The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by the eleventh section of "The Volunteer Act, 1863," it is amongst other things enacted that "Her Majesty in Council may from time to time declare what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to be given by the Volunteer, and the course of instruction to be gone through by him, and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to be attained by him and his Corps, such proficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting Officer at the Annual Inspection of the Corps, or otherwise, as by Order in Council is from time to time directed," and that "the draft of any scheme to be from time to time submitted to Her Majesty in Council for approval under the present section shall have been laid before both Houses of Parliament for one lunar month at least, either before or after, or partly before and partly after, the passing of this Act during the present, or for the like period during any subsequent Session of Parlia-

ment before such scheme receives the approval of Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be amended so far as relates to the particulars set forth in the Schedule hereof, a draft of which Schedule was on the twenty-first day of June last, laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words therein mentioned and contained, and one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the amendments of the Scheme of Efficiency for which provision is made in the said Schedule have this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having this day taken the said amendments into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in Her Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby amend, in the words of the said Schedule, the aforesaid Order in Council of the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and doth declare Her Royal approval of the amendments. *C. L. Peel.*

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing  
Order in Council.

AMENDMENTS of the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers in force under Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated thirty-first July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, made under the provisions of the Volunteer Act, 1863, or Orders since issued in amendment thereof.

(1.) To add to the existing Certificates of Efficiency for Volunteers of the several arms of the Volunteer Force, a special Certificate for Members of Volunteer Brigade Bearer Companies, in the words of Schedule A hereof.

(2.) To vary the terms of the Certificate of Efficiency for Sergeants of Volunteer Divisions of Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers and of the Certificate of Efficiency for Non-commissioned Officers of rank lower than that of Sergeant, and for Sappers as shown in the Certificates attached in the words of Schedule B and C hereof.

SCHEDULE A.

CERTIFICATE OF EFFICIENCY.

FOR VOLUNTEER BRIGADE BEARER COMPANIES.

I hereby certify:

(1.) That No. \_\_\_\_\_ was duly enrolled on the Muster Roll of the \_\_\_\_\_ one of the Corps comprised in the Volunteer Brigade, on the \_\_\_\_\_ 18 \_\_\_\_\_, and is actually a member of the Corps on this date.

\* For Recruits.—If present at Inspection, sixteen Bearer Company and twenty other Drills (including the Inspection). If absent from Inspection with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, sixteen Bearer Company and twenty-two other Drills.

Second year.—If present at the Inspection sixteen Bearer Company and twenty other Drills (including the Inspection), or such number, not less than eight Bearer Company and nine other Drills (including the Inspection), as will with the number performed in the previous year amount to thirty-two Bearer Company and forty other Drills. If absent from Inspection, with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, sixteen Bearer Company and twenty-two other Drills, or such number not less than eight Bearer Company and eleven other Drills as will with the number performed in the previous year amount to thirty-two Bearer Company and forty-two other Drills.

Third and fourth years, and subsequent years.—If present at the Inspection eight Bearer Company and nine other Drills (including the Inspection). If absent from Inspection with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, eight Bearer Company and ten other Drills.

N.B.—Extra Drills, say about six, would be required for instruction with pack equipment.

Squad Drills, at which not less than four rank and file are present, may be reckoned when necessary to complete the number of Company Drills. But, when so reckoned, they can only be counted in the proportion of three Squad Drills in lieu of one Company Drill. When counted, the number of Bearer Company, Company, and Squad Drills, respectively attended must be stated on the Certificate granted to the Volunteer.

To constitute a Bearer Company or a Company Drill reckoning towards efficiency, twelve at least of all ranks per Company must be present, of whom not less than two must be Officers and Sergeants.

Attendance at a Review may be counted as a Drill. † Here insert "present at" or "absent from," as the case may be. If absent, it must be stated whether with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified. If enrolled after the date of Inspection, strike out paragraph, and so state.

An Officer of the Army Medical Staff will be detailed to assist in the conduct of the examination, and will countersign this Certificate.

**CONDITIONS OF EFFICIENCY FOR NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND SAPPERS.**

*Recruits.*—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers with under two years' service, may be returned as efficient, who have attended 78 submarine mining drills and the continuous training for eight days. They shall pass the test examination previously specified (either at the end of their first or second year of service) before being classed as "trained men."

*Trained Men.*—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers with over one year's service, who have passed the test examination previously specified may be returned as efficient, provided that they shall have attended the continuous training for eight days, and 78 submarine mining drills.

