The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Rooms two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

## PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained

at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The number of Presentations is limited to 200

at each Drawing Room.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within

the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, between Her Majesty and His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals between the territories of Her Majesty and certain

Dependencies of Germany, which Treaty is in the terms following :-

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia, considering it advisable to regulate by a Treaty the extradition of criminals between certain dependencies of Germany and the territories of Her Britannic Majesty, have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries for this purpose:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, the Right Honourable John, Earl of Kimberley, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, &c., &c., Her Britannic Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign-Affairs; and

His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia, His Minister of State, Paul, Count von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg, Knight of the Exalted Order of the Black Eagle, &c., &c., Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of His Imperial and Royal Majesty to Her Britannic. Majesty;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective Full Powers, which were found to be in good and due form, have agreed to and concluded the following Articles:—

#### "ARTICLE I.

"The provisions of the Extradition Treaty signed between Germany and Great Britain on the 14th May, 1872, shall be applicable to the dependencies of Germany specified in the following Article, in such manner that persons in any of these dependencies, and within the sphere of the authorities established there, who are accused, or who have been convicted, of having committed a criminal act in the territories of Her Britannic Majesty, and persons in any of the aforesaid territories of Her Britannic Majesty, who are accused, or who have been convicted, of having committed a criminal act in any of the

Seine Majestät der Deutsche Kaiser, König von Preussen, Allerhöchstihren Staatsminister, Paul, Grafen von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg, Ritter des hohen Ordens vom Schwarzen Adler, &c., &c., ausserordentlichen und bevollmächtigten Botschafter Seiner Kaiserlichen und Königlichen Majestät bei Ihrer Grossbritannischen Majestät;

welche nach gegenseitiger Mittheilung ihrer in guter und gehöriger Form befundenen Vollmachten über folgende Artikel übereingekommen sind:—

## "ARTIKEL I.

"Die Bestimmungen des zwischen Deutschland und Grossbritannien am 14. Mai, 1872, unterzeichneten Auslieferungsvertrages sollen auf die im nachfolgenden Artikel näher bezeichneten, von Deutschland abhängigen Gebiete derart Anwendung finden, dass auch die in einem dieser Gebiete innerhalb des Bereichs der daselbst bestehenden Behörden sich aufhaltenden Personen, die einer im Vereinigten Königreich von Grossbritannien und Irland oder in den Kolonien und auswärtigen Besitzungen Ihrer Grossbritannischen Majestät begangenen strafbaren Handlung beschuldigt oder schuldig befunden sind, und die in einem der

dependencies of Germany, shall be mutually extradited in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid Treaty, in so far as they are not modified by the present Treaty.

#### "ARTICLE II.

"For the purposes of the present Treaty, the following are the dependencies of Germany referred to in Article I:—

"The territories in Africa, in New Guinea, and in the Pacific Ocean which, by agreement between Germany and Great Britain, have been, or shall in future be, reserved to Germany as spheres of influence, Protectorates, or possessions.

#### "ARTICLE III.

"In place of Article III of the Extradition Treaty of the 14th May, 1872, it is hereby provided, with regard to the dependencies of Germany, that there shall be no obligation to grant the extradition from those dependencies of natives or of subjects of the Empire, and that the British authorities shall be under no obligation to grant the extradition of British subjects who have been accused or convicted of a criminal act in those dependencies.

#### "ARTICLE IV.

"There shall be no obligation to grant extradition from the dependencies of Germany in cases where, before the extradition has taken place, such an application has been received for the transfer of the person in question to the territory of the German Empire as must, according to law, be complied with. The granting of extradition from a dependency of Germany must always be considered as being on the condition that no such application shall have been received before the extradition is carried out. In case the transfer to Germany takes place, it shall, however, be open to the British Government to apply for the extradition of the person concerned from Germany, in accordance with the terms of the Treaty of the 14th May, 1872.

