**D**ESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received from Rear-Admiral Frederick G. D. Bedford, C.B., Commander-in-Chief on the Cape of Good Hope and West Coast of Africa Station, and from Captain Francis Powell, of Her Majesty's ship "Phœbe," reporting operations against the Chief Nanna of Brohémie, in the Benin River:—

Letter from Captain F. Powell, of the "Phœbe," Senior Officer, West Coast of Africa, to the Admiralty, dated 1st September, 1894.

*Her Majesty's Ship "Phœbe,"*

*Benin River, September 1, 1894.*

SIR, I HAVE the honour to inform you of the following proceedings of Her Majesty's ship under my command since the despatch of my previous letter of 19th August, 1894.

2. I left Loanda at 11.30 A.M. on Monday, 20th August, and arrived at the Fairway Buoy, at the mouth of the Bonny River, at 6 o'clock on Friday morning, August 24th. At 7 o'clock the tide served for entering the river, so I proceeded up, finding the important buoys well in position.

3. Just to the north of Breaker Island I found the African Steamship Company's steamship "Ekoe" aground, and she signalled and sent to me for assistance, so I agreed to send a wire hawser to her and try to tow her off. On getting Her Majesty's ship into position I anchored, but the water reported in the chains appearing rather too shoal I at once rounded from every part of the ship, but got no less than 18 feet anywhere—the ship drawing 17 feet 2 inches aft. However, as the bottom was very uneven and the ship even appeared to touch very lightly once or twice, I weighed again at once, sent to the "Ekoe" to say there was not water enough for me to stop and help him, and proceeded on up to Bonny, anchoring there off the settlement at 9.50 A.M.

4. Mr. Moor, the Acting Consul-General of the Protectorate, came on board, informed me of the position of affairs with regard to the rebellious chief Nanna in the Benin River, and asked me to assist in reducing him. I assured him I should be happy to co-operate in every way in my power should I receive the sanction required by Article 227 of the Station Orders. Telegrams were despatched to the Admiralty, Foreign Office, and the Commander-in-Chief, and I received a reply from the Admiralty on Saturday morning, August 25th, authorizing me to act if I considered the force at my disposal was sufficient.

5. I at once informed the Consul-General I was ready to take him to the Forcados River and thence by the Chanomi and Nanna Creeks to Benin. He came on board, and at 11 A.M. I weighed and proceeded out of the Bonny River and anchored off the entrance to the Forcados River at 8 A.M. Sunday, August 26th. The tide serving at 11 A.M., I again weighed and crossed the Forcados bar and came on through the creeks to Benin River, anchoring near Her Majesty's ship "Alecto," which was lying off the mouth of the Brohémie Creek, at 6.45 P.M.

Shortly after entering the creek we met the Protectorate yacht "Evangeline" and communicated with her. The creeks, though in places very narrow and winding, contain ample water, the least obtained being 21 feet, and, except in one place where there is a very awkward turn, we were able to steam ten knots, the ship steering beautifully.

6. Lieutenant-Commander Heugh, of Her Majesty's ship "Alecto," came on board when I anchored, reported the fact of his boat having been fired on the previous day, and the loss sustained (Enclosure No. 1), and informed me generally as to the state of affairs.

There can be no question but that Nanna's position is a very strong one: his town is up a creek, or rather ditch, at least a mile long, which, as Lieutenant-Commander Heugh experienced, is obstructed and defended by ordnance of at least 7-pounder calibre commanding the waterway. The ditch itself only holds enough water to float one of our boats manned and armed for about two hours before and after high water, and is so narrow that a steamboat could not turn round nor a pulling boat use oars.

As far as I can learn, there is no overland route to the town, but there is perhaps another ditch, also obstructed and commanded by small cannon. The battery that fired on Lieutenant Heugh is, as near as I can judge, about 400 yards in a direct line from the river, and it appears to me that the best plan is first to clear the bush sufficiently near to be able to rush it.

7. Monday, August 27th, was employed in endeavouring to collect information, and moving the Houssas up from Benin to a disused factory near the ship. A search light was kept on Brohémie Creek every night, and canoes attempting to go in or come out were fired on.

8. On Tuesday, August 28th, 70 Houssas with a party of labourers were landed on the left bank of Brohémie Creek and proceeded to cut a road


through the mangroves towards the stockade. A party of 25 Blue Jackets from Her Majesty's ship "Phœbe," under Lieutenant Hickley, were landed at the same point with orders to make a breastwork and form a rallying point for the Houssas under fire of the ships in case they were attacked and driven in by the enemy.

A practicable road for guns was made during the day for a distance of about 400 yards, and it was decided to land the whole of our force in the morning to take the stockade, and advance on Brohemie Town.

I knew we were close to the stockade, and from the best intelligence we could gather the houses began about 300 yards beyond it, and there we should find firm open ground suitable for working field guns on. During this day shell were fired into the town at intervals of a quarter of an hour, and this was continued during the night.

9. On Wednesday morning the entire force was landed, after the bush had been searched with shells and machine guns, and at 8.15 left the point and advanced on the stockade. From the very first the labour of advancing our 7-pounder and Maxim guns was very severe, the narrow-tyred wheels sinking into the mud up to their axles occasionally.

The plan of advance was as follows:—



At 8.50 the end of the road cut the previous day was reached, and the labourers were put on to cut the bush, while spies were sent out and a krooman climbed a tree to try and get information.

As the bush was cut the force continued to advance, and at 9.25 the spies reported a stockade about 250 yards distant with a creek in front.

At 9.45 a small creek having been crossed by means of planks, the 7-pounder "Alecto's" rocket tube and Houssas' Maxim fired into the position of the stockade.

9.49. Advanced and fired volleys into the stockade, and at ten took it and found it just deserted, fires burning and guns loaded.

23 guns, from 6- to 9-pounders, were found loaded with charges in neat bags, and a cane framework about 10 inches long full of scrap iron.

Some of the guns were on truck carriages, others on planks with rope and chain breechings well secured to the embrasures; the guns were spiked and dismantled and the powder put into the creek.

