TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), order, direct, and declare as follows:-

#### Definition.

1. In this Warrant-

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same:

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of

Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and British Central Africa viâ Cape Town.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant between the United Kingdom and British Central Africa there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage; that is to

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight one shilling and ninepence.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding seven pounds in weight for the first pound one shilling and ninepence, and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight one shilling and ninepence.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, there shall not be conveyed or tendered

The undermentioned Gentlemen to be Second | for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight seven pounds.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable as hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stumps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall, subject as hereinbefore mentioned, be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he thinks fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained or returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

Return and Deposit Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason;

the following provisions shall (subject to the provisions of the Warrant of the said Commissioners of the 12th day of December, 1888, relating to Foreign and Colonial Parcels) apply; (that is to say):

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the .... declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by post to the sender, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

.: (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of British Central Africa that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up : upon the personal application of the sender in or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

(4.) In any case the notice shall state that, in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel

during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such a manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

(6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:-

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery

of the Parcel.

(b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

(7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for re-direction or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882.

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rate fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not prepaid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a

Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Re-direction to places out of United Kingdom.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or British Central Africa is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

Re-direction to places within United Kingdom. .

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

#### Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

#### Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel—

(1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article, whether similar to the above or not; or

(2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(3.) Containing or bearing any letter or communication in the nature of a letter except a circular transmissible by book post.

(4.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of the United Kingdom or Cape Colony.

(5.) Exceeding in value the sum of fifty pounds or containing specie, bullion, gold dust, nuggets, or ostrich feathers.

(6.) Consisting of or containing:(a.) Any explosive substance.

(b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.

(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses; and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender

thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Post-master-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster- General not liable for Loss or Damage.

20. Nothing contained in or done under or inpursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

#### THE FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1893.

#### By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1892, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

#### Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as THE FOREIGN Animals Order of 1893.

2. This Order does not extend to Ireland.

#### Commencement.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect on the twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

#### Interpretation.

4.—(1.) In this Order-

The Board means the Board of Agriculture: The Act of 1878 means the Contagious

Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

The Acts of 1878 to 1892 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1892:

Cattle means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and °calves:

Animals means, except where it is otherwise expressed, cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:

Foreign, applied to animals and things, means brought to England or Wales or Scotland from any country out of the United Kingdom:

Foreign Animals Wharf means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing:

Admiralty Wharf means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board as a Foreign Animals Wharf for Naval purposes only:

Superintendent includes a foreman wharfinger or other person at the time being in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf:

Reception-lair, means a lair or other proper place adjacent or near to the landing stage, pier, quay, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf where animals are landed, and set apart for the reception of animals immediately after landing:

Lairage-men means men specially appointed by the occupiers of a Foreign Animals Wharf for the purpose of landing animals at such Wharf and feeding and watering and tending

them in a reception-lair:

Landing-Place for foreign animals means a part of a port approved or defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals not subject to slaughter or quarantine:

Disease includes, with the diseases specified in the Act of 1878 (that is cattle-plague, contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, footand-mouth disease, sheep-pox, and sheepscab', swinc-fever:

Swine-fever means the disease called or known as typhoid fever of swine, soldier, purples, red disease, hog cholera, or swine-plague:

Suspected means suspected of being diseased: Carcase means the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of such a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoors, horns oftal, or other part of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof;

Fodder means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals:

Litter means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals:

Master includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:

Other terms, unless it is otherwise expressed, have the same meaning and scope as in the Act of 1878.

(2.) Any Order, act or approval, made, done or given by the Privy Council under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, shall, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have been made, done or given by the Board, and this Order shall be construed accordingly.

(3.) Swine-fever shall be a disease for the purposes of the provisions of the Acts of 1878

to 1892 relating to foreign animals.

#### CHAPTER 1.—PROHIBITION.

#### Prohibited Countries.

5. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order shall not Le landed.

#### CHAPTER 2.—FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER.

Conditions of Landing.
6.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of Part I of the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878 and of this Chapter is, subject to the following conditions:

First. ... That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board . any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any of the following countries, namely...

