The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is enacted by "The County Courts Act, 1888," that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to alter the number and boundaries of the Districts and the place of holding any Court, and to order the discontinuance of the holding of any Court, and the consolidation of any two or more Districts, and the division of any District, and to order by what name and in what towns and places a Court shall be held in such District:

And whereas it has been represented that it would be of advantage to the public if Sittings of the County Court of Devonshire now holden at East Stonehouse were ordered to be held at Plymouth as well as at East Stonehouse:

Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirtieth day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, the Sittings of the County Court of Devonshire now holden at East Stone-