The stockade is a very strong one, and evidently the work of months: its total length is some 300 yards, the posts of ironwood two and three deep in places, and quite impervious to rifle fire. It commands the creek leading to the town and would have rendered an advance by boats disastrous.

10. The enemy now began firing from the town, the shot all falling in or near to the creek showing they had cotated on our advancing that way.

There was a great deal of unavoidable delay at this time in getting the guns up, the stockade having to be pulled down and a track made with the posts, the push too was now a good deal thicker and the advance was very slow.

11. At 1.45 the force arrived at a creek broader and deeper than any we had crossed before, and from here the houses were visible some 200 yards off; the Houssas and "Phœbe's" company waded through with their ammunition on their heads, while trees were cut down to make a bridge for the guns.

12. At 3.30 we were able to move on, and advanced on the houses, firing volleys into them before rushing them. Rockets and 7-pounder shell were fired into the town and set fire to some houses. The enemy's fire was getting warmer, and the Houssas became reluctant to advance, so I ordered Lieutenant Hickley to take the "Phœbe's" company to the front and take the houses, which he did at once.

The fire of the Houssas was now uncontrollable, in spite of the efforts of their officers, and, while in the houses, one of our men, T. J. Molyneux, A.B., was shot in the back, undoubtedly by them.

13. And now, instead of being on the hard ground that all our information promised, we found that each lot of houses was divided from the next by water, and that we were in a perfect network of creeks, with no appearance of hard ground anywhere. Another lot of houses was taken, and the next fired upon, but it was impossible to take the guns any further. The crews had worked magnificently, but they were utterly done, and there was no more water left.

Without guns and rockets it seemed impracticable to take the town, as we knew Nanna had plenty of guns, he was keeping up a heavy fire on us, he is known to have machine guns, and rifle bullets were passing over us all the time.

To stay where we were for the night was impossible, so as it was now nearly five o'clock there was nothing for it but to return to the ships, which we did leisurely in excellent order, "Phœbe's" Company under Lieutenant Hickley forming rear guard and keeping the enemy in check.

14. At Creek the guns crews were so exhausted that I very reluctantly gave orders for the 7-pounder to be spiked and, with its carriage and that of the Maxim, thrown into the creek; they could not have been got back to the ship in the dark, and the attempt would probably have led to heavy loss to the whole force, as the enemy were following us up. The Maxim gun was brought away and carried to the boats.

15. By 7.30 the whole force was embarked and the Houssas returned to Benin.

16. The casualties were as follows:—  
Killed—1 Private, Housa.

Wounded—Captain Scafe, finger amputated, T. J. Molyneux, A.B., "Phœbe," dangerously.

17. To reduce Brohemie Town will require a force of at least 400 white men—300 to advance by land and 100 by water—well equipped with rockets and Maxims mounted on tripods. The country is impracticable for anything on wheels.

At present I am endeavouring to clear the people out of the town by shelling; the distance is about 2,000 yards, and as we hear they are very short of provisions we are patrolling the river to cut off all supplies of food going in.

18. I have telegraphed to the Commander-in-Chief for supplies of ammunition, and provisions, and additional ships, for the sooner the business can be concluded the sooner the ship can be removed from this unhealthy river.

So far the health of both ships is excellent, and I am endeavouring to get them everything I can in the way of food.

19. In conclusion, I have great pleasure in informing you that the behaviour and steadiness of the Officers and men landed from Her Majesty's ships "Phoebe" and "Alecto" on August 29th was excellent, the exertions and zeal of the 7-pounder and Maxim guns crews especially being beyond praise.

Letter from Lieutenant and Commander Heugh, of Her Majesty's ship "Alecto," to the Senior Officer, West Coast of Africa, dated 25th August, 1894.

Inclosure No. 1 in Captain Powell's Letter of 1st September, 1894.

*Her Majesty's Ship "Alecto" at Benin,  
August 25, 1894.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report in continuation of my letter of 22nd instant, that, owing to a large number of natives collecting at night time opposite this ship, I found it necessary to destroy, by burning, three villages at the entrance of Brohemic Creek, more especially as the ship had been fired upon.

2. Various attempts were made, notwithstanding firing from the ship, to rush the blockade. As it was quite apparent to me that Nanna and his people were entirely hostile to the Government, and that, from information received, small canoes were able to go up by other creeks than that off which I was anchored, I considered it necessary to block these by felling trees, having previously interviewed the Consular Authorities, who were quite of my opinion.

3. Nightly a system of patrolling has been carried on to prevent the ingress or egress of canoes to Brohemic.

4. This morning I completely armour-plated my steam cutter against rifle fire, and proceeded to find out if there were severe obstacles in the creek that would prevent our attacking Brohemic by way of it. I proceeded with Major Copland Crawford, of the Protectorate (Consular Agent), Captain James Lalor (Seconded, Royal Marine Light Infantry), of the Niger Protectorate Force, Robert H. Crouch, Chief Petty Officer, 80,830, Charles Chick, A.B., 115,127, George Smallwood, A.B., 146,565, James Jury, A.B., 145,649, Joseph Perkins, Leading Stoker, First Class, 145,395, and Frank E. Lambkin, Stoker, 164,204, with a native as Interpreter, who apparently knew the bends of the creek.

At a distance of about 380 yards (rough survey), hearing voices, I deemed it necessary to turn the boat (being in a place where there was sufficient room to do so), and had virtually done so, when an exceedingly heavy fire from a large battery of guns was opened upon us, the boat was pierced through the stern in several places between wind and water, by shot averaging 7 and 9 lbs. I deeply regret to say that the Coxswain, James Jury, A.B., was mortally wounded, dying on board the ship at 1.45 p.m., Charles Chick, A.B. (serving Nordenfelt gun), virtually mortally wounded, Major Copland Crawford, Captain Lalor, and Joseph Perkins, Leading Stoker, all three very severely wounded. One projectile completely disabled the Nordenfelt gun and the shield and armour protection of the boat was wrecked. I at once took the helm,

the fire being still very severe. I gave an order to go ahead, this was not at once complied with, but a few seconds afterwards, Joseph Perkins, Leading Stoker, First Class, already mentioned, got up from where he had been shot (his foot was hanging by shreds), and I am proud to say that this man, Joseph Perkins, Leading Stoker, First Class, engineered the boat back to the ship under a heavy fire, fainting from a tremendous loss of blood just as we got alongside the "Alecto," the boat from the time when first fired upon gradually making water, and arriving alongside in a sinking condition. Whilst regretting this loss of life, I cannot help mentioning the noble and devoted manner in which every individual performed his duty. Major Copland Crawford, though severely wounded, managed to fire two shots from his rifle at the enemy.