#### " ARTICLE V.

"Applications for extradition from dependencies of Germany shall be made through the British Ambassador at Berlin, in accordance with paragraph 1 of Article VIII of the Treaty of the 14th May, 1872, but in the case of persons who are accused, or who have been convicted, of criminal acts in the Colonies or foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, the application for extradition may be made to the chief authority of the dependency of Germany from which the extradition of the persons in question is desired by the chief Consular officer of Her Britannic Majesty in the dependency in question, if there be a Consular officer therein, or, if there be none, then by the Governor or other chief authority of the Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty concerned. It shall, however, be open to the chief authority of the dependency of Germany to refer to the German Government in case of doubt whether the application for extradition should be complied with.

# "ARTIKEL II.

"Unter den von Deutschland abhängigen Gebieten (Artikel I) sind im Sinne des gegenwärtigen Vertrages zu verstehen:—

"Die Gebiete in Afrika, in Neu-Guinea und im Westlichen Stillen Ozean, die durch Uebereinkommen zwischen Deutschland und Grossbritannien als Interessensphären, Schutzgebiete oder Besitzungen Deutschland vorbehalten worden sind oder noch vorbehalten werden sollten.

#### "ARTIKEL III.

"An Stelle des Artikels III des Auslieferungsvertrages vom 14. Mai, 1872, soll für die von Deutschland abhängigen Gebiete gelten, dass die Verpflichtung zur Auslieferung aus diesen Gebieten sich nicht auf deren Eingeborene, sowie auf Reichsangehörige und die Verpflichtung der Britischen Behörden zur Auslieferung von Personen, die in jenen Gebieten einer strafbaren Handlung beschuldigt oder schuldig befunden sind, sich nicht auf Britische Unterthanen erstreckt.

#### "ARTIKEL IV.

"Die Verpflichtung zur Auslieferung aus den von Deutschland abhängigen Gebieten fällt weg, wenn vor Ausführung der Auslieferung ein Antrag auf Ablieferung der beanspruchten Person nach dem Gebiete des Deutschen Reichs eingeht, dem nach gesetzlicher Vorschrift entsprochen werden muss. Die Bewilligung der Auslieferung aus einem der von Deutschland abhängigen Gebiete soll stets als unter der Bedingung geschenn gelten, dass ein solcher Antrag auf Ablieferung bis zur Ausführung der Auslieferung nicht eingegaugen ist. Es bleibt im Falle der Ablieferung nach Deutschland der Königlich Grossbritannischen Regierung aber vorbehalten, die demnächstige Auslieferung aus Deutschland auf Grund und nach Massgabe des Vertrages vom 14. Mai, 1872, in Antrag zu bringen.

#### "ARTIKEL V.

"Die Anträge auf Auslieferung aus einem der von Deutschland abhängigen Gebiete sollen, wie im Absatz 1 des Artikels VIN des Vertrages vom 14. Mai, 1872, vorgesehen ist, durch die Königlich Grossbritannische Botschaft in Berlin gestellt werden mit der Massgabe jedoch, dass, falls es sich um Personen handelt, die einer in den Kolonien oder auswärtigen Besitzungen Ihrer Grossbritannischen Majestät begangen strafbaren Handlung beschuldigt oder schuldig befunden sind, der Antrag auf Auslieferung auch bei der obersten Behörde des von Deutschland abhängigen Gebietes, aus dem die Auslieferung der fraglichen Personen gewünscht wird, durch den obersten Konsular-beamten Ihrer Grossbritaunischen Majestät in dem betreffenden Gebiete, wenn ein solcher vorhanden ist, oder, wenn dieses nicht der Fall ist, durch den Statthalter oder die sonstige oberste Behörde der bei der Angelegenheit betheiligten Kolonie oder auswärtigen Besitzung Ihrer Majestät gestellt werden kann. Der obersten Behörde des betreffenden von Deutschland abhängigen Gebietes bleibt es jedoch vorbehalten, wenn es ihr zweifelhaft erscheint, ob dem Auslieferungsantrage zu entsprechen ist, darüber an ihre Regierung zu berichten.

