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THE following Address from the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, was presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on the occasion when, as representing Her Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness opened the Tower Bridge, on Saturday, the 30th June, 1894:—

The Right Honourable H. H. Asquith, Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, was in attendance on His Royal Highness.

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Councillors of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, desire at the conclusion of the great work of constructing the new Tower Bridge, which was commenced as far back as June, 1886, to again welcome the presence of Your Royal Highness on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, to inaugurate an example of Magnificent Engineering, of such vast importance to our fellow Citizens and the dwellers in the East end of London, both North and South of the Thames.

The Tower Bridge at its commencement was estimated to be completed in four years, and to cost £750,000. The works, however, have involved sufficient magnitude and difficulty to require the sanction of Parliament for double the time for completion of the Bridge and its approaches, the cost of which will reach the sum of £1,184,000, the whole of which large amount will be provided by our Bridge House Estates Committee out of the funds under their care and management, and without any cost whatever to the Ratepayers.

We anticipate that the work thus happily completed, to the infinite credit of all who have been engaged upon it will be not only an ornament to the Metropolis, but a lasting benefit to those for whose use it is specially intended.

We desire, in conclusion, to express our abiding devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty the Queen, who we feel is in this great and important ceremony with us in heart, and our sincere and earnest acknowledgments for the attendance here of Your Royal Highness as Her Most Gracious Majesty's Representative, and the ever-welcome presence of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, to whom, with Your Royal Highness, we pray that all blessings may be vouchsafed.

"IT is a great satisfaction to the Princess of Wales and Myself to be permitted on behalf of The Queen, My dear Mother, to open the Tower Bridge across the River Thames; and We thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address on the occasion.

"This Bridge will be an enduring Monument of the well directed Energy and public Spirit of the Corporation of London; it will also serve as an Example of the splendid engineering Skill bestowed on its Construction.

"Uniting two busy and populous Districts of the Metropolis the Bridge will afford immensely increased Facilities of Communication and be of the greatest Service to the industrious Inhabitants of these Districts; while from its ingenious and admirable Arrangements it will not interfere with the Navigation of the River.

"We heartily thank you for the Cordial Welcome we have received, and I shall not fail to communicate to the Queen your Assurances of Loyalty and Devotion to Her Majesty."

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Martin Brighouse and of the new parish of Lightcliffe both in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the tenth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three and published in the London Gazette on the eighth day of March following a part of the parish of Halifax in the said county of York and at that time in the diocese of Ripon was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church of Saint Martin Brighouse situate within the limits of such parish and the same chapelry district was called 'The Chapelry District of Saint Martin Brighouse.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-fifth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six and published in the London Gazette on the third day of March following a part of the said parish of Halifax was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church of Saint Matthew situate at Lightcliffe within the limits of the same parish and the same chapelry district was called 'The Chapelry District of Lightcliffe.'

"And whereas both the said chapelry district of Saint Martin Brighouse and the said chapelry district of Lightcliffe have under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become new parishes of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-

seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas both the said new parishes are now within the limits of the diocese of Wakefield as aforesaid.

"And whereas it has been represented and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Martin Brighouse and of the said new parish of Lightcliffe should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Walsham Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Lightcliffe and of the said new parish of Saint Martin Brighouse shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Lightcliffe which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Martin Brighouse.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Lightcliffe in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Martin Brighouse in the same county and diocese being :—

"All that part of the said new parish of Lightcliffe which is comprised within the limits of the municipal borough of Brighouse as those limits are defined in the first schedule of the Royal Charter of Incorporation creating the said borough which is dated the tenth day of August in the fifty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Wakefield.

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Staines in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Staines which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Staines have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts or of some or one of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act to the Minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-mentioned Act and to his successors and when the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the last-mentioned Act then to the incumbent of such new parish and to his successors a grant of one hundred and twenty pounds per annum.

“And whereas such grant as aforesaid will be made by an Instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“And whereas by a certain Deed of Indenture bearing date on or about the fifteenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844, and 1856 or some or one of them and being under the hand and seal of the Reverend John Hopkins Armstrong the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Staines and being also under the hand and seal of the Right Honourable Farrer Baron Herschell Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain as the patron on behalf of Your Majesty in right of the Crown of the said vicarage and being also under

the hand and episcopal seal of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London as such Bishop and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England (which deed has been enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said John Hopkins Armstrong did grant and confirm unto the minister or incumbent of the herein proposed district or new parish and his successors one perpetual clear yearly rent charge or net annual sum of seventy-five pounds to be payable out of the revenues of the said vicarage half-yearly on the twenty-fifth day of March and twenty-ninth day of September in every year such yearly rent charge to take effect and come into operation upon and from the next avoidance of the said vicarage of Staines.