I would also like to mention Robert Crouch, Chief Gunner's Mate, who when called upon by me to fire a rocket at the enemy, did so under a heavy fire as coolly as though it were at mere practice, the result of which discharge caused a cessation of the heavy firing of cannon, tending greatly towards enabling me at a very slow rate of speed to bring the boat out of the creek and alongside the ship.

Captain Lalor also, though so severely wounded, was endeavouring to support me in bringing the boat out of this difficulty.

Again, whilst regretting what has taken, it appears to me that Nanna is a far more formidable enemy than has been supposed, and therefore I consider that to annihilate him force and great caution is requisite, and it will be necessary to flank him, getting at him by land from various points, as evidently his creek is impracticable for a main attack by boats, owing to its narrowness, shoal water, and density of jungle on either hand throughout its entire length, and the evident batteries of heavy ordnance all along the creek.

5. I cannot help thinking that my experience of this day has prevented a general destruction of the force intended to attack the position, as in all probability we should have shelled the town, leaving these batteries untouched, to destroy each boat in turn as the flotilla should proceed on its way up to Brohemic.

The following is a list of killed and wounded:—  
Major Copland Crawford, Captain James Lalor, very severely wounded.

James Jury, A.B., mortally wounded, dead.  
Joseph Perkins, Leading Stoker, Charles Chick, A.B., dangerously wounded.

Letter from Commander-in-Chief to the Admiralty, dated 27th September, 1894, No. 342.

*Her Majesty's Ship "Philomel," Benin,  
September 27, 1894.*

SIR,

BE pleased to inform their Lordships that in accordance with my telegram No. 19, of 7th September, 1894, I left Simon's Bay in Her Majesty's ship "Philomel" on the 8th instant, and arrived at St. Paul de Loanda on 13th instant.

2. Having received 297 tons of coal I left the same day for Bonny, and crossed the bar on the morning of the 17th instant.

3. I had telegraphed to Her Majesty's ship "Phoebe" to send a pilot if possible for the channel joining the Forcados River and the Benue

to Bonny, and the Niger Coast Protectorate yacht "Evangeline," with Lieutenant Parks, of Her Majesty's ship "Phoebe," arrived at Bonny shortly after us.

4. We left Bonny directly telegrams had been sent, and arrived off the Forcados River at daylight on the 18th, and the tide being favourable proceeded into the river at once, and on through the Chamoni and Nanna Creeks which, though requiring careful attention to the tides, present no great difficulties for a ship of this size. Lieutenant (N.) Parks proved to be an excellent pilot, and by 1.30 P.M. we were in the Benin River.

5. I found the "Phoebe" and "Alecto" at anchor off the Brohemie Creek, occasionally firing a shell into the town. The direction was given from a crow's nest on a spar rigged above the "Phoebe's" fore-topmast, and from which a view of the roofs of a few houses could be obtained. I anchored near them, and arranged for a more vigorous shelling the next day, the 19th.

6. At 6 A.M. on the 27th the firing was stopped, and, at my request, the Consul-General sent messengers to Nanna to give him another opportunity of surrendering. I inclose a copy of the letter sent. A verbal reply was received which amounted to a distinct refusal. (See Memorandum attached.)

7. The shelling, though no doubt it must have made most of the town uninhabitable, could only be directed by the view that could be obtained by lashing the main-topmast half-way up the fore, and placing a crow's nest on the top. The houses (of which only the roofs could be seen) were scattered and surrounded by creeks and swamps, and though occasionally some thatched houses were set on fire, it had not the effect of driving the fighting-men any great distance from their guns, as they were invariably ready, after a short interval, to open fire if they discovered we had parties on-shore.

8. The stoppage of the food supply, supposing it had been possible to prevent any going in, which was doubtful (owing to the nature of the country intersected in every direction by creeks, the openings to which are very difficult to discern) did not commend itself to me, as it would have caused great misery to the slaves and poorer people, leaving the real instigators of the trouble untouched, as any food that did find its way in would immediately be appropriated by them.

9. Under these circumstances it appeared to me that we might go on wasting ammunition for days, and wearing the men out in an unhealthy climate, patrolling and blockading without bringing matters to a satisfactory conclusion, so I decided that a direct attack on the town by a landing party must be made, and the Acting-Consul General fully concurred.

10. The difficulties were considerable, owing to the vast stretch of mangrove swamp that surrounded the town, while a direct attack by boats up a creek commanded by a number of guns and blocked very effectually in many places would probably cost many valuable lives.

11. The only practicable way of getting at the place seemed to be by making some kind of track through the swamp and getting in the rear of the guns; accordingly on the afternoon of the 20th the ground on the right bank of the creek, of which nothing was known before, was reconnoitred by Mr. Roupell, of the Niger Coast Protectorate Forces, and a small detachment of native troops, and was reported impracticable.

12. I now determined to try and clear away the bush on the left bank of the creek until we could get into a position to enfilade the guns that

commanded it, but the position of which we could not very accurately determine; and accordingly on the 22nd a party of wood cutters, covered by Houssa skirmishers, and supported by a company of seamen from the "Philomel," commenced cutting from the upper end of the stockade which had been taken on the first attack.

