Islington now vested in the said James Fox as such vicar or incumbent of the said district parish of Saint Paul, Balls Pond, Islington as aforesaid shall be transferred from him the said James Fox and from his successors vicars or incumbents of the said district parish of Saint Paul, Balls Pond, Islington to the said Robert Long, William Hagger Barlow, Henry Woodhouse Dearden, John Deacon and Francis Augustus Bevan and their heirs and assigns and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Robert Long, William Hagger Barlow, Henry Woodhouse Dearden, John Deacon, and Francis Augustus Bevan and their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries or some of them which are within the archdeaconry of Leicester in the diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas there are at present three Archdeaconries within the said diocese of Peterborough to wit the Archdeaconry of Northampton the said archdeaconry of Leicester and the archdeaconry of Oakham.

"And whereas the statutory schedule (prepared under the provisions of the hereinbefore lastly mentioned Act) of the rural deaneries within the said archdeaconries respectively is dated the thirteenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

"And whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the second day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of the same month the rural deaneries within the said archdeaconry of Oakham were rearranged.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Mandell Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the rural deaneries or some of them within the said archdeaconry of Leicester are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve certain alterations of the areas of certain of the rural deaneries within the said archdeaconry of Leicester and the formation of a certain new rural deanery to be called the rural deanery of South Akeley in the same archdeaconry.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Mandell Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he hath set his hand and his episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said Archdeaconry of Leicester shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries the names of which are set down in order under the name of

the said Archdeaconry of Leicester in the schedule to this scheme annexed and that the name which in the said schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof and that every parish or cure or church the name of which is set down in numbered order in the first column of the said schedule under the name of any one of the rural deaneries in the said archdeaconry shall belong to and be and form a part of that archdeaconry and of the rural deanery under the respective names of which it may appear as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon of the same archdeaconry and of the rural dean of the same rural deanery and shall not belong to or be or form a part of any other archdeaconry or rural deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean the intent of these our recommendations and proposals being that the said schedule to this scheme annexed shall as to the first column thereof be (in so far as the same legally can or may be) as from the day aforesaid substituted so far as it relates to the said Archdeaconry of Leicester for the hereinbefore mentioned statutory schedule of rural deaneries within the said diocese of Peterborough as aforesaid.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ Whereas by the authority of an Instrument bearing date the tenth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend John then Bishop of the diocese of Chester a part of the parish of West Derby in the said county of Lancaster and at that time in the said diocese of Chester was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Saint Catherine Edge Hill situate in the said parish of West Derby and the said particular district was known as the Particular District of Saint Catherine Edge Hill.

“ And whereas the said particular district of Saint Catherine Edge Hill has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

“ And whereas the said new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill is now situate within the diocese of Liverpool as aforesaid.

“ And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill should be altered so as to include within its limits a certain further portion of the said parish of West Derby being a part of the conventional district of Saint Mary Edge Hill.

“ Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill shall be altered so as to include within its limits all that further portion of the said parish of West Derby which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink and that from and after the same date and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said parish of West Derby so to be included as aforesaid shall become annexed to and become and be and shall form part of the said new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool being:—

"All that portion of the parish of West Derby in the said county and diocese (being part of the conventional district of Saint Mary Edge Hill) wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the south and upon the east by the said new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill upon part of the north-east by the new parish of Saint Cyprian Edge Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the remaining and greater part of the north-east and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Cyprian Edge Hill from the parish of West Derby aforesaid at the junction of Dorothy-street with Wavertree-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Overton-street and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Harbord-street upon the boundary which divides the said parish of West Derby from the new parish of Saint Catherine Edge Hill aforesaid."

in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate at Colwyn Bay in the parish of Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Colwyn Bay as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Alfred George Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul situate at Colwyn Bay as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Colwyn Bay.'