“And whereas Sir Edward Clarke Knight one of Your Majesty's Counsel and a Member of the Commons House of Parliament has contributed and paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners a sum of one thousand pounds towards the endowment of the herein proposed district or new parish.

“And whereas the said Sir Edward Clarke has paid over to us a further sum of two thousand pounds to be held by us towards the cost of the provision of a permanent church for the same proposed district or new parish.

“And whereas the said two sums of one thousand pounds and two thousand pounds respectively have been so paid as aforesaid by the said Sir Edward Clarke upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas we have undertaken to pay in respect of the said sum of one thousand pounds and so long as it shall remain in our hands by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year a sum of thirty pounds to the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish.

“And whereas we have undertaken to repay to the said Sir Edward Clarke his heirs or assigns the said sum of one thousand pounds when and so soon as the deed of indenture above referred to shall have taken effect and the said charge of seventy-five pounds upon the revenues of the vicarage of Staines shall have become payable to the minister or incumbent of the herein proposed district or new parish.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Staines which is mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Peter Staines.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the

law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Sir Edward Clarke for his life and shall after his death be vested in and be exercised by his wife Dame Katherine Matilda Clarke (should she survive him) for her life and that after the deaths of the said Sir Edward Clarke and of his said wife the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish shall be vested in and shall and may be exercised alternately by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and his successors for the time being and in and by the Lord Bishop of the said diocese of London and his successors for the time being the first of such alternate turns of patronage to be exercised by the Lord High Chancellor for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Peter Staines being:—

"All that part of the parish of Staines in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded upon the east partly by the parish of Ashford and partly by the parish of Laleham both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south-east the south the south-west and the west by the River Thames or in other words upon the south-east and upon the south by the parish of Chertsey in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester upon the south-west by the parish of Thorpe upon the west by the parish of Egham both in the last-named county and diocese and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Egham from the parish of Staines aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the Staines and Wokingham line of the London and South-Western Railway over the River Thames aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of twenty-eight and three-quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with the line of the Windsor Staines and South-Western Junction Railway and extending thence first south-eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-named line of railway for a distance of sixty-three and one quarter chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Staines from the parish of Ashford aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish of Staines, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and

every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Littlewick, in the parish of White Waltham, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Littlewick as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of White Waltham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Littlewick as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Littlewick.'

"And with the like consent of the said William, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Littlewick as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the

taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference:—

"The district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Littlewick comprising:—

"All that portion of the parish of White Waltham (which for all ecclesiastical purposes is united to and held with the parish of Shottesbrook) in the county of Berks and in the diocese of Oxford which said portion of the parish of White Waltham aforesaid is bounded upon the west partly by the said parish of Shottesbrook and partly by the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Peter Knowl Hill in the said county and diocese upon the north-west by the last-named new parish upon the north by the consolidated chapelry of Stubbings in the same county and diocese upon the north-east partly by the said consolidated chapelry of Stubbings and partly by the new parish of All Saints Boyne Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints Boyne Hill from the parish of White Waltham aforesaid at a point in the middle of the main line of the Great Western Railway near to Waltham Siding and distant one chain and a half or thereabouts to the south-west of a mile-post situate on the north-western side of the said main line of railway and indicating a distance of twenty-six miles from London and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of seventy-two chains or thereabouts to the centre of Blackmill's Bridge which carries the road leading from Cherry Garden-lane towards Knowl Hill over the said line of railway and extending thence generally north-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of sixty-one chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of White Waltham from the parish of Shottesbrook aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Christ Church Parkgate is vested in the Archbishop of York and his successors in right of his See.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Farrer, Baron Herschell now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple Archbishop of York have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices may be assigned and transferred by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1878.
41 Vict., c. 16, s. 58.

NIGHT WORK. MALE YOUNG PERSONS ABOVE 16.
Order of Secretary of State extending Special Exception.

