WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act,

1882," it is, amongst other things, enacted that save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise in any year of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days:

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Clare Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, and of the Falmouth Militia Division, Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the above-mentioned units of Militia shall for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five be extended under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

Clare Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

Falmouth Militia Division, Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, fifty-five (55) days.

WHEREAS by the five hundred and eighty-second and five hundred and eighty-third sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may by Bye-law made under Part X of that Act do within its district all or any of the things specified in the said section, but that a Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to Her Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have made certain Bye-laws with respect to the contribution to be made towards the Pilotage Funds of the Liverpool District by the masters and mates of vessels holding Pilotage Certificates granted in pursuance of section five hundred and ninety-nine or six hundred of the said Act, which Bye-laws are in substitution for the Bye-laws for the same purpose already made by the said Pilotage Authority, and approved by Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, for a period of three years from the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, for a period of three years from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five,

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

BYE-LAWS made by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, the Pilotage Authority of the Port of Liverpool, pursuant to "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," section five hundred and eighty-two.

1. The following Bye-law shall commence and take effect from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

2. Every Master or Mate who holds a Pilotage Certificate granted in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Acts, enabling such Master or Mate to Pilot any ship or ships within any part of the district over which the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, as the Pilotage Authority, has jurisdiction, shall contribute towards the Pilotage Fund of the said district, as follows, that is to say:—

(a.) Every such Master or Mate to whom a Pilotage Certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or who shall have obtained a renewal of any Certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or ships therein specified drawing seventeen feet of water and upwards, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of three pounds three shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a Pilotage Certificate.

(b.) Every such Master or Mate to whom a Pilotage Certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or shall have obtained a renewal of any Certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or ships therein specified drawing less than seventeen feet of water, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of two pounds two shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a Pilotage Certificate.

The contributions above mentioned shall be payable to the Treasurer for the time being of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board at the time when the fee for the granting or for the renewal of the Certificate of such Master or Mate is payable.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it was provided that in the case of any harbour, river or other inland navigation, for which rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters thereof, or concerning the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by such vessels were not and could not be made by or under the authority of any local Act, it should be lawful for Her Majesty in Council upon the necessary application being made, to make such rules as aforesaid.

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board established by "The Mersey Docks and Harbour Act, 1857," for the time being, empowered to carry into effect the provisions of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Acts, 1857 to 1893, are the Body Corporate owning and exercising jurisdiction over the River Mersey and the Port and Harbour of Liverpool:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 26th day of August, 1893, made in pursuance of the said first recited Act, Her Majesty, on the application of the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, was pleased to make certain rules, set forth in the Schedule thereto, concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels, to wit, dredgers when at work or in position for working in the River Mersey or the sea channels leading thereto within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board:

And whereas by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that where rules are not and cannot be made, under the authority of any local Act concerning lights and signals to be carried, or the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, Her Majesty in Council on the application of any person having authority over such waters, or if there is no such person any person interested in the navigation thereof, may make such rules, and those rules shall, as regards vessels navigating the said waters be of the same force as if they were part of the collision regulations:

And whereas the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board having authority as aforesaid have applied to Her Majesty in Council to make, and have submitted for approval, certain new rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels, to wit, dredgers, when at work or in position for working, in the River Mersey or the sea channels leading thereto within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, such rules to be substituted for and in lieu of the rules set forth in the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the 26th day of August, 1893.

And whereas the new rules so submitted as aforesaid appear to be reasonable and proper:

And whereas the operation of this Order is urgent:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in Her vested by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to make the said new rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto; and to direct that the same shall come into force from and after the date hereof, and be substituted for and in lieu of the rules contained in the Schedule to the said Order of the twenty-sixth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, which is hereby revoked, and shall be *provisional* rules within the meaning of the "Rules Publication Act, 1893." SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels, to wit, Dredgers, in the River Mersey, or the Sea Channels leading thereto, when at work or in position for working.

1. In these Rules the word "Dredger" shall mean any vessel fitted with plant or apparatus for dredging or excavating or, fitted with plant or apparatus for eroding or dispersing sand and other material.

2. Every Dredger in the River Mersey or the Sea Channels leading thereto within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, when at work or in position for working, shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

Lights to be carried between Sunset and Sunrise,
(1.)—(a.) Forward.—A white Light in a globular

lantern of not less than eight inches in diameter at a height not exceeding ten feet above the hull, suspended from the forestay or otherwise near the bow where it can be best seen.

(b.) *Amidships*.—Three white Lights in globular lanterns of not less than eight inches in diameter placed in triangular form not less than eight feet apart, the base of the triangle to be at least ten feet higher than the aft Light, and to be also higher than and clear of the framework, funnels, or any other erections upon the Dredger.

(c.) *Aft*.—A white Light in a globular lantern of not less than eight inches in diameter, double the height of the forward Light, at the main or mizzen peak, or at the boom topping lift or other position near the stern where it can be best seen.

Each of the above-mentioned Lights shall be of sufficient power and so constructed as to show with a clear atmosphere, a clear uniform and unbroken Light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(ii.) A Dredger when not making any way through the water shall not carry side lights, but when making way shall carry the usual red and green side lights.

Signals to be carried between Sunrise and Sunset.

Amidships.—Three red balls of not less than two feet in diameter placed in triangular form not less than eight feet apart, the base of the triangle to be higher than and clear of the framework, funnels, or any other erections upon the Dredger.

3. The Lights and Signals required to be carried by these Rules are to be taken by other vessels as signals that the vessel showing them is not under command, and cannot therefore get out of the way.

4. Every Dredger in the River Mersey or the Sea Channels leading thereto, within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board when not at work nor in position for working, shall carry the ordinary Lights and Signals required to be carried by vessels for avoiding collisions, as provided by "The Mersey Channels Prevention of Collisions Act, 1874," and by the rules and regulations (now) and from time to time in force under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."

WHEREAS in pursuance of the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," the Master and Brethren of the Trinity House of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, being a Pilotage authority within the meaning of that section, made and submitted, for the consent of Her Majesty, certain Bye-laws which were approved by Order in Council dated the fourteenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three:

And whereas by the five hundred and eighty-second and five hundred and eighty-third sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-law made under Part X of that Act, do all or any of the things specified in the said section: but that a Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to Her Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the said Pilotage Authority have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain new Bye-laws fixing the rates of pilotage in the Port of Blyth, in substitution, as far as that port is concerned, for the rates of pilotage specified in the Bye-laws approved by the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three: which said new rates of pilotage are set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed new Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, in substitution, as far as the Port of Blyth is concerned, from and after the date of this Order, for the rates of pilotage specified in the Bye-laws approved by the Order in Council of the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

SCHEDULE.

BYE-LAWS as to remuneration of Pilots at Blyth.

1. The following rates for pilotage for the Port of Blyth shall be paid in substitution for the rates provided for by the Bye-laws approved by Her Majesty in Council on the fourteenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and now in force, that is to say:—

2. For sea pilotage during the year one shilling and sixpence for every foot of water which any ship or vessel shall draw.

3. Ships of over five hundred tons register burthen shall pay one halfpenny per ton on the excess of tonnage above five hundred tons in addition to the above pilotage dues.

4. Vessels having lee boards shall pay five shillings in addition to the above rates.

5. The pilotage dues shall be paid to the Sub-Commissioners or to the Pilot performing such pilotage duty within five days after the performance thereof.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Battersea and partly out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Philip Battersea both in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us

that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Battersea and of the new parish of Saint Philip Battersea aforesaid which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain well disposed persons have contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds sterling in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and (so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act then) of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should grant out of the Common Fund created by the firstly-herein named Act a capital sum of seven hundred pounds in respect of which there shall be paid by us to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the subscribers of the major part of the said endowment of four thousand and three hundred pounds have nominated to us as the persons in whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be vested the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John Straton the present Bishop of the diocese of Sodor and Man the Reverend Frederic Edward Wigram of Oak Hill House Hampstead in the county of Middlesex Clerk in Holy Orders the Reverend Hanmer William Webb-Peploe of No. 23 Onslow-gardens London in the last named county Clerk in Holy Orders William Donaldson Cruddas of Elswick Dene Newcastle-upon-Tyne Esquire and Charles Holehouse Bousfield of No. 40 Elvaston-place London in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire.

