THE following General Order regarding the action which took place at Chilás, on the N.W. Frontier of India, has been received from the Government of India:—

GENERAL ORDER.

FIELD OPERATIONS.—CHILÁS.

Simla, the 19th May, 1893.

THE Most Honourable the Viceroy and Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the subjoined letter from the Adjutant-General in India, dated the 10th May, 1893, submitting, under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief in India, a despatch from Colonel A. G. A. Durand, C.B., commanding the troops in the Gilgit Agency, reporting the particulars of the action fought in Chilás on the 5th March last.

From Major-General W. Galbraith, C.B., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department (No. 2958-A, dated Simla, the 10th May, 1893).

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to submit, for publication in the "Gazette of India," the accompanying despatch*, with enclosure, from Lieutenant-Colonel A. G. A. Durand, C.B., regarding the fighting at Chilás on the 5th March, 1893.

2. Sir George White shares Lieutenant-Colonel Durand's regret for the loss of Major Daniell and appreciation of his bravery and soldier-like qualities, and His Excellency also endorses Lieutenant-Colonel Durand's opinion of the gallant behaviour of Lieutenant Moberly and the officers and men of the Body Guard Regiment.

From Lieutenant-Colonel A. G. A. Durand, C.B., Commanding the Troops in the Gilgit Agency, to the Adjutant-General in India,—(No. 1185, dated Gilgit, the 30th March, 1893).

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, an official report submitted by Lieutenant F. J. Moberly, 37th Bengal Infantry, in which the fighting which took place in Chilás on the 5th March is described.

2. The post of Chilás had been for some time past held by three hundred rifles of the Body Guard Regiment, and, with the rest of the line of communication to Búnji, had been placed by me under the immediate orders of Major Daniell, 1st Punjab Infantry, an officer specially selected last year to act as my second in command. On the 5th, owing to convoy and other duties, the available rifles at Chilás were some 270.

3. For some time Major Daniell had received warning that an attack was preparing, which was to take place on the night of the Mahomedan feast known as the Shab-i-Barat. Unfortunately some mistake was made in calculating the night. Major Daniell believed it to be that of the 2nd and 3rd, and on the 3rd of March he wrote that everything was quiet, and that there was no sign of the enemy. So confident had he become that no attack was intended that he gave Lieutenant Moberly permission to go shooting from the 4th, a permission of which that officer fortunately did not avail himself. Further, I found that a patrol which had been habitually for some weeks sent in the afternoon to ground about a mile to the west of our camp, from which a very extended view, embracing the road down to the Indus Valley for several miles, can be obtained, had, on the afternoon of the 4th, been stopped by Major Daniell's orders. Had it moved out as usual, the collection of the enemy opposite the Hodar stream must have been observed. But for the circumstance that a party of the enemy broke into a house in the village in search of a man employed by me, and that they fired a couple of shots at his servant, it appears to me that something very like a surprise of the post would have occurred. The mistake in the dates was most unfortunate.

4. I have nothing to add to Lieutenant Moberly's account of the actual fighting beyond my thorough concurrence in the opinion expressed by him as to the behaviour of the Body Guard Regiment. I have ordered a committee to assemble to report on the cases of the men recommended by Lieutenant Moberly for the Order of Merit, and the proceedings shall be forwarded in due course.

5. A very careful examination of the ground has convinced me that Major Daniell's attack, though extremely gallant, was faulty in conception. He was killed at a point marked by a red spot on the accompanying sketch*—that is, in a position to reach which he had led a portion of his men through a raking cross fire. Moreover, his attack forced Lieutenant Moberly to stop all fire from the walls of our fort, and deprived the attack of valuable support. From what I could discover, it appears that he was confident of thoroughly defeating the enemy, and that his one fear was

that they would not stand. His attack, consequently, became an encircling one, and, by cutting off the enemy from all avenues of escape, led to unnecessary loss on our side, while probably not increasing that of the enemy, who, if attacked only in front and flank, would have been driven out into the ruined fort and into the open beyond.

6. The enemy carried off the rifles and belts of seventeen dead sepoys. Their loss has been extremely heavy; there are more than 120 men buried in Chilás itself, and, from information obtained, there is no doubt but that their loss in dead has amounted to from 180 to 250, with numerous wounded. The fire of our men was very deadly owing to the crowded condition of the enemy, the number of hits to rounds fired being between three and four per cent. The enemy came from as far as seventy miles down the Indus below Chilás, and comprised levies from Koli Palas, Patan, Jalkot, Sao, Kotgalala, Sazin, Tangir, Darel, Harban, Hodar, Thur, and Chilás. The Jalkot and Sao men lost very heavily, the former losing two headmen; the Tangiris also had a leading man killed. At present the Shins—that is, the states on both banks to Sazin—have had enough; the Koli Palas men were slightly engaged, and are said not to wish to join any new confederacy; but the Jalkot and Patan men are determined to return if they can raise another force and get help from below.