WHEREAS the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, section 58, contains a special exception to the effect that nothing in the Act shall prevent the employment, in factories to which the exception applies, of male young persons during the night, if they are employed in accordance with the following conditions :

- (1.) The period of employment shall not exceed 12 consecutive hours, and shall begin and end at the hours specified in the notice in the Act mentioned ; and
- (2.) The provisions of Part One of the Act with respect to the allowance of times for meals to young persons during the period of employment shall be observed, with the necessary modifications as to the hour at which the times allowed for meals are fixed ; and

(3.) A male young person employed during any part of the night shall not be employed during any part of the 12 hours preceding or succeeding the period of employment ; and

(4.) A male young person shall not be employed on more than 6 nights, or in the case of blast furnaces or paper mills 7 nights, in any two weeks :

And the said Act declares that the provisions of the Act with respect to the period of employment on Saturday, and with respect to the allowance to young persons of 8 half holidays in every year or of whole holidays in lieu of them, shall not apply to a male young person employed in day and night turns in pursuance of this exception :

And whereas this special exception is by the Act applied to the factories specified in Part Six of the Third Schedule thereto, but power is given to a Secretary of State to extend such exception to other classes of non-textile factories and workshops :

And whereas it has been proved to my satisfaction that in non-textile factories of the class

mentioned in the schedule hereunder it is necessary, by reason of the nature of the business requiring the process to be carried on throughout the night, to employ male young persons of sixteen or upwards at night, and that such employment will not injure the health of the male young persons employed :

Now I, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under section 58 of the said Act, extend the said exception to factories of such class so far as regards male young persons of sixteen or upwards.

This Order shall come into effect on 5th July, 1894, and shall continue in force until revoked.

RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

Rules of the Supreme Court, July, 1894.

Order XXX, Rule 7.

Evidence.

1. On the hearing of the summons, the Court or a Judge may order that evidence of any particular fact, to be specified in the order, shall be given by statement on oath of information and belief, or by production of documents or entries in books, or by copies of documents or entries or otherwise as the Court or Judge may direct.

Order XXXV, Rule 5A.

District Registrars.

2. At the end of Order XXXV, Rule 5, add :—
(g.) Interpleader Orders.

Order XXXVII, Rule 4A.

Distribution of Property ; Evidence.

3. In any case relating to the distribution of any property whether in Court or out of Court, the Judge may, in order to avoid expense and delay, admit as evidence statements on oath of information and belief, and such other evidence as having regard to the circumstances of the case may be reasonable. As regards proceedings in Chambers, the Judge may exercise his discretion under this Rule, without any formal application, by giving directions to the Chief Clerk in any particular case as to the nature of the evidence to be admitted.

Order XLVI, Rule 1.

Meaning of "Company" and "Stock."

4. In the following Rules of this Order the expression "company" includes the Governor and Company of the Bank of England and any other public company, whether incorporated or not, and the expression "stock" includes shares, securities, and dividends thereon.

Order XLVI, Rule 2.

Application for and Effect of Charging Order.

[1 & 2 Vict., c. 110, s. 14 ; 3 & 4 Vict., c. 82 s. 1.]

5. If a judgment debtor is interested in any stock standing in the books of any company or in any stock or funds in Court standing in the name of the Paymaster-General, the Court or a Judge, upon the *ex parte* application of the judgment creditor, may order the judgment debtor to show cause why the stock or funds, or any part thereof, should not be charged with the payment of the judgment debt and interest, and upon the

making of the order the judgment creditor shall be entitled to all the remedies which he would have been entitled to if the charge had been made in his favour by the debtor ; provided that no proceeding shall be taken to have the benefit of the charge until after the expiration of six months from the date of the order.

Order XLVI, Rule 3.

On Making of the Order no Transfer to be Made except by Directions of the Court or Judge.
[1 & 2 Vict., c. 110, ss. 14, 15.]

6. Upon the making of an order under the last preceding Rule, no transfer of any stock affected thereby shall be made until the order is made absolute or discharged, and if after notice thereof to the company whose stock is affected thereby, and before the order is made absolute or discharged, the company permits any transfer of the stock to be made, the company shall be liable to the judgment creditor for the value of the stock so charged and transferred, or such part thereof as may be sufficient to satisfy the judgment, and no disposition of the judgment debtor in the meantime shall be valid or effectual as against the judgment creditor ; provided that where the stock is standing in the name of the Paymaster-General the order shall not prevent the company from permitting a transfer of the stock or payment of the income thereof in such manner as the Court or Judge may direct.

Order XLVI, Rule 3A.

Order to be made Absolute unless Cause Shown.
[1 & 2 Vict., c. 110, s. 15.]

