#### PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Koom is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two doys previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presenta-tion cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in should communicate with the heads of their

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirtyfour; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, in the words following, that is to say:--

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Sparkhill in the parish of Yardley in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said-church of Saint John the Evangelist situate

at Sparkhill as aforesaid.
"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John James Stewart Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Yardley which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Sparkhill as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Sparkhill.'

"And with the like consent of the said John James Stewart Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Sparkhill as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of

the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"The district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Sparkhill being:

"All that part of the parish of Yardley in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon part of the east by the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acock's Green upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Cyprian Hay Mill, both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north by the new parish of Christ Church Sparkbrook in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese aforesaid, upon the west partly by the new parish of Balsall Heath, and partly by the new parish of Moseley both in the said county of Worcester and in the diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south and upon the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Moseley from the parish of Yardley aforesaid, at the junction of Wake Greenroad with the road called or known as College Hill and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stratford-road and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Redding-lane and extending thence northward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of seventy-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with Warwick-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of twenty-four and a half chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the eastern end of the houses situate on the northern side of the said last-named road and called or known as Sunrise Villas at the junction of the same road with the lane leading to Tyseley Farm upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Yardley from the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acock's Green aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and. Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Worcester. C. L. Peel.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial " of the dead in England beyond the limits of the "Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning " the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burialground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health no new burial-ground should be opened in the parish of Saint Asaph, in the county of Flint, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that in the parish cemetery at Saint Asaph the Regulations hereinafter set forth should be observed:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the tenth day of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial

T the Court at Windsor, the 30th day of ground shall be opened in the parish of Saint Asaph, in the county of Flint, without "the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that in the parish cemetery at Saint Asaph the following Regulations shall be observed :-

I. The burial ground shall be effectually fenced, and, if necessary, underdrained to such a depth as will prevent water remaining in any

grave or vault.

II. The area to be used for graves shall bedivided in grave spaces, to be designated by convenient marks, so that the position of each may be readily determined, and a corresponding plan kept on which each grave space-shall be shown.

III. No earthen grave shall be dug within one-

foot of any other grave.

IV. A register of graves shall be kept in which the name, age, and date of burial in each shall be duly registered.

V. No body shall be buried in any vault or walled grave unless the coffin be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is by properly cemented stone or brick work which shall never be disturbed.

VI. One body only shall be buried in any common earthen grave on the same day, unless the bodies be those of members of the same family; and every coffin shall be forthwith covered with earth at least a foot thick, which shall be closely rammed down never to be

again disturbed.

VII. No unwalled grave shall be re-opened within fourteen years after the burial of a person above twelve years of age, or within eight years after the burial of a child under twelve years of age, unless to bury another member of the same family; in every case a layer of earth not less than one foot thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; but if, on re-opening any grave, the soil be found to be offensive, such soil shall not be disturbed, and in no case shall human remains be removed from the

VIII. No coffin shall be buried in any unwalled grave within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall not. be less than three feet below that level.

PATTISHALL.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Pattishall, in the county of Northampton; and also in the churchyard, after the first March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brick-

work properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

BLAENAVON. - Forthwith and entirely in the Old Horeb Baptist Chapel and chapelyard, in the parish of Blaenavon, in the county of

Monmouth.

'GLEMSFORD .- Forthwith and entirely in Ebenezer Baptist Chapel, in the parish of Glemsford, in the county of Suffolk, and also in the chapelyard, within three feet of any dwelling; and in the rest of the chapelyard,

except as follows :-

In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the chapelyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

RINGSTEAD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel and chapelyard in the parish of Ringstead, in the county of Northampton.

COWBRIDGE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel in the parish of Cowbridge, in the county of Glamorgan; and also in the chapelyard except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the chapelyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

BOLAS MAGNA.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Bolas Magna, in the county of Salop; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brick-

work properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many

the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

CODDENHAM. - Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Coddenham, in the county of Suffolk; and also in the churchyard, after the thirtieth September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brick-

work properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

SUTTON-WITH-DUCKMANTON.-Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Sutton-with-Duckmanton, in the county of Derby; and also in the churchyard except as follows :-

In such reserved grave spaces now existing in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water, burials may be allowed of Mrs. Fanny Susan Arkwright and Mrs. Maria Anderson Humble in vaults or graves not less than five feet deep.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the

14th day of June next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said 14th day of June.

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many

therein at the date of this Order, viz., widows and widowers as can be buried at or below that depth.

YNYSCYNHAIARN. - Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Ynyscynhaiarn, in the county of Carnarvon; and also in the churchyard except as follows:-

(a., In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein he separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly

(b.) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at this date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

FEN DITTON .- Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Fen Ditton, in the county of Cambridge; and also in the churchyard, after the thirty-first October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, except as follows:

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at this date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz.: widows and widowers as can be buried at or below that depth.