*Experts.*—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers with over three years' efficient service, who have passed the test examination for experts, may be returned as efficient, provided that they shall have attended the continuous training for eight days, and 48 submarine mining drills, or the complete period of fifteen days' continuous training and 10 submarine mining drills.

*Special Exemptions.*—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers specially exempted from attendance at the continuous training under the provisions of the Volunteer Regulations, may have their certificates granted, provided that they shall have attended the following number of drills, which may be counted by attendance during a portion of the camp, at whole day or half-day parades, or at hourly drills.

Recruits.—90 drills.

Trained Men.—90 drills.

Expert Men.—60 drills.

*Notes.*

*Drills.*—A submarine mining drill is one hour's actual submarine mining work. Periods of continuous work of not less than 1½, 2, 2½, 3, and 3½ hours, may be reckoned as equivalent numbers and fractions of drills towards efficiency.

Recruits should not do more than two hourly drills on one evening.

A whole day parade will count as 6 drills.

A half-day parade will count as 4 drills.

A working day during the continuous training will count as 6 drills in computing the number of drills required in excess of the period of eight days' continuous training, and also in the case of Volunteers specially exempted from attendance for the period of eight continuous days.

All certificates of efficiency are issued subject to the recommendation of the officer specially deputed to make the technical inspection of the division.

I recommend that the name of No. \_\_\_\_\_ be included in the annual submarine mining efficiency returns of his division.

Recruits should not do more than two hourly drills on one evening.

A whole-day parade will count as 6 drills.

A half-day parade will count as 4 drills.

A working day during the continuous training will count as 6 drills in computing the number of drills required in excess of the period of eight days' continuous training, and also in the case of Volunteers specially exempted from attendance for the period of eight continuous days.

All certificates of efficiency are issued subject to the recommendation of the Officer specially deputed to make the technical inspection of the division.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two and of the Act of thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein recited duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and

of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein recited, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the Metropolis, and within the City and Diocese of London, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Michael, Wood Street, with Saint Mary Staining, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, caused proposals for a Scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly mentioned Act and were approved by the said Frederick, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, and were assented to by the patrons of the two benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, and by the Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton near unto Windsor in the County of Buckingham, and the same College, who, are the alternate patrons of the said benefice and Rectory of Saint Alban, Wood Street, and Saint Olave, Silver Street, and by the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley, Baron Halsbury, who as Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, was then alternate patron on behalf of Your Majesty, in right of the Crown, of the said benefice and rectory of Saint Michael, Wood Street, with Saint Mary Staining, and by the parishioners of Saint Michael, Wood Street, in vestry assembled, as the other alternate patrons of the lastly mentioned benefice and rectory, and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications by the vestries of the parishes concerned, that is to say, by the joint vestry of the parishes of Saint Alban, Wood Street, and Saint Olave, Silver Street, and by the joint vestry of the parishes of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto, and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Farrer, Baron Herschell, is now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain.

"And whereas the said Frederick, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, as such Bishop, and the patrons of the said two benefices and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and episcopal seal), and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, and of the said Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton near unto Windsor, and the same College (in testimony whereof they the said Dean and Chapter and the said Provost and College have to this scheme respectively affixed their capitular, and common or corporate seals) and with the consent of the said Farrer, Baron Herschell (in testimony where-

of he has to this scheme set his hand and seal), and with the consent of the parishioners of the said parish of Saint Michael Wood Street, in vestry assembled (in testimony whereof this scheme has been signed by two parishioners of the said parish duly nominated and appointed by the said parish to sign the scheme on behalf of the parishioners) and with the consents of the joint vestry of the said parishes of Saint Alban, Wood Street, and Saint Olave, Silver Street, and of the joint vestry of the said parishes of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

“PART I.