13. I went away that morning with the Consul-General in the "Alecto" as far as Sapele (about 4 miles) to visit some villages which were suspected of assisting Nanna, and left orders with Captain Campbell, of the "Philomel," to push on with the cutting and to endeavour to obtain information about the trend of the creek, probable position of the guns, &c., but not to expose the men more than absolutely necessary, and to withdraw if they found they were working in the line of fire. After cutting for a couple of hours they were discovered and a heavy fire was opened; it was evident that any advance in that direction must be at the risk of considerable loss; the wood cutters would not work any longer, and the party were embarked and returned without loss.

14. Before the fire was opened Lieutenant (N.) Parks, of the "Phoebe," reconnoitred the creek in a canoe for some distance, and added to the scant information we possessed.

15. This day's experience proved the necessity of proceeding in a different direction, and, having fortunately obtained the services of a couple of intelligent deserters, we started to cut a track through the swamp that would take us well round clear of the guns, and on the 23rd we commenced cutting, with a strong party of labourers, 50 Houssa skirmishers in front of them, and a covering party of Seamen and Marines. I landed about 2 P.M., and at 3 P.M. the natives apparently discovered that something was going on, for they suddenly opened a very rapid fire from cannon, machine guns, and rifles. They fired from the former between 80 and 90 rounds in less than an hour; fortunately they were principally laid in the direction of the creek and did no damage. A track was cut about 400 yards long by the evening.

16. Next morning early the cutting was resumed. A heavy and rapid fire was again opened; but they evidently could not get the direction, and it proved ineffectual. After a few hours' work it was reported to me that the edge of the thick mangroves was nearly reached, that the country was more open beyond, and that it was, in all probability, possible to get into the town in a short time from the point they had reached, so the cutting was stopped, and I spent the afternoon in organizing an attack for next day.

17. A further report of the proceedings will be forwarded by the next opportunity.

SIR,

THE Admiral of the African Squadron has, as you are probably aware, arrived in the river with another of Her Majesty's ships, and others are shortly expected.

It is deemed advisable, in the interests of yourself, chiefs and people, also on grounds of common humanity, to give you another and final opportunity of surrender. As you have already been informed no terms can be made with you further than if

you, your chiefs and people, surrender and lay down your arms your lives will be safe. For anything further than this, your people must trust to the clemency of Her Majesty's Government.

Should you be prepared to surrender you must inform me by bearer, and a reasonable time, not exceeding two hours, will be allowed you to appear with your chiefs on Her Majesty's ship "Phœbe" now lying at the mouth of Brohemie Creek.

MEMORANDUM.

NANNA answers to foregoing letter calling on him to surrender.

Verbal reply given to messengers to the effect that—

"Nanna has read the letter and hears what it says, but that does not mean to say that he agrees to it. He will come down himself if he wishes to."

As the messengers were paddling down the creek from Brohemie, Nanna sent them word that they need not come to him again.

Foregoing received on 20th, the date the messengers went up.

Letter from Commander-in-Chief to Admiralty, dated 3rd October, 1894, No. 343.

"*Philomel*," at Benin,

SIR,

October 3, 1894.

IN continuation of my letter of 27th September, No. 342, be pleased to inform their Lordships that the attack on Brohemie, which I mentioned I was organizing for 25th September, was carried out with complete success.

2. The force detailed for the attack by the track cut through the mangrove swamp was on shore in good time. I landed at 5.30 A.M., accompanied by my Flag Lieutenant, Mr. P. Streatfeild, and Mr. Wilson (Clerk), who both did most useful service during the day. The Houssas, wood-cutters, Maxim gun and rocket party, had already started, and the rest of the column was pushed forward as quickly as possible.

3. The natives seem to have anticipated an attack that morning, for very soon after we landed they opened fire, and missiles were flying about freely in the vicinity of the stockade and the beginning of the track; but fortunately no one was hurt. They had no guns bearing on us as we advanced.

4. The firing from the ships, which was suspended while the landing was in progress, commenced again about 6.15 A.M. The guns being carefully laid on bearings, and at ranges that would ensure safety to our men. All firing had been ordered to cease at 6.45 A.M., and by that time the cutting through the mangrove bush was completed, and we were ready to advance in more open, but very soft, swampy country, intersected by small creeks.

5. The march along the track was a most arduous and fatiguing one, especially for men equipped. When freshly cut down the thin layer of trees and the roots gave some kind of footing, but even with this help you sank at every step half-way to the knee. On this occasion, however, most of the road had been cut for two days; it had been trampled down by the passage to and fro of large numbers of men. Rain had fallen

heavily at short intervals, and to go down over the knee in the evil-smelling mud was a constant occurrence; but the men trudged on quietly and persistently, and, not being hampered by any field-guns, made fairly good progress. Upon reaching the open I pushed forward to the front, to be in a better position for directing the movements, and joined Mr. Moor, Acting Consul-General, who had been personally directing the movements of the Houssas with great energy and sound judgment. He remained with me for the rest of the day. I cannot speak too highly of his services. Two guns were fired from the left about this time, but did no damage.

6. Mr. Campbell, Vice-Consul for Bonny, was doing most useful work in scouting, and his reports showed that the natives who acted as guides were taking us in the desired direction, and as soon as the main body was clear of the mangroves, the Marines, also Maxim and rockets were opened out on the right, the Seamen in the centre, and the Houssas on the left. We soon struggled through the swamp, to a point from which it was possible to form some idea of the town. The plan attached shows the position, and from there the advance was fairly rapid, though difficult at times owing to the numerous creeks.

7. The Houssas who had skirmished admirably in front through the bush, inclined to the left to disable the guns before mentioned, and the alteration in the formation rendered necessary by the narrow extent of hard ground placed the Marines in front with the rockets and Maxim gun, followed by the Seamen, then the Houssas.

8. On gaining the first clear view, it was evident that the position of the enemy was untenable. We were in the rear of their defences and a large number of men could be seen running from the guns which commanded the creek. I immediately sent orders to Captain Campbell, of Her Majesty's ship "Philomel," to advance. Fire was opened from Alluma's house as we approached, but it was soon silenced by volley firing and rockets, and the attack was pressed forward, until at 8.5 A.M. we were in complete possession of the town, and the natives had entirely disappeared into the bush.