"And with the like consent of the said Alfred George Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul situate at Colwyn Bay as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend William Venables Williams, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Colwyn Bay as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said William Venables Williams and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Colwyn Bay being:—

"All that part of the parish of Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs in the county of Denbigh and in the diocese of Saint Asaph which is bounded upon the north-east by the sea at Rhôs Bay, upon the east partly

by the new parish of Saint Catherine Colwyn situate partly in the county of Carnarvon and partly in the said county of Denbigh and wholly in the diocese aforesaid, and partly by the parish of Llanellian-yn-Rhôs in the said county of Denbigh and in the diocese aforesaid upon the south by the new parish of Saint John, Trofarth, in the last-named county and in the diocese aforesaid, upon the south-west and upon the greater part of the west by the parish of Llansantffraid-Glan-Conway in the said last-named county and in the diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west, upon the remaining part of the west and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Llansantffraid-Glan-Conway from the parish of Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs aforesaid at the centre of the footbridge which carries the road or footpath leading from the house called or known as Mynydd-merci to Mochdre over the stream called or known as Graianllyn otherwise Mochdre Stream which flows from Fridd-y-mynydd to Mochdre and extending thence northward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its confluence with the stream called or known as Nant-y-cwn and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of forty and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby passing the house called or known as Nant-y-cwn) to the point where the same stream crosses the road which leads from Mochdre past the houses called or known as Felin, Mynydd, Mynydd-bâch, and Deunant respectively, toward Rhiw and Colwyn, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eighteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road which leads from Gell past Pen-y-bryn-Uchaf and Pant-y-glôch to Llandrillo-yn-Rhôs, and extending thence generally northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same road over the Chester and Holyhead Branch Line of the London and North-Western Railway, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirty-three and a half chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the mile-stone which indicates a distance of forty-one miles from Chester, and extending thence due north-east and in a direct line for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to the sea at Rhôs Bay aforesaid."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years

of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices within the Metropolis and within the city and diocese of London, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Michael Royal and Saint Martin Vintry, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals are prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the said Act, and are approved by the said Frederick, Bishop of London, and are assented to by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury, who is the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less, and by the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury, the said bishop and the said dean and chapter being the alternate patrons of the said benefice of Saint Michael Royal and Saint Martin Vintry, and the same proposals are also assented to subject to certain modifications by the united vestry of the parishes of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less and by the united vestry of the parishes of Saint Michael Royal and Saint Martin Vintry.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter referred to should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said Frederick, Bishop of London, as such bishop and the patrons of the said two benefices and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the said Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and archiepiscopal seal), and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme set their common or capitular seal), and with the consents of the vestries of the said parishes of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less, and of the said parishes of Saint Michael Royal and Saint Martin Vintry (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed, in the case of each of the said vestries, by the chairman of

a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent); we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

“ PART I.

“ As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:

“ 1. That the said benefice of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less and the said benefice of Saint Michael Royal and Saint Martin Vintry be united into one benefice under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry and All Hallows the Great and Less,’ which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

“ 2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect and if one only shall be then vacant the said union shall also forthwith take effect if the incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the first incumbent of the united benefice, but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of his benefice and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be full then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of them if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the incumbent of the united benefice; but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and, in any case, it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit to the united benefice such first incumbent (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the said present benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

“ 3. That if after this scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council, and before the said union shall have taken effect, the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices shall with the consent of the Bishop of London retire from his incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect, then the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be entitled during the period hereinafter specified to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice, and by way of compensation, an annual sum equal to the net annual value of the tithes or rate in lieu of tithes, and all other endowments belonging to the incumbency from which he shall so retire computed on the average receipts of the three years immediately preceding the year in which the said incumbent shall so retire, which annual sum shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect, and shall be payable by

equal quarterly payments in every year; the first quarterly payment thereof to become due at the end of three calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect, and the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life if he continue to be a member of the Church of England, but not otherwise, or until he shall accept other church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent. And upon his accepting such preferment the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if he shall accept other church preferment of a less net annual value (to be ascertained without reference to and exclusively of the house of residence, if any) than as aforesaid, then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum (to be ascertained as aforesaid) payable to him for the same year in respect of such other preferment. Provided always that if such retiring incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law, the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension, his right to receive such annual sum payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also that if the same annual sum payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease by his ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid, or by his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid, or by his acceptance of such church preferment, or by his death (as the case may be) on any other than one of the quarterly days of payment then he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the current quarter, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current quarter.