"And whereas the said grant of twenty-one pounds per annum will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us the said Commissioners under our Common Seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right

Reverend Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Battersea and of the said new parish of Saint Philip Battersea which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas Clapham Common.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and shall be exercised jointly by the said Norman Dumenil John Straton the said Frederic Edward Wigram the said Hanmer William Webb-Peploe the said William Donaldson Cruddas and the said Charles Holehouse Bousfield their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Barnabas Clapham Common being:—

"1. All that portion of the parish of Battersea wherein the present Incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester which is bounded upon the east partly by the parish of Clapham and partly by the new parish of Saint Paul Clapham both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north partly by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Philip Battersea and partly by the new parish of Christ Church Battersea both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the west by the new parish of Saint Mark Battersea Rise in the same county and diocese and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark Battersea Rise from the parish of Battersea aforesaid at the junction of the road called Lavender-sweep with the road called Battersea-rise and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Wix's-lane upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Battersea from the parish of Clapham aforesaid.

"2. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Philip Battersea which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint Paul Clapham aforesaid upon the south and upon the west by the above described

portion of the parish of Battersea aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north partly by the new parish of the Ascension Lavender Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Ascension Lavender Hill from the new parish of Saint Philip Battersea aforesaid at the junction of the road called Tyneham-grove with the road called Lavender-hill and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wix's-lane aforesaid on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Philip Battersea from the new parish of Saint Paul Clapham aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtieth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, Abergavenny situate in the parish of Abergavenny in the county of Monmouth and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified by his having signed and

sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Abergavenny which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny.'

"And with the like consent of the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Bury Capel Clerk in Holy Orders Honorary Canon of Llandaff the present Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Abergavenny shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Bury Capel and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Abergavenny, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Abergavenny in the county of Monmouth and in the diocese of Llandaff which is bounded upon the south and upon the south-west by the parish of Llanfoist in the said county and diocese and upon all other sides that is to say upon the west, upon the north-west and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Llanfoist from the parish of Abergavenny aforesaid at the centre of the bridge or viaduct which carries the Merthyr Tredegar and Abergavenny Branch Line of the London and North-Western Railway over the River Usk, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of fifty-four chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such branch line of railway over Pen-y-Pound-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the said road for a distance of thirteen and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Frogmore-street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said street for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Nevill-street and with High-street and continuing thence still south-eastward along the

middle of the last-named street for a distance of three and three quarters chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint John's-street and extending thence south-westward for a distance of five chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street and of the roadway called or known as Saint John's-square to its junction with Nevill-street aforesaid and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with Castle-street and with Tudor-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of thirty-seven yards or thereabouts to its junction with Byefield-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of eight and a half chains or thereabouts to its present south-western end and extending thence due southward and in a straight line for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the River Usk aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Abergavenny from the parish of Llanfoist aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough for providing such places of burial under the provisions of the said Act: Provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same shall be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough one month at least before such petition is so considered;

And whereas the Town Council of the borough of Heywood, in the county of Lancaster have presented a petition to Her Majesty, stating that, by an Order in Council, it was ordered that in Saint Luke's churchyard and in the burial grounds of the Wesleyan Chapel Market-street, of the Wesleyan Methodist Association, of the Baptist Chapel, of the New Jerusalem Chapel and of the Independent Chapel (all in Heywood) burials should wholly cease from and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and representing that there is difficulty and inconvenience in providing, under the powers of the Statute of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the parish or parishes within the said borough, and praying that powers may be vested in the Council of the said borough of Heywood, for providing places of burial for the inhabitants of the said borough, pursuant to the provisions of "The Burials Act 1854," and any Acts amending or extending the same:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council has been duly published as required by the above said first-recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Heywood, for providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the parish or parishes within the said borough of Heywood, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, intituled, "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontin-

tinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz. :—

In the Parish Churchyard of North Scarle, in the county of Lincoln, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

In the Parish Churchyard of Hathern, in the county of Leicester, until the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

WHEREAS Charles Neve Cresswell Esquire Barrister-at-Law duly appointed in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 as Commissioner for determining the boundaries of the wards of the Borough of Neath and for apportioning the Councillors thereto, has transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State his scheme in the following terms :—
“MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT 1882.

“Borough of Neath.

“WHEREAS a Petition from the Council of the Borough of Neath praying for the division of the borough into wards has been presented to Her Majesty.

“And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased by Order in Council to refer the said Petition to the Lords of the Council for consideration, and did upon their Report on the eighth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in Her Majesty by the Municipal Corporations Act 1882, and in pursuance of every other power enabling Her in that behalf, fix the number of wards into which the said Borough of Neath shall be divided : and thereupon ordered and directed that the number of the said wards shall be two.

“And whereas on the nineteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did in pursuance of the thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 warrant and appoint Charles Neve Cresswell Esquire Barrister-at-Law to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards of the Borough of Neath, and for apportioning the Councillors among them, the number of such wards having been fixed as aforesaid.

“Now I the said Charles Neve Cresswell in pursuance of the said recited warrant of appointment do hereby determine the boundaries of the two wards into which the Borough of Neath shall be henceforth divided which wards are hereafter numbered and named as follows that is to say :—

“Ward No. 1 otherwise Castle or North Ward.

“Ward No. 2 otherwise Melyn or South Ward.

“And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 1 otherwise Castle or North Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough of Neath as is contained within a line commencing from the point of intersection of the boundary of the borough and the centre of the River Neath immediately south of the Mines Royal Works, thence in a north-easterly, easterly, south-easterly, south-westerly, westerly, and southerly direction to the point of intersection between the boundary of the borough and the road known as Kimla-road, thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said

road to the point of intersection of Greenway-road with Eastland-road thence along the centre of Greenway-road to the ‘Rope Walk,’ thence along the centre of the ‘Rope Walk’ to the ‘Dark Arch,’ thence along the centre of the roadway under the ‘Dark Arch’ to the road leading to the Green Bridge, thence along the centre of the said road to the centre of the said Green Bridge, thence by a straight line in a north-westerly direction to the centre of the River Neath at a point distant from the centre of the Neath River Bridge one thousand four hundred and sixty linear feet, as measured upon the $\frac{1}{25000}$ th Ordnance Survey Map; thence along the centre of the said river in a south-westerly and westerly direction to the point of commencement aforesaid.

“And I do hereby determine that Ward No. 2, otherwise Melyn or South Ward, shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough of Neath as is contained within a line commencing from the point in the centre of the River Neath immediately south of the Mines Royal Works aforesaid, thence in a south-westerly, south-easterly, north-easterly; south-easterly, northerly and south-easterly direction along the boundary of the borough to the boundary of Ward No. 1, thence in a north-westerly direction along the boundary of Ward No. 1 to the centre of the River Neath and thence in a south-westerly direction along the aforesaid boundary to the point of commencement aforesaid.

“And I the said Charles Neve Cresswell by virtue of the powers given to me by the aforesaid warrant of appointment and in accordance with the provisions of the thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 do hereby assign and apportion to each of the said two wards hereby determined six Councillors in due order of rotation as follows that is to say :—

“To Ward No. 1 otherwise ‘Castle or North’ Ward :—

- “1. Evan Evans Bevan who retires 1895.
- “2. David Llewellyn Davies who retires 1895.
- “3. Hopkin Jones who retires 1896.
- “4. James Davies Llewellyn who retires 1896.
- “5. Edward Davies who retires 1897.
- “6. James Glass who retires 1897.

“To Ward No. 2 otherwise ‘Melyn or South’ Ward :—

- “1. Abraham George who retires 1895.
- “2. (vacant) who retires 1895.
- “3. Hopkin Morgan who retires 1896.
- “4. William Burrows Trick who retires 1896.
- “5. John Bevan Davies who retires 1897.
- “6. Arthur Russell Thomas who retires 1897.

THE following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Pembroke College, Cambridge, on the fifteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :—

STATUTES to alter the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the "Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877" in relation to the College of Valence-Mary, commonly called Pembroke College in the University of Cambridge such amending Statutes being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the 15th day of May 1895 and passed at the said General Meeting by the unanimous votes of the persons present and voting and now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

WE the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of the said College, in exercise of the powers given to us by the 51th section of the said Act, do hereby alter the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College in manner following, that is to say :—

By substituting in CHAPTER III "*Of the Fellows*" for sections 7, 11, 13 and 19 the following sections to form amended sections of such Chapter :—

Of the Fellows.

