And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the twenty-third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, to give notice of such representation and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said first-recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered:—

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Ashburton, in the county of Devon, and in the old churchyard within five yards of the church; and also in the rest of the old churchyard, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.