“ 4. That the said annual sum shall be charged upon the annual income of the united benefice, and shall be payable out of the same by the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice, and as between the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and the retiring incumbent and his assigns; the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the united benefice, the incumbent of which united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of the said united benefice, and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice, and that if such annual sum or any part thereof shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said quarterly days of payment, and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London, it shall be lawful for the said bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said

bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns to recover the said annual sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal or equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united benefice, his executors or administrators, any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

"5. That if the said union shall have taken immediate effect by reason of the incumbent for the time being of either of the present benefices having retired from his incumbency, and such incumbent shall be living when the united benefice shall for the first time after such union become vacant, the incumbent who shall have so retired shall (if in the opinion of the Bishop of London he be not disqualified by age or otherwise) be entitled to fill such vacancy and may be admitted by the bishop to the united benefice without any form or fee of or for presentation and without being required to make any payment in respect of First Fruits to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, and he shall upon such admission become the second incumbent of the united benefice, and the annual sum hereinbefore made payable to him shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but as regards the future patronage and right of presentation to the united benefice and the rights of the patrons in regard thereto, and the order of the turns of presentation, the admission of such retired incumbent, as aforesaid, to the united benefice shall not be deemed to be a presentation, but shall as regards such patronage, right of presentation, and other rights be deemed to be a continuance of the first incumbency of the united benefice.

"6. That if the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices shall become the first or second incumbent of the united benefice he shall be entitled, during his incumbency of the united benefice, to receive out of the annual income thereof the annual sum which, if he had retired from the incumbency of either of the said two benefices, he would have been entitled to receive under clause 3 of Part I of this scheme.

"PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice, and certain officers of the same, and certain matters connected therewith, or with the church of All Hallows the Great, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of the united benefice.

"2. That after the union the expense of maintaining the fabric of the parish church of the united benefice and of providing the things requisite for the performance of Divine service therein shall be defrayed out of the charitable revenues, applicable to such purposes, at the disposal of the incumbent and churchwardens or trustees of the several parishes of the united benefice and shall be the first charge on such revenues.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the font and communion table and sacramental plate used in the church of All Hallows the Great shall be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if not needed for such church they shall be transferred to any other church or chapel

or churches or chapels, within the diocese of London which the Bishop may select.

"4. That upon the union taking effect the chancel screen in the church of All Hallows the Great shall be carefully removed, and, if possible, shall be set up in the parish church of the united benefice, but if it shall not be found practicable or desirable to set up the aforesaid screen in the church of the united benefice such screen shall, in that case, be set up in such other church (within the limits of the City of London if possible), as the Archbishop of Canterbury, after consultation with the President and Council of the Royal Institute of British Architects, shall direct.

"5. That upon the union taking effect the remainder of the carved work now in the church of All Hallows the Great or so much of such carved work as the joint vestry of the united benefice shall desire, shall, with the approval of the Archbishop of Canterbury, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if the whole or a part of such carved work be not needed for such church the whole or such part as shall not be needed for such church shall be transferred to the church of the new benefice hereinafter mentioned, unless it shall seem more expedient to the Archbishop of Canterbury that the same shall be sold, and the proceeds to arise from such sale shall in such case be added to the proceeds to arise from the sale hereinafter recommended of the materials and site of the church of All Hallows the Great.

"6. That upon the union taking effect if the table of fees used in the two churches be alike in all particulars, the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes; but if such table of fees be not alike in all particulars, the same shall be of no authority, and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

"7. That if upon the union taking effect the persons who at the present time hold the respective offices of parish clerk, organist, and sexton of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry shall at that time hold their respective offices, such persons shall be respectively parish clerk, organist, and sexton of the united benefice; but no parish clerk, organist, or sexton of the united benefice shall have any larger estate and interest in his office than he shall have possessed in his original office before the union.