"Applications for the extradition of criminals to one of the dependencies of Germany shall be made in the manner provided in Article VIII, paragraph 1, and Article XV of the Treaty of the 14th May, 1872; in case, however, there should be no German Consular officer in the Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty from which the extradition is desired, the application may be made by the Governor or other chief authority of the dependency of Germany which is concerned to the Governor or other chief authority of the Colony or possession concerned.

# "ARTICLE VI.

"The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged as soon as possible.

"The Treaty shall come into operation two months after the exchange of the ratifications, and shall remain in force as long as the Treaty of the 14th May, 1872, remains in force, that is, it shall terminate with the termination of that Treaty.

"In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed

thereto the seal of their arms.

"Done at London, the tifth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.

Mai, 1872, vorgesehenen Wege zu stellen, mit der Massgabe jedoch, dass, wenn ein deutscher Konsularbeamter in der Kolonie oder auswärtigen Besitzung Ihrer Grossbritannischen Majestät, der aus Auslieferung gewünscht wird, nicht vorhanden ist, der Auslieferungsantrag durch den Gouverneur oder die sonstige oberste Behörde des bei der Angelegenheit betheiligten von Deutschland abhängigen Gebietes an den Statthalter oder die sonstige oberste Behörde der betreffenden Kolonie oder Besitzung gerichtet werden kann.

#### "ARTIKEL VI.

"Der gegenwärtige Vertrag soll ratifizirt und die Ratifikations-Urkunden sollen so bald wie

möglich ausgewechselt werden.

"Der Vertrag soll zwei Monate nach Austausch der Ratifikations-Urkunden in Kraft treten und. so lange in Kraft bleiben wie der Vertrag vom 14. Mai, 1872, also ausser Kraft treten, wenn dieser ausser Kraft tritt.

"Zu Urkund dessen haben die beiderseitigen Bevollmächtigten denselben unterzeichnet und

ihre Siegel beigedrückt.

"So geschehen zu London am fünften Mai, im Jahre des Herrn ein tausend acht hundert und vier und neunzig.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at London on the third day of

December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the said Treaty with His Majesty The German Emperor, King of Prussia, and of the Dependencies of Germany referred to therein.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the said Dependencies of Germany and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the

Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

And whereas the immediate operation of this Order is urgent, this Order shall come into operation on the said third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

HEREAS on the thirtieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, a Convention was made at London between Her Majesty and the President of the French Republic respecting the postal service between France and French possessions and the United Kingdom and British Possessions, the terms of which Convention are set forth in the schedule to "The Mail Ships (France) Order in Council, 1892."

And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged on the twenty-third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

one:

And whereas by section eight of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," it is provided that an Order in Council may for the purpose of a Convention with a Foreign State apply the said Act, subject to any exceptions or modifications not inconsistent

with the provisions of the said Act, to any British Possession, and that the said Act when so applied should, subject to those exceptions and modifications and subject as thereinafter mentioned, have effect as if it were re-enacted, with the substitution of such British Possession for the United Kingdom, provided that, before it should be applied to any British Possession named in the Schedule to the said Act, the Government of such Possession should have adhered to the Convention.

And whereas the Government of Tasmania, one of the British Possessions named in the Schedule to the said Act, has adhered to the said Convention:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Act should, for the purpose of the said Convention, apply to Tasmania, subject to the exceptions and modifications in this Order contained:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :-

1. "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" shall, for the purpose of the said Convention, apply to Tasmania, subject, however, to the provisions of

exceptions and modifications following, that is to

(i) The expression "Officer of Customs" shall mean an officer of the Customs Department

of Tasmania.

(ii) In lieu of sub-sections (one) and (two) of section seven of the said Act the following provisions shall be substituted, that is to say: Every offence may be prosecuted and every fine may be recovered by action or other legal proceedings in any Court of Tasmania competent to impose fines, but any fine imposed by a Court of inferior or limited jurisdiction shall not exceed either the amount authorized by the said Act or the amount of fine which the Court may impose in the exercise of its ordinary jurisdiction, whichever of the said amounts shall be the less; and there shall be the same right of appeal (if any) against any such fine as in other cases of fines imposed by the same Court in the exercise of its ordinary jurisdiction; and every Court, whether of original or appellate jurisdiction, may reduce the amount of any fine.

