

scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice being a rectory of Saint Mary in the town and county of the town of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester between that benefice and a certain other benefice being the new parish and vicarage of Saint James, Bernard-street, in the same town county and diocese.

"Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester is the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, and also of the said benefice of Saint James, Bernard-street.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Saint James, Bernard-street, is at present insufficiently endowed and that the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, has endowments of such an amount as that, after the apportionment hereinafter recommended and proposed shall have been made out of the same endowments, the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, is of opinion and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish of Saint James, Bernard-street by that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, is now full of a clerk, and the rector or incumbent thereof, the Reverend Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce, Clerk in Holy Orders, is willing that the said apportionment shall be made accordingly and has executed this scheme in token of such his willingness.

"And whereas there are held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for and for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, and as part of the endowments thereof, a sum of three thousand three hundred and eleven pounds eight shillings and seven pence, Three pounds per centum India Stock.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury, acting as Archbishop of the Province within which each of the said two benefices is situate and with the consent of the said Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, acting as such Bishop and also as patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices and with the consent of the said Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce, acting as rector or incumbent as aforesaid of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and as from the day on which any such Order of Your Majesty in Council shall be published in the London Gazette the sum of three thousand three hundred and eleven pounds eight shillings and seven pence three pounds per centum India Stock aforesaid shall cease to be so held by us in trust for and for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Southampton, as part of the endowments of the same benefice, and shall be held by us in trust for and for the benefit of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said new parish and vicarage of Saint James Bernard-street the dividends from time to

time accruing on the said sums of Stock to be paid to the said vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said new parish and vicarage of Saint James, Bernard-street.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council has been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Order; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows, viz.:—

In the parish churchyard of Saint Helen's, Auckland, in the county of Durham, until the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.