“As to the proposed union itself, and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:—

“1. That the said benefice of Saint Alban, Wood Street, and Saint Olave, Silver Street, and the said benefice of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining, be united into one benefice under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining,’ which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

“2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect and if only one shall be then vacant the said union shall also forthwith take effect if the incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the first incumbent of the united benefice; but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be full then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of them, if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the incumbent of the united benefice; but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and in any case it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said Diocese of London to admit to the united benefice such first incumbent (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the said present benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

“3. That if after this scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council and before the said union shall have taken effect, the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices shall, with the consent of the Bishop of London, retire from his incumbency in

order that the said union may take immediate effect, then the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be entitled during the period hereinafter specified, to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice, and by way of compensation an annual sum equal to the net annual value of the tithe or rate, in lieu of tithe, and all other endowments belonging to the incumbency from which he shall so retire, computed on the average receipts of the three years immediately preceding the year in which the said incumbent shall so retire, or such less annual sum as shall actually arise from the present endowments of the benefice from which he shall so retire, so that should the income to arise from such endowments cease to be paid in part or altogether from circumstances beyond the control of the incumbent of the said united benefice, the pension of the retiring incumbent shall be diminished by the amount which shall be proved to be irrecoverable, which said annual sum or pension shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect, and shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in every year, the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect, and the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life, if he continue to be a member of the Church of England, but not otherwise, or until he shall accept other church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent. And upon his accepting such preferment, the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if he shall accept other church preferment of a less net annual value than as aforesaid, then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum payable to him for the same year in respect of such other preferment.

“Provided always that if such retiring incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law, the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension, his right to receive such annual sum payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also, that if the same annual sum payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease by his ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid, or by his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid or by his acceptance of such Church preferment, or by his death (as the case may be), on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment, then he, or his executors, or administrators, shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the current half-year, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current half-year.

“4. That the said annual sum shall be charged upon the annual income arising from the endowments of the benefice which a retiring incumbent shall vacate, and shall be payable out of the same by the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice, and as between the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and the retiring incumbent and his assigns, the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the benefice which a retiring incumbent shall vacate, and the incumbent of the said united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to

pay to the said retiring incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of the said united benefice and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice and that if such annual sum or any part thereof (except any part which may be irrecoverable by the incumbent of the united benefice) shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said half-yearly days of payment, and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London, it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same be not paid within such period, then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, to recover the said annual sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal or equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice, to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united benefice, his executors or administrators, any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

#### "PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith, or with the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Alban, Wood Street, shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of the united benefice.

"2. That after the union the expense of maintaining the fabric of the parish church of the united benefice, and of providing the things requisite for the performance of divine service therein, shall be defrayed out of the charitable revenues applicable to such purposes at the disposal of the incumbent and churchwardens or trustees of the Parishes of Saint Alban, Wood Street and Saint Olave, Silver Street, and shall be the first charge on such revenues, provided always that we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, shall make out of such monies, as may from time to time be received by us under the provisions of the 'City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883,' such a grant as will raise to a sum of two hundred and twenty pounds per annum the funds available for the maintenance of divine service in the said church of the united benefice.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the font and communion table used in the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, shall, if the joint vestry of the united benefice desire it, and if the Bishop of London approve of it, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if not needed for such church they shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, or to such other church or chapel within the Diocese or London as the bishop may select.

"4. That upon the union taking effect the sacramental plate now belonging to the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice, if, in the opinion of the Bishop of London, it be required for use in that church, but if it be not so required then it shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned.

"5. That upon the union taking effect, the organ and carved work, and other fittings and furniture now in the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, or so much of them as the joint vestry of the united benefice shall desire, shall, with the approval of the Bishop of London, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if they be not so transferred, or only in part so transferred, then the whole of them, or the residue not so transferred, shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, unless it shall seem more expedient to the Bishop of London that the same shall be sold, and the proceeds to arise from such sale shall in such case be added to the proceeds to arise from the sale hereinafter recommended of the materials and site of the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street.

"6. That upon the union taking effect if the tables of fees used in the two churches be alike, in all particulars, the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice (shall until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

"7. That if upon the union taking effect the persons who at the present time hold the respective offices of organist and sextoness of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, shall at that time hold their respective offices, such persons shall be respectively organist and sextoness of the united benefice, but no organist or sextoness of the united benefice shall have any larger estate and interest in his or her office than he or she shall have possessed in his or her original office before the union.

"8. That in the event of the services of any of the church servants of the parishes of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining, who at present hold office being dispensed with by reason of the union taking effect, such servants shall out of any monies to be received by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the provisions of Part V. of this scheme, receive such reasonable compensation as having regard to the length of his or her or their tenure of office, and other circumstances of the case, shall seem to us equitable and proper.