(iii) The regulations required to be made under sub-section (four) of section seven of the said Act by the Commissioners of Customs, with the consent of the Treasury, shall in Tas-

mania be made by the Governor in Council.
(iv) Section five of the said Act, so far as relates to the Commissioners of Customs, shall

not apply to Tasmania.

2. The said Act shall apply as regards any public ship of the French Republic, when employed as a mail ship in the cases authorized by Article V of the said Convention.

3. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (France) Order in Council (Tasmania), 1895."

WHEREAS Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Empress of India by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts 1844 to 1886, and having regard to the provisions of a Convention the ratifications of which were exchanged on the fourteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninetyfour between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of Austria King of Bohemia and Apostolic King of Hungary was pleased to make an Order in Council dated the thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four providing amongst other things that the said convention should as from the commencement of the said Order and subject to clause five of the said Order have full effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions:

And whereas by clause five of the said Order it was provided that the said Order should apply to all the Colonies and Foreign Possessions of Her Majesty excepting to those named in the said clause but that nevertheless the provisions of the said Order might be applied by further Order to any Colonies or Foreign Possessions named in the

section eight of the said Act, and also to the said clause on whose behalf notice to the effect indicated in Article IX of the said Convention should be duly given:

And whereas the Colonies of Newfoundland. Natal, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and New Zealand being some of the colonies excepted from the operation of the said Order have severally expressed a wish that the said Convention may be made applicable to them and the notice required by Article IX of the said Convention has been duly given on behalf of the above-named Colonies by Her Majesty's Representative at the Court of His Imperial and

Royal Apostolic Majesty:

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts 1844 to 1886 and of the proviso in clause five of the said Order of the thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four and Article IX of the said Convention doth order and it is hereby ordered that the provisions of the said Order of the thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four shall apply and the same are applied accordingly to the following Colonies: that is to say

> Newfoundland. Natal. Victoria. Queensland. South Australia. Western Australia. New Zealand.

This Order shall come into operation on and

from the date hereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly. C. L. Peel.

W HEREAS by virtue of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act 1890" it is lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise and enjoy any power of jurisdiction which Her Majesty now hath or may at any time hereafter have within any country or place out of Her Majesty's deminions in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had. acquired such power or jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory.

And whereas under a Convention concluded at Constantinople on the fourth of June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey assigned the Island of Cyprus to be occupied and administered by

England.

And whereas by a supplementary Convention concluded at Constantinople on the fourteenth of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy - eight it was amongst other things declared that in assigning the Island of Cyprus to be occupied and administered by England, His Imperial Majesty the Sultan had thereby transferred to and vested in Her Majesty the Queen for the term of the occupation, and no longer, full powers of making laws for the government of the Island in Her Majesty's name, free from the Porte's control.

And whereas by Her Majesty's Order in Council of the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, the coins specified in the Schedule to this Order were declared and ordained to be legal tender in the Island of Cyprus at the rates and for the amounts therein stated:

And whereas doubts have arisen with respect to the least current weight of such coins, and the power of dealing with them when too light, and it

is expedient to remove such doubts.

Now therefore Her Majesty is pleased, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her Majesty by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act 1890 or otherwise, and by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to declare and order, and it is hereby declared and ordered as follows:-

1. The least current weight of each of the gold coins named in the Schedule to this Order is the weight in that behalf specified in the Schedule; and the tender of payment of money, if made in any of the said coins when either it is of less weight than such least current weight, or has been called in by Her Majesty's proclamation,

is not a legal tender.

2. Any of the gold coins mentioned in the Schedule to this Order which is below the least current weight or has been called in by Her Majesty's proclamation, may be cut, broken, or defaced in such manner and by such persons and generally in accordance with such regulations, general or special as may be from time to time directed by Her Majesty's High Commissioner and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Cyprus, with the advice of the Executive Council of the Island.

