TOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Thursday, the 22nd of June next, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

REGULATIONS

TO DE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office. Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially

should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by His Grace the Lord High Commissioner to the Right Honourable Sir George Onto Trevelyan, Bart., Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him laid before the Queen, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:-

May it please Your Majesty,

YOUR Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, acknowledge with reverent and devoted loyalty Your Majesty's gracious letter.

We rejoice to receive the assurance of Your Majesty's lively interest in the welfare of the Church of Scotland, and of the confidence with which you commit to our charge the important interests and solemn duties of attending to the care and spiritual well-being of the Scottish

people.

We dutifully assure Your Majesty that we shall seek so to discharge our duties as to promote the best interests of the people of Scotland. It is our earnest desire and our purpose that the National Church shall encourage and guide the nation in social, benevolent, and religious work, and we venture to submit to Your Majesty that by enquiry into the actual condition of the people, and by devi-ing measures to remedy evils which are thus brought to light, we are with some success endeavouring to fulfil that purpose. We know that in all efforts to lighten the burden of sickness and to brighten the homes of the poor we shall have the sympathy and favour of Your Majesty, and we pray Almighty God to give success to our labours in this field of humanity and religion.