"Provided always that it shall be lawful for us if we shall see fit in all or in any of these cases to advance the compensation money, or any part thereof, out of the fund created by the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"9. That upon the final closing of the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street the register books of baptisms, marriages and burials of the parishes of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining, shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

#### "PART III.

"As to the endowments of the United benefice we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues, and income constituting the endowments (present and future) of the rectory of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, and of the rectory of Saint Michael, Wood Street with Saint Mary Staining, shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice, subject to the payment as aforesaid by the incumbent of the united benefice of any pension which, under the provision of Part I of this scheme may be payable to a retired incumbent, and subject also to the payment to the incumbent for the time being of the proposed new benefice, which is contemplated and recommended by Part VI of this scheme.

"PART IV.

"Upon the subject of patronage we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, recommend and propose:—

"That the patronage of the said united benefice of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining, shall be vested alternately in the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, and in the Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton near unto Windsor in the County of Buckingham and the same College, the next turn of presentation to belong to the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, and that the patronage of the new Church and benefice, which are referred to in Part VI of this scheme shall be vested as therein recommended and proposed.

"PART V.

"As to the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and the site and appurtenances thereof, and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture, or fittings of the same church, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, recommend and propose:—

"1. That as soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, be taken down.

"2. That subject to the provision contained in clauses 3, 4 and 5 of Part II. of this scheme the furniture or fittings, and the materials and site of the said church; together with any ground annexed thereto, and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof, shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient: such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid, of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church, shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied as follows, and in the following order, that is to say:—

"(a.) That we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, shall out of such monies, first make provision for the compensation or compensations mentioned in Part II Clause 8 of this scheme.

"(b.) That we shall next appropriate out of the said proceeds a sum of two thousand pounds as part of the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"(c.) That we shall next set apart a sum sufficient to pay the fees, charges, and expenses (if any) payable for and in respect of the institution to and induction of one of the incumbents of either of the existing incumbencies of Saint Alban, Wood Street, with Saint Olave, Silver Street, and of Saint Michael, Wood Street, with Saint Mary Staining, to the incumbency of the said united benefice (if such institution and induction shall take place), and also the first fruits (if any) which shall be payable on such institution or induction to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the Augmentation and Maintenance of the Poor Clergy.

"(d.) That we shall next set apart a capital sum of four thousand pounds for the provision, when opportunity shall arise, of a house of residence for the incumbent of the said united benefice, and that until such house shall have been provided, one moiety of the interest (such interest being calculated at the rate of two pounds and ten shillings per centum per annum) accruing upon such capital sum of four thousand pounds shall be paid by us to the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice, in addition to the income which as such incumbent he shall be entitled to receive under the provisions of this scheme, and the other moiety of such interest shall be accumulated and added to such capital sum until such accumulation shall be declared by us and by the patrons of the said united benefice to be no longer necessary, and thereupon such other moiety shall also be paid by us to the said incumbent in addition to the income which as such incumbent, he shall be entitled to receive under the provisions of this scheme.

"(e.) That we shall next set apart and pay over to the said Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the Augmentation and Maintenance of the Poor Clergy a sum of six hundred pounds, to be held and invested by them, the annual income arising from such investment to be paid yearly in the following manner and proportions, namely, two-thirds of such income to be paid to the churchwardens for the time being of the said parish of Saint Mary Staining, to be by them applied exclusively to the maintenance in good order of the disused churchyard of the said parish of Saint Mary Staining, and the remaining one-third of the said annual income to be paid to the churchwardens for the time being of the said parish of Saint Olave, Silver Street, to be by them applied exclusively to the maintenance of the disused churchyard of the said parish of Saint Olave, Silver Street.

"(f.) That we shall, out of such moneys, next set apart a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds for the purpose of defraying the cost of any works which (with the approval of us and the Bishop of London) may be executed under or by direction of the rector and churchwardens of the united benefice for the purpose of rendering the church of the said united benefice, that is to say the church of Saint Alban, Wood Street, more suitable for the purpose of divine worship therein.

"(g.) That so much of the remainder of such net proceeds as may be required shall be appropriated by us (1) for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new church for (and within the limits of) the said new district constituted or to be constituted as contemplated by

Part VI. of this scheme, and (2) if the funds will permit for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a parsonage house or the purchase (and, if required, enlargement or alteration) of any existing suitable house for a parsonage house for and within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid.

"(h.) That if after providing the said proposed new church and parsonage house for such new district there be any balance of funds remaining unappropriated, such balance shall be invested by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as an addition to the endowment of the same new district, and the interest or dividends accruing in respect of such investment shall be paid to the incumbent for the time being of the new district.