Austria Hungary (including Bosnia and

. Herzegovina), , Belgium,

Denmark (excluding Iceland),

France, Germany,

Gibraltar,

Greece,

Italy, Malta,

Montenegro,

Morocco,

Natal,

Netherlands,

Norway,

Ottoman Dominions,

Portugal,

Portuguese State of East Africa,

Roumania,

Russia,

Servia,

Spain, Sweden,

Zululand,

or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Second. That the vessel has not within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any of the countries mentioned above in the first condition of this Article, or any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any of the countries mentioned above in the first condition of this Article, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Exception in favour of Admiralty Wharves.

7. The provisions of the ten following Articles of this Chapter shall not extend to any Admiralty Wharf; provision for Admiralty Wharves being made by the Admiralty Foreign Animals Wharves Order of 1884.

Regulations applying to Landing-Stage.

8.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Board, shall during the time of the landing of the animals be admitted to the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf at which the animals are landed, nor until such landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf has since the animals were landed been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All persons before leaving such landingstage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board may

direct or require.

#### Charge of Animals on Landing.

9.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, when landed, be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to move any animals so long as they remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs or of an Inspector of the Board except with the permission of the Commissioners or of the Inspector, as the case may be.

#### Disposal of Animals on Landing.

10. Animals when landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be driven by lairage-men to the nearest available reception-lair or lairs within the limits of the Wharf, there to await the examination of an Inspector of the Board, and shall not be allowed to come in contact with any animals other than those forming part of the same cargo.

Regulations applying to Reception-Lair.

11.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage-men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Board, shall be admitted to the reception-lair.

(2.) All persons before leaving the receptionlair shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board may direct or require.

(3.) The animals shall be examined in the reception-lair by an Inspector of the Board

during daylight.

(4.) If on such examination all the animals are found free from disease, the Inspector of the Board may permit the animals to be moved out of the reception-lair and into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of the Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals is or are found to be affected with disease, all the diseased animals being affected with one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which such Rules are

applicable for the time being therein.

(6.) If on such examination any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuro-pneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth disease, (d) sheep-pox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever are found to exist then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(7.) The slaughter of such animals under the Rules set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as

practicable.

Regulations applying to all Parts of Foreign Animals Wharf (other than Reception-Lair) on Detection of Disease.

12.—(1.) Where it appears to an Inspector of the Board that disease exists or has lately existed in any one or more animals in any particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair), all the diseased or suspected animals being affected with one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf and to any other part or parts of the Wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Board, there is or has been a diseased or suspected animal, and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(2.) If it appears to the Inspector of the Board that any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuropneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth disease, (d) sheeppox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever exist or have lately existed in any particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair) then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughterhouse or other part of the Wharf and to any other part or parts of the Wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Board, there are or have been any diseased or suspected animals, and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(3.) The slaughter of such animals under the Rules set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon

as practicable.

#### Feeding and Watering.

13.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Wharf or the person in charge thereof with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or consignees of the animals, and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the owners or consignees summarily.

(2.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient

supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or

milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Time for Slaughter.

14.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.

(2.) The slaughter of the animals may be commenced at any time after the landing thereof with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) The slaughter of the animals shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

#### Movement of Carcases, Manure &c.

15.—(1.) No carcase, offal, fodder, litter or dung or manure shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All offal (except such parts as are intended for human food) before being so removed from

the Wharf, shall be treated as follows:

(i.) Either such offal shall be boiled or scalded:
(ii.) Or such offal may, with a Licence from the Board, but not otherwise, be washed in the following solution, namely:—Carbolic acid or chloride of lime one part; and water forty parts:

and in either case such treatment shall be to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Board.

- (3.) All dung and manure shall, before being so removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.
- (4.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

#### Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf.

16. Where an animal in a Foreign Animals Wharf is affected with disease, the portion of the Wharf where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until

that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf. 17.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, or animals moved into a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Order, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Wharf.

- (2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Wharf shall apply to such animal.
- (3.) A Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Acts of 1878 to 1892 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in relation thereto.

### CHAPTER 3.—QUARANTINE. Quarantine Stations.

18. Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station must be intended for reshipment to a foreign country, or for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes, the proposed landing to be in each case approved by the Board on special application through the Commissioners of Customs.

### Animals intended for Reshipment to a Foreign Country.

19.—(1.) Reshipment Station in this Article means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station for the landing and quarantining of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country.

