THE Queen has been graciously pleased to appoint Alfred Sharpe, Esq., to be Her Majesty's Consul for the Territories under British influence to the North of the Zambesi.

THE Queen has been pleased to approve of Mr. William Rönnefeldt as Austro-Hungarian Consul for Cardiff and Newport; of Mr. Peter Andreas Paulsen as Danish Consul at Manchester; of Mr. Guy Weir Hogg as Swedish and Norwegian Consul at Jamestown, St. Helena; of Mr. Marshall Hanger as United States Consul at Bermuda; and of Mr. Eugène Stephen Dubief as French Vice-Consul at Sierra Leone.

THE Queen has been pleased to give directions for the appointment of George Melville, Esq., C.M.G. (Colonial Secretary designate of Barbados, and lately administering the Government of the Falkland Islands), to be Colonial Secretary for the Bahama Islands.

THE Queen has been pleased to grant unto Albert Cantrell Hubbersty, of Felley Abbey, in the union of Basford, in the county of Nottingham, Esquire, late Major and Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel, 3rd Battalion, Derbyshire Regiment, Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding and Honorary Colonel (1892), 1st Battalion, Nottinghamshire (Robin Hood) Rifle Volunteers, in the Commission of the Peace for the counties of Derby and Nottingham, Her Royal licence and authority that he and his issue may take and henceforth use the surname of Cantrell in addition to and before that of Hubbersty, and that he and they may bear the arms of Cantrell quarterly with their own family arms; such arms being first exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's said College of Arms.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 4th February, 1894, from Her Majesty's Representative at Athens, giving the following additional information as to quarantine against Turkey:—

Medical inspection is substituted for quarantine on arrivals from the Dardanelles and all Turkish ports and islands (including Samos) in the Mediterranean, with the exception of Salonica, for vessels sailing on and after the 28th ultimo.

The quarantine already in force against Salonica, Constantinople, the Bosphorus, and Turkish Black Sea ports remains unchanged.

The decree ordaining the above regulation is dated the 1st instant.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 7th February, 1894, from Her Majesty's Representative at Stockholm, stating that the Swedish cholera observation station of Köpstadö is now closed, and the quarantine station at Känsö used as an observation station.

A Despatch, dated 8th February, also states that the Swedish Authorities have declared the Belgian Province of Hainault infected with cholera from the 6th instant.