7. The Order, upon proof of notice thereof to the judgment debtor or his solicitor, shall, unless the judgment debtor within the time mentioned in the order shows cause to the contrary, be made absolute, but the Court or a Judge may vary or discharge the order upon the application of the judgment debtor or any person interested.

Order XLVI, Rule 8.

Effect of Service of Affidavit and Filed Notice.

8. A company upon whom the office copy of the affidavit and the duplicate of the filed notice have been served, shall not permit the stock specified in the notice to be transferred, or any dividends thereon to be paid until after a day specified in a notice in writing served by the company upon the person by whom the notice under Rule 4 of this Order was filed, or upon his solicitor, stating that a request has been received by the company from the person in whose name the stock is standing, or from some person acting on his behalf or representing him, that the stock may be transferred or the dividends thereon paid, and that unless an action is brought and an injunction obtained and served on or before the specified day, the notice will not be regarded.

Order XLVI, Rule 11A.

Order to Bank of England to Transfer Stock or Pay Dividends. [39 & 40 Gec. 3, c. 36, ss. 1 and 2.]

9. The Court or a Judge may make any order as to the transfer of any stock standing in the books of the Bank of England in the name of or belonging to any party to an action, or the payment of the dividends thereon, as to the Court or a Judge may seem just, and a certificate signed by the chief accountant of the Bank of England shall be evidence that the stock required to be transferred is standing in the books of the Bank in the name of the person required to transfer the same, and any order made under this Rule may be enforced against the Bank in the same way as if the Bank had been a party to the action or matter. Provided that an order shall not be made under this Rule, in any case

where the Bank claims any interest in or lien on the stock, or, where further discovery is sought from the Bank than as by this Rule provided.

Order XLVI, Rule 11B.

10. The certificate referred to in the last preceding Rule shall be furnished by the Bank on a request in writing, signed by the proper officer of the Court, and the solicitor to the applicant, and shall state the amount of the stock required to be transferred, in whose name the stock is standing, and if it be particularly required, but not otherwise, when the stock, or any part thereof was transferred, and by whom.

Order XLVI, Rule 11c.

Fees on Proceedings under last Preceding Rule. [39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 36, ss. 1 and 2.]

11. The fees of or incidental to any proceeding under the last preceding Rule shall be the same as heretofore or such other fees as may be prescribed.

Order XLVI, Rule 11D.

Order Restraining Transfer of Stock. [39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 36, s. 1; 5 Vict., c. 5, s. 4.]

12. The Court or a Judge upon the application of any party interested may restrain any company from permitting the transfer of any stock standing in the name of any person in the books of the company, or from paying any dividends thereon, and any order made under this Rule shall specify the stock, and the amount thereof, to be affected thereby, and the name of the person in which the same is standing.

Order may be Discharged or Varied. [5 Vict., c. 5, s. 4.]

13. Any order made under the last preceding Rule may be discharged or varied upon the application of any party interested.

Order XLVI, Rule 14A.

Amendment of Rule 14.

14. In Order XLVI, Rule 14, the words "as a writ of *distringas* duly issued under the Act "5 Vict., c. 5, s. 5, would have had against the "Bank of England" are hereby repealed, and the words "as if the office copy of the affidavit and the duplicate of the filed notice had been "served upon the company as by Rule 4 of this "Order provided" are substituted therefor.

Order XLVI, Rule 14B.

Vacating Registration of lis pendens. [30 & 31 Vict., c. 47, s. 2.]

15. Where any action or proceeding has been registered as a *lis pendens* against any person, if the action or proceeding is at an end, or if the Court or a Judge is satisfied that the *lis pendens* has been improperly registered, the Court or a Judge may order the vacating of the registration thereof without the consent of the party by whom it was registered.

Fees on Vacating Registration of lis pendens. [30 & 31 Vict. c. 47, s. 2.]

16. Where any order is made under the last preceding Rule the proper officer shall, upon the filing of an office copy of the order, enter a discharge of the *lis pendens* on the register, and may issue certificates of the entry of discharge, and the fees payable for the entry of the discharge and for the certificates thereof shall be the same as heretofore, or such other fees as may be prescribed.

Actions on Penal Bonds.

Further Breaches. 8 & 9 Will. 3, c. 11, s. 8. 3 & 4 Will. 4, c. 42, ss. 16, 18.

17. (1.) In any action on a penal bond for the breach of any covenant contained therein in

respect of which there may be further breaches, the writ may be indorsed with a claim for the amount of the penal sum mentioned in the bond, and judgment may be entered for the plaintiff for that amount as security against further breaches, but execution on the judgment shall be limited to the amount of the damages which the plaintiff is found to have sustained by reason of the breach of covenant, and costs.