(2.) The landing of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country is subject to

the following conditions:

First. The animals must be landed at a Reshipment Station.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee of the animals or his agent declaring that each animal is intended for reshipment to a foreign country.

Third. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with contagious or infectious disease.

Fourth. The animals shall not be moved alive out of the Reshipment Station except into a vessel for exportation to a foreign country, and until reshipped shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Purposes of Exhibition, or for other Exceptional Purposes (other than Reshipment).

20.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals intended for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes (other than reshipment) at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is subject to the following conditions:

First. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee of the animals or his agent, declaring the purposes for which each animal is intended.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent, declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with disease.

Third. The animals when landed shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Fourth. The animals when landed shall be detained in the Station for such period as the Board in each case according to the circumstances direct.

Fifth. When moved thereout they shall be

accompanied by

(a.) a Certificate of an Inspector of the Board certifying that they are free from disease;

(b.) a Licence of an Inspector of the Board specifying the place to which and the person

to whom they are to be taken. Sixth. The Inspector of the Board giving the

Licence shall send a copy of the Licence to the Local Authority for the district in which the place to which the animals are to b taken is situate.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to take them to any other place or person.

#### Movement of Carcases.

21.-(1.) No carcase shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

#### Disinfection of Dung and Manure.

22. Dung and manure shall, before being removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

#### Disinfection of Quarantine Station.

23. Where an animal in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is affected with disease, the portion of the Station where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Quarantine Station.

24.-(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Quarantine

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Station shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Acts of 1878 to 1892 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in

relation thereto.

#### CHAPTER 4.—FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE.

#### Free Countries.

25.—(1.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries named in Part I of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to s'aughter or quaran-

(2.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, sheep brought from the country mentioned. in Part II of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject

the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall | under the Fifth Schedule of the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or quarantine.

(3.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals other than cattle brought from the country mentioned in Part III of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or quaran-

#### Lunding-Places for Foreign Animals.

26.—(1.) Foreign animals subject to the provisions of this Chapter shall not (except as specially provided by this Order) be landed at any place other than a Landing-Place for foreign animals.

(2.) Those foreign animals shall be landed in such manner, at such times, subject to such supervision and control, and under such Regulations, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

(3.) When landed they shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

(4.) No part of a Landing-Place for foreign animals shall be declared to be an Infected Place or part of an Infected Place except by the Board.

#### Conditions of Landing.

27.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for foreign animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America (provision as to which last-mentioned country is made by the third condition of this Article), or the Isle of Man.

Second. That, in the case of the landing of cattle, the vessel in which they are imported has not within twenty-eight days before taking them on board had on board any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North

America.

Third. That, in the case of the landing of cattle or swine, the versel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board had on board any cattle or swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the United. States of America.

Fourth. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported. entered any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America, or the Isle of Man.

Fifth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the sixth condition of this Article),

or Iceland, or New Zealand, or the Channel

(provision as to which last-mentioned country is made by the seventh condition of this

Article), or the Isle of Man.

Sixth. That none of the cattle imported have while on board the vessel been in contact with any cattle exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America.

Seventh. That none of the cattle or swine imported have while on board the vessel been in contact with any cattle or swine exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in the United States of America.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for foreign animals

unless and until-

(a.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and

(b.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this

Article.

#### Twelve Hours Detention.

28. Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be detained in the Landing-Place for foreign animals for at least twelve hours reckoned from the time of the landing of the last animal of the cargo, whether the whole cargo is landed continuously without intermission at one place or part thereof is landed at one place and part at another place, or parts thereof are landed at different times at the same plaçe.

Examination and Consequences.

29.-(1.) Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall not be moved from the Landing-Place for foreign animals, or be allowed to come in contact with any other animals, until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) The animals shall be examined by the Inspector of the Board during daylight, and such examination shall take place after the expiration of the twelve hours detention mentioned in the

last preceding Article.

