

which has left port before receiving a special licence; and every vessel which before leaving port has received a special licence, and every authorized vessel to which such flag shall have been delivered, shall carry such flag during the period of time and in the waters in which fur-seal fishing is allowed by the recited Act, and shall hoist it at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by such notice.

(c.) A Secretary of State may give such further provisional directions as he may deem necessary for the due observance of the provisions of the recited Act and this Order, and any such directions, on being published in such manner as he may direct, shall be observed as if they were contained in this Order.

4. This Order may be cited as "The Behring Sea Award Order in Council, 1894."

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., the Most Honourable the Marquis of Ripon, K.G., two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following Statute, made on the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, by the Governing Body of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

A STATUTE to amend under the powers of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 a Statute framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 88 in relation to the College of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge such amending Statute being duly made at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four and passed at such meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Whereas the Cambridge University Commissioners appointed under the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 88 on the twenty-ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine made the following Statute which was confirmed by Her Majesty the Queen in Council on the twenty-second day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty:

STATUTE respecting Scholars from Sedbergh School.

"That from the date hereof no further election be made of any Scholar on the Foundation of Roger Lupton, D.D., or of Henry Hebblethwaite.

"That in the place of the Scholarships founded by the said Roger Lupton and Henry Hebblethwaite, there be established Six Exhibitions, of the yearly value of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence each, to be called Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibitions.

"That each of the said Exhibitions be tenable for three years.

"That Two of the said Exhibitions be filled up by the College in the first term of ordinary residence for Undergraduate Students, in the

"year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, Two in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, Two in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and so on for ever.

"That those Students only be admitted as Candidates who have been Scholars of Sedbergh School for at least two years.

"That at each annual election a preference be always given to a native of the parish of Sedbergh in electing to one of the Two Exhibitions (if such an one on presenting himself for examination be found competent).

"That in the event of a vacancy occurring during the three years for which any Exhibition is tenable, a new Exhibitioner be elected by the College on the same conditions as at the ordinary yearly elections, and that the Exhibition so filled up be tenable for such period only as the Exhibitioner originally elected in the ordinary manner would have held it.

"That any Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibitioner be eligible for any Scholarship, Sizarship, or other College emolument, not being a second Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibition; and that in the event of his being elected, his Exhibition be tenable with such Scholarship, Sizarship, or other College emolument.

"That if, on the occasion of a vacancy of any Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibition, no Candidate should present himself who had been a Scholar of Sedbergh School for the space of two years aforesaid, or none such of sufficient merit to deserve to be elected, the Exhibition or Exhibitions then to be filled up be treated as open to general competition."

And whereas under the Act 40 and 41 Vict. c. 48 s. 54 (hereinafter called the Act) it is enacted that a Statute made by the Commissioners nominated by the Act for a College and any Statute Ordinance or Regulation made by or in relation to a College under any Authority other than that of the Act should after the cesser of the powers of the Commissioners be subject to alteration from time to time by Statute made by the College under the Act and not otherwise the same being passed at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the College specially summoned for this purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the persons present and voting.

And whereas it has been represented to us the Master and Fellows of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) and we are of opinion that the usefulness of the said Exhibitions would be increased if their value were greater.

We the said Master and Fellows of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th Section of the Act amend the said Statute respecting Scholars from Sedbergh School as hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the Statute following that is to say—

STATUTE for Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibitions.

"In place of the six Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibitions now established in St. John's College there shall be established three Exhibitions of the yearly value of £66 13s. 4d. to be called Lupton and Hebblethwaite Exhibitions.

"Each of the said Exhibitions shall be tenable for three years.

"The election of the Exhibitioners shall be vested in the Council of the College and the intellectual qualifications of candidates shall be ascertained in such manner as the said Council shall from time to time determine.

"One of the said Exhibitions shall be filled up in the year 1894 one in the year 1895 and one in the year 1896 and so on for ever.