9. At Alluma's (see plan) we found the magazine, which I ordered to be cleared and the contents destroyed; it contained more than 13 tons of powder, besides many barrels of iron shot, and 240 cases of gin. Leaving a party and guard to clear the magazine, the main body were pushed on to the chief Nanna's quarters, a fine well-built collection of dwellings and storehouses, with a large open space of clear ground about them. A creek ran up close to the house where there was a long row of boat-houses, but only a very few large canoes were hauled up, and none of the war canoes he was known to possess. The guns in this battery were spiked, many of them were found loaded. Captain Campbell's force arrived at 9.30, it having been delayed considerably by the obstructions placed across the creek, and which had to be removed by guncotton.

10. It was necessary to occupy the town for some days at all events, and I placed Captain Powell in command. The Houssas were quartered at first at Alluma's, and our men at Nanna's, but it was found advisable the next day to concentrate the whole force at the latter place. It poured with rain incessantly from about 11 A.M., which added considerably to the discomfort experienced.

11. I was quite astonished at the extent of the place, and the open spaces and soft mud had to a large measure rendered the shell fire ineffective; Nanna's quarters were practically uninjured, also

Alluma's; Bizanne's house was very much damaged and a number of the thatched-roof houses had been burnt; but many of the smaller buildings were of wood or red clay; all the principal ones had iron roofs, and it was impossible to ignite them by shell fire. The long ranges of storehouses about Nanna's house were filled, in addition to the warlike stores, with quantities of articles for trading, and an enormous amount of gin. We destroyed in the first 24 hours about 800 cases containing one dozen bottles each, and 7,500 cases were found in store afterwards. No less than 106 guns, ranging from a 3-pounder to a 32-pounder cannonade, were found mounted and unmounted in various positions. Among them was a large number of about 9-pounders, very good looking cast-iron guns.

It had puzzled me how they were able to maintain such a rapid fire. When, however, I saw the powder made up in neat muslin bags, and the cylinders of split bamboo crammed with iron balls and pieces of scrap iron all ready, the explanation was simple.

12. It must have taken months, I might almost say years, of preparation, which could only have been in anticipation of trying conclusions with us, and a considerable amount of intelligence was displayed in all the arrangements. For instance, the guns were admirably placed to meet any attack from the direction expected, viz., the creek, and the guns themselves were well and strongly mounted, some on truck and rear chock carriages, some embedded in heavy baulks of timber, and kept in place by iron straps; and all were so firmly secured by chains to posts driven into the ground that there was no evidence of their having turned over by firing, as is often the case with makeshift mountings, although they had certainly been tested.

13. Next morning, the 26th September, accompanied by the Acting Consul-General, I proceeded with a force under the command of Captain Campbell to Eddu, a small town at the head of a creek about two miles from Brohemie. The track to this place was through nearly as bad a swamp as that in which we were marching the day before, there was a little hard ground at the entrance of the village, a few armed men rushed into the bush as the Houssas (who were skirmishing in front) appeared, and we saw no more of them. Two guns, about 6-pounders, loaded nearly to the muzzle, commanded this small creek, which runs up to the town from the river; these were destroyed, the village fired, and we returned after Mr. Roupell, of the Protectorate Forces, and a small party of Houssas had waded down the creek for a considerable distance to see if there were any canoes in it.

14. The Acting Consul-General being anxious to ascertain whether Okotobo and other villages of the Addubrassi Creek, which have never been visited before, were friendly or not, on the evening of the 26th I gave orders to Lieutenant and Commander Heugh, and Mr. Tomlin, Acting Sub-Lieutenant, to proceed in the Protectorate launch "Shamrock," taking with them another smaller steam-launch, and the "Alecto's" surf-boat, with strict orders only to reconnoitre and return. Lieutenant and Commander Heugh showed commendable zeal in carrying out his instructions.

On the morning of the 27th, I despatched the "Widgeon" to Bonny with telegrams. She returned on 30th.

15. While all this was going on, the various large creeks were being actively patrolled to try and intercept Nanna. The "Alecto" was moved well up the Addubrassi Creek, and kept watch over it. Four police launches belonging to the

Protectorate were turned over to me. These boats were large enough to afford some shelter from the heavy rains, but the work has been very trying. I have every reason to be satisfied by the vigilance shown by the officers and men in them.

16. As it was certain that a large number of people and canoes must be trying to escape by some outlet, I placed a small party under command of Lieutenant Gore-Browne, with orders to start from Brohemie at daylight on the 27th, and with small boats explore a creek up which we had reason to believe (from information received from some of the stragglers that kept coming in) Nanna and his people were cutting their way out. Mr. Campbell, Vice-Consul, accompanied the party, and in the course of the day these returned, having about two miles up the creek come across an immense number of canoes, and with one of the chiefs, Ologun, prisoner.

The people were told to go back to Brohemie, which they seemed glad to do, and about 150 canoes, containing a very large proportion of women and children, came in before dark. The people were lodged in some empty storehouses for the night, the sick carefully treated, and all were fed, poor things most of them were very hungry, but I was glad to find very few wounded, and I feel confident that for many days the town had been deserted by all but those who intended to fight, and they had found some place of comparative safety out of our usual range. [We learned after the place had been taken that they used to lie down behind some huts with very strongly built mud walls in the vicinity of the guns], and the inhabitants had been living in their canoes and camping out in places in the bush known only to them. It may be mentioned that living in canoes is the natural condition of these people, they travel about for days in them, and are constantly on the move.

17. The very large majority of the people were slaves, and must in many cases have suffered great privations from want of sufficient food.

18. Every effort was being made to endeavour to catch the headmen by whose obstinacy all this misery had been brought about, and though most of the people questioned declared that Nanna had gone out four or five days ago by a new creek he was cutting, it seemed impossible that he should have done so with his large canoes in face of the vigilant patrolling that was going on.