- (3.) If on such examination all the animals landed from the same vessel are found free from disease, they may be moved from the Landing-Place for foreign animals and shall thereupon cease to be deemed foreign animals (except for the purpose of paragraph (7) of Section thirty of the Act of 1878): Provided that nothing in this paragraph applying to animals shall be deemed to extend or apply to the dung of such animals, nor to any fodder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings brought in the same vessel with such animals.
- (4.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with cattle-plague or foot-and-mou h disease, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are within the Landing-Place for foreign animals and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means

Islands, or the United States of America | to the Board. The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals within the Landing-Place for foreign animals so detained to be slaughtered.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with pleuro-pneumonia or sheep-pox or sheep-scab or swine-fever, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals of the same kind as the diseased animals which were brought in the same vessel with the diseased animal or animals (that is, all the cattle or all the sheep or all the goats or all the swine) amongst which the disease is found and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board. The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals of the particular kind so detained to be slaughtered.

(6.) The slaughter of the animals under paragraphs (4) and (5) of this Article shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

#### Continuance of One Cargo.

30.—(1.) For the purposes of this Chapter al! animals brought at the same time in the same vessel shall be deemed to continue and be one cargo during the time of the twelve hours or other period of detention, whether they are all landed continuously without intermission at one place, or some of them are landed at one place and some at another place, or some of them are landed at one time and some at another time at the same place.

(2.) Where an animal forming part of one cargo of foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter has not been kept separate from an animal forming part of another cargo of foreign animals, all the animals forming those two cargoes shall be dealt with as if they formed

one cargo.

#### Detention of Suspected Animals.

31. An Inspector of the Board may detain, for any period that he thinks necessary or profer, any foreign animal under this Chapter which he has reason to suspect is diseased or may introduce disease.

#### Movement of Animals, Carcases, Manure &c.

32.-(1.) No animal, carcase, fodder, litter, or dung or manure shall be removed from a Landing-Place for foreign animals, or from any lair or other place therein, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such animal or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be slaughtered, destroyed, or otherwise dealt with in accordance

with instructions given by the Board.

#### Disinfection of Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

33. Where an animal in a Landing-Place for foreign animals is affected with disease, the portion of the Landing-Place where the discased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

### Restriction on Use of Landing-Place for Foreign

34.-(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be at any time landed at or moved is to or kept in a Landing-Place for foreign animals.

(2.) Any animal being in a Landing-Place for

foreign animals shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Landing-Place shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Landing-Place for foreign animals shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Acts of 1878 to 1892 or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in rela-

tion thereto.

#### Lunding of other Foreign Animals.

35. Nothing in this Chapter shall prevent the landing of any foreign animal at a Foreign Animals Wharf if the owner of the animal or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, or the consignee thereof, so desires.

#### CHAPTER 5.—CHANNEL ISLANDS.

36. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Channel Islands are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine, but such animals shall be subject to the provisious of Chapter 4 of this Order (Foreign Animals not SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE).

#### CHAPTER 6.—ISLE OF MAN.

37. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Isle of Man are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine, or without being subject to the provisions of Chapter 4 of this Order (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT to Slaughter or Quarantine).

CHAPTER 7 .- LANDING AND DISPOSAL OF DUNG, Fodder, LITTER, UTENSILS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

38. All dung of foreign animals, and all fodder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings used for or about foreign animals, and all other dung, fodder or litter brought in the same vessel with foreign animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

Treatment of Dung, Fodder &c. of Animals which are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

39 .- (1.) All dung of foreign unimals that have not been or are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, and all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to, and all litter that has been used for or about, such animals, shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder or litter landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for

foreign animals.

Landing and Treatment of Dung, Fodder &c. of Animals which have been or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

40.—(1.) Dung of foreign animals that have · been or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, and partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall not be landed at any place without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate.

(2.) All such dung and all such partly consumed or broken fodder and all such litter. shall, when so landed, be forthwith well mixed. with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(3.) All other fodder and litter brought in the same vessel with such animals may be landed without the previous consent of the Local Authority, but shall, when landed, remain under the charge of an Officer of Customs, and such fodder and litter shall not be removed from the place where landed except with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs.

(4.) Utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings used for or about such animals shall not be landed at any place without the consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate unless they have been cleansed and disinfected previous to the landing thereof. If landed with such consent without having been previously cleansed and disinfected they shall be forthwith cleansed and disinfected by and at the expense of the owner, and shall not be removed or permitted to come in contact with any animals. until so cleansed and disinfected.