"8. That upon the final closing of the church of All Hallows the Great the register books of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the parishes of All Hallows the Great and Less shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments of the united benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:

"That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues, and income constituting the endowments of the rectory of All Hallows the Great and Less, and of the rectory of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry, shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice, and that so soon after the union taking effect as the existing vested interests in the income of the united benefice shall have ceased and determined, the incumbent at that time of the said united benefice, and his successors shall be entitled to receive an annual sum of six hundred pounds out of the income arising from or constituting such

endowments, and that the residue of such income shall form the endowment or part of the endowment of the new district which is hereinafter proposed to be constituted or created. Provided always that if the full annual sum shall, under clause 3 of Part I of this scheme, become payable to a retiring incumbent by way of compensation, then and in such case the recommendations contained in this present clause shall come into full operation only as from and after the cesser and determination of the payment of such annual sum by way of compensation. Provided further that in case the full annual sum payable under the said clause 3 to a retiring incumbent by way of compensation shall (as provided by the same clause) be in any year or years reduced in consequence of the receipt, by such retiring incumbent, of income derived from other church preferment of a less annual value than the said full annual sum payable by way of compensation, then and in every such case the annual amount or sum by which such reduced annual sum shall fall short of such full annual sum shall become available and be applicable for the endowment or part of the endowment of the said proposed new district, and any portion of the income of the said united benefice which from any other cause shall not be required for the purpose of the said payment to be made under this present clause shall also become available and be applicable for the endowment or part of the endowment of the same new district.

“PART IV.

“As to a certain new district we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:

“1. That an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the Metropolis, as that word is defined by the Act of the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty (such district then having been, or then being about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, authorizing the formation or constitution of such district), shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church shall be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended.

“2. That the patronage of such new district and benefice shall be vested alternately in the Bishop of London for the time being and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury, the first turn or presentation thereto to be vested in the Bishop of London.

“3. That when a church for such district has been built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended it shall be consecrated by the name and style of All Hallows, or by such other name and style as may appear to the bishop of the diocese to be more expedient.

“PART V.

“As to the church of All Hallows the Great and the site and appurtenances thereof, and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials site, furniture, or fittings of the same church we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, recommend and propose:

“1. That upon the union taking effect the church of All Hallows the Great be taken down.

“2. That subject to the provision contained in clauses 3, 4, and 5 of Part II of this scheme, the furniture or fittings, and the materials and site of the said church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof, shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at

such time or times, and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

“3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid, of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church shall form one aggregate fund, and shall be applied as follows and in the following order, that is to say:—

“(a.) That we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall, out of such moneys, first pay over to the rector and churchwardens of the united benefice of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry and All Hallows the Great and Less a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds for the purpose of defraying the cost of any works which (with the approval of us and the Bishop of London may be executed under or by direction of the said rector and churchwardens) for the purpose of rendering the church of the said united benefice, that is to say, the church of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry, more suitable for the purpose of Divine worship therein.

“(b.) That we shall next set apart a sum sufficient to pay the fees, charges, and expenses (if any) payable for and in respect of the institution to and induction of one of the incumbents of either of the existing incumbencies of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry and of All Hallows the Great and Less to the incumbency of the said united benefice (if such institution and induction shall take place), and also the first fruits (if any) which shall be payable to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy on such institution or induction.

“(c.) That we shall next set apart a capital sum of four thousand pounds for the provision, when opportunity shall arise, of a house of residence for the incumbent of the said united benefice, and that until such house shall have been provided one moiety of the interest (calculated at the rate of two pounds and ten shillings per centum per annum) accruing upon such capital sum of four thousand pounds shall be paid by us to the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice in addition to the income which, as such incumbent, he shall be entitled to receive under the provisions of this scheme, and the other moiety of such interest shall be accumulated and added to such capital sum until such accumulation shall be declared by us and by the patron of the said united benefice to be no longer necessary, and thereupon such other moiety shall also be paid by us to the said incumbent in addition to the income which, as such incumbent, he shall be entitled to receive under the provisions of this scheme.

“(d.) That we shall next appropriate out of the said proceeds a sum of one thousand pounds as part of the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

“(e.) That we shall next set apart and pay over to the rector and churchwardens of the united benefice a sum of five hundred pounds,

to be held and invested by them as trustees, the annual income arising from such investment to be devoted towards the maintenance in good order of the two churchyards of the respective parishes of All Hallows the Great and All Hallows the Less.

