

# The London Gazette.

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**T**HE Peace betwixt the Great Mogul and the English East-India Company is now fully concluded, and his General hath withdrawn all his Forces from the Island of *Bombay*, and the Companies Deputy-Governor of that Island has retaken Possession of the several Forts and Places they had made themselves Matters of during the War. The Great Mogul has likewise given his Pardon and Grants to the Company for carrying on their Trade in all parts of his Dominions with all the Privileges and Immunities they formerly enjoyed, and even with greater Advantages than before.

*Genoa, April 21.* The French have been with their Gallies and some Men of War before *Oneglia*, and have shot about 300 Bombs into the Town, but the ill Weather obliged them to return to *Villa Franca*, except 3 or 4 Ships which continue at *Alassi* not far from *Oneglia*. The Garison of *Final* has been reinforced with 2000 men from the State of *Milan*.

*Turin, April 23.* On Thursday last a Detachment of about 2000 Men, Horse, and Foot, marched from *Pignerol* under the command of the Marquis de *Fenqueres*, and attacked the *Vaudois* at *Lucerne*, who being too weak to resist them, retired to the Hills; but receiving 3 or 4 hours after a Reinforcement, they came down, and charged the French so vigorously, that they forced them to give way, and pursued them almost to the Gates of *Pignerol*, killing 3 or 400 of them, and divers of their Officers. The greatest loss the *Vaudois* sustained was in their Provisions, and the Equipages of some of their Officers, which were burnt in the Houses and in the Convent which the French set on fire at *Lucerne*. Besides the Regiments that are already arrived here from *Milan*, we expect very suddenly from thence 5000 men more; and a Regiment of 1000 men is likewise come hither from *Wirtemberg*. Our Duke has sent a Reinforcement to *Cuneo* to secure that *Pas*.

*Venice, April 27.* The Captain-General *Mocenigo* intended about the middle of this month to sail from *Corfu* with the Venetian Fleet for *Napoli di Malvasia*. The Letters from *Rome* of the 21st instant say, that since the return of the Courier from *Vienna* with an Answer in favour of Cardinal *Barberigo*, the French Cardinals insisted, that there should be no Election made till the Express they had sent to the Court of *France* was likewise come back; That in the mean time they did all they could to support the Party of *Astori*; And that there seems as yet little appearance of uniting the several Factions for the Choice of a new Pope.

*Vienna, May 3.* On the 28th of the last month Count *Guido of Starckenberg* parted from hence for *Hungary*, to command the Imperial Troops which are assembling about *Ejck*. The main Army is to rendezvous near *Buda* towards the end of this month; And the Count de *Castelli* is sent to Prince *Leopold of Baden* to hasten his return hither, in order to take upon him the Command of it. In the mean time they continue to work very hard on the Fortifications of *Buda*, and in 2 or 3 months they will have quite perfected them. From *Croatia* we hear, that daily Skirmishes happen between the Imperial Garison of *Zrin* and the neighbouring Turks, and the Prisoners taken do all relate, That the Basha of

*Bysnia* is preparing to invade that Province, to which purpose he has drawn 5 Great Pieces of Cannon out of *Bagnalucca*, and ordered 15 Aga's with their Companies to march from *Jayes*; and that Count *Erdeoty*, the Ban of *Croatia*, had upon this advice appointed a General Meeting of the Militia of that Province to oppose the Enemies designs. We have an account of Sir *William Hussey's* arrival at *Buda*, having been received with extraordinary Honours by the Governors of all the places which he passed through. Prince *Eugene of Savoy* parted from hence on Sunday last for *Turin*.

*Hydelberg, May 8.* The Velt-Mareschal *Caprara* draws together the Imperial and Confederate Troops. There will be on the 10th instant a review of the Forces of *Franconia*, and of those of *Suabia* on the 22d. The General *Van Heydelshorf* is going to march from hence with 3 Battalions to *Hairbron*; and Colonel *Erst* remains here with 3 other Battalions. The French are forming a Camp near *Lanzensandel* not far from *Landau*.

*Frankfort, May 9.* This morning arrived here the Duke of *Schonberg* in his way to *Saxony*, as also the Prince de *Commercy*, who is going to his Command in the Imperial Army on the *Rhine*. The Forces of *Saxony*, to wit, 12000 of the Electors, and 4000 of the other Princes of his House, are on their march hither. We hear, that the Mareschal de *Lorge* is arrived at *Strasbourg*.

*Cologne, May 11.* The Elector of *Cologne* has summoned a Meeting of the States of this Archbishoprick against the 21st of this month at *Bun*, to consult about the Affairs of the Country. The *Bavarian* Troops quartered at *Bun*, and in other places of this Diocels, have orders to begin their march on the 18th instant towards the *Upper Rhine*; Those of *Hesse* are moving this way, the Count de *Lippe*, who commands them, having since yesterday had his Head Quarter within 4 hours march of this place. Most of the French Troops quartered on the *Moselle* are marched towards *Landau* and the *Upper Alsace*; from whence we hear, that the Dauphin is daily expected at *Strasbourg*.

*Hamburgh, May 11.* The last Letters from *Dresden* assure us, that the Forces of *Saxony* were ordered to march with all possible diligence towards the *Rhine*. They write from *Poland*, that great Preparations are making for the Campaign, and that the King was resolved to be in the Field by the beginning of *June* with a greater Army than he has yet had together since this War. From *Berlin* we have an account, that the Marriage of the Duke of *Courland* with the Princess *Elizabeth* of *Brandenburg* was celebrated the 29th inst, and that the Elector set out on the first instant for *Crossen*, to take a review of the 6000 men he is sending to *Hungary*. The Secretary of the Baron *d'Asfeld*, (formerly Resident here from *France*) who, when his Matter was obliged to leave this place, stayed here to carry on his Intrigues and Correspondencies, was on the 2d instant seized, together with his Papers, and has ever since been kept under a Guard.