(5.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to the landing of any dung of such animals, nor to the landing of any fodder or litter, or any utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for foreign animals, nor to the treatment or disposal

of the same when landed thereat.

#### Removal of Utensils &c. from Foreign Animals Wharf or Station or Landing-Place.

41.—(1.) No utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings that have been used for or about animals and have been lauded from a vessel at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for foreign animals shall be removed from the Wharf or Station or Landing-Place except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions

from time to time given by the Board.

#### CHAPTER 8 .- DISINFECTION. Vessels.

42.—(1.) A vessel used for carrying foreign animals shall, after the landing of animals therefrom, and before the taking on board of any other animal or other cargo, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

(i.) All parts of the vessel with which animals or their droppings have come in contact

shall be scraped and swept: then

(ii.) The same parts of the vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then

(iii.) The same parts of the vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash:

except that

(iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.

2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel. shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

#### . Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

43.—(1.) A moveable gangway or passageway, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading of foreign animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of foreign animals, shall, as soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed as follows:

- (i.) The gangway or apparatus shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then
- (ii.) The gangway or apparatus shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the gangway or apparatus, and all dung, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

#### CHAPTER 9.-TRANSIT BY WATER.

#### Shorn Sheep.

44. Between each first day of November and the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive) shorn sheep (being foreign animals) shall not be carried on the deck of a vessel, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

#### Gangways for Sheep-Pens.

45. Where sheep (being foreign animals) are carried on the deck of a vessel, proper gangways shall be provided either between or above the pens in which they are carried.

#### Fittings of Vessels.

- 46. The following provisions shall apply to all vessels in or on which foreign animals are conveyed to any port or place in Great Britain except to those parts of any vessel in or on which cattle are conveyed across the Atlantic Ocean to any port or place in Great Britain (that is to şay):
- (i.) Every place used for animals on board a vessel shall be divided into pens by substantial divisions.
- (ii.) Each pen shall not exceed nine feet in breadth, or fifteen feet in length.
- (iii.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be strewn with a proper quantity of litter or sand or other proper substance, or be fitted with battens or other proper foot-holds.
- (iv.) Every such place, if inclosed, shall be ventilated by means of separate inlet and outlet openings, of such size and position as will secure a proper supply of air to the place in all states of weather.

Special Provisions as to Transatlantic Vessels conveying Cattle.

47. The following Regulations shall apply to all vessels in or on which cattle are conveyed across the Atlantic Ocean to any port or place in Great Britain (that is to say):

(Regulation A.—Parts of Vessel to be used.)

- (i.) Cattle shall not be carried on more than three decks.
- (ii.) Cattle shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other cattle are carried.
- (iii.) Cattle shall not be carried in any part of the vessel where in ordinary course of navigation they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or would interfere with the efficient working of the boats necessary for the persons on board.

Regulation B.—Pens and Fittings.)

(iv.) Every part of the vessel used for cattle shall be divided into pens.

- (v.) The stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens, whether of timber or iron, shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength and so adjusted as to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the cattle thrown against them.
- (vi.) Each pen shall be provided with proper battens to prevent the cattle from slipping, and which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise.

(vii.) Cattle shall be protected from the weather by proper and suitable shelters.

(Regulation C.—Space.)

(viii.) Not more than four cattle shall be carried in one pen, except where small store cattle are carried, in which case not more than five cattle shall be carried in one pen. Sufficient space shall be allotted in every pen to enable the cattle to properly feed and rest during the voyage.

(Regulation D.—Passage-Ways.)

(ix.) Between every two rows of cattle, and in front of every single row of cattle, there shall be a passage-way, the minimum width of which in any part of the vessel shall not be less than one foot and six inches free of obstruction.

Regulation E.—Ventilation.)

(x.) All enclosed portions of the vessel used for cattle shall be sufficiently ventilated (in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways) by cowls or other proper means for the admission of fresh air and the removal of foul air.

(Regulation F.—Light.)
(xi.) Proper and suitable arrangements shall be made to provide at all times adequate light for the proper tending of cattle.

(Regulation G.- Food and Water.)