7. When a Fellowship becomes vacant, there shall be a General College Meeting before the end of a year from the date of the vacancy for the purpose of electing a Fellow. If at such a meeting the majority of those present shall deem it expedient, it shall be competent to them to defer the election to another General College Meeting to be held before the end of eighteen months from the date of the vacancy.

11. If, as the result of such voting, such a majority as the case may require under sections 1, 3 and 20a of this chapter shall have agreed upon any one, he shall be held to be thereby elected.

13. If at any meeting held for the election of a Fellow the election shall be deferred as hereinbefore mentioned, or if there shall not be present within one hour from the time appointed for the assembling of the meeting a majority of all the members for the time being of the Society, then the matter of the election of a Fellow shall not be further entertained at that meeting, but shall stand over to some subsequent General College Meeting to be convened for the purpose. If however at the expiration of eighteen months from the date of the vacancy or such longer time not exceeding three years from the date of the vacancy as may for special reasons be allowed by the Chancellor of the University, the Society shall not have elected a Fellow to fill it, then the Master and six Senior Fellows, or (if they shall not be unanimous in the matter) the majority of the said Master and six Senior Fellows, shall be entitled to elect a Fellow to fill the vacancy.

19. In computing with reference to any Fellowship the period of six years mentioned in the last preceding section, any year during which the Fellow shall have been engaged in what the Society shall, by a resolution passed by a majority of at least two-thirds of the Members of the Society present at the Audit Meeting next after the expiration of that year, recognise as College or University work of importance, shall be treated as only a half year.

By adding the following section to form section 19a of the said chapter :—

19a. After the expiration of the Fellowship of any Fellow he may be elected, or (as the case may be) re-elected, to one of the College offices mentioned in section 21 of this chapter and may thereafter be re-elected to a Fellowship, which he

shall retain so long as he holds one of the said offices.

By substituting for section 20 the following section to form an amended section of the said chapter :—

20. A Fellow shall not be re-elected (except as under section 19a of this chapter), unless it be deemed to be of importance to the interests of the College that he should be re-elected because of his past services, or for the sake of his future services, to the College or to the University, or except for such special reasons as would enable him to be elected to a Fellowship under section 3 of this chapter, or, if he be a Professor, to the Professorial Fellowship. The number of Fellows holding Fellowships under sections 3 and 4 of this chapter and the present section shall not exceed four.

By adding the following sections to form sections 20a, 20b, 20c, and 20d of the said chapter :—

20a. The re-election of a Fellow under the conditions of the last preceding section may be for a period of either three or six years. It may take place at any time during the last year before the expiration of his Fellowship or at any subsequent time. Such re-election, if it take place at the Audit Meeting, shall require a majority of two-thirds of the Members of the Society present; if at any other General College Meeting, it shall require a majority of two-thirds of all the Members for the time being of the Society.

20b. In case of the re-election of a Fellow during the last year before the expiration of his Fellowship the junior Fellow present and voting shall vote first, and the rest of the Fellows in ascending order according to their seniority, and the Chairman shall vote last. If, as the result of such voting, such a majority as the case may require under section 20a of this chapter shall have agreed to re-elect the said Fellow, he shall be held to be thereby re-elected.

20c. A Fellow shall not be present at any College Meeting during such time as the question of the extension of his Fellowship under section 19 of this chapter or of his re-election to a Fellowship under section 20 of this chapter shall be under discussion, but he shall (if previously present) withdraw from the Meeting during that time. In voting however upon the matter his vote shall be counted as if it had been given in his own favour.

20d. A Fellow re-elected during the last year before the expiration of his Fellowship, or within three months after the said expiration, shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of the said Fellowship to which he has been re-elected as from the day of the said expiration. It shall not be necessary for him to be admitted to his Fellowship as in section 16 of this chapter, and he shall retain his seniority among the Fellows.

By substituting for Sections 21, 22, 26 and 30, the following Sections to form amended Sections of the said Chapter :—

21. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions, a Fellow holding any of the College offices next hereinafter mentioned shall be entitled to retain his Fellowship so long as he shall continue to hold any of those offices, and for that purpose the continuity shall not be deemed to be broken by mere transference from one of those offices to another. The offices lastly hereinbefore referred to (which are hereinafter designated privileged College offices) are those of Principal Tutor, Principal Mathematical Lecturer, Principal Classical Lecturer, Dean and Treasurer, and also one other College office such as a majority of all the members for the time being of the Society may, at a General

College Meeting, if they deem it expedient, pronounce privileged for any period not exceeding five years.

22. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions, any Fellow who shall have held, whether continuously or not, the office of Principal Tutor for fifteen years in all or any one or more successively of the privileged College offices for twenty years in all, shall be entitled to retain his Fellowship for life or until such time as he shall vacate it otherwise than by lapse of time. The number of Fellows holding Fellowships under this section and receiving the annual stipends of their Fellowships shall not exceed four at any one time, but every other Fellow qualified to hold his Fellowship under this section shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of his Fellowship except only the annual stipend. Such Fellow, however, shall not be taken into account in estimating the number of Fellows as provided in section 6 of this chapter. The order of succession to a Fellowship with stipend held under this section shall be according to seniority of qualification by completion of the necessary years of service, or, in case of equality of such seniority, according to seniority of first admission to a Fellowship. It shall be competent for a Fellow holding a Fellowship with stipend under this section to hold instead thereof, with the consent of the Society in College Meeting, a Fellowship without stipend. Such Fellow shall not however forfeit thereby his right of succession to a Fellowship with stipend at any future time.

26. The Society may, in any special case in which the interests of the College so require, make it a condition of the tenure of a Fellowship that the Fellow shall, if called upon so to do at the time of his election or re-election or within one year from either of those times, perform such duties in College, or do such work, for such time as the Society shall require. On any breach of such condition the Fellowship shall become vacant.

30. The Society in General College Meeting may elect to be an Honorary Fellow of the College any Member of the College, or any person of distinguished merit, whom they shall by a majority of at least two-thirds of all the Members for the time being of the Society consider worthy and desirable to be so elected. The Society in General College Meeting may by a like vote terminate the tenure of an Honorary Fellowship. An Honorary Fellow shall have no voice or authority in the affairs of the College, and shall not, by virtue of his election, be entitled to any stipend. He may however enjoy such other rights, privileges, and emoluments of a Fellow as the Society in General College Meeting may from time to time determine.

By substituting in CHAPTER IV "*Of the Scholars*" for Sections 1, 3, 4 and 5 the following Sections to form amended Sections of such Chapter:—

Of the Scholars.

1. Out of the portion of the College revenues to be assigned to the Scholarship Fund, provision shall be made for three Scholarships of eighty pounds (£80) a year, nine Scholarships of sixty pounds (£60) a year, eight Scholarships of forty pounds (£40) a year, and six Scholarships or Exhibitions of twenty pounds (£20) a year.

3. The Scholars shall (subject to the provision contained in the next section of this chapter) be elected from among the resident Members of the College, or from among such other resident Members of the University, as shall have been in the opinion of the Society distinguished in the ordinary studies of the University, or in some examination held under the direction of the College:

4. The Society may also elect Scholars (hereinafter called Minor Scholars) after an open competitive examination from among those who shall not be more than nineteen years of age on the first day of the academical year in which such examination shall take place, and who shall not have been admitted as Members of any College or of the University, or shall not have commenced residence in any College or in the University. A Minor Scholarship shall (unless some other period of tenure, not exceeding two years, shall be prescribed by the Meeting at which the election to it shall be made) be tenable only until the time from which the General Scholarships awarded at the next general election of Scholars at which the Minor Scholar might, if he should think fit, be a candidate shall commence. The maximum emolument of Minor Scholarships shall be eighty pounds (£80) a year, inclusive of room rent and all allowances.

5. Every Scholar, other than a Minor Scholar, who when elected shall not be already a Member of the College shall forthwith after election be admitted a Member. Every Scholar who at the time of his election is not in residence shall come in due course into College residence, and shall not in the meantime be entitled to receive any of the emoluments of his Scholarship. In the event of any default on the part of any Scholar in either of these particulars, he shall by such default forfeit his Scholarship.

By adding the following Section to form Section 15 of the said Chapter IV:—

15. A Scholar or Exhibitioner may at any time decline the emoluments of his Scholarship or Exhibition, but he shall retain the status and privileges of the Scholarship or Exhibition.