“(f) That the remainder of such net proceeds shall be appropriated by us for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of, a new church within the limits of the said new district, constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the church of such new district, and if the amount of such remainder shall be sufficient, the same shall also be appropriated by us for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of, a parsonage house (or the purchase, enlargement, or alteration of any existing house, suitable with or without enlargement or alteration for a parsonage house) within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the parsonage house of such new district.

“ PART VI.

“ Upon the subject of patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, recommend and propose :

“ 1. That the sole patronage of the said united benefice of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry and All Hallows the Great and Less shall be vested in the Archbishop of Canterbury, and that by way of exchange for the patronage now vested in the Bishop of London and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of Christ, Canterbury, alternately, of the rectory of Saint Michael Royal with Saint Martin Vintry, the patronage of the new district to be formed or constituted as aforesaid shall, as aforesaid, be vested in the Bishop of London and the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury alternately, the first turn of presentation being with the Bishop of London.

“ Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval, which by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of All Hallows the Great and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

“ And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her

Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS Charles Neve Cresswell, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law duly appointed in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882, as Commissioner for determining the boundaries of the Wards of the borough of Cambridge and for apportioning the Councillors thereto, has transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State his Scheme in the following terms :—

“ MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT, 1882.

“ Borough of Cambridge.

“ WHEREAS Her Majesty has been pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in Her Majesty by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882 to fix the number of Wards into which the borough of Cambridge shall be henceforth divided, and to order and direct that the said borough shall be divided into ten Wards, which Order was made on the thirtieth day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

“ And whereas on the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did in pursuance of the thirtieth section of the aforesaid Act duly warrant and appoint Charles Neve Cresswell Esquire Barrister-at-Law, to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of the Wards of the borough of Cambridge, and for apportioning the Councillors among them, as in the said Act provided and directed.

“ And whereas the borough of Cambridge is a borough within the provisions and regulations of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882, and by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board, made on the fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and duly confirmed by Parliament, the number of Councillors of the said borough was increased from thirty to thirty-six, of whom thirty should continue to be elected by the Burgesses of the borough, and six should be elected to represent the University in the manner therein prescribed and directed.

“ Now I the said Charles Neve Cresswell do hereby in pursuance of the said warrant of appointment determine the boundaries of the ten Wards into which the said borough shall be divided, which Wards are hereinafter numbered and named as follows that is to say :—

“ Ward No. 1 otherwise Castle Ward.

“ Ward No. 2 otherwise Bridge Ward.

“ Ward No. 3 otherwise Market Ward.

“ Ward No. 4 otherwise Saint Andrew's Ward.

“ Ward No. 5 otherwise Fitzwilliam Ward.

“ Ward No. 6 otherwise New Town Ward.

“ Ward No. 7 otherwise Romsey Ward.

“ Ward No. 8 otherwise Petersfield Ward.

“ Ward No. 9 otherwise Saint Matthew's Ward.

“ Ward No. 10 otherwise Abbey Ward.

“ And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 1 otherwise Castle Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is con-