COMBE HAY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Combe Hay, in the county of Somerset; and also in the churchyard, after the thirtieth June one thousand eight hundred

and ninety-four, except as follows:—
(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

"An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates:

THE CANADIAN CATTLE (SLAUGHTER AND EXAMINATION) ORDER OF 1894.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under

the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1893, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Order applicable to Canadian Cattle.

1. The provisions of this Order, except where otherwise expressed, shall apply only to cattle brought from Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (in this Order called Canadian cattle) to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, and such provisions are in addition to and not in substitution for any other provisions applicable to cattle landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

# Canadian Cattle to be Landed at certain Specified Wharves.

2. Canadian cattle may be landed at any of the Foreign Animals Wharves specified in the Schedule to this Order and shall not be landed at any other Foreign Animals Wharf.

Canadian Cattle to be Marked and Isolated.

3. Canadian cattle shall, as soon as practicable after being placed in the reception-lair in the Foreign Animals Wharf, and before they are moved from such reception-lair, be marked by and at the expense of the owner or his agent or the consignee, by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail and by the clipping of a broad arrow, about five inches long, on the left hind quarter, and shall, until they are slaughtered, be kept in lairs apart from all cattle other than Canadian cattle.

Canadian Cattle to be Slaughtered in Special Slaughter-Houses.

4.—(1.) Canadian cattle shall be slaughtered in slaughter-houses specially appropriated for the purpose by the owners of the Foreign Animals Wharf with the approval of an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture, and animals other than Canadian cattle shall not be moved into such slaughter-houses whilst so appropriated.

(2) During the time that any such slaughterhouse is so appropriated a notice shall be kept affixed at or near to the entrances thereof to the effect that such slaughter-house is specially appropriated and is to be used for the slaughter of Canadian cattle only and that no other animals

are admitted.

(3.) The slaughter of the cattle shall take place, during such time as the Board of Agriculture may from time to time by notice in writing direct.

Lungs of Canadian Cattle to be Examined.
5.—(1.) No carcases or portions of carcases of Canadian cattle shall be removed from any slaughter-house so appropriated as aforesaid except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture, and in no case shall the lungs of Canadian cattle be removed from the Foreign Animals Wharf until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed into any slaughter-house appropriated under this Order, the carcases or portions of carcases of any animals other than the carcases or portions of carcases of Canadian cattle slaughtered under the provisions of this

Order.

Offences.

6. If the owner of any Canadian cattle or his agent or the consignee of the cattle or any other person moves any head of cattle or removes any carcase or portion of a carcase in contravention of this Order, such owner, agent, consignee, or person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

Interpretation.

7. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1893.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as THE CANADIAN. CATTLE (SLAUGHTER AND EXAMINATION) ORDER. OF 1894.

Commencement.

9. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.

REGULATIONS respecting Competitive Examinations for Clerkships in the Second Division of the Civil Service. N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

1. Competitive Examinations of Candidates for Clerkships in the Second Division of the Civil Service will be held from time to time at such places as may be deemed expedient.

2. These Examinations are open, under such general restrictions as may be laid down, to all

natural-born subjects of Her Majesty, being of the prescribed age, and of good health and character. The undermentioned restrictions are at present in force :-

(i.) The following classes of persons are in-

eligible, viz.:-

Persons actually serving in the Army and Navy; and Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of less than five years' service.

(ii.) The following classes of persons will not be eligible unless they produce to the Civil Service Commissioners the written permission of the authorities of their department to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition, viz.:-(a) Persons holding situations in the Civil Service; (b) Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of more than five years' service; (c) Apprentices in Her Majesty's Dockyards, and Engineer Students in the Navy.

(iii.) Persons who have been trained in Normal Schools at the public expense will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Committee of Council on Education, Great Britain, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil

Service Commissioners.

(iv.)   - 9. English History.
  - 10. Book-keeping.

6. The number of persons to be selected for the Second Division at each Examination will be published as part of the notice of every such Examination.

7. Each competitor placed on the list for the Second Division of the Civil Service will remain thereon until he attains the age of 25 years,

unless in the meantime he has been appointed to a situation in some public office.

Candidates on completing their 25th year, or on receiving appointments, will be removed from

the list.

8. From this list the Civil Service Commissioners, on the application of Departments having vacancies, will supply, on probation, the requisite Clerks, whether for permanent or temporary duty. Selections will, as a general rule, be made by the Civil Service Commissioners according to the order of the names on the list; but the Civil. light shows white.

With  $7\frac{1}{4}$  feet and upwards the light shows white with groups of coloured flashes at intervals of eighty seconds. The flashes in each group are shown at intervals of five seconds, each red flash adding 3 feet 4 inches more to the initial height of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  feet, and each green flash 10 inches more.

With a rising tide, the fixed light, whether red or white, is eclipsed for a short period every eighty seconds; and, with a falling tide, the fixed light, white or green, is eclipsed twice in quick succession during the same period.

At or near high water, the light is not eclipsed. When the fixed white light is varied by groups of coloured flashes, the eclipse takes place about the middle of the interval separating the groups.