7. I would desire to recommend Lieutenant Moberly very strongly to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. Throughout a most trying day this young officer behaved with marked gallantry and coolness. In the first attack on the village he led his men very gallantly, killing three of the enemy with his own hand; his retirement after being wounded was cool and methodical, and saved his party from destruction. His action after Major Daniell's death showed, in my opinion, marked coolness and nerve, more especially considering the fact that he had been wounded in the head and stunned, and that he was throughout the day of the 5th and following night suffering from the effects of his wound. The disposition made by him to cover the retirement of the remains of Major Daniell's attacking party, the rapidity with which he seems to have re-established perfect order—no easy task when one-third of the storming party were killed and wounded—his quiet and efficient arrangements to hold the post, all reflect the greatest credit on him. His example had evidently an excellent effect on the men, and I venture to think that his conduct is deserving of special recognition.

8. In conclusion, I wish to express my deep regret at the death of Major Daniell. It would be difficult to find a more gallant officer, or one more experienced in frontier warfare, and, short as the time was during which he served under me, it was long enough to make me appreciate his soldierly qualities, his directness, and loyalty.

From Lieutenant F. J. Moberly, 37th Bengal Infantry, on special duty in Gilgit, Commanding in Chilás, to the Staff Officer, Gilgit,—(dated Chilás, the 8th March, 1893).

I HAVE the honour to forward the following report of the recent fighting in Chilás for the information of the British Agent.

On the morning of the 5th instant, about 3 A.M., I was awake by a sepoy of the guard over the north-eastern entrance of the fort, and he told me that a large number of armed men with drums and flags were advancing, beating drums and

shouting. I woke Major Daniell, and went round the tents waking up the sepoys, who at once fell in and lined the walls. We waited there till the enemy came within 200 yards, and then Major Daniell gave the order to commence fire. We did so by volleys, and the enemy at once retired into the village, firing as they went, but without doing any harm to us. It was too dark to see how many there were, but I should think that there were not less than 1,000 or 1,200. They then began building a low stone breastwork on the ruins of the old fort. I was then ordered by Major Daniell to take 35 men down, and attack the village. This was, as I found out afterwards, about 3.30 A.M. I advanced with half the number of men extended, firing volleys, and the other half in support, and when within some 70 yards of the village I ordered up the support, and charged. During the advance two Sepoys were wounded. We found the village full of men with guns, who fired and threw stones at us. We cleared the first line of houses after some fighting, killing about twelve or fifteen of the enemy, and wounding some more. Jemadar Gan Singh, of the Body Guard Regiment, here captured a standard, and altogether behaved with conspicuous gallantry. We were again advancing, when I was struck by a bullet on the head, which stunned me. On coming to my senses I found that my men had not advanced any more, and as I did not feel equal to the task of going on myself, and as besides the enemy were beginning to creep round our flank, I ordered the Jemadar to retire. During the retirement one man was wounded, and on arriving at the fort I discovered that one of my personal orderlies was missing, and I have since found out that he was shot through the brain in the place where I was shot, and in the dark he must have been overlooked. I remember seeing him beside me at the time.

The enemy kept up an incessant fire on us from then till about 8.30 A.M., when they almost entirely ceased; but without doing us any damage. Major Daniell had meanwhile determined to attack the village and the sangar with as many men as possible. So he ordered the attacking party to fall in at 9 A.M. It was only possible to get 140 men together, as he had to leave some 120 men in the fort, as the enemy by this time had crossed the Botogah Nala, and had also taken up a position on a hill to the south-east of us, thereby entirely surrounding us. He marched out from the south-eastern entrance of the fort, and, making a circuit, began to advance on the western side of the village. Meanwhile, we in the fort kept up as heavy a fire as possible on the village and sangar. Major Daniell's advance appears to have been in two parties. Half the sepoys under Subadar Mán Singh went straight at the village and gained the outer edge of it, where they remained throughout, keeping up a heavy fire on the enemy, who remained in the village, returning the fire. The other half, under Major Daniell, went below the village, and then advanced up on the eastern side of it, passing by the mosque, which was full of men. Close here the Major was shot, and then Adjutant Nain Singh appears to have closed all round the village, inclining so as to unite with Subadar Mán Singh's company. It was about this time that he (the Adjutant Nain Singh) was also killed, as well as Subadar Bir Singh.

Subadar Mán Singh had been wounded and brought into the fort, and has since died of his wounds. On hearing of Adjutant Nain Singh's death, Jemadar Gan Singh collected all the men together and retired. This was about 11.30 A.M.