(xii.) The cattle, while on board, shall be provided with a sufficient amount of water, and proper accommodation shall be provided on board for the stowage of food so that the same shall not be unduly exposed to the weather at sea.

(Regulation H.—Mode of securing Cattle.) (xiii.) Every head of cattle shall be securely tied by the head so as stand athwartships.

(Regulation J.—Attendance.)

(xiv.) Every consignment of cattle shall be in charge of a responsible foreman, who shall have under him competent assistants numbering with himself one for every twenty-five head of cattle, and proper and suitable accommodation for these persons shall be provided.

(Regulation K .- Injured Cattle.)

(xv.) In the case of cattle suffering from broken limbs or other serious injuries during the voyage, the master of the vessel shall cause such cattle to be forthwith slaughtered.

#### Detention.

48. Foreign animals landed from a vessel shall, on a certificate of an Inspector of the Board, certifying to the effect that the provisions of this Chapter, or some or one of them, have not or has not been observed in the vessel, be detained, at the place of landing, or in lairs adjacent thereto, until the Board otherwise direct.

#### CHAPTER 10.—MISCELLANEOUS.

#### Power to exclude Strangers.

49.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for foreign animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person, not having by law a right of entry or way into, on, or over that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, entering or going into, on, or over the same without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for foreign animals, is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person, not having by law a right to remain in or on that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, or in or on that particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other pertion thereof, failing to quit on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

#### Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

50.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for foreign animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering that Wharf or Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for loreign animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before leaving that Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(3.) An Inspector of the Board is tereby empowered to affix a notice at or near the entrance of any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for foreign animals to the effect that persons before leaving that particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of the Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(4.) Any person failing on request as aforesaid to comply with the terms of any such notice shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

#### Foreign Animals Injured on Voyage.

51. Subject to paragraph (xv.) (Regulation K.—Injured Cattle) of Article 47 of this Order, where a vessel comes into port having on board any foreign animal maimed or injured on the voyage, the owner, consignee, or other person in charge thereof, or the master of the vessel, shall, if directed by an Inspector of the Board, or may if he thinks fit, slaughter that animal immediately on its being landed; but the carcase of such animal shall not be removed from the place of landing or some lair or slaughter-house adjacent thereto approved by the Board without a certificate of the Inspector of the Board certifying that it is not likely to introduce disease.

Carcases of Animals Dying on Voyage.

52.—(1.) If a vessel arriving has on board the carcase of a foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule which was taken on board for the purpose of importation, but has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival, report the fact to the Principal Officer of Customs at the port.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission

in writing of the Principal Officer.

#### General Power of Detention.

53. Where it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule, or with respect to any fodder or other article, brought by sea, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seise and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the restoration thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

#### Duties of Local Authority and Police.

54. Where any provision or regulation relating to foreign animals is in operation, the Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspector of the Board to carry the same into effect and to enforce the same, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

#### Offences.

55.—(1.) If the slaughter of animals is not commenced at the time directed by the Board under this Order, or completed in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the person failing to cause such slaughter to be so commenced or completed shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If any dung of animals, or any fedder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, fittings, or other thing is landed or removed in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessec and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such dung or other thing is landed or removed, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(3.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence

against the Act of 1878.

(4.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Foreign Animals Wharf or Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or Landing-Place for foreign animals in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,—(as the case may be) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

- (5.) If an animal or a carcase or any manure is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal or of the carcase or of the manure, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal or carcase or manure, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.
- (6.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

#### THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

Rules for Foreign Animals Wharf on Detection of Disease.

[Articles 11 and 12.] PART I.

(Rule A .- Cattle-Plague.)

(i.) If the disease is cattle-plague, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that cattle-plague exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are then within such receptionlair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph

or other rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of cattle-plague, before leaving such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(Rule B.—Pleuro-Pneumonia.)

If the disease is pleuro-pneumonia, the Inspector of the Board shall cause the diseased cattle and all cattle that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows:

(a.) The diseased cattle shall be forthwith

slaughtered.

(b.) The cattle not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Board be taken charge of by the owners or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those cattle may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(Rule C.-Foot-and-Mouth Disease.)