Ascertainment of Damages on Further Breaches.

(2.) The Court or a Judge upon the *ex parte* application of a plaintiff who has obtained a judgment for the amount of the penal sum mentioned in a bond under the last preceding Rule, upon affidavit by himself or his solicitor that judgment has been obtained as therein provided, and that since the judgment was obtained further breaches have been committed, may order the defendant to appear before the Court or a Judge, or an officer of the Court, as the Court or Judge appoints, to show cause why any damages sustained by the plaintiff by reason of the said further breaches should not be assessed under a writ of inquiry or in any other way in which the Court or Judge may direct, and by the same or any subsequent order may order that execution limited to the amount of the said damages and costs shall issue on the said judgment; provided that the plaintiff shall not in any case recover by way of damages more than the amount of the penalty mentioned in the bond.

No Statement of Claim when Defendant does not Appear.

(3.) If the defendant fails to appear to the writ no statement or claim shall be delivered, and the plaintiff may at once deliver particulars of the alleged breaches to the defendant or his solicitor and proceed as mentioned in the last preceding Rule.

Proviso.

(4.) Provided that where the writ in an action is indorsed with a claim for the full amount of any penal sum mentioned in a bond, payment into court shall be admissible to particular breaches only, and not to the whole action.

Order LIV, Rule 4B.

Form and Issue of Originating Summons.

18. An originating summons shall be in the Form No. 1A, B, C, or D, Appendix K, or in the Forms G or H, Appendix K, to these Rules, with such variations as circumstances may require. It shall be prepared by the applicant or his solicitor, and shall be sealed in the Central Office, or in Probate matters in the Probate Registry or in Admiralty matters in the Admiralty Registry, and when so sealed shall be deemed to be issued. The person obtaining the summons shall leave at the Central Office, Probate Registry, or Admiralty Registry, as the case may be, a copy thereof, which shall be filed and stamped in the manner required by law. In Probate and Admiralty matters the signature of the President shall be deemed to be equivalent to sealing.

Order LIV, Rule 4c.

Appearance to Originating Summons.

19. The parties served with an originating summons shall, except as hereinafter provided, before they are heard, enter appearances in the Central Office, or in Admiralty matters at the Admiralty Registry, and give notice thereof. A party so served may appear at any time before the hearing of the summons. If he appears at any time after the time limited by the summons for appearance he shall not, unless the Court or a Judge shall otherwise order, be entitled to any further time for any purpose, than if he had appeared according to the summons.

Order LIV, Rule 4D.

Attendance under Originating Summons.

20. The day and hour for attendance under an originating summons to which an appearance is required to be entered shall, after appearance, be fixed by notice, sealed with the seal of the Central Office in the case of a summons issued in the Queen's Bench Division, or of the Chambers of the Judge to whom such summons is assigned in the case of a summons issued in the Chancery Division, or of the Admiralty Registry in the case of Admiralty matters. Such notice shall be in Form No. 1r, Appendix K. The notice shall be served on the defendant or respondent by delivering a copy thereof at the address for service named in the memorandum of appearance of such defendant or respondent not less than four clear days before the return day. The day and hour for the hearing of an *ex parte* summons shall in the Chancery Division be fixed at the Chambers of the Judge to whom the matter is assigned on production of the originating summons.

Order LIV, Rule 4E.

Service of Summons not being Originating Summons.

21. Every summons, not being an originating summons to which an appearance is required to be entered, shall be served two clear days before the return thereof, unless in any case it shall be otherwise ordered. Provided that in case of summonses for time only, the summonses may be served on the day previous to the return thereof.

Order LIV, 4F.

When Appearances not Required.

22. A respondent to an originating summons —

- (1.) Under the Solicitors Act, 1843;
- (2.) For solicitor to deliver papers;
- (3.) Under the Arbitration Act, 1889;
- (4.) Under Order LVII, Rule 1, for interpleader relief;
- (5.) Under Order LXI, Rule 27, to enter memorandum of satisfaction;
- (6.) Relating to parliamentary or municipal elections petitions;
- (7.) For inspection of register of Joint Stock Company;
- (8.) For relief under Bills of Sale Act, 1882, by grantor of bill of sale;
- (9.) Under section 17 of the Married Women's Property Act, 1882;
- (10.) In Probate matters relating to—
 - (a.) Acceptance of foreign securities;
 - (b.) Applications for grant notwithstanding caveat;
 - (c.) Leave to withdraw caveat after warning, where there is so pending cause or matter;

shall not be required to enter an appearance before being heard in Chambers.