As regards this report of Major Daniell's attack, it is only what I can hear from the native officers who took part in it, as until 11 A.M. we got no news in the fort, but we could see that there was some hard fighting going on in and about the village. About 11 A.M. wounded men began coming in, and then Major Daniell's orderly came and said that the Major had been killed, shot through the head and the body. About this time we saw the sepoys gradually retiring and firing, being pursued by the enemy, whom, however, they held in check. Just then I heard that Adjutant Nain Singh and Subadar Bir Singh and a lot of sepoys had been killed in the village, and at the same time news came that the sepoys were running short of ammunition; so I sent out a party with some boxes of ammunition to cover the general retirement. Here I wish to mention the particularly gallant conduct of sepoy Mangalu, No. 1 Company, Body Guard Regiment, who, as soon as he heard that they were short of ammunition, shouldered a box and rushed out, crossing a very heavy fire and getting wounded in the leg; but, nevertheless, he stuck to his box. During the retirement another gallant action was performed by another sepoy of the Body Guard Regiment, sepoy Bahadur Gurung, No. 4 Company, who rushed back alone some fifty yards, to within a hundred yards of the enemy, under a very heavy fire, and picked up and brought in on his back a wounded sepoy who was lying there. I collected all the men as they retired and lined the walls, as the enemy were collecting to advance. We drove them back into cover, and until 2 A.M. the next morning desultory firing was kept up.

In the afternoon I sent for Múnshi Gulab Khan, and asked him if there was any way of sending news to Búnji, whereupon he volunteered to go himself at night if I sent a sepoy with him. I asked for volunteers to go, and three sepoys volunteered,—Sepoys Nariban, Tikaru, and Neola, of the Body Guard Regiment; so I wrote three separate letters, and gave them to these men. I have since heard that Múnshi Gulab Khan and Sepoy Tikaru arrived at Ges on the 6th instant at 7 P.M., having managed to elude various picquets of the enemy in the Botogah and Thak nalas. They separated on starting from the other two sepoys, and heard nothing more of them. Probably they would have heard shots fired if these two men had been killed; so I trust that they are all right and will turn up in time, as they may only have lost their way.

We stood in our places all night expecting a fresh attack; but towards morning everything got suddenly quiet, and when it got light we could see no signs of the enemy. I did not like to advance, fearing an ambush, and besides the sepoys were very exhausted, and I ordered them to turn in and sleep, and fall in again at one o'clock, keeping a strict look-out, and determined, if nothing more was heard, to advance on the village for reconnaissance about 2 P.M.

About one o'clock we captured a Chilási, who said that all the enemy had retired down the river, and also a dák man who had brought the dák from Ges the night before, and who had been captured by the enemy and his dák seized. He also said that all the enemy had retired; so I ordered an advance on the village, which was found to be empty. They had left 40 of their dead lying on the ground, and besides large numbers of freshly made graves showed where they had buried the remainder.

From news since received, I estimated their loss as at least 250 killed, besides some 40 or 50

wounded. The total numbers of the enemy, including the men all round us in the Thak and Botogah *nalas* and on the other bank of the river, must have been 4,000 or 5,000 at least. We recovered all our dead bodies, two or three of which had been mutilated after death.

Major Daniell was, it appears, struck simultaneously by two bullets, one through the brain, and one which entered at the left side and came out just behind the heart, so that his death must have been instantaneous.

Our casualties were—

1 British Officer, 3 Native Officers, and 19 rank and file killed.

1 Native Officer and 22 rank and file severely wounded.

1 British Officer and 5 rank and file slightly wounded.

I have only the highest praise for the sepoys of the Body Guard Regiment in garrison here, who showed the greatest courage, and have behaved splendidly throughout.

In conclusion, I wish to recommend the following Native Officer and men for the Order of Merit :—

Jemadar Gán Singh, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles (the Body Guard Regiment), for conspicuous gallantry on two separate occasions, for the way in which he managed the general retirement after all the senior officers had been killed, and also for the great assistance he has been to me ever since. He went round continually the whole night of the 5th, keeping up the men to the mark, encouraging them, and showed himself a most capable officer at a very trying time.

Havildar Partimán, Naick Parsimal, Lce.-Naick Mán Singh, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for conspicuous gallantry in action. Naick Parsimal, although wounded, continued to do his work.

Sepoy Bahadur Gurung, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for carrying a wounded sepoy out of action (*vide report*).

Sepoy Mangalu, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for conspicuous gallantry (*vide report*).

Sepoy Balu, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for carrying Subadar Mán Singh, who was wounded, out of action, in doing which he was severely wounded himself.