tained within a line commencing from a point in the centre of the River Cam beneath the centre of the Great Bridge thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said river to the centre of the Mill Pit near Small Bridge in the boundary line of the parishes of Saint Mary the Less and Saint Botolph thence in a south-westerly direction along the said parochial boundary to its termination in the bed of the said river, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the river and of Newnham Mill Pit to a point opposite to the centre of the Mill Tail, thence along the centre of the Mill Tail to the Mill Stream, thence along the centre of the Mill Stream to the boundary of the borough, thence in a westerly, north-westerly, north-easterly, and south-easterly direction along the said boundary to the centre of the River Cam at the eastern corner of the grounds of Saint Mary Magdalene College, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of the River Cam to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 2 otherwise Bridge Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from the point aforesaid beneath the centre of the Great Bridge, thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of the River Cam to the boundary of the borough, thence in an easterly direction along the said boundary to a point opposite to the centre of Parsonage-street, thence, by a straight line across Midsummer Common to the centre of Parsonage-street, thence along the centre of Parsonage-street to the centre of the Newmarket-road, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the Newmarket-road to the boundary of the parishes of Saint Andrew the Less, and Holy Trinity, opposite to the centre of Fair-street, thence in a southerly direction to and along the parochial boundary in the centre of Fair-street to a point opposite to the centre of Willow-walk, thence in a westerly direction to and along the boundary of the parishes of Holy Trinity, and Saint Andrew the Great in Willow-walk to Short-street, thence by a diagonal line to the corner of the boundary wall of Christ's Piece, thence in a westerly direction along the said parochial boundary to Milton's-walk, thence in a south-westerly direction along the boundary of Christ's College Gardens abutting upon Milton's-walk to Drummer-street, thence to the centre of the footpath on the south-eastern side of Christ's-lane, thence along the centre of the said footpath to the centre of Saint Andrew's-street, thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Saint Andrew's-street to Sidney-street, thence to and along the centre of Sidney-street to Bridge-street and thence to and along the centre of Bridge-street to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 3 otherwise Market Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from the point aforesaid beneath the centre of Great Bridge thence in a south-easterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 2 to Saint Andrew's-street, thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Saint Andrew's-street to a point opposite to the centre of Downing-street, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Downing-street to Pembroke-street, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Pembroke-street, to a point opposite to the centre of Free School-lane, thence in a northerly direction to and along the centre of Free School-lane to a point opposite to

the centre of Botolph-lane, thence in a westerly direction to and along the centre of Botolph-lane to the centre of Trumpington-street, thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Trumpington-street to a point opposite to the centre of Silver-street, thence in a westerly direction to and along the centre of Silver-street to the centre of the Small Bridge, thence in a northerly direction to and along the boundary of Ward No. 1 to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 4 otherwise Saint Andrew's Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from a point in the centre of Saint Andrew's-street opposite to the centre of the footpath in Christ's-lane, thence in a north-easterly and easterly direction along the southern boundary of Ward No. 2 to Fair-street, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Fair-street to Fitzroy-street, thence in an easterly direction to and along the centre of Fitzroy-street to a point opposite to the centre of City-road, thence in a southerly direction to and along the centre of City-road to a point opposite to the centre of John-street thence in a south-easterly direction to and along the centre of John-street to the centre of Adam and Eve-row, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Adam and Eve-row to a point opposite to the centre of Dover-street, thence to and along the centre of Dover-street to the centre of East-road, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of East-road and Gonville-place to a point in the centre of Regent-street at Hyde Park Corner, thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Regent-street to the boundary of Ward No. 3 thence in a north-westerly direction along the said boundary to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 5, otherwise Fitzwilliam Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge, as is contained within a line commencing from the point in the boundary of Ward No. 4 opposite to the centre of Downing-street, thence in a south-easterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 4 to the point above mentioned in Regent-street at Hyde Park Corner, thence in a south-westerly and westerly direction along the boundary of the parishes of Saint Andrew the Less and Saint Benedict to a point opposite to the centre of Panton-street, thence in a southerly direction to and along the centre of Panton-street to the centre of Bateman-street, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Bateman-street to the boundary of the parishes of Saint Mary the Less, and Saint Andrew the Less on the eastern side of Hobson's Brook, thence in a southerly direction along the said parochial boundary to the boundary of the borough, thence in a westerly and north-westerly direction along the boundary of the borough to the boundary of Ward No. 1, thence in a northerly direction along the said boundary to the boundary of Ward No. 3, thence in an easterly direction along the southern boundary of Ward No. 3 to the point of commencement aforesaid.

"And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 6 otherwise New Town Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from the point of intersection of the boundaries of Ward No. 4 and of Ward No. 5 at Hyde Park Corner, thence in a north-easterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 4 to a point opposite to the centre of Gresham-road, thence in a south-easterly direction to and along the centre of

Gresham-road to a point opposite to the centre of Saint Paul's-road, distant twenty-six feet from the south-western boundary of a close numbered 76 upon the Ordnance Map, Scale $\frac{1}{2500}$ Sheet XLVII 2, thence by a straight line to the boundary of the said close, thence in a south-easterly direction along the said boundary to a point distant two hundred and twenty-four feet from the centre of Mawson-road, thence by a straight line to the centre of Mawson-road, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Mawson-road to the centre of Lyndewode-road, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Lyndewode-road to the centre of Tenison-road, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Tenison-road to a point opposite to the centre of Devonshire-road, thence in an easterly direction to and along the centre of Devonshire-road to a point opposite to the south-western corner of the premises of the Midland Railway Company, thence in an easterly direction to and along the southern boundary of the said premises to the centre of the Great Eastern Railway, thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of the said railway to the boundary of the borough, thence in a westerly and northerly direction along the said boundary to the boundary of Ward No. 5; thence in a northerly and easterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 5 to the point of commencement aforesaid.

