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Madrid, April 18.

The Marquis de Legunez began his Journey this week for *Alicant*, from whence he will pass by Sea to *Genoua*, in order to take possession of the Government of *Milan*. There are very pressing Orders sent to *Cadix*, to hasten out the Men of War that are fitting there. The new Great Matter of *Males* has appointed Don *Alonzo de Cosman* to reside as his Ambassador at this Court.

Milan, April 25. Our Governor-General the Count de *Fuenfaldia* is returned from *Alexandria*, where he took a review of the Troops that are ordered to march to *Piedmont*. Don *Gaspur Manriques de Lara*, our new Maistre de Camp-General, parted from hence this week for *Turin*, to confer with the Duke of *Savoy* about the march of the Spanish Forces designed for his Royal Highness's Service, which he is to command this Campagne. Our Governor has sent 1000 Foot and 200 Horse to reinforce the Garison of *Finat*. The Marquis d' *Obliggi*, the Emperor's Envoy to the Princes of *Italy*, is arrived at *Genoua*, where he is to have his first publick Audience on the 27th of this month.

Venice, May 4. Several new raised Troops are arrived this week at the *Lido*; from whence they will be transported with the next Convoy to the *Levant*. The last Letters from *Rome* gave an account, that the Ecclesiastical Gallies are fitting out with great diligence for the assistance of this State. In the Conclave, the Cardinals in the French Interests finding they cannot prevail for one of their own Faction, do all they can to embroil Things, and to retard the Election of a Pope.

Leghorne, May 1. The English and Dutch Squadron, consisting of 15 Men of War, commanded by Captain *Aylmer*, with the *Turkey* and other Merchant Ships under their Convoy, set sail from *Cagliari* in *Sardinia* on the 26th past for *Cadix*. The *Reserve* is gone for *Tunis* and *Tripoli*, and the *Sirah* will sail from hence to morrow with the Merchant Ships that are here, in order to rejoyne the said Convoy. Captain *Aylmer* was 4 days before *Argiers*, where the new English Consul, Mr. *Baker*, was very kindly received by the Dey 'Tis said, that Government inclines to a Peace with the Dutch, and to break with the French.

Warsaw, April 20. The Count de *Thun*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, has frequent Conferences with the Ministers of this Crown about disposing Matters for the approaching Campagne, which are in such forwardness, that we are assured the whole Army will be in the Field by the beginning of *June*; The King is still resolved to command it in Person; and 'tis the general opinion, He will march directly into *Moldavia* to secure that Province; and that if there be occasion, he will at the same time send a strong Detachment to joyn the Imperial Forces in *Transylvania*. The last advices from *Moscow* confirm our former accounts of the little Success which the Turkish and French Ministers, who were not long since sent privately thither to sollicite a Peace between the *Muscovites* and the *Tartars*, have had in their Negotiation at that Court, and of the great Prepa-

rations that are making by the Czars for the prosecution of the War, which the Tartars seem so sensible of, that they are drawing their Forces that way for the defence of their Country.

Vienne, May 6. Great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition are brought daily hither from the Hereditary Countries, in order to be transported to *Hungary* for the use of the Imperial Army. Prince *Louis of Baden* is expected here the Beginning of the next week, part of his Buggage being already arrived. Count *Guido* of *Stremberg* is gone to command a flying Camp on the *Draue*; and the Duke de *Croy* is appointed to command the Forces that are drawing together in *Croatia*. The main Army is to Rendezvous towards the end of this month near *Buda*.

Berlin, May 8. On the 29th past was Celebrated here the Marriage between the Duke of *Courland* and the Princess *Elizabeth* of *Brandenburg*; with great Solemnity. On the first instant the Elector set out for *Crossen*, where on the 3d he took a review of his Troops that are going for *Hungary*; They are one third Detachements out of the old Regiments, and filled up with new Levies, and together make a very compleat Body of 1634 Horse, 409 Dragoons, and 4809 Foot, in all 6252 Men; They are commanded by Lieutenant-General *Busfus* and Major-General *Brandt*, and were to march forward on the 4th, and to be delivered to the Emperor's Commission, the Count de *Shafentch* at *Granberg* on the Frontiers of *Saxia*. Their Electoral Highnesses of *Brandenburg* are gone to *Carelsbark* in *Polandia*.

Hamburg, May 15. The Forces of *Saxony* are on their march towards the *Rhin*, and 'tis said, that the Elector will command them in Person this Summer. The Duke of *Sell* intends to return very suddenly to *Flanders*.