Sepoy Bahadur, Sepoy Jai Bhaddar, and Sepoy Indra Lal, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for conspicuous gallantry.

Sepoy Nariban, Sepoy Neola, and Sepoy Tikaru, 2nd Jammu and Kashmir Rifles, for carrying the *dák* through the enemy's picquets at imminent danger to themselves. (N.B.—Up to the date no news has been received of the two former.)

Sepoy Kharkubir, 4th Kashmir Rifles, my own orderly, who was up with me the whole time during the attack, and who, when I was wounded, helped me under cover at great personal risk.

The following Native Officer, non-commissioned officers and men also distinguished themselves during the action, and are deserving of reward :—

The following shall be subject to a period of ten days' quarantine, but shall be permitted, under the directions of the Collector of Customs, to discharge goods (which are not susceptible of communicating contagion) by means of the vessel's crew on lighters, or to employ for handling cargo local labourers under twenty-one days' quarantine, viz. :—

(a.) Vessels arriving from any port without a clean bill of health.

(b.) Vessels arriving from any port of France, Algeria, or the Regency of Tunis.

Vessels which have been in any of the above places, but which have afterwards been admitted to free pratique in other ports, shall not be admitted to free pratique in these islands before twenty-one days have elapsed from their departure from a port of France, Algeria, or the Regency of Tunis, and should such vessels produce a certificate to the effect that they have been thoroughly disinfected at an intermediate port the said period shall be reduced to eleven days.

4. Passengers.

(a.) Passengers arriving by any vessel subject to quarantine are required to undergo the same restrictions as the vessels on which they arrive.

(b.) Passengers will not be permitted to land at Malta unless they declare on oath to the Port of Authority that they have not resided or been in France, Algeria, or the Regency of Tunis for eleven days previous to their arrival.

The Government of the Danish Antilles has suppressed, from the 7th ultimo, the disinfection prescribed for the luggage of travellers arriving on board of vessels coming from German ports, as well as from Havre, St. Nazaire, and Bordeaux, but it maintains also with respect to these places the prohibition of the importation of linen and of worn clothes, as well as of rags and of other objects of specially contagious character.

By Decree of the 6th of the same month the said Government has established, on account of the epidemic of small pox prevailing in London, a quarantine of fifteen days with regard to vessels arriving from London at the Danish Antilles, or having been in communication with the said port, or during the voyage with vessels coming from the said port. It has at the same time imposed a quarantine of fifteen days, counting from the day of departure, on travellers coming from London, and ordered the disinfection of all linen, woollen effects, and used bed clothing which forms part of their baggage.

We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, correspond with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain; and we took a coin from each of such packets of Gold coins, making altogether two Two pound or forty shilling pieces, forty-nine Sovereigns or Twenty shilling pieces, and fifty-six Half-Sovereigns or Ten shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus two thousandths of an ounce ($\cdot 002$ oz.) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus six hundred thousandths (or $\cdot 00006$), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to Weight. We then took from such residue one Two pound piece, six Sovereigns, and six Half-Sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Two pound piece weighed 246.738, that such Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first 123.394, the second 123.264, the third 123.274, the fourth 123.354, the fifth 123.204, and the sixth 123.224; and that such Half-Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first 61.667, the second 61.637, the third 61.607, the fourth 61.667, the fifth 61.717, and the sixth 61.597. We then assayed the said Two pound piece, six Sovereigns, and six Half-Sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Two pound piece to be 916.60, of such Sovereigns to be 916.96, 916.80, 916.86, 916.80, 916.50, and 916.46 respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such Half-Sovereigns to be 916.76, 916.66, 916.70, 916.50, 916.60, and 916.46 respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of Silver coins, making altogether nineteen Crowns, eighteen Half-

Crowns, eight Florins, twenty-two Shillings, twenty-three Sixpences, one Fourpence, fifteen Threepences, one Twopence, and one Penny, and weighed each of the said Silver coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the said Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus nineteen thousandths of an ounce ($\cdot 019$ oz.) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to Weight. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus two ten thousandths (or $\cdot 0002$), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to Weight. We then took from such residue one Crown, one Half-Crown, one Florin, one Shilling, one Sixpence, and one Threepence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Crown weighed 435.263, that such Half-Crown weighed 217.531, that such Florin weighed 174.245, that such Shilling weighed 87.122, that such Sixpence weighed 43.496, and that such Threepence weighed 21.798. We then assayed the said Crown, the said Half-Crown, the said Florin, the said Shilling, the said Sixpence, and the said Threepence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Crown to be 926.3, of such Half-Crown to be 926.1, of such Florin to be 926.4, of such Shilling to be 925.7, of such Sixpence to be 926.0, and of such Threepence to be 925.8.