By substituting in CHAPTER V "*Of the Educational Staff and College Officers*" for Section 4 the following Section to form an amended Section of such Chapter:—

4. The Principal Tutor shall be appointed by the Master for a probationary period of three years, and on the expiration of such period the Society in General College Meeting shall have power, by a majority of all the members for the time being of the Society, to confirm the appointment for a further period of not less than seven and not more than twelve years, after the expiration of which further period they may in General College Meeting by a like majority renew the appointment for further periods of five years. It shall not be competent to the Master to appoint the same Fellow more than once to the office of Principal Tutor except with the consent of a majority of two-thirds of all the members for the time being of the Society.

By substituting in CHAPTER IX "*Of Allowances for Commons and other Details*" for section 4 the following section to form an amended section of such Chapter:—

4. The Foundress's Feast shall be held in every year, either, in accordance with ancient custom, on New Year's Day, or on such other day as may from time to time be determined by the Society in General College Meeting.

1 and 2. The Chancellor's fee includes the approval of plans, the perusal of the petition and other papers, the settling the sentence, and the approval of the Draft Act. The Registrar's Fee includes the perusal of the deeds of conveyance, the drawing and engrossing of the petition, and the sentence and the notarial Act, the necessary attendance at the Consecration, and the registering the deeds and the Act in the Register Book in the Diocese. The Secretary's fee includes the inspection of plans and correspondence prior to the papers being sent to the Registry. The Apparitor's fee includes all necessary citations and attendance on the Bishop at the Consecration.

3. The Chancellor's fee includes the attendance of the Chancellor or his Surrogate, the examination of the presentments of the outgoing churchwardens, and the admission of the new churchwardens to office. The Registrar's fee includes the drawing and issuing of the inhibition and of the Mandate for the citation of the Clergy, the preparation of the Visitation books and of the articles of enquiry and the presentment papers, the attendance at the Visitation and attesting the presentments and declarations of the churchwardens, the registering the papers exhibited by the clergy, the tabulating in the Registry the copies of the Register Books of Baptism and Burials, and other papers required to be annually transmitted. The Apparitor's fee includes the preparation and delivery of the citations to the clergy and churchwardens, and the attendance at the Visitation.

4 and 5. The Chancellor's fee includes the perusal of the petition, the order for the notice or citation, as the case may be, the perusal of the certificate and other papers, and making the decree. The Registrar's fee includes the perusal of the minutes of the vestry and the petition, the drawing of the notice or citation and other necessary documents and attending the Chancellor for his order, the preparation of the certificate and attendance on the Chancellor for his decree, and the drawing and signing the faculty. The Apparitor's fee includes the service of the notice or citation, but is exclusive of one shilling a mile for travelling expenses, if the citation is to be personally served in the country.

CHRIST CHURCH.

Statute XXVI, as altered by the Governing Body on eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, by adding the words in *italics* after the word "University" in Clause 1.

STATUTE XXVI.

Discipline and Causes of Deprivation of Scholars and Exhibitioners.

1. Any Scholar or Exhibitioner who shall marry, or be elected to a Studentship, or to a place on the foundation of any other Collegiate Body within the University, *or who shall without permission from the Governing Body previously accorded in writing cease to read for honours*, shall thereby vacate his Scholarship or Exhibition.

2. Any Scholar or Exhibitioner may be deprived of his Scholarship or Exhibition by the Governing Body for any misconduct which in the judgment of the Governing Body, or the major part of those present and voting at any stated meeting, shall merit deprivation.

3. Every Scholar or Exhibitioner, and every member of the House under the degree of Master of Arts, shall be required to conform to such general regulations as to residence, discipline, and (subject to the provisions of the Universities Tests Act, 1871) attendance on Divine worship as may be made from time to time by the Governing Body.

THE following Statute, made by the Governing Body of Brasenose College, Oxford, on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

Alteration to Statute 8 made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the Principal and Scholars of the Kings Hall and College of Brasenose in Oxford specially summoned for the purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting on the question this third day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

This alteration if approved of will be by the addition to Statute 8 of the following clause number 7:—

7. No selected candidate for the India Civil Service shall be eligible to any of the Scholarships hereinbefore referred to, and any scholar who shall become a selected candidate shall thereby vacate his Scholarship. But the Principal and Fellows may, if they think fit, and on such conditions as they may determine, award from time to time to any selected candidate a Scholarship tenable during residence with emoluments not

exceeding forty pounds a year; the amount of such emoluments within that limit to be determined by the Principal and Fellows after the receipt of a report laid before them by the Tutors and Lecturers of the College.

THE following General Order, dated 10th May, 1895, together with a Despatch from Lieutenant-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., detailing the operations of the Waziristan Field Force, has been received from the Government of India:—

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

GENERAL ORDER.

Simla, the 10th May, 1895.

FIELD OPERATIONS.—WAZIRISTAN.

No. 473. THE Right Honourable the Viceroy and Governor-General of India in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following letter from the Adjutant-General in India, dated the 13th April, 1895, forwarding a Despatch from Lieutenant-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., commanding the Waziristan Field Force, detailing the operations of the troops under his command from the 15th December, 1894, to the 13th March, 1895.

2. The Governor-General in Council entirely concurs with the Commander-in-Chief in India in his appreciation of the skilful manner in which Lieutenant-General Sir William Lockhart has conducted the operations of the Waziristan Field Force to a completely successful issue; the strategic dispositions of Sir William Lockhart were so admirably planned and so effectively carried out as to prevent that combined resistance on the part of the Waziris which, had it taken place, would have increased the military importance of the expedition at the cost of greater loss of life to the troops engaged. His Excellency in Council is also fully sensible of the excellent conduct of the Officers and men engaged in the operations, which were of the most trying nature, and he has noticed with satisfaction the good services of those who have been especially brought to notice.

3. His Excellency in Council is glad to have an opportunity of expressing his appreciation of the services rendered by Mr. R. I. Bruce, C.I.E., Commissioner of the Derajat, who had full political responsibility in Waziristan before Lieutenant-General Sir William Lockhart took command. The acknowledgments of the Government of India are also due to Mr. L. White King, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Dera Ismail Khan, and Mr. H. A. Anderson, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Bannu, who respectively carried out the delimitation of the southern and northern portions of the Afghan-Waziristan boundary under Lieutenant-General Sir William Lockhart's orders. His Excellency in Council also notices with pleasure the efficiency of the arrangements made by the Postal and Telegraph services under Mr. W. Van Someren and Mr. A. J. L. Grimes, respectively.

4. The Governor-General in Council further desires to express his sincere acknowledgments of the great care and attention given to all matters with which the Government of the Punjab were concerned, and of the valuable advice given by the

Honourable Sir Dennis Fitzpatrick in connection with the various phases of these operations.

No. 183-W, "Field Operations," dated Simla, the 13th April, 1895, from Major-General G. de C. Morton, C.B., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

I have the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief in India, to forward, for the information of the Government of India, the accompanying despatch from Lieutenant-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., detailing the operations of the Waziristan Field Force from December 15th, 1894, to March 13th, 1895, on which latter date the head-quarters of the Field Force returned to Bannu from the Tochi Valley.

2. In doing so, I am to express His Excellency's approval of the skilful manner in which the operations have been conducted throughout, and the complete success with which the orders of Government have been given effect to. All the offending sections of the Mahsud Waziri tribe have been subjected to severe punishment and have been compelled to submit to the terms imposed on them by the Government of India, with which they have now complied in full, while in addition, the demarcation of the frontier between Waziristan and Afghanistan has been successfully completed.

3. Although the repulse of their attack on Brigadier-General Turner's camp at Wana had greatly broken the powers of resistance of the Waziris, who subsequently offered little organized opposition to our advance, and though the list of casualties is small, yet the demands made upon the troops employed were great. They have borne much fatigue and exposure to snow and bitterly inclement weather, without shelter (which caused 171 deaths from pneumonia alone) in the most cheerful and soldier-like spirit, and the Commander-in-Chief has every reason to be satisfied with their discipline and general behaviour throughout the operations.

4. His Excellency fully concurs in Sir William Lockhart's commendations of Brigadier-General W. P. Symons, C.B., Brigadier-General A. H. Turner, Colonel C. C. Egerton, D.S.O., and the other Officers, warrant and non-commissioned officers mentioned in this despatch.