3. This Order may be cited as "The Cyprus

Every British sailing-vessel provided with a special licence under this Order shall show, under her national colours, a flag, not less than four feet square, of two equal triangular pieces, yellow and black, joined from the right-hand upper corner of the fly to the left-hand lower corner of the luff, the part above and to the left to be black, and the part to the right and below to be yellow.

3. If in the case of any vessel there is any contravention of these Regulations, a Secretary of State, or any person duly authorized by him for the purpose, whether any penalty has been recovered under the recited Act or not, may revoke the special licence, whether the same was granted by a Secretary of State or by such person.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries or some of them which are within the Archdeaconry of Canterbury in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four certain rearrangements of the areas of some of the rural deaneries within the said diocese of Canterbury were effected.

"And we further recommend and propose that. nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

say:"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Mujesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parochial chapelry of Blacktoft, the parish of Howden, and the parish of Eastrington all in the county of York and in the diocese of York and also to com prise certain extra-parochial places called or known respectively as Gilberdike Mill, Cheapsides, New Village and Market Weighton Ganal, all in the said county and dioress.

"Whereas it has been made it appear to us

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that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said cures together with the said extra-parochial places which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

. "And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes

of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parochial chapelry of Blacktoft, the said parish of Howden, and the said parish of Eastrington or some or one of them have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts or of some or one of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act and to his successors, and when the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the last-mentioned Act then to the Incumbent of such new parish and to his successors a grant of one hundred pounds, per

"And whereas such grant as aforesaid will be made by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas Thomas Stephen Whitaker of Everthorpe Hall, Brough, in the East Riding of the said county of York has contributed and paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners a sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence towards the endowment of the herein proposed district or new

"And whereas the said sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence has been so paid as aforesaid by the said Thomas Stephen Whitaker upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner

hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas we have undertaken to pay in respect of the said sum of one thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence and so long as it shall remain in our hands by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year a sum of fifty pounds to the minister or incumbent of the said proposed

district or new parish.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) William we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parochial chapelry of Blacktoft, of the said parish of Howden, of the said parish of Eastrington, together with the said extraparochial places called or known respectively as Gilberdike Mill, Chcapsides, New Village, and Market Weighton Canal, which are mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon

and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The

District of Saint Stephen Newport.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Thomas Stephen Whitaker for his life and that after his death the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish shall be vested in and shall and may be exercised by the said William Dalrymple Archbishop of York and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Stephen, Newport,

"All those several contiguous portions of the parochial chapelry of Blacktoft, of the parish of Howden, and of the parish of Eastrington, all in the county of York and in the diocese of York, and all those extra-parochial places called or known respectively as Gilberdike Mill, Cheapsides, New Village, and Market Weighton Canal, in the said county and diocese which (taken together) are bounded upon the north partly by the parish of Holme-on-Spalding Moor and partly by the parish of Hotham, both in the county of York and diocese of York, upon the north-east partly by the parish of North Cave and partly by the parish of South Cave both in the said county and diocese upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Mary Broomfleet in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-west and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Broomfleet from the parochial chapelry of Blacktoft aforesaid at a point a little to the south. east of Oxmardike Gate in the middle of the line of the Hull and Selby Railway and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and fifty-nine chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing at Bellasize-lane, the boundary which divides the said parochial chapelry of Blacktoft from the parish of Eastrington aforesaid) to the point a little to the north-west of Gilberdike Bridge where such line of railway crosses Middlefield drain and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said drain for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Middlefield east drain and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named drain for a distance of fourteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with North Field drain and extending thence first eastward and then northward along the middle of the last-named drain

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the parochial chapelry of Blacktoft of the parish of Howden and of the parish of Eastrington out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and to the Archbishop of York in respect of the extra-parochial places to be comprised within the limits of such district and such Patrons and Incumbents and Archbishop have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

And whereas on the fifth day of November in the year last aforesaid the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department did duly appoint me the Honourable Evan Edward Charteris Barrister-at-Law for the purpose of determining the boundaries of such wards and apportioning the Besthorpe Church, in the parish of South Councillors of the said city among them without Searle, in the county of Nettingham; and making any alteration in the number of such wards as in the said Municipal Corporations Act 1882 mentioned.