#### "PART VI.

"As to a certain new district and benefice we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:

"1. That an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the metropolis, as that word is defined by the Act of the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty (such district then having been or then being about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England authorizing the formation or constitution of such district) shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church and a parsonage house (if funds will permit) shall be provided out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"2. That the patronage of such new district and benefice shall be vested alternately in the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Bishop of London for the time being, the first turn or presentation thereto to be vested in the Lord High Chancellor.

"3. That when a church for such district has been built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended, it shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Mary and Saint Michael or by such other name and style as may appear to the Bishop of the Diocese to be more expedient.

"4. That as an endowment for the aforesaid new benefice the incumbent of the said united benefice shall pay to the incumbent for the time being of the new benefice half-yearly such part of the income of the united benefice as shall then arise from the present endowments of the said benefice and rectory of Saint Michael, Wood Street, with Saint Mary Staining, provided always that if the union shall have taken effect by the retirement upon a full pension of one of the present incumbents of the two benefices to be united, such payment to the incumbent for the time being of the new benefice shall not come into operation until such retired incumbent shall cease to be entitled to his pension, and if such retired incumbent be entitled only to a portion of such pension, then the incumbent of the new benefice shall be entitled to receive from the incumbent of the united benefice for the time being a payment equal in amount to the difference between the reduced pension payable and the income derived from the present endowments of the said rectory and benefice of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and Saint Mary Staining.

"Provided always that this scheme shall not

take effect until the consents and approval, which by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church, shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of Saint Michael, Wood Street, and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or of any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer (to the extent hereinafter-mentioned) of the ownership of the advowson or right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of New Sleaford in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the said advowson or right of

patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of New Sleaford is vested in the Reverend Alfred Langdon, Clerk in Holy Orders, now Vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice of New Sleaford and in his executors administrators or assigns, during the subsistence of a lease dated the twenty-seventh day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine and made between the Reverend John Matthias Turner, Clerk Doctor of Divinity Lord Bishop of Calcutta and Prebendary of the Prebend of Lafford otherwise New Sleaford of the first part, Nassau William Senior and Alexander Cosmo Orme of the second part and William Foster of the third part.

"And whereas the said Alfred Langdon is desirous that the advowson or right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of New Sleaford now vested in him and his executors administrators or assigns as and to the extent aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Lincoln.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, now Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln is willing to accept for himself and his successors in the bishoprick of Lincoln the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts hereinbefore recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Edward Bishop of Lincoln has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners have agreed to make to the said benefice of New Sleaford a certain grant of fifty pounds per annum out of our common fund when the patronage of the same benefice shall have been made public patronage to our satisfaction.

"And whereas the transfer to the extent aforesaid of the patronage of the said benefice of New Sleaford to the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Lincoln will have the effect of making the same patronage public patronage to our satisfaction.

"And whereas under the circumstances aforesaid it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that the transfer to the extent aforesaid of the patronage of the said benefice of New Sleaford which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the said right of patronage and advowson arises or exists that is to say in the parish of New Sleaford.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Alfred Langdon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the advowson or right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of New Sleaford now vested in him the said Alfred Langdon, and his executors administrators or assigns as aforesaid during the subsistence of the hereinbefore mentioned lease dated the twenty-seventh day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine shall be transferred from him the said Alfred Langdon and from his executors administrators

or assigns to the said Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, as such Bishop, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time during the subsistence of the hereinbefore mentioned lease and for all other (if any) the estate and interest of the said Alfred Langdon therein be exercised by the said Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln and his successors Bishops of the same diocese.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament"

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the district parish of Holy Trinity Ipswich and partly out of the parish of Saint Clement Ipswich both in the county of Suffolk and in the diocese of Norwich.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich and of the parish of Saint Clement Ipswich aforesaid which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas Anna Frances Spooner the wife of the Reverend Edward Spooner Clerk in Holy Orders of the Deanery, Hadleigh in the said county of Suffolk has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds

sterling in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and (so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, then) of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands."

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should grant out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-named Act a capital sum of seven hundred pounds in respect of which there shall be paid by us to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said Anna Frances Spooner has nominated to us as the person and as the corporation sole in whom she desires that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be vested, herself the said Anna Frances Spooner her heirs and assigns for the first turn of appointment and subsequently the Right Reverend John Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever for the second and every succeeding turn of nomination.