5. I am to bring to the notice of Government the services of Mr. R. I. Bruce, C.I.E., Commissioner of the Derajat, who is mentioned in Brigadier-General Turner's despatch No. 143 of 29th November, 1894, and to express the Commander-in-Chief's concurrence in the commendatory remarks of Sir William Lockhart on Mr. L. White King, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Dera Ismail Khan, and Mr. H. A. Anderson, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Bannu.

6. In the opinion of His Excellency, the energy of Mr. A. J. L. Grimes, Telegraph Department, and the admirable manner in which all the postal arrangements were carried out by Mr. W. Van Someren, of the Postal Department, merit the recognition of Government.

No. 1379-A-W, dated. Abbottabad, the 30th March, 1895. From Lieutenant-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., Commanding the Waziristan Field Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to submit for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, the following report on the operations of the Waziristan Field Force, 1894-95:—

2. In order that the causes and objects of the expedition may be understood, a very brief review of the events which led up to it seems to be useful. In accordance with the treaty made at Kabul in November, 1893, with His Highness the Amir, it became necessary to delimit the Waziristan border from Domandi on the Gumal to the borders of Khost. Owing, however, to the frequent and serious raids which had been committed by the Mahsud Waziris into the Gumal and Zhoi valleys from the year 1892 onwards, it was not considered safe that the delimitation of this boundary should be attempted without a strong escort, and it was accordingly decided by the Government of India that the British Commissioner should be accompanied by a brigade of all arms, a second brigade being held in reserve at Dera Ismail Khan. On October 25th the Commissioner arrived in Wana, and on November 3rd a determined night attack was made by the Mahsud Waziris numbering some 3,000, on the camp of his escort, which was commanded by Brigadier-General A. H. Turner. This attack was repulsed, but not without the loss on our side of 120 killed and wounded. The Government of India being averse to sending an expedition into the Mahsud country without giving the tribe a chance of making reparation for this unprovoked attack, offered them certain terms which were to be complied with by December 1st. Those terms included the surrender as hostages of eighteen of the principal men engaged in the attack on Wana, the banishment from the country of Mulla Pawindah, the leading spirit in the hostile movement, until matters should have been settled, and the surrender of every rifle, every horse, and all the money stolen from the British camp on November 3rd. These terms not having been complied with by the date fixed, the Government of India, on the recommendation of Mr. Bruce, the British Commissioner, extended the period of grace to December 12th. On the 14th of that month it was reported by Mr. Bruce that the Mahsud headmen had totally failed to induce the hostile factions and Mulla Pawindah to make the reparation demanded, and on the 15th I was appointed to exercise political control directly under the Government of India.

3. On December 16th, under the orders of Government, I issued a proclamation to the Mahsuds, in which I stated that the tribe having failed to comply with the terms, it was my intention (1) to punish the sections concerned in the attack on Wana and also all persons who might assist or screen individuals belong to such sections; (2) to enforce the terms already imposed and any additional conditions which renewed opposition on the part of the tribe might entail; and (3) to secure the demarcation of the boundary which the Government of India had from the beginning intended to carry out. The proclamation added that I had no desire to stay in the Mahsud country longer than was necessary for the attainment of the above objects.

4. On December 17th I assumed command of the Waziristan Field Force composed as under—

1st or Wana Brigade:

Brigadier-General A. H. Turner, Commanding.
2nd Battalion Border Regiment.
1st Punjab Cavalry (one squadron).
No. 3 (Peshawar) Mountain Battery.
No. 2 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners.
1st Battalion 1st Gurkha (Rifle) Regiment.
3rd Sikh Infantry.
1st Battalion 4th Gurkha (Rifle) Regiment.
20th (Punjab) Regiment of Bengal Infantry.

2nd or Jandola Brigade.

The brigades were concentrated on December 17th at Wana, Jandola, and Mirian, respectively. The plan of operations was as follows:—The 1st Brigade, leaving the 20th Bengal Infantry to garrison Wana, to march to Kaniguram via the Sharawangai Kotal; the 2nd Brigade to move from Jandola to Makin via the Tank Zam; and the Bannu Column from Mirian via the Khaisor Valley to Razmak. In the case of the last every endeavour was to be made to secure the co-operation of the Darwesh Khel Waziris, through whose country the route lay. In order that the three columns might arrive at their destinations on the same date it was necessary that the Bannu Column should start one day before the others, and accordingly I ordered Colonel Egerton to move forward on the 17th and the other two columns to advance on the 18th December.

5. These movements were duly carried out. The Bannu Column marched from Mirian on the 17th and reached Razmak on the 21st. No opposition was met with beyond shots fired into camp at night and at rear guards on the march, two sepoy of the 1st Sikhs and one follower being wounded.

The 2nd Brigade, accompanied by myself and the Field Force head-quarters, marched from Jandola on the 18th and reached Makin on the 21st. Several towers belonging to hostile sections were blown up *en route*, and the village of Marobi, belonging to Mulla Pawindah, was completely destroyed, with the exception of the mosque, which by my orders was spared. No organized opposition was met with, but camps and picquets were fired into, and the rear guard was annoyed by small bodies of the enemy, who succeeded in one case in killing three Pawindah camels and wounding several others. The only other casualty was one sapper driver killed near the Mulla's village.

The 1st Brigade marched from Wana via the Wucha Tiarza Pass into the Khaisara Valley, and thence crossing the Sharawangai Kotal, reached Kaniguram on the 21st. Brigadier-General Turner reported that he had met with great difficulties at the Sharawangai Pass and had been annoyed by bands of Mahsuds hanging on the flanks and rear of his column, one sepoy of the 3rd Sikhs and one sepoy of the 4th Gurkhas being severely wounded.

6. On December 22nd the Bannu Column joined me at Makin. On the same date a party from the 1st Brigade was despatched to the village of Karam, near Kaniguram, belonging to one of the hostile sections, and blew up its towers. The enemy, occupying a breastwork above the village,

opened fire on the troops, and, before he could be dislodged, two Officers and four sappers were wounded.

7. The Mahsuds were now reported to have taken refuge with their property and cattle in the glens running up to Pirghal, and I accordingly issued orders on the 22nd for a combined movement in six columns up those valleys. The 1st and 2nd Columns (from the 3rd Brigade) were ordered to advance from Makin up the Dara and Badinzai Valleys, respectively; the 3rd and 4th Columns (from the 2nd Brigade) to move from Makin up the Potwela and Murdar Valleys; and the 5th and 6th Columns (from the 1st Brigade) to advance from Kaniguram up the Trikhan (Pirghal) and the Badar Valleys. These movements were successfully carried out. The columns bivouacked for two nights and visited every settlement. Many towers belonging to the Abdul Rahman Khel, Abdullai, Badinzai, Langar Khel, and Garerai, all of whom had joined in the attack on Wana Camp, were blown up. A considerable quantity of forage and grain was carried off by the troops, and numerous flocks and herds were captured and brought to camp. Little opposition was offered, the people appearing to be cowed by the simultaneous advance of so many bodies. Our only casualties were two men of the Border Regiment severely wounded. Heavy snow had fallen and the troops suffered from great cold.

8. On December 31st a force under Colonel Egerton, D.S.O., consisting of the troops noted in the margin,* with mule carriage only, marched for the Shakhtu Valley with eight days' supplies. Colonel Egerton had orders to thoroughly explore the northern portion of the Mahsud country, to inflict punishment on the refractory sections, and to capture, if possible, the Mahsud flocks and herds reported to have been concealed in and about the Suzha Valley. On the following day the remainder of the Bannu Column marched for Jandola, and in the first march lost two sepoy of the 1st Sikhs—one mortally and the other severely wounded.

9. On December 31st I went to Kaniguram, returning to Makin on the following day. On January 2nd Brigadier-General Turner, taking the troops noted in the margin,† with mule carriage and six days' supplies, marched from Kaniguram to visit the Abdul Rahman Khel settlements in Splitoi and the country to the east of the Zaterai (Bar Pit) range.

10. On January 2nd a small column from the 2nd Brigade moved up the Shuran Algad, and blew up the towers belonging to the Abdullai at Spin Kamar, without opposition, returning to Makin on the following day.

11. As all the higher valleys belonging to the Mahsuds had now been visited by the troops, and as the cold (18° of frost the night I was at Kaniguram) was telling severely on the men, numerous deaths having occurred from pneumonia, I determined to evacuate Kaniguram and Makin, and to move the troops to lower levels.