19. At last, late in the afternoon of the 27th, we obtained information that seemed to leave us no doubt that the war canoes were still in the creek; and one man who had been in favour, but had lately been deposed by Nanna, declared Nanna was going to escape that night, and he thought he could find out the place.

I immediately despatched the steam pinnaces of this ship and the "Phoebe" under Lieutenant Streatfeild, my Flag Lieutenant, and Lieutenant Hickley, with orders to take up positions on each side of the supposed opening and hidden as much as possible under the bushes.

20. They reached their position about midnight and kept as quiet as possible in the inky darkness. About 3 A.M., on the morning of the 28th, Lieutenant Streatfeild heard whispering a short distance from his boat; he could see nothing, but immediately began to move his boat out. A slight noise was made, four men splashed into the water and were into the bush in a moment, leaving a canoe, which, on examination, was found to contain all the valuables belonging to Nanna which could be packed into a moderate-sized canoe, including £327 in money, and among other things

were two hideous carved wooden arrangements, which the natives declared were the war Ju Ju of Nanna and Bizanne, and which they would certainly have with them. It seems most probable therefore that they were in the canoe.

21. It is a most hopeless task trying to follow up natives in this bush, but the "Alecto" sent a party of kroomen to search about, while Lieutenant Hickley returned to the ship, delivered up the valuables, and I arranged that some Houssas should go up and endeavour to trace the fugitives; in this they were unsuccessful, and returned in the evening. Next morning, however, Nanna's cap and coat were found near by and recognized as those he was wearing, and there is no reason to doubt that he was in the canoe.

22. Meantime at daylight, the same day (September 28), Lieutenant Gore-Browne, accompanied as before by Mr. Campbell, Vice-Consul, started off with a small detachment of Seamen from the "Philomel," taking the Houssas' Maxim gun in a dinghy with them, and after following the creek along for about 2 miles, they left the boats which were constantly aground, and waded for about 2 miles. They passed more canoes at intervals and told them to go back, and at last were rewarded by coming upon the war canoes and others laden with Nanna's effects, the procession being hopelessly blocked by a large canoe. To get them as far as they did must have entailed immense labour, and the slaves must have been working for a long time at it.

23. All day we were at work, the Acting Consul-General, more particularly, freeing the slaves, making arrangements as to their future, supplying them with provisions, and starting them off, and before dark some 1,500 had been dealt with.

24. On September 29th it poured incessantly all day, and much the same kind of work was going on. Lieutenant Parks, of the "Phœbe," and Mr. Ruppell, of the Protectorate Forces, remained all night with the canoes at the end of the creek to prevent looting. Lieutenant Gore-Browne went up at daylight with a small detachment from the "Philomel" to relieve them, and a party of kroomen were sent up to assist in bringing the large canoes down. In the course of the afternoon some of Nanna's gig canoes, which were built for war purposes, were brought down deeply laden with his effects. I was now able to reduce the garrison, and Captain Powell returned on board in the evening, leaving Lieutenant Hickley in command of the town.

25. September 30. The patrolling launches were withdrawn, except one that had orders to see that the canoes leaving Brohemic with the people, took the direction that had been arranged. The "Alecto" moved down the river. Lieutenant Gore-Browne had remained all night up the creek where the canoes were found, and by his exertions the last of them reached Brohemic before sunset.

26. The last ten or twelve canoes were all war canoes belonging to Nanna, Bizanne, and other chiefs; they had started them first, with their effects, in hopes they would cut their way out before being discovered, leaving the slaves in the rear. In the canoes mentioned above we found numbers of whips, slave irons, neck rings, &c., and there were evidences of horrible severities having been practised to make the slaves work at getting the canoes along; large numbers of them ran away, and at different times came down to the edge of the bush, and were taken off by our patrolling boats. Altogether the Consul-General made arrangements for the future of about 2,500

people, who came into Brohemic from the bush after it was taken, principally in canoes.

27. Parties have been employed breaking up the large guns and bringing the smaller ones down and sinking them in deep water in the river. The blunderbusses and other weapons, not permitted under the Brussels Conference, have also been destroyed.

28. The Acting Consul-General proposes to sell the enormous stores of cloth, hardware, &c., by auction. The Houssas will garrison the place for some time longer, but there is no necessity for keeping our men up there, though it has been absolutely necessary until now, to prevent looting. They re-embarked on the evening of 1st October. Before leaving, the 7-pounder with carriage, which had been abandoned on 29th August, was recovered, together with the field carriage of the Maxim.

29. The "Philomel" and "Phœbe" will leave the river this morning, the 3rd October. The "Widgeon" and "Alecto" remain for a short time longer. The "Alecto" will take the Acting Consul-General up the Ethiopie River; he will only be away a few days, and I have his assurance, that unless any fresh trouble occurs, which is unlikely, that he will not seek to detain the ships a day longer than necessary.

30. Having now, I trust, placed my Lords in possession of a clear narrative of these short but arduous operations, it becomes my duty to bring to their notice the zeal and discipline of the officers and men of the small squadron under my immediate orders here, and it has been a real pleasure to me to note the cheerful and energetic manner they have gone about their duty. They have had to work under most trying conditions, and it has been perfectly marvellous that we have not had casualties.

31. It is unnecessary for me to enlarge on the discomforts of service in the rivers and creeks of the West Coast of Africa. They are well known at the Admiralty, but in this case, in addition to the boat work, there has been much marching about in the unwholesome mud, and for days it has rained incessantly.

32. Every precaution that could be, has been taken, and I am thankful to say the health of the ships' companies has not suffered much as yet; but the danger is when the reaction comes after the excitement of recent events has passed off, and I am sending the "Phœbe" to Ascension and St. Helena at once. The "Philomel" proceeds to the Cape, the "Alecto" will go to Cape Lopez and St. Thomé, and the "Widgeon" will cruise about.

33. Though all concerned have merited my approbation, I have found it necessary to mention several Officers' names in describing the various services performed; and there are others on whom greater responsibilities have fallen, owing to their position, &c.: these it is my duty to bring specially to the notice of their Lordships.