(i.) If the disease is foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that foot-and-mouth disease exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other

rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of foot-and-mouth disease, before leaving the reception-lair,

or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(iv.) The occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf shall provide proper and suitable suits of overall clothes for the use of the lairage-men and other persons entering such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf. Such overall clothes are to be put on upon entering, taken off on leaving, and left in, the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall from time to time be properly disinfected with a solution of carbolic acid as directed by the Inspector of the Board.

(v.) The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, to be forthwith

slaughtered.

(Rule D.—Sheep-Pox.)

(i.) If the disease is sheep-pox, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that sheep-pox exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the sheep that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other

rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased sheep, or who has in any way come in contact or been with such sheep to take such means for preventing the spreading of sheeppox, before leaving the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(Rule E.—Sheep-Scab.)

If the disease is sheep-scab, the Inspector of the Board shall cause the diseased sheep and all sheep then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows:

(a.) The diseased sheep shall be forthwith

slaughtered.

(b.) The sheep not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Board be taken charge of by the owner or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those sheep may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(Rule F .- Swine-Fever.)

If the disease is swine-fever, the Inspector of the Board shall cause all the swine then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be forthwith slaughtered.

#### PART II.

(Rule G.—Cattle-Plague and Pleuro-Pneumonia or Foot-and-Mouth Disease or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swinc-Fever.)

If the diseases are cattle-plague and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) foot-and-mouth disease, (c) sheep-pox, (d) sheep-scab, and (e) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule A of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule H.-Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pex.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheeppox, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule J.-Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheepscab, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule K .- Pleuro-Pneumonia and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule L.—Foot-and-Mouth Disease and Fleuro-Pneumonia or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are foot-and-mouth disease and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) sheep-pox, (c) sheep-scab, and (d) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule C of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule M.-Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with that Rule.

(Rule N.—Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule O .- Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-scab and swine-fever, the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule,

(Rule P.-Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheeppox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

#### (Rule Q.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheeppox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

#### (Rule R.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheepscab and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

#### (Rule S.—Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are slieep-pox and sheep-scab and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D. and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

#### THE WARWICKSHIRE (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1893.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1892, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

#### Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as THE WARWICK-SHIRE (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1893.

#### Extent.

2. This Order shall extend only to the county of Warwick (including the borough of Warwick and also including the several parishes of Alderminster, Oldberrow, Shipston-on-Stour, Tidmington, Tredington, and Yardley in the county of Worcester, which borough and parishes have been transferred by agreement to the district of the Local Authority of the county of Warwick), and to the boroughs of Coventry and Leamington.

#### Commencement.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

#### Interpretation.

4. In this Order-

Parasitic mange means parasitic mange of horses, asses, or mules:

The Act of 1878 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

The Acts of 1878 to 1892 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1892: Inspector includes Veterinary Inspector:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878.

Extension of Definition of Animals and Disease.

5. Horses, asses, and mules shall be animals, and parasitic mange of horses, asses, and mules shall be a disease for the purposes of the following Sections of the Act of 1878 (namely):

Section thirty-one of the Act of 1878 (notice

of disease).

Section thirty-two of the Act of 1878 (Orders) Section fifty of the Act of 1878 (powers of

Section fifty-one of the Act of 1878 (powers of

inspectors)

and of all other Sections of that Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those Sections, including such Sections as provide for offences and procedure.

Notice of Disease.
6.-(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass, or mule affected with parasitic mange, or suspected of being so affected, shall with all practicable speed give notice of the fact of the horse, ass, or mule being so affected or suspected, to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the horse, ass, or mule so affected or suspected is.

(2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the

Local Authority.

Duty of Inspector to act immediately.

7. An Inspector of the Local Authority on receiving in any manner whatsoever information of the supposed existence of parasitic mange, or having reasonable ground to suspect the existence of parasitic mange, shall proceed with all practicable speed to the place where such parasitic mange, according to the information received by him, exists, or is suspected to exist, and shall see that the provisions of this Order are complied with.

Treatment for Purositic Mange.

8.—(1.) A person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass, or mule affected with parasitic mange, shall treat that horse, ass. or mule, or cause it to be treated, with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange.

(2.) If any person fails to comply with the requirements of this Article he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and Disinfection.