Now I the said Evan Edward Charteris do hereby in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act determine as hereinafter mentioned the boundaries of the two wards into which the said city is divided which wards are hereinafter numbered and named as follows:—

Ward No. 1 otherwise the Eastern Ward. Ward No. 2 otherwise the Western Ward.

And I do hereby determine that the said Ward No. 1 otherwise the Eastern Ward shall comprise so much of the city of Truro as is contained within a line which commences at a point in the centre of the channel of the Truro river by Lower Newham Quay at the point of intersection of the city boundary with such channel and then passes up the centre of such channel to the town quay thence up the centre of the channel of Kenwyn river to a point near the entrance to the Nurseries on the Leats thence in almost a direct line to the centre of the road in front of Lower Trehaverne House then down the centre of Pydar-streetroad to the second house before reaching Boscawen-row thence at right angles in a northeasterly direction at the back of the houses on the north side of Boscawen-row to the centre of the river Allin thence up the centre of the channel of the said river to the point where the boundary of the city intersects the same thence following the said city boundary along the north, north-eastern, eastern and southern boundary of the city to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 2 otherwise the Western Ward shall comprise so much of the city of Truro as is contained within a line which commences at a point in the centre of the channel of the Truro river by Lower Newham Quay at the point of intersection of the city boundary with such channel and then passes up the centre of such channel to the Town Quay, thence up the centre of the channel of Kenwyn river to a point near the entrance to the Nurseries on the Leats thence in almost a direct line to the centre of the road in front of Lower Trehaverne House down the centre of Pydar-street-road to the second house before reaching Boscawen-row thence at right angles in a north-easterly direction at the back of the houses on the north side of Boscawen-row to the centre of the River Allin thence up the centre of the channel of the said river to the point where the boundary of the city intersects the same thence following the said city boundary along the north, north-western, and southern boundary of the city to the point of commencement aforesaid.

Such ward including that portion of the parish of Kenwyn which lies within the municipal area.

And I the said Evan Edward Charteris do hereby in further pursuance of the said Act and of the powers given me under the same by virtue of the said appointment assign and apportion nine Councillors to each of the said wards as follows that is to say:—

To Ward No. 1:—Councillors Mark Ball, Alfred Blenkinsop, Henry Buck, Walter Bryant Cory, William Chivell, John James, Elijah Wilee, William Hocker Williams, Thomas Worth.

To Ward No. 2:—Councillors Henry Barrett, James Julian, John Fowler Jacob, Denzil Little, Charles Robert Parkyn, Samuel James Polkinhorn,

Edward Roberts, Charles Seargeant, Richard Whitworth.

THE following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Jesus College, Cambridge, on the eighteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and sealed with the Common Seal of the College, on the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877, 40 and 41 Victoria Cup. 48 in relation to Jesus College in the University of Cambridge such amending Statutes being duly made at a general meeting off the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the 18th day of December 1894 and passed at the said general meeting by the unanimous vote of those present and voting and now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

WE the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of the said College in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the said Act do hereby alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College in the following manner viz.—

By substituting for Statute XV intituled "Of Pensions" the following Statute to form an amended Statute XV under the same title.

#### STATUTE XV.

Of Pensions.

In addition to and independent of any Fellowship dividend there shall be paid by way of pension in every year to each Fellow or late Fellow who shall have held the office of Bursar Dean Tutor Assistant Tutor or Lecturer or any two or more of the same offices for twenty years a sum equal to two-fifths of a dividend as ascertained by Statute XX of these Statutes and to each Fellow or late Fellow who shall have held any one or more of such offices for twenty-five years a sum equal to three-fifths of such dividend: such payments by way of pension to be made from the "Divisible Income" as specified in Statute XX of these Statutes. Provided that no person who was not on first October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four in possession of one of the aforesaid offices shall receive such pension while he holds any such office.