I. Though I could not agree with the views held by Captain Powell as to the measures to be taken to reduce Brohemic after the failure of the attack on 29th August, for reasons reported in paragraphs 7, 8, and 9, of my letter of the 27th September, I fully appreciated the efforts he had made, and was making in the direction that seemed best to him. I have, since my arrival, intrusted him with many important duties, which have been invariably carried out with great zeal and ability.

II. Captain Campbell, of the "Philomel," has acted as my Flag-Captain, and in that capacity has been zealous and energetic, and most anxious to carry out my orders and anticipate my wishes.

III. Lieutenant and Commander Heugh, of the "Alecto," has had a great deal of trying and important work to do, and has performed it with commendable zeal.

IV. I desire especially to mention the executive officers of "Philomel" and "Phœbe"—Lieutenants Gore-Browne and Hickley. It would be difficult to find two more able and zealous Officers.

V. I found when I arrived no reliable information about Brohemie; the chart was a blank, and no systematic attempt was being made to plot down what was gained by experience. I placed the matter in the hands of Lieutenant (N.) Parks, of the "Phœbe," and he has worked unremittingly at it, in addition to his other duties, with very satisfactory results.

VI. Staff Commander Maclean, of the "Philomel," has piloted the ship over the bars and through the narrow creeks with care; he has also been employed in patrolling work.

VII. During the operations Mr. Byron, my secretary, has been a great help to me.

VIII. I have been pleased with the promptitude shown by Lieutenant and Commander Grant-Dalton, of the "Widgeon," on several occasions when carrying my despatches and telegrams, when it involved crossing dangerous bars.

34. Captain Powell, of the "Phœbe," has submitted a list of Officers whom he desired to recommend. I have already had occasion to mention the names of Lieutenants Hickley and Parks, and I further wish to support his commendation of Staff-Surgeon Browne.

35. Sergeant Stilwell, Royal Marine Artillery, of the "Philomel," was in charge of the Marines during the attack on Brohemie on the 25th September, and carried out the orders he received with coolness and intelligence. The Sergeant of the "Phœbe," who was senior, landed, but was immediately taken ill, and had to return to the ship.

36. The Acting Consul-General has brought to my notice, in a letter, the services of John Keeffe, A.B., O.N. 124537, of Her Majesty's ship "Phœbe," who has worked the Maxim gun for the Houssas. I consider from my personal observation on several occasions that he has fully deserved the praise bestowed upon him.

37. It is also my duty to bring to their Lordships' notice for representation to the proper quarter the invaluable advice and assistance I have all through received from Mr. Moor, Acting Consul-General. I cannot speak too highly of his ability and energy. He is firm, and at the same time conciliatory in dealing with the natives, and I should say eminently suited to deal with the present state of affairs. I trust his services may meet with proper recognition.

38. In concluding, I venture to express the belief that the downfall of this powerful chief will have a very far-reaching and beneficial effect. For a long time he has terrorised the country round for a radius of a hundred miles or more. By force of arms he has compelled almost the entire trade of this district to pass through his hands without a shadow of right. He has owned a vast number of slaves, and regularly recruited them by cruel slave-raiding; he has, after entering into treaty obligations with this country, repudiated them whenever it suited his convenience, and defied us to enforce them; and all the time he has been preparing for the fight he knew must come sooner or later, and which he deliberately provoked at last, though given time and many opportunities of retreating from the position he had taken up. Perhaps the more extraordinary

part of it is that he so carefully prevented visitors from seeing any but the trading quarters of his stronghold Brohemie, that no reliable information could be obtained about the defences or resources of the place; and so it gradually came about that in a town so little known that it was actually not indicated on the chart, the largest store of munitions of war ever possessed by any native chief was accumulated, and the approaches by the usual route defended so strongly that direct attack would have been a most risky operation.

Gunpowder, 14 tons.

Heavy blunderbuss-shaped guns, with swivels for mounting on war canoes. The diameter of the bore of most of them, excluding the slightly bell-shaped mouth, was 1½ inches. About 100 of these new, with iron barrels; a large proportion of the rest had brass barrels, and were found loaded with about 30 iron bullets in each, 445 tons.

Long flint lock guns (new), 640.

Short flint lock guns (more than half these new), 906.

Flint and cap guns (found in various places in remains of burnt thatched houses), 245.

Short swords, 17 cases.

Long knives (Macheti), 231 cases.

Case shot made up in zinc cylinders and filled with iron balls and broken-up iron, between 500 and 600.

Bamboo cases of various calibres filled as above, and many cases ready for filling, about 500.

Gatling feeders (some of these empty), 7 cases.

Gatling ammunition, 2,500 rounds.

Snider ammunition, 2 cases.

Revolver ammunition (Eley's), 300 rounds.

Friction tubes, 2 boxes.

A very large quantity of round shot of various sizes, barrels of iron bullets, broken-up scrap iron, &c.

NOTE.—The Gatling gun feeders and ammunition were found in the bush near the creek where the war canoes were abandoned. The gun itself had not been found when I left, the search having been interrupted by heavy rain, but in all probability it will be, and I expect many more arms.

Large stores of cloth (estimated value between £3,000 and £4,000).

Hardware, &c.

Gin (cases containing 12 bottles in each), 8,300.

The store containing the cloth was burnt by accident on the morning of 2nd of October.

Our men had been withdrawn on the evening of the 1st, leaving a Houssa garrison. The fire was first discovered at 3 A.M. on the 2nd.

A Letter, of which the attached is a copy, has been addressed to the Commander-in-Chief with reference to the before-mentioned Despatches:—

SIR, *Admiralty, December 7, 1894.*

I HAVE laid before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the Despatches noted in the margin\* reporting on the operations undertaken against the Chief Nanna of Benin, in the months of August and September last, resulting in the capture of his stronghold at Brohémie on the 25th September, and I am commanded by their Lordships to acquaint you that they have much pleasure in approving all your proceedings and in noting the skill and energy by which they have been characterized.