9.-(1.) The Local Authority may, for the purpose of preventing the spreading of parasitic mange, make Regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:

(a.) For providing for the cleansing and disinfection of places used by, and of utensils, mangers, feeding troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things used for or about, any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange:

(6.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and disinfection are to be effected:

(c.) For providing that such places, utensils, mangers, freding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things shall be cleansed and disinfected at the expense of the Local Authority, or of the owner, lessee, or occupier thereof.

(2.) If any person fails to cleanse and disinfect

any place or any utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing to be cleansed and disinfected, and to recover the expenses of such cleansing and disinfection from such person summarily.

General Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

10.—(1.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board of Agriculture a copy of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

(2.) If the Board of Agriculture are satisfied on inquiry with respect to any Regulation made by the Local Authority under this Order, that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Offences.

11. If anything is omitted to be done as regards the cleansing or disinfection of any place or thing in contravention of a Regulation of the Local Authority made under the authority of this Order, the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place, or the owner of the thing, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an effence against the Act of 1878.

W HEREAS the population of the said Parish of Saint Saviour, according to the last Census, exceeds two thousand persons;

And whereas at a Meeting of the Vestry of the said Parish, held, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Tuesday, the 29th day of November, 1892, a Resolution was passed to the effect that the provisions of the Vestries Act, 1850, should be applied to and put in force in the said Parish;

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish have made application in writing to Us, the Local Government Board, to give effect to the aforesaid Resolution:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the Vestries Act, 1850, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said Parish of Saint Saviour, and the provisions contained in Articles II, III, IV, and V of this Order shall apply to the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed to the said Parish.

ARTICLE II.—The duties of the Vestry Clerk shall be as follows, namely,—

To give notice of and attend the Meetings of Vestry and Committees appointed thereat.

To summon and attend Meetings of the Churchwardens, Vestry, and Overseers, when required, to enter the minutes thereof respectively, and, so far as his duties extend, to carry out whatever may, by any Resolution of the Churchwardens, Vestry, or Overseers, be directed to be done.

To prepare and publish lists of persons qualified to act as Vestrymen and Auditors.

To attend with every deputation which may be appointed by the Vestry.

To advise the Churchwardens, Vestry, and Overseers upon all questions referred to him. To conduct all correspondence of the Vestry and Overseers, including all correspondence arising from the audit of the Overseers' Accounts.

To keep the Account of such Charity Moneys as the Overseers or Churchwardens, as such, are authorized or are accustomed to distribute.

To keep the Vestry Books and the Parish deeds and documents, and the Rate Books and Accounts which are closed, and to give copies of and extracts from the same to any person entitled thereto, such person paying for the same at the rate of fourpence for every seventy-two words or figures, and to permit any person or persons rated to the relief of the Poor of the said Parish at all reasonable times to inspect the same or any of them, on pain of dismissal for neglecting to give such copies or permit such inspection.

To make out the Poor Rate, Sewers Rate, and General Rate, and procure the same to be allowed, and to give the notices thereof

required by law.

To prepare demands for the several Rates hereinbefore mentioned.

To prepare and issue the necessary process for recovering of arrears of such Rates respectively before the Justices, and procure the summons to be served, and to attend the Justices thereon, and advise the Churchwardens and Overseers as to the recovery of such arrears.

To assist the Overseers in making out their Accounts (whenever required by them), and, subject to the Rules and Regulations of the Commissioners for administering the laws for the relief of the poor, the Poor Law Board, or the Local Government Board in force for the time being, to examine from time to time the Accounts of the Collectors of the several Rates hereinbefore mentioned, and their returns of arrears.

To attend the Audit of Accounts of the Overseers.

To assist the Churchwardens or Overseers in preparing and making out all other Parochial Assessments and Accounts, and in examining the Accounts of the Collectors of such Assessments.

To make out provisional and supplemental Valuation Lists, and to inspect all properties in relation thereto, reporting on the cubical capacity of all premises where necessary.

To ascertain and make out the lists of persons liable to serve on Juries, and to cause them to be printed and duly published and returned to the Justices.

To give the notices for claims to vote for Members of Parliament and to make out lists of voters, and to get the same printed and published and duly returned according to law, and to attend the Court for revising