" And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 7 otherwise Romsey Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from the point of intersection of the boundary of the borough with the eastern boundary of Ward No. 6 on the Great Eastern Railway thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of the said railway to the boundary of the borough on the River Cam thence in a southerly direction along the boundary of the borough to the point of commencement aforesaid.

" And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 8 otherwise Petersfield Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the borough of Cambridge as is contained within a line commencing from a point in the boundary of Ward No. 4 opposite to the centre of Gresham-road, thence in a north-easterly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 4 to a point in the east road opposite to the centre of Broad-street, thence to and along the centre of Broad-street in an easterly direction to a point opposite to the centre of Flower-street thence in and along the centre of Flower-street in a northerly and easterly direction to the centre of Blossom-street thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Blossom-street to the centre of Norfolk-street, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Norfolk-street to the centre of Gwydir-street, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Gwydir-street to a point opposite to the centre of Milford-street, thence to and along the centre of Milford-street in an easterly direction to the centre of Sturton-street, thence to and along the centre of Sturton-street in a southerly direction to a point opposite to the centre of Sleaford-street, thence to and along the centre of Sleaford-street in an easterly direction to a point distant one hundred and forty-four feet from the point of intersection of Sleaford-street and Ainsworth-street, thence eastwards in a straight line to the boundary of Ward No. 7 in the centre of the Great Eastern Railway, thence in a south-westerly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 7 to the boundary of Ward No. 6, thence in a north-

westerly direction along the said boundary to the point of commencement aforesaid.

THE following Statute, made by the Governing Body of Pembroke College, Oxford, on the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

A STATUTE made by the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Oxford, in amendment of the Statutes made under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act of 1877.

Whereas by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act of 1877, 40 and 41 Victoria, c. 48, sections 54 and 55, it is enacted, that a Statute made by the Commissioners for a College shall be subject to alteration from time to time by Statute made by the College under this Act and not otherwise, the same being passed at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for this purpose, by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting; and further that every such alteration of Statute shall be submitted to the Queen in Council, and be proceeded on and have effect as if it were a Statute made by the Commissioners. Now therefore We the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College in the University of Oxford, being this day assembled in a General Meeting specially summoned for the purpose after due notice given of the business to be transacted thereat, do by unanimous vote of those present and voting, enact as follows, that is to say We alter Statute VI of the said Statutes by adding the following clause numbered twenty-three :—

23. There shall be created a Fund to be called the College Exhibition Fund, which shall be separate and distinct from the Exhibition Fund authorized by clause 14 of this Statute. Into it shall be paid

(1) Such portions of the emoluments of any open Scholarship or Exhibition which have been forfeited by any Scholar or Exhibitioner as shall be from time to time determined by the Master and Fellows.

(2) Such sum, not exceeding £150 in any one year, out of the Corporate Revenues of the

College, as the Master and Fellows may from time to time determine at any Stated General Meeting.

The College Exhibition Fund shall be applied, under such conditions and in such manner as the Master and Fellows shall think fit, in granting Exhibitions to such Members of the College, being in statu pupillari, as the Master and Fellows shall judge to be deserving of assistance and to stand in need of it to enable them to continue their studies at the University. A Scholar or Exhibitioner shall not be ineligible for receiving assistance out of this Fund if in the judgment of the Master and Fellows he shall be in need of it; but no such assistance shall be given to any Scholar or Exhibitioner who shall not already have commenced residence at the College, nor shall any prospect of such assistance be announced when notice is given of any forthcoming election to a Scholarship or Exhibition.

Any Exhibition granted under this clause shall be terminated at any time by Resolution of the Master and Fellows.