They notice with satisfaction that your plans were so complete that your forces took the town, although it was strongly defended by batteries, without loss of life.

The peculiar nature of the position, surrounded as it is by mangrove swamps and intersected with creeks, rendered these operations especially arduous and difficult, and the zeal and endurance shown by Officers and Men in bringing them to a successful issue merits the highest praise.

Their Lordships fully recognize the gallantry and perseverance shown by the Officers and Men engaged in these operations, both at the capture of Brohémie and in those prior to your arrival in the Benin River, and I am to desire you will convey to all concerned the expression of their Lordships' high appreciation (in which the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs fully concurs) of the praiseworthy manner in which they did their duty under very trying circumstances.

The Despatches will be gazetted, and the names of the Officers and Men especially mentioned will be favourably noted.

### RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

#### NOTICE.

The following draft Rules are published pursuant to the Rules Publication Act, 1893:—

1. The Chancery Funds Amended Orders, 1874 (except so far as they revoke or abrogate any previous Order) and Order XXII, Rule 12, are hereby revoked.

#### Order XXII. Rule 12.

2. In the Chancery Division a person making a lodgment under an Order shall forthwith give notice thereof, by prepaid letter through the post, to the solicitor of the person on whose application the Order was made, or to such person if he has no solicitor, or if the Order was made on his own application to the solicitors of the other parties appearing thereon, or such other parties if they have no solicitors.

A person making a lodgment on request, other than a lodgment under the Trustee Act, 1893, shall forthwith give notice thereof in like manner to the solicitor of the other parties to the cause, or to such parties if they have no solicitor, or if such lodgment is made in a matter to the persons interested (if known), or their solicitors (if any), stating in each case what the money or securities so lodged represent.

#### Order XXII. Rule 12A.

3. Every petition or summons for dealing with money or securities in Court, chargeable with any duty payable to the Revenue, or the dividends on such securities, shall contain a statement whether such duty has or has not been paid.

#### Order XXII. Rule 12B.

4. Every petition or summons for dealing with funds which have been placed in the list of dormant funds, shall contain a statement that such funds have not been dealt with for 15 years or upwards, and where such funds shall amount to, or exceed in value, £500, a copy of such petition or summons shall, unless the Court or Judge shall otherwise direct, be served on the Official Solicitor of the Court.

#### Order LIV. Rule 4A.

5. Application to deal with funds lodged in Court under the Act, shall be intituled in the same manner as the affidavit or request on which the funds were lodged. All other applications under the Act, not made in any pending cause or matter, shall be intituled in the matter of the trust (described so as to be distinguishable) and of the Act. Every petition or summons for a vesting order, or the appointment of a person to convey, shall state the section or sections of the Act under which it is proposed that the Order should be made.

#### Order LV, Rule 13A.

6. Add to sub-section (c) of Order LV, Rule 13A, the words "or the suing for or recovering any chose in action," and in sub-section (d) of the same Order substitute for the words "where the money or securities in Court does not or do not exceed £1,000 or £1,000 nominal value," the words "coming within the provisions of Rule 2 of this Order."

#### Order LXI, Rule 19.

7. In Order LXI, Rule 19, after the word "petition" insert the word "affidavit," and after

the word "presented" the word "filed," and add at the end "or a note indicating that the cause was commenced prior to 2nd November, 1852, and the correctness of such reference to the record may be required to be authenticated by the Seal of the Central Office."

#### Order LXI, Rule 30.

8. Add at the end of the Rule "but no effects of the suitors consisting of jewels or plate or other articles of a like nature or negotiable securities are to be so deposited."

### ORDER OF LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL RE-ARRANGING THE WARDS OF THE PARISH OF ST. JAMES, WEST- MINSTER, APPROVED BY THE SEC- RETARY OF STATE.

To the Vestry of the Parish of St. James, Westminster;

And all whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section 15 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1893, it is enacted that the London County Council may from time to time for the purpose of elections of vestrymen, upon the application in writing of the vestry, or of not less than five hundred rated householders of a parish mentioned in Schedules A and B to the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, by order under their seal, re-arrange the wards in such parish, and determine the number, extent, limits, and boundary lines of the new wards, but so nevertheless that no ward shall contain less than five hundred rated householders, and that the whole number of wards shall not exceed eight, and the Council shall, in making any such re-arrangement apportion among the several wards the number of Vestrymen to be elected for such parish, and shall in assigning the number of Vestrymen to each ward have regard so far as practicable as well to the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in each ward as to the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated, and the number of Vestrymen assigned to each ward shall be a number divisible by three; and it is also by the said Act enacted that any such Order may contain such provisions with reference to the election, rotation, and retirement of Vestrymen (whether elected prior or subsequently to the date of the Order) as the Council may think necessary for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Order.

And whereas the parish of St. James, Westminster, is a parish mentioned in Part II of Schedule A to the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, and pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, the said parish was divided into four wards.

And whereas the vestry of the said parish of St. James, Westminster, hath applied to the London County Council to re-arrange the wards of the said parish pursuant to the provisions of the said 15th section of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1893.

And whereas it appears from the rate books of the said parish, prepared in the month of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, that the said parish contains four thousand nine hundred and seventy-nine rated householders, and that the ratable annual value of property in the said parish is seven hundred and twenty-four thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine pounds.

Now the London County Council having considered the said application, and having taken into consideration the number of persons rated to

the relief of the poor in each ward of the said parish, and the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated, and all the circumstances connected with such application, doth hereby order that the wards of the said parish of St. James, Westminster, be re-arranged in manner following, that is to say, that the said parish be divided into four wards, and that the wards be distinguished by the names mentioned in the first column of the undermentioned Schedule, that the extent, limits, and boundary lines of such

wards shall be those described in the second column of the said Schedule, and that the number of vestrymen to be elected for each of the said wards shall be the number mentioned in the third column of the said Schedule.

And the London County Council doth further order that this Order shall come into force for the purpose of the first election of vestrymen under the Local Government Act, 1894, and such election shall be subject to the provisions of the said Act.
