

City, as well as to the Schiffs and the Vairelins. From *Thoulon* they write, that the Count *d'Estree* was returned thither with the Squadron under his Command; that he was taking on Board two months Provisions; and that 'twas said he had Orders to sail towards *Catzenauz*. The last Letters from *Savoy* say, that the French have rais'd some new Works about *Montmelian*, in order to a closer Blockade of that place. That there had happened a new Encounter between the *Vaudois* and the *Marquis de Feuquieres*, in which the French own to have had 40 men killed and wounded. From *Calais* and *Dunkirk* we have an account, that the Appearance of a Squadron of English Men of War had mightily disturb'd all those Coasts, inasmuch that several Troops were sent thither from *Flanders* for the guard of them.

*Brussels*, May 27. We hear, that the Elector of *Bavaria* is on his march with the Forces designed for the Assistance of the Duke of *Savoy*, which has so alarm'd the French, that they are sending thither what Troops they can spare without too much weakening themselves on this side. Those of *Saxony* were on their march to the *Rhine*, and would be there in 15 days. The Dutch and the other Confederate Troops, that are to serve in *Flanders* this Summer, are all marching to the General Rendezvous; and Prince *Waldeck* has already formed a Body of them near *Digom*, within an hours march of this City. The Duke of *Luxemburgh* arrived on the 15th in the French Camp near *Courtray*. On the 20th he marched to *Hauteville*, taking his Head-quarter at *Bassut*, near which place he pass'd the *Schelde* on the 25th, and is now encamped at *Lessines*. The *Marquis de Boufflers* has burnt several Villages about *Namur*, and has since posted himself with 10 or 12000 men near *Dinant*.

*Ghent*, May 27. The Duke of *Luxemburgh* encamped yesterday at *Liffnes*. We have an account from *Audenarde*, that at least 500 Swiss Deserters are come in there within these five days; we have likewise a great many here, yesterday came in above 70 French of one Regiment, and they tell us that all the Regiment had deserted.

*Hague*, May 29. The King is now at *Loo*; where the Count *de Salmes* arrived on Saturday last from *Germany*, and gave His Majesty a full account of the state of the Forces there; and the next morning he and my Lord *Marleborough* parted from thence for *Flanders*, to put all things into a readiness against His Majesties arrival there. We have an account from *Zealand*, that the Men of War, commanded by Vice-Admiral *Vanderputten*, Rear-Admiral *Everez*, and Captain *Moffiman*, are gone to Sea, in order to join the English Fleet. And from *Amsterdam* we hear likewise, that the Ships of Vice-Admiral *Callenberg*, the Count *de Bentheim*, and Captain *Mais*, set sail the 21th out of the *Taxel*; that those of *Friseland* lay in the *Vlie* ready to sail; and that two more, which are hired at *Amsterdam* for the Admiralty of *Groningen*, had pass'd the *Pampus*. Admiral *Trump* died this day, after a long Illness.

*Dublin*, May 16. We have advice, that the French Convey arrived at *Limerick* on the 8th instant, with Provisions, Cloaths and Ammunition, but no Men nor Money. The *Sieur de St. Ruth*, who is to command the Irish Troops, and two French Lieutenant-Generals, are come over with these Ships. Our Forces are marching to their Rendezvous.

*Norwich*, May 21. At a Chapter of this Church, Mr. *John Moore* was, in pursuance of Their Majesties Letters under the Great Seal, and Letter Mithive, this day unanimously Elected Bishop of *Norwich*.

*Duis*, May 22. Yesterday in the Afternoon came into the *Duis* nine Dutch Men of War from *Holland*, so that there are now 37 (Capital Ships,) with the Fleet; and we are told, that 9 more are coming. The *Phoenix* is

come in with several Merchant-men from the Westward.

*Deale*, May 23. This morning, the Wind being Easterly, Admiral *Ruffell*, with the English and Dutch Fleet under his Command, sail'd out of the *Dunnes* to the Westward.
