

following the Camp, who are only an Incumbrance to the same, and it being found by experience, that the Country has suffered extremely by them, they having not only Robbed and Plundered it themselves, but enticed the Soldiers to do the same; for the preventing hereof for the future, and that the Quarters may be better secured, while the Army is in the Field, from the Rapperies and other disaffected People, The Lords Justices do hereby Order and Direct all Their Majesties Protestant Subjects, as well as Papists, to stay at, or repair to, their respective Habitations, for the preservation and improvement of the same; and that no person or persons whatsoever, except such as come thither with Provisions for the use of the Army, or upon some lawful occasion approved of by the Commander in Chief, do presume to follow the Camp upon pain of Death.

By another Proclamation of the 30th of April, All the Inhabitants of the Counties of Waterford and Tipperary are Commanded, within Three Days after the date thereof, to repair to their own Houses, or places of Habitation, or to some adjacent Garrison if they may not go home with security; and those that belong to the Counties of Cork, Limerick, and Kerry, are forthwith to repair either to their own Houses or Habitations if they have such in the County of Cork, or to some of the Garrisons in the said County, in order to be employed in the Militia for the defence of the Country when the Army is in the Field, according to such farther Orders as shall be given them for the publick Service.

And by an Order of Lieutenant-General Ginkle Commander in Chief of Their Majesties Forces, All Officers and Soldiers, and other persons whatsoever, are strictly charged not to Press any Horses or Carts without License first had from the Lords Justices or himself in writing; And whereas the Militia is to be upon Duty for the preservation of the Country, when the Army is in the Field, no person is to Press any Horse actually Listed in the Militia upon any pretence whatsoever.

Minhead, May 12. Yesterday arrived in this Port a Ship which left Cork on Friday last, and brings Letters from very good Hands, giving the following account of a late Action near that place. On Thursday the last of April Captain Clayton went with a Party of men to relieve the Garrison of Ballymagooly; Captain Hemycroft then commanded there, who was the same day to march his Men to Cork, but understanding that the Irish Garrison of Ballyclough had a design to intercept them, he would not march by day, but stayed till night, however this was not so privately carried; but that the Irish had notice of it, and thereupon detached 120 of their best Horse, and 120 Dragoons, with 250 Volunteers and Rapperies commanded by Brigadier Carroll, Sir James Carter, the Lord of Kinsale, Colonel Lacey, Major Slingsby, Captain Copinger, and Captain Condon, who fell on our Party just on the other side of Six-mile Water, about 3 of the clock in the morning; upon their approach our men faced, and about 20 fired, which broke their Front, and put them into some disorder, and gave opportunity to ours to retreat to a small Pound made of Mud, claying up a Truckle to the Door where they entred; Immediately the Enemy came up and offered them Quarter, which Captain Hemycroft refusing, they charged and pressed hard upon our Men, who received them so warmly, that they killed several of them; The Enemy made a second and third attack, but went off with the same Success; This continued several hours, till the news of it being carried to Cork, a Party was sent from thence to their Relief, but the Enemy were all fled before they came, leaving dead on the spot Captain Copinger and Captain Condon, with 14 Soldiers, and Major Slingsby severely wounded; Colonel Lacey and the Lord of Kinsale were likewise dangerously wounded

and carried off, but we hear they are since dead, and about 50 more were wounded; Major Slingsby was brought to Cork, and it's thought he cannot live; But he was so ingenious as to contrive, That he believed the Hand of God was against them, for that they had resolved to promise Quarter to our men, though they designed to murder them all. We lost 8 men, and our whole number was but 80.

Deale, May 14. There are now in sight 4 Dutch Men of War coming from Holland, and it's believed they will be in the Downes this Evening, one of them is a Vice-Admiral.

Deale, May 16. The English and Dutch Fleet set sail on Thursday last from the Buoy of the Nose, and arrived this day in the Downes.