"And whereas the said grant of twenty-one pounds per annum will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us the said Commissioners under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich and of the said parish of Saint Clement Ipswich which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Bartholomew Rose Hill Ipswich.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such

district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and shall be exercised for the first turn of appointment by the said Anna Frances Spooner her heirs and assigns and after the said first turn of appointment shall for the second and every succeeding turn of appointment be vested in and be exercised by the said John, Bishop of the diocese of Norwich aforesaid and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Bartholomew Rose Hill Ipswich comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich in the county of Suffolk and in the diocese of Norwich which is bounded upon the south-west by the parish of Saint Clement Ipswich (including the hereinafter-described portion thereof) in the said county and diocese upon the east by the parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew in the same county and diocese upon the north by the new parish of Saint John Ipswich in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John Ipswich from the district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich aforesaid at the junction of Foxhall-road with Newton-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-two and a half chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Felixstowe-road upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich from the parish of Saint Clement Ipswich aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Saint Clement Ipswich which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Nacton in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south-east by the extra-parochial place called or known as Warren House in the same county and diocese upon the north-east and upon the north by the district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich aforesaid (including the above described portion thereof) or in other words by the said Felixstowe-road and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of the Holy Trinity Ipswich from the parish of Saint Clement Ipswich aforesaid at the junction of Felixstowe-road aforesaid with Nacton-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of one mile and thirteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Clement Ipswich from the parish of Nacton aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures

out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Norwich.

These regulations do not apply to luggage brought by travellers.

It is further stated that the above prohibition does not apply, in so far as the Province of Liege and Russia are concerned.

I. As regards importation and transit.

(a.) To rags pressed together by hydraulic process in bales hooped with iron;

(b.) To cuttings (afval) of new stuffs coming direct from spinning or weaving factories, clothes shops, or laundries; to artificial wool or shavings (afval) of new paper;

(c.) To goods, with regard to which there is satisfactory proof that, although imported via the Province of Liege or via Russia, they come from some other place, and provided that such goods have been packed and transmitted in such a manner that they cannot have been in contact with infected objects.

II. As regards transit.

To goods packed in such a manner that they cannot possibly have been tampered with or manipulated on the way.



Thames Conservancy.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Conservators of the River Thames propose to make the following Bye-laws:—

BYE-LAWS for the regulation of vessels navigating the River Thames through the Tower Bridge.

The Conservators of the River Thames in exercise of the powers and authority vested in them by the Thames Acts, 1857 to 1883, and of every other authority them hereunto in anywise enabling, do order and direct as follows, that is to say:—

1. The master of every vessel intending to pass up the river through the Tower Bridge shall, notwithstanding any previous Bye-law or regulation, and in addition to the ordinary lights to be carried by such vessel when under weigh, exhibit before arriving at Cherry Garden Pier, and shall continue to exhibit until such vessel shall have passed through the said bridge, the following signals:—

(a.) By day, viz., between sunrise and sunset one black ball not less than two feet in diameter, placed in such a position on such vessel where it can best be seen at a height above the hull of not less than twenty feet.

(b.) By night, viz., between sunset and sunrise, two red lights, in globular lanterns of not less than eight inches each in diameter, placed vertically six feet apart, at a height of not less than 20 feet

above the hull, and in such a position where they can best be seen, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

2. The Master of every vessel intending to pass down the river through the said bridge shall, notwithstanding any previous Bye-law or Regulation and in addition to the ordinary lights to be carried by such vessel, exhibit the signals prescribed by the preceding Bye-law.

3. The Master of every vessel shall in foggy weather before approaching the said bridge, either from the upper or lower side thereof, ascertain whether the said bridge can be opened or not.

4. These Bye-laws shall be in addition to and not in substitution for any Bye-laws now in force or which shall hereafter be made by the Conservators under their general powers and which shall apply to the navigation of the river below London Bridge, and nothing in these Bye-laws shall diminish or affect the powers of the Conservators with regard to the regulation of vessels on the river below London Bridge.

5. The word "master" in these Bye-laws shall have the same meaning and interpretation as in section 1 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1857.

6. The master of any vessel or any person committing any breach of or in any way infringing any of these Bye-laws, shall be liable to a

penalty of and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds, which said penalty shall be recovered and enforced summarily, and shall be applied according to the provisions of the Thames Acts, 1857 to 1883.

7. These Bye-laws may be cited as "The Tower Bridge Navigation Bye-laws."