Order LIV, Rule 23.

Appeal from Chambers.

23. In the Queen's Bench Division, except in matters of practice and procedure, the appeal from a decision of a Judge at Chambers shall be to a Divisional Court.

Order LIV, Rule 24.

Eight-Day Motion.

24. In the Queen's Bench Division, except in matters of practice and procedure, every appeal to the Court from any decision at Chambers shall be by motion, and shall be made within eight days after the decision appealed against, or if no Court to which such appeal can be made shall sit within such eight days, then on the first day on which any such Court may be sitting after the expiration of such eight days.

Order LVII, Rule 11.

When Decision in Interpleader Proceedings to be Final.

25. Every decision of the Court or a Judge in any case where the Court or a Judge, with the consent of both claimants or on the request of any claimant, and having regard to the value of the subject matter in dispute, disposes of the merits of their claims and decides the same in a summary manner under Rule 8 of this Order, and in any case where the question is a question of law, and the facts are not in dispute, and the Court or a Judge decides the question without directing the trial of an issue under Rule 13 of this Order, shall be final and conclusive, and no appeal shall lie, either with or without leave, from any such decision. Provided that where a case is decided in a summary manner by a Master in pursuance of Rule 8 of this Order an appeal shall lie from the decision of the Master to a Judge at Chambers.

Order LVII, Rule 11A.

Appeal by Leave from Judgment in Interpleader.

26. Subject to the last preceding Rule of this Order, the judgment in any action or on any issue ordered to be tried or stated in an interpleader proceeding shall be final and conclusive against the claimants, and all persons claiming under them, unless by special leave of the Court or a Judge, or of the Court of Appeal.

Order LXII, Rule 2.

Chancery Records.

27. (1.) Every order which, according to the practice at the time of the operation of this Rule, would require to be entered in the office of the Chancery Registrars, shall for the future be filed under the direction of the Senior Registrar. An entry of the filing thereof shall be made in books to be kept for that purpose, and all orders made throughout any year shall be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are filed. Every order so filed shall be deemed to be duly entered, and the date of such filing shall be deemed the date of entry. In the case of procedure orders drawn up in Chambers, no entry thereof shall be necessary before an attachment can be issued for disobedience thereof.

(2.) A duplicate of every order shall, one clear day after the same shall have been received at the Chancery Registrar's office, or in urgent cases sooner, if so directed by the officer by whom the same has been drawn up, be supplied out of the said office without fee to the solicitor or person having the carriage of the order; and wherever any Rule or order, or the practice of the Court, requires the production or service of the original order, it shall be sufficient to produce or serve the duplicate.

In the case of printed orders, a printed copy shall be marked as a duplicate and duly examined before sealing the same. In the case of written orders, a duplicate shall be written without abbreviations, and carefully examined by Writers specially selected for that purpose, under the direction of the Scrivenery Board, and the examination thereof certified in such manner as the Board shall direct; and no duplicate shall be sealed unless such examination shall have been so certified. Every duplicate shall be sealed before being issued, and there shall be noted thereon the number of the order, the date of entry, and the amount of the stamp on the original order.

(3.) A further duplicate may at any time, with the sanction of the Senior Registrar and on

payment of the prescribed fee, be issued on the Senior Registrar being satisfied of the loss of the duplicate, and that the person applying is properly entitled to it.

- (4.) Calendars or indexes of the orders entered in pursuance of this Rule shall be made under the direction of the Senior Registrar, so that the same may be conveniently referred to when required, and the original orders made in each year when filed shall from time to time be bound up in volumes. Such volumes and calendars, or indexes, shall from time to time be transmitted to the Filing and Record Department of the Central Office, to be there preserved, and shall at all times during office hours be accessible to the public on payment of the usual fee.
- (5.) An order shall not be amended except upon production of the duplicate last issued, which shall, after the original order has been amended, be also amended in accordance therewith under the direction of the Senior Registrar, and the amendment in the duplicate shall be sealed under the like direction.
- (6.) For the purposes of this Rule "order" shall include judgment; and the Senior Registrar and the Scrivenery Board respectively shall give such directions as may be necessary for carrying this Rule into effect.

Order LXXI, Rule 1A.

Repeal.

28. The following Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883, are hereby annulled:—