*Paris, May 8.* The Duke of *Luxemburg* is gone to command the French Army in *Flanders*, where the Duke de *Chausel*, the Prince de *Saxe*, the Mar-

quis de Foyeuse, the Sieur Rosen, the Marquis de Tallard, and the Duke de Vendôme, are to serve under him as Lieutenant-Generals; and the Duke du Maine, the Marquis de Vercelles, the Count de Montchevrenil, the Grand Prior of France, the Sieur de Polastron, and the Sieur de Vivans, as Marshals de Camp. In Germany our Army will be commanded by the Marechal de Loges, and under him by the Count d'Alvergne, the Duke de Villeroy, the Marquis de la Feuillie, and the Marquis d'Uxelles, as Lieutenant-Generals; and the Sieur de Berville, the Count de Tallard, the Marquis de Camille, the Count de Melas, the Duke de Bourbon, and the Prince de Conti, as Marshals de Camp. The Marquis de Bruffiers is to command the Camp on the Moselle, and is to have the Sieur d'Agier, and the Sieur de Rubantel, for Lieutenant-Generals; and the Marquis de Villars, the Count de Giffé, the Duke de Roquelaure, and the Marquis de la Vieuville, for Marshals de Camp. In Italy the Sieur de Langlerie, and the Marquis de Bullonde, are to serve as Lieutenant-Generals under the Sieur de Camille; and the Marquis de Feuquieres, the Marquis de St. Sulpice, the Marquis de Crequi, the Count de Borghese, and the Prince d'Elbeuf, as Marshals de Camp. And in Rouillon the Army is to be commanded by the Duke de Noailles, and by the Sieur de Chaffron as Lieutenant-General; and the Marquis de Quignon, the Sieur d'Ivry, and the Sieur de Prechat, Marshals de Camp. The Letters from *Marfeilles* of the 25th of the last month say, that on the 13th the Count d'Estree came with the Ships and Gallies under his command before *Oneglia*, and sent in a Summons to the Governor to surrender the place, or else to pay 50000 Crowns for Contribution, but receiving no other Answer than several Shot from the Fort, the French brought their Gallies as near as they could, and threw about 300 Bombs into the Town, but there arising a violent Storm, it put a stop to their design, and obliged the Count d'Estree to return to *Villa Franca*. The news of the Marquis de Feuquieres defeat by the *Vaudois* of *Lucerne*, is confirmed with this farther account, that he lost between 3 and 400 men and about 20 Officers in this Action.

*Brussels*, May 13. Prince *Waldeck* is returned from *Aix la Chapelle* to his Head Quarters at *Duffellan*, and the Dutch Troops begin to draw together; Eleven Regiments that were quartered in *Brabant* are already advanced as far as *Tirlemont*, and several Battalions have passed through here in their march towards *Hall*, where 1500 Pioneers are daily at work to put that place into a posture of Defence. There are at present in *Namur* 20 Battalions of Foot, besides Horse. The French are forming a Camp at *Moragne* between *Cende* and *Tournay*; which is to be commanded by the Duke of *Luxemburg*; and they have another small Camp at *Harlebecke* on the River *Lys*, in the same place where the Marechal d'*Humieres* was posted the last Summer. The French are going to demolish *Thuin* on the *Sambre*, having already transported all the Ammunition and Provisions from thence to *Mons*, and they intend to do the like with divers other small places, that they may make use of the Garisons to reinforce their Armies this Summer.

*Hague*, May 15. On Saturday last, about 9 in the morning, the King set sail from *Harwich*; The next day, about 6 in the morning, His Majesty Landed near *Masland-sloot*, went from thence to *Honflerdyke*, and came about 10 at night to this place; And yesterday morning all the Foreign Ministers waited upon His Majesty to Congratulate his safe Arrival. His Majesty intends to go from hence on Friday next to *Lee*. The Duke of *Zell* is expected here in 8 or 10 days. Three Dutch Men of War lye ready at *Rotterdam* to sail for *England* with the first fair Wind. And from *Middleburg* we have an account by Letters of the 17th instant, that Vice-Admiral *Vin Putten*, and Rear-Admiral *Evertzen*, with the Men of War fitted out by the Admiralty of *Zealand*, would sail in 2 or 3 days. Vice-Admiral *Akenonde* is to command the Dutch Squadron in the absence of Admiral *Tromp*.

*Dublin*, May 4. Several Vessels arrive daily with Provisions and Recruits from *England*, and all imaginable Diligence is used for the opening of the Campaign. We hear from *Cork*, that on the last of April 110 of our Foot, as they came from *Billinagooley*, were set upon by 300 of the best of the Irish Horse and Dragoons, upon which they retired into an enclosed place, and defended themselves so well, that they killed three of the Enemies Captains, with some other Officers, and about 20 private Soldiers, and obliged the rest to retire; We lost 10 Men, and Major *Singsby* was brought into *Cork* mortally wounded. Colonel *Piper*, with the Troops in the County of *Kildare*, and a Detachment of the Militia of this City, has been lately in pursuit of the Rapparees, and had above 50 of them.

*Whitehall*, May 9. Their Majesties have been Graciously pleased, upon the Death of Dr. *Lampugh* late Archbishop of *York*, to Nominate Dr. *Savage* Dean of *Canterbury* to be Archbishop of that See.