On January 4th the remainder of the 1st Brigade marched from Kaniguram towards Marghaband, there to await the arrival of Brigadier-General Turner, and then to proceed to Jandola. During the first march of this brigade a private of the

Border Regiment was severely wounded. On the 5th I marched with the 2nd Brigade from Makin to Janjal. The rear guard was fired on, and one sepoy of the 38th Dogras was wounded. Four of the enemy were killed. At Janjal a halt was made for two days to allow of the Shabi Khel and Galishahi settlements in the neighbourhood being visited. Punishment was inflicted on those sections by the destruction of towers and defences, no opposition of any sort being met with. On the 7th I issued notices to all the sections of the Mahsuds, ordering them to meet me at Kundiwam on January 19th to hear the final orders of Government regarding themselves. On January 8th the march was continued to Shalmanzai (Surimanja Kach), and on the 9th Jandola was reached, at which place the 1st Brigade and the Bannu Column had already arrived.

12. The latter column, after leaving Makin, had crossed the Engamal Pass into the Shakhtu, and marched down that valley to Matwam, which was reached on January 2nd. Thence Colonel Egerton moved across the hills into the Suzha Valley, and reached Jandola on January 6th. He met with little opposition, but succeeded in inflicting considerable damage on the Shabi Khel, Kikari and Marsenzai sections in the Shakhtu, and in capturing about 3,000 cattle, sheep, and goats, belonging to hostile Mahsud sections in the Suzha Valley.

13. The column from the 1st Brigade under Brigadier-General Turner, which left Kaniguram on the 2nd, crossed the Zaterai range and reached Ahmadwam after a difficult march through snow on the same day. On the 3rd two small columns were sent into the Splitoi Valley and returned to Ahmadwam on the 5th, after having thoroughly explored the valley and blown up all the Abdul Rahman Khel towers in it. There were no casualties on our side, but the enemy suffered some loss. From Ahmadwam General Turner moved to Bahadur Khel in the Wucha Khwara, and from there sent out small columns to explore the country to the east of the Zaterai range. On the 7th, having carried out his programme, he arrived at Marghabaud, whence the whole of the 1st Brigade marched on the 9th to Jandola.

14. The first phase of the operations having thus terminated, I ordered the 1st Brigade to return to Wana, via the Gumal route, and the Bannu Column to march back to Mirian, detaching a strong force under Colonel Egerton himself via the Suzha route, with the object of, if possible, capturing more of the enemy's cattle, while I myself with the 2nd Brigade moved into the Khaisara Valley via the Shaburzam. Accordingly on the 12th the 1st Brigade marched for Wana, reaching its destination on the 19th. Colonel Egerton, taking 1,200 infantry and four guns with eight days' supplies, and only mule transport, marched on the same day and reached Jani Khel on the 19th, where he was joined by the remainder of his column, which had marched round by the Bain Pass. *En route* he thoroughly searched the country about Bakripunga (Bakarkand), Babarghar and the Sammal Kotai, and succeeded in capturing over 1,200 head of cattle. He met with but slight opposition, his only casualty being one sepoy of the 1st Sikhs killed. On the 13th, the road through the Shahur Tangi having been made practicable for camels, I marched with the 2nd Brigade (strengthened by the 14th Sikhs from Jandola) for Khaisara. On the 15th Tangi Raghza was reached, and a halt was made to allow of the construction of the road on to Narai Raghza. From Tangi Raghza I detached a small column under Colonel Gaselee, C.B., to visit and

punish the Machi Khel settlements at the head of the Gurgura Valley. On the 17th I marched to Narai Raghza, sending back, before starting, a wing of the 33rd Bengal Infantry to form a post at Barwand for the protection of the line of communications. On the 18th I halted at Narai Raghza to allow of the road on to Kundiwam being completed. On that date I was rejoined by Colonel Gaselee, who had met with some opposition in carrying out his orders, two men of the 14th Sikhs being severely wounded. On the 19th I marched to Kundiwam, where I found the Mahsud headmen arriving in obedience to the orders sent them.

15. On the 21st I announced to the Mahsuds the orders of Government. Besides the original conditions as to surrender of hostages, the banishment of Mulla Pawindah and the restoration of property stolen from Wana camp, which had already been partially complied with, several additional penalties were imposed on the tribe. These included the surrender of the following arms, viz: 50 breech-loaders, 200 matchlocks, and 200 swords or knives; the payment in cash of all fines outstanding against the tribe; and the opening up of the Shahur Valley route from Jandola to Wana. The tribe was given up to March 1st to fully comply with the above terms, and it was explained to them that until this was done our troops would remain in their country.

16. On the 22nd, leaving Brigadier-General Symons, C.B., with his brigade, in Khaisara, to see the terms carried out, I moved with the 5th Gurkhas to Wana and joined Brigadier-General Turner.

On the 24th Mr. King, C.S., with an escort consisting of the troops noted in the margin,* under the command of Colonel W. O. Thompson, marched from Wana for Domandi to carry out the delimitation of the southern portion of the British-Afghan boundary. The party arrived at Domandi on the 27th, and the delimitation was begun on the 28th. This was completed as far as Khwaja Khidr, a distance of 51 miles, on the evening of February 11th. I visited the delimitation party at Larkhwah on the 4th of that month. The success attending this portion of the demarcation was due to the energy and firmness of Mr. King.

17. On February 5th the body noted in the margin† left Wana for Bannu to form the divisional troops with the force marching up the Tochi to carry out the delimitation of the northern portion of the boundary. On the 12th I left Wana with Field Force head-quarters and on February 24th joined the Bannu Column at Saiadgai, one march beyond Bannu. Previous to this the headmen of the Darwesh Khel and of the Dawari clans had been summoned to Bannu, and the objects of the Government had been clearly explained to them by Mr. Anderson, Deputy Commissioner. Their attitude was friendly, and they undertook to furnish supplies and to perform any service required of them.

18. On the 25th I advanced with the Bannu Column to Haidar Khel in Lower Dawar, where I was joined by the divisional troops from Mirzail. From Haidar Khel the whole force advanced up the Tochi Valley, reaching Sheranni on March 2nd. No opposition was met with beyond a few shots

fired into camp at night. At Idak a Gurkha sepoy was mortally wounded, while on grazing guard, by a fanatic, who was at once cut down by some cavalry troopers. With this exception there were no casualties during my advance to Sheranni.

19. On March 5th Mr. Anderson, C.S., with an escort consisting of the 20th Bengal Infantry and half a company of sappers, under the command of Colonel W. H. Meiklejohn, C.M.G., and accompanied by the Afghan representatives, who had arrived at Sheranni on the 3rd, marched for Charkhel (Charkheiahar) to demarcate the northern portion of the boundary. On the 7th the first pillar was erected on the highest peak of that range, and on the 19th the boundary was completed to Khwaja Khidr, a distance of 50 miles.

20. On March 8th, leaving Colonel Egerton's column to support the delimitation party, I marched towards Bannu with the remainder of the divisional troops. When halted at Darpa Khel on the 10th a small foraging party, which had been sent into that village for wood, was attacked by some fanatics, and it became necessary to send a company of the 5th Gurkhas to clear the place. The villagers suffered some loss and two Sepoys of the 5th Gurkhas were wounded—one severely. On the 13th I reached Bannu.

21. In the meanwhile the orders of Government had been fully complied with by the Mahsuds. On March 1st the tribe had carried out all the terms with the exception of the surrender of three of the hostages; but on March 4th these were brought into my camp at Sheranni.

22. On March 11th the head-quarters of the 2nd Brigade marched from Kundiwan and arrived at Tank on the 14th. The following troops are now left in Wana: a mountain battery, a company of sappers, and two regiments of infantry, and at Barwand there is a wing of infantry. In the Tochi Valley there are a mountain battery, a company of sappers, and four regiments of infantry, and this force cannot be reduced until the delimitation of the remaining section of the boundary, viz., from Charkhel to Laram shall have been completed.

23. I am thus in a position to report that the work entrusted to me is practically finished, and that the objects of the expedition, as set forth in the proclamation of December 16th, have been accomplished. The sections of the Mahsud tribe concerned in the attack on the British camp at Wana have been severely punished; the terms of Government have been fully complied with, and the demarcation of the boundary has so far been successfully carried out.