Dublin, May 7. The Lords Justices of this Kingdom have put out a Proclamation, dated the 27th of the last month, which sets forth; That whereas the Army is now to draw into the Field, where it will be necessary, that Provisions be brought in from time to time for its Supply, and that in order thereunto, all due Encouragement be given to Suters and other Persons that shall repair thither for that purpose, They do strictly Charge and Command all Officers Civil and Military, and Soldiers of Their Majesties Army, not to molest or disturb any Suter, or other Person, that shall have a Warrant from the Colonel of any Regiment; or Leave from the Lords Justices, or the Commander in Chief of Their Majesties Forces, to go out the Camp for this Service; That they do not presume to take any thing from the said Suters, or to use any Violence to them, upon pain of being proceeded against with the utmost Severity; And all Officers, and other Officers in Chief of the respective Regiments, are to take care, that the Officers and Soldiers do not do any such Things as the said Statute shall forbide them writing according to the Statute that shall from time to time be settled. And that the Forces may be more plentifully supplied, and those unnecessary Persons prevented from following

following the Camp, who are only an Incumbrance to the same, and it being found by experience, that the Country has suffered extremely by them, they having not only Robbed and Plundered it themselves, but enticed the Soldiers to do the same; for the preventing hereof for the future, and that the Quarters may be better secured, while the Army is in the Field, from the Rapperies and other disaffected People, The Lords Justices do hereby Order and Direct all Their Majesties Protestant Subjects, as well as Papists, to stay at, or repair to, their respective Habitations, for the preservation and improvement of the same; and that no person or persons whatsoever, except such as come thither with Provisions for the use of the Army, or upon some lawful occasion approved of by the Commander in Chief, do presume to follow the Camp upon pain of Death.

By another Proclamation of the 30th of April, All the Inhabitants of the Counties of Waterford and Tipperary are Commanded, within Three Days after the date thereof, to repair to their own Houses, or places of Habitation, or to some adjacent Garrison if they may not go home with security; and those that belong to the Counties of Cork, Limerick, and Kerry, are forthwith to repair either to their own Houses or Habitations if they have such in the County of Cork, or to some of the Garrisons in the said County, in order to be employed in the Militia for the defence of the Country when the Army is in the Field, according to such farther Orders as shall be given them for the publick Service.

And by an Order of Lieutenant-General Ginkle Commander in Chief of Their Majesties Forces, All Officers and Soldiers, and other persons whatsoever, are strictly charged not to Press any Horses or CARRS without License first had from the Lords Justices or himself in writing; And whereas the Militia is to be upon Duty for the preservation of the Country, when the Army is in the Field, no person is to Press any Horse actually Listed in the Militia upon any pretence whatsoever.

Minhead, May 12. Yesterday arrived in this Port a Ship which left Cork on Friday last, and brings Letters from very good Hands, giving the following account of a late Action near that place. On Thursday the last of April Captain Clayton went with a Party of men to relieve the Garrison of *Ballymagooly*; Captain *Hernycroft* then commanded there, who was the same day to march his Men to Cork, but understanding that the Irish Garrison of *Ballyclough* had a design to intercept them, he would not march by day, but stayed till night, however this was not so privately carried; but that the Irish had notice of it, and thereupon detached 120 of their best Horse, and 120 Dragoons, with 250 Volunteers and Rapperies commanded by Brigadier *Carroll*, Sir *James Carter*, the Lord of *Kinsale*, Colonel *Lacey*, Major *Slingsby*, Captain *Copinger*, and Captain *Comdon*, who fell on our Party just on the other side of *Six-mile Water*, about 3 of the clock in the morning; upon their approach our men faced, and about 20 fired, which broke their Front, and put them into some disorder, and gave opportunity to ours to retreat to a small Pound made of Mud, claying up a Truckle to the Door where they entred; Immediately the Enemy came up and offered them Quarter, which Captain *Hernycroft* refusing, they charged and pressed hard upon our Men, who received them so warmly, that they killed several of them; The Enemy made a second and third attack, but went off with the same Success; This continued several hours, till the news of it being carried to Cork, a Party was sent from thence to their Relief, but the Enemy were all fled before they came, leaving dead on the spot Captain *Copinger* and Captain *Comdon*, with 14 Soldiers, and Major *Slingsby* severely wounded; Colonel *Lacey* and the Lord of *Kinsale* were likewise dangerously wounded

and carried off, but we hear they are since dead, and about 50 more were wounded; Major *Slingsby* was brought to Cork, and it's thought he cannot live; But he was so ingenious as to contrive, That he believed the Hand of God was against them, for that they had resolved to promise Quarter to our men, though they designed to murder them all. We lost 8 men, and our whole number was but 80.

Deale, May 14. There are now in sight 4 Dutch Men of War coming from *Holland*, and it's believed they will be in the *Downes* this Evening, one of them is a Vice-Admiral.

Deale, May 16. The English and Dutch Fleet set sail on Thursday last from the Buoy of the *Naze*, and arrived this day in the *Downes*.