And by substituting for Statute XX intituled "Of the distribution of the Revenue," the following Statute to form an amended Statute XX under the same title.

#### STATUTE XX.

Of the Distribution of the Revenue.

From the gross yearly receipts of the College due or received on or before Michaelmas in each year shall be paid first all sums due under these Statutes or under Statute XXXI of the Statutes approved by the Queen in Council on sixteenth April one thousand eight hundred and sixtyone: also all charges arising from necessary repairs of buildings such stipends and salaries to the officers and servants of the College as may have been fixed by the Master and Fellows and all other ordinary burthens. Of the net income resulting ten per centum shall be paid to the General Scholarship Fund. The remainder after deducting the allowances of the Master and Fellows as fixed from time to time by vote of the Master and Fellows shall be called the "Divisible Income."

From the "Divisible Income" shall be paid to each Fellow under these Statutes one dividend such dividend not to exceed two hundred and fifty pounds, to the Master three such dividends and to each person who shall have acquired under Statute XV of these Statutes a right to a pension so many one-fifth parts of such dividend as under Statute XV he is entitled to (such payments by way of pension to be made pari passu with payments by way of dividend and without priority as between fellowships and pensions). The balance of "Divisible Income" if any shall be set aside for the use and emolument of the College. Provided that if any person shall have been Master or Fellow for a part only of such preceding year he shall be entitled to one fourth part only of his annual share for each quarter of a year or part of a quarter greater than the half during which he may have been Master or Fellow.

BYE-LAWS for the regulation of the passage through the Tower Bridge of such vessels as require the raising of the bascules.

The Conservators of the River Thames, in exercise of the powers and authority vested in them by the "Thames Conservancy Act, 1894," and of every other authority them hereunto in anywise enabling, do order and direct as follows, that is to say :-

1. The master of every vessel intending to pass up the river through the Tower Bridge and 38 and 39 Vic., c. 60, s. 12, by writing under his up the river through the Tower Bridge and hand, dated the 30th day of January, 1895, requiring the bascules to be raised, shall, notwithstanding any previous Bye-law or regulation, and in addition to the ordinary lights to be carried by such vessel when under way, exhibit before arriving at Cherry Garden Pier, and shall continue to exhibit until such vessel shall have passed through the said bridge, the following signals:-

(a.) By day, viz., between sunrise and sunset one black ball not less than two feet in diameter, placed in such a position on such vessel where it can best be seen at a height above the hull of

not less than 20 feet.

(b:) By night, viz., between sunset and sunrise, two red lights, in globular lanterns of not less than eight inches each in diameter, placed vertically six feet apart, at a height of not less than 20 feet above the hull, and in such a position where they can best be seen, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

2. The master of every vessel intending to pass down the river through the said bridge and requiring the bascules to be raised, shall. notwithstanding any previous Bye-law or Regulation and in addition to the ordinary lights to be carried by such vessel, exhibit the signals prescribed by the preceding Bye-law until the vessel has

passed through the said bridge.

3. The master of every such vessel shall in foggy weather before approaching the said bridge, either from the upper or lower side thereof, ascertain whether the said bridge can be opened or not.

4. These Bye-laws shall be in addition to and not in substitution for any Bye-laws now in force or which shall hereafter be made by the Conservators under their general powers and which shall apply to the navigation of the river below London Bridge, and nothing in these Bye-laws shall diminish or affect the powers of the Conservators with regard to the regulation of vessels on the river below London Bridge.
5. The word "master" in these Bye-laws shall

have the same meaning and interpretation as in section 3 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894.

6. The master of any vessel or any person committing any breach of or in any way infringing any of these Bye-laws, shall be liable to a penalty of and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds, which said penalty may be recovered and enforced summarily, and shall be applied according to the provisions of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894.

7. These Bye-laws may be cited as "The Tower Bridge Navigation Bye-laws."