24. I forward herewith a map showing the routes followed by the force. From this it will be seen that our troops have traversed Waziristan from one end to the other, and have visited every part of the Mahsud country. The fact of our having penetrated into their remotest glens and reached strongholds never before visited by British troops, will, it is hoped, have a good effect on the future conduct of the tribe.

25. A return of casualties during the operations is attached. Although the number of killed and wounded is comparatively small, the losses entailed by severe work and exposure have been considerable, 171 deaths having occurred from pneumonia alone.

26. The troops, have, however, endured fatigue, exposure, and hardships generally, with cheerfulness, and the conduct of all ranks of the Field Force under my command has been admirable as regards discipline. The 2nd Battalion, Border

Regiment, arrived in the field from Multan in poor health; but the effects of the fever, with which all ranks were saturated, rapidly disappeared, and the battalion performed the hardest duties in severe weather to my complete satisfaction.

27. In conclusion, I have to bring to the special notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the services of the following Officers:—

Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Mason, D.S.O., Royal Engineers, Assistant Quartermaster-General for Intelligence, already brought to notice by myself on three previous occasions, has again proved himself all that a Staff Officer should be. My task would have been a very much more arduous one had I not had the benefit of his advice, based on a thorough acquaintance with all that could be known of the Waziris and their country. Apart from his special intimacy with North-West Frontier matters, he has every qualification for a high position on the Staff.

Major A. R. Martin, 5th Gurkhas, Assistant Adjutant-General, is a most able Staff Officer, and his services have been invaluable. I consider Major Martin well worthy of advancement.

Captain M. H. S. Grover, 2nd Punjab Cavalry, was Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General with the Field Force head-quarters from the commencement of the expedition until January 24th, when he was recalled to India for duty. I have every reason to be satisfied with his work. He was succeeded by Captain C. H. Powell, 1st Gurkhas, to whom the work was quite new, but who has done it very well.

The work of the Bengal Sappers and Miners under Captain A. G. Hunter-Weston, Royal Engineers, and his Officers, has been excellent, and I am indebted to it for the removal of many of my difficulties in a very mountainous country.

Captain R. A. Browne, of the Border Regiment, has superintended the signalling of the Field Force to my satisfaction, and great credit is due to him and to all serving under his orders.

Surgeon-Colonel L. D. Spencer, M.D., Indian Medical Service, has most ably administered his department in the field, and I commend the excellent work done by himself and by his Officers and other subordinates for very favourable consideration. He has been well supported by all, but I wish to give special prominence to the valuable services of Surgeon-Lieutenant-Colonel J. T. B. Bookey, Indian Medical Service, and Surgeon-Major J. Shearer, M.B., Indian Medical Service.

Captain H. Wharry, Staff Corps, has been my Chief Commissariat Officer throughout the operations. He has had considerable difficulties to contend with, but these have always been overcome by his ability and readiness of resource. He has been efficiently supported by the commissioned, warrant and non-commissioned officers working under his orders, both in the supply and transport branches.

Major R. A. Wahab, Royal Engineers, has made a complete survey of all the new country opened out by the expedition, which will not be the least important result of the operations. His work, as well as that of all serving under him, has been carried on under conditions of fatigue and exposure in severe weather, which often demanded great endurance.

My Aide-de-Camp, Lieutenant the Honourable F. H. S. Roberts, King's Royal Rifle Corps, and the other Officers of my personal Staff have rendered me every assistance.

The 1st Brigade was commanded by Brigadier-General A. H. Turner, Staff Corps, whom I have already brought to notice for good work performed

in two previous frontier expeditions. I trust that his valuable services in Waziristan may receive recognition.

The 2nd Brigade was commanded by Brigadier-General W. P. Symons, C.B., who has fully maintained the reputation he had already established by services which are well known to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

The Bannu Column was commanded by Colonel C. C. Egerton, D.S.O., 3rd Punjab Cavalry. He has proved himself to be as good a leader as he was a Staff Officer in former expeditions under my command.

The divisional troops during the latter part of the operations were commanded by Colonel A. Gaselee, C.B., 5th Gurkhas, to my entire satisfaction. I also beg to bring to notice the services of Colonel W. H. Meiklejohn, C.M.G., 20th Bengal Infantry, who commanded the Delimitation Escort in the Tochi Valley.

Of the Officers brought to notice by Brigadier-Generals and the Column Commander, I beg to submit the names of the following for the favourable consideration of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief:—

29. I wish to record my recognition of the hearty co-operation given to me by the following Civil Officers, who have been associated with me during different periods of the expedition:—

Mr. L. White King, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Dera Ismail Khan. I cannot speak too highly of this most able Officer, and I trust that his successful delimitation of the southern section of the Waziri-Afghan boundary, viz., from Domandi to Khwaja Khidr, may receive recognition, carried out as it was under conditions demanding not only great physical endurance, but also keen intelligence, patience, and resolution.

Mr. H. A. Anderson, C.S., Deputy Commissioner of Bannu, who made it possible for Colonel Egerton to march the Bannu Column through the Darwesh Khel country by the influence he possesses over that tribe, and who afterwards succeeded in overcoming all objections on the part of the inhabitants to my advance up the Tochi Valley. To those eminent services I have every confidence that he will add that of the completion of the Waziri-Afghan boundary.

My thanks are also due to the other civil officers who accompanied the Field Force.

30. Thanks to the never-failing energy of Mr. A. J. L. Grimes and those working under him, telegraphic communication with India and between the columns was established as fast as the troops

advanced, and was seldom interrupted for more than a few hours. The line was continually cut by the enemy, or brought down by gales, but it was invariably repaired within a very short time in spite often of long distances to be covered through heavy snow.

31. The Postal Department worked admirably under Mr. W. T. Van Someren, to whom the thanks of every member of the Field Force are due.

From the Adjutant-General in India to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

The following is submitted for the information of the Government of India in the Military Department:—

No. 544, dated Camp Khar, the 7th April, 1895.

From Major-General Sir R. C. Low, K.C.B., Commanding the Chitral Relief Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I have the honour to forward a report on the action of the 4th April, 1895, fought by the 1st Brigade of the force under my command.

2. At 1 P.M. the 1st Brigade began to descend from Malakand Kotal along the road to Khar. The advanced guard was furnished by the Bedfordshire Regiment, the main body consisting of the 37th Dogras, No. 3 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, the King's Royal Rifles, and one company of the 15th Sikhs; the remainder of the 15th Sikhs being on rear guard and at the Malakand Pass till relieved.

3. When the advanced guard had moved forward about two miles down the valley, No. 4 Company, Sappers and Miners, were caught up. The enemy were seen in large numbers on a low ridge to the right front and ascending in greater strength a high rocky ridge which ran roughly parallel to the road and at an average of 1,200 yards from it. The Bedfordshire Regiment seized the mouth of the defile, through which the road there ran, with two companies on each flank; another company of the Bedfords and one of King's Royal Rifles ascended a spur immediately

on the right of road. The guns came into action here against the parties on the high ridge. The 37th Dogras advanced across the plain and attacked the low ridge to the right front, driving the enemy over it and advancing beyond. The ridge being gained, the Dogras were supported by a company of the 15th Sikhs; the guns advanced to a fresh position and came into action, where also were the King's Royal Rifles with a Maxim, and the Bedfordshire Regiment. After a time the force crossed the valley and was deployed with the battery and Maxim gun between the King's Royal Rifles and the Bedfords, covering the road the baggage had to take on issuing from the defile.

4. The enemy began to threaten the left flank of the Dogras. Two troops of the Guides coming up round the left of the Dogras charged about 1,200 of them, and killing about 30, the remainder fled to the hills. No. 4 Company, Sappers and Miners, now moved up to the ridge. The enemy now drew off, and the baggage having come up emerged into the plain. The Dogras and Sikhs withdrew, and the whole force moved on into camp near Khar.

5. The enemy's casualties are estimated at 500, and ours consisted of:—Europeans—killed none, wounded 3; natives—killed 2, wounded 15.

I have the honour to forward for information a condensed report, accompanied by a sketch by Lieutenant Gardyne, Gordon Highlanders, of the action at the crossing of the Swat river on the 7th April, 1895.

The 2nd Brigade, less the Gordon Highlanders and the Guides Infantry, encamped at Aladand on the evening of the 6th, and no enemy were seen that day on the further bank of the Swat river till the evening.

On the morning of the 7th a company of the King's Own Scottish Borderers was sent down towards the place where it was proposed to construct the bridge, and were fired at from the ridge of the hills on the opposite bank; this ridge was thickly occupied by the enemy, as were the villages of Chakdarrah, Saidabad, and Ramorah. The forces at the disposal of the General Officer Commanding the 2nd Brigade to-day consisted of

The King's Own Scottish Borderers, the 4th Sikhs, No. 4 Company, Sappers and Miners, No. 8 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, two squadrons of the Guides, to which were added from Khar the 11th Bengal Lancers and the 15th Sikhs, and No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery. The 4th Sikhs and No. 8 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, fired at the enemy on the hills; the King's Own Scottish Borderers (four companies) and No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery attacked Ramorah fort. Under cover of the fire of the 4th Sikhs and No. 8 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, the whole of the cavalry and the 15th Sikhs crossed by a ford about 800 yards from the hills. Directly the cavalry crossed the main ford, the river here consisting of five branches, the enemy began to stream up the plain towards Uch, thus getting a long start of the cavalry, who pursued them as far as the Katgala pass, nine miles, cutting up about 100 of them, the majority falling to the 11th Bengal Lancers. Two companies of infantry advanced to Uch, five miles, in support of the cavalry, the 15th Sikhs occupied Chakdarrah, the 4th Sikhs Saidabad, and three companies of the King's Own Scottish Borderers and a section of sappers, crossing by a breast-high ford, Ramorah fort, which proved too strongly built to be destroyed by the explosives at hand. In the evening the two companies returned from Uch, the cavalry, the King's Own Scottish Borderers, and a section of Sappers returned to camp at Aladand, the 15th Sikhs and the 4th Sikhs remaining in their position across the river.

The enemy's loss by rifle and shell fire could not be estimated. Our casualties consisted of one man killed, two men drowned crossing the ford, and ten men wounded, and three horses killed and eight wounded.

C. Low, K.C.B., commanding the Chitral Relief Forces, regarding the encounters with the enemy which took place near Sado on the 13th and 14th April, 1895.

I have the honour to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief a condensed report of the action near Sado on the 13th and 14th April, 1895.

1. On the previous evening the Guides Infantry Battalion had been sent across the Panjkora River on a slight raft bridge, with orders to construct a defensive post on the right bank and protect themselves for the night, and to burn the next morning certain villages on the right bank a mile or two lower down from which firing at our troops and transport had taken place. It was intended to support this battalion early the follow-

ing day with other troops, but during the night the raft piers were so damaged by logs carried down by the current, that the bridge became useless, and had to be broken up. The Guides Infantry had started up the hill at daylight, and could not be stopped in time.

2. Shortly before noon on the 13th instant, a report was sent in by the Officer commanding the Guides Infantry that two large columns of the enemy were coming down the Ushiri Valley towards him. I at once ordered out the remainder of the 2nd Brigade, with No. 8 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery, and the four Maxim guns with the brigade. The Guides Infantry were seen to be occupying a very high ridge on the southern side of the Ushiri Valley, and distant about 2,000 yards from the left bank of the Panjkora River. From this point they were retiring very slowly in a north-westerly direction, coming down a spur towards the junction of the two rivers. The batteries opened fire as soon as the enemy advancing from the west showed over the ridge.

3. The Guides Infantry continued to retire slowly down the spurs, and as soon as the enemy had come sufficiently far down the eastern slopes of the hill, our infantry opened fire at ranges from 800 to 1,200 yards from the left bank to cover the retirement. Orders were signalled to the Officer commanding the Guides Infantry to move across the open valley and the Ushiri stream to his post of the previous night, which, being only 100 yards from the left bank, could be well protected by our fire. This he proceeded to do, but was a good deal harassed during the movement by the appearance of the second column of the enemy; which now showed on the north-side of the Ushiri Valley, and moving parallel to the Guides attempted to get round to some spurs commanding the post, to the east of the village of Khazana. I regret very deeply to report that Lieutenant-Colonel Battye, commanding the Guides Infantry, was killed by a gunshot wound during this movement. The retirement of the Guides was most steadily carried out, and moving the guns and infantry gradually round the bend of the river on high ground commanding the far bank I was able to keep the enemy at a distance.

4. It was nearly dark by the time the Guides Infantry reached their post. No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery and some infantry were left on the left bank, and ammunition and supplies as well as two Maxim guns under Captain Peebles, Devonshire Regiment, and one company of the 4th Sikhs were sent over on mussuck rafts to reinforce the Guides. Firing, however, continued till nearly 11 p.m., and commenced again at daylight the next morning (14th), when Captain Peebles was mortally wounded, and I regret to say, died on the following morning (15th).

5. The enemy withdrew entirely up the valley soon after daybreak on the 14th. I estimate their strength at about 2,000 men in each of the two columns, and their casualties were no doubt numerous, but being unable to pursue, I am without definite information on this point.

6. The enemy are reported to have been a mixed gathering of Salarzais, Mamunds, subjects of the Amir from Asmar and Kunar (of these we know 18 were killed), and Utman Khels of Amrang, who were far the boldest in coming on.

The following is submitted for the information of Government :—

No. 169A, dated Camp Mundia Khan, the 19th April, 1895. From Major-General Sir R. C. Low, K.C.B., Commanding the Chitral Relief Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I have the honour to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, a condensed report, accompanied by a sketch by Lieutenant Robertson, Field Intelligence Officer, of the action near Mamugai on the 17th April, 1895.

1. The force at Sado commenced crossing the suspension bridge near Zulm Baba at daybreak. By 10.45 A.M. the following troops had crossed :—

One squadron, Guides Cavalry.

Three squadrons, 11th Bengal Lancers.

No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery.

Half of No. 4 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners.

Two companies, 23rd Pioneers.

The four infantry battalions of the 3rd Brigade.

The King's Own Scottish Borderers had crossed the bridge previously, and held the heights to the north-west of the bridge.

2. The cavalry were pushed on up the valley towards Miankalai, reconnoitring, and about 9 A.M. reached a point about one mile to north-west of Mamugai, when a considerable body of the enemy with flags were seen collecting near Miankalai. On the cavalry retiring, the enemy followed them up to a certain extent, but carefully avoided ground where the cavalry might have acted against them.

3. I pushed on to Ghobani with the 3rd Brigade, arriving there soon after noon. The enemy had then collected on a bluff in two villages west of Mamugai. The battery came into action about 12.30 P.M., and the enemy soon fell back under cover. The Seaforth Highlanders and 4th Gurkhas moved up to the south side of the valley, and then advanced against the enemy in a westerly direction, driving them back from spur to spur, and eventually arrived at the bluff mentioned about 4 P.M., which they occupied for the night.

4. The cavalry had been moved up the valley to their original position, to try and intercept the enemy in their retreat on Miankalai, but the enemy kept so far over to the west side of the Jandol Valley that our cavalry were unable to get at them. Our loss was very slight,—8 men wounded, and 9 horses wounded, of which two had afterwards to be shot.

5. The enemy's loss was probably slight; their total number engaged was from 3,000 to 4,000, composed of a miscellaneous gathering of Mamunds, Salarzais, a few Mohmands, and a few inhabitants of Asmar and Kunar. It is believed Umra Khan was not present in person. The enemy appeared to retire mainly on Miankalai.

Now know ye, that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, of the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents), assign to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, Felixstowe, as a particular district, all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Walton and of the parish of Felixstowe aforesaid, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and do direct that the same shall be called "The Particular District of Saint John the Baptist, Felixstowe."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich (testified as aforesaid), in further exercise and execution of the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or in some of them, and particularly in the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter sixty, in the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-six (such two lastly-mentioned Acts being also two of "The Church Building Acts" before named), in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby determine and declare that banns of matrimony shall be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized or performed at the church of the said particular district of Saint John the Baptist, Felixstowe, and do hereby order and direct that all the fees, dues, offerings, or other emoluments to be received in respect of such publication of banns of matrimony, and of such solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the same church shall, from and after the next avoidance of the vicarage of the said parish of Walton, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Felixstowe respectively, belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint John the Baptist, Felixstowe: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

In witness whereof the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have hereunto affixed their common seal, and the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich, has hereunto set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal, this twentieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.
