*Alicant, May 7.*

**T**His day Captain *Aylmer* in Their Majesties Ship the *Rupert*, with about 70 Sail of English and Dutch Men of War and Merchant Ships under his Command from the *Levant*, arrived off of this place, and proceeded on his Voyage homeward, without stopping in this Road, having sent before the *Portland* Frigate, to advise any Ships that might be bound for *England* or *Holland* to be in a readines to joyn the Convoy, but here was only one English Ship from *Zant*, who is sailed with them.

*Rome, May 12.* The Conclave has now lasted three months, and is like to continue a great while longer, for the Cardinals are still as much divided as they were at first about the Choice of a Pope, and the French do all they can to hinder their Agreement. *Alveri* seems to have lost all hopes of his own Promotion; but the Friends of *Barberigi*, and especially the Zealots, are not yet discouraged from employing all their Endeavours for his Advancement to the Papal Chair, and if the last Courier that was dispatched to *Spain* does bring back the Answer they desire, they hope after all to effect it. The Cardinals of *Lavin* and *Spinola* are much indisposed in the Conclave, and *Visconti* is not yet well enough to return thither.

*Turin, May 12.* Our Duke is going to form a Camp near *Como*, and has sent for 36 Pieces of Cannon from *Vercelli*; We are assured, that his Highness will bring 2000 men into the Field, without reckoning the 18000 that are expected from *Germany*. We do not hear of any Motions of the Enemy; and some Persons come lately from *Syls* report, that Monsieur *Catinat* was gone from thence to *Grenoble*.

*Milan, May 16.* Prince *Eugens* of *Savoy* arrived here on the 10th instant from *Vienna*, having in his way seen the Elector of *Bavaria* at *Municken*; and parted again from hence the same day for *Turin*. Four new raised Companies of Germans are come to *Como*. The Troops of this State, designed for the assistance of the Duke of *Savoy*, are on their march towards *Piedmont*. Our new Governor the Marquis *de Loganes* is daily expected here.

*Venice, May 18.* The Princess *Anna Maria* of *Tuscany*, who is married to the Elector Palatine, arrived on Sunday last at *Passau*, and the Tuesday following continued her Journey towards *Germany*. This week sailed from hence another Convoy with 3000 men for the *Levant*.

*Vienna, May 24.* The Emperor, Empress, and the King of the *Romans*, intend to go the next week to the Countess of *Albania*, to see the *Brandenburg* Troops as they pass by in their march towards *Hungary*. From *Buda* they write, that there are 5000 men at work on the Fortifications of that place, and that they are making a new Line to separate the Upper from the Lower or *Water Town*. The Letters from *Hessick* give an account, of the daily arrival of new Troops threabouts; and that the Enemy had

got some of their Forces together about *Nissa*, but that their General Rendezvous was at *Sesbia*, where they will divide their Troops into two Bodies, one to act towards *Transylvania*, and the other in *Hungary*. The Turks had brought to *Widin* a great number of Barks with Provisions designed for *Belgrade*, 10 of which the Russians seized near *Orsova* in their passage thither, and 7 more at *Gulitz*, where the River *Morave* falls into the *Danube*; They have likewise surpris'd the Fort of *Solim* near *Lip-pa*, so that these People, with their Captain *Anton*, are like to be very troublesome to the Turks. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* was to set out yesterday from *Bohemia* on his Journey hither.

*Ratisbonne, May 24.* The Elector of *Bavaria* is preparing for his Expedition to *Savoy*, with a Body of 18000 men of his own and the Emperor's Troops, who are said to be already on their march.

*Hydelberg, May 29.* The Troops of *Savoy* continue their march with great diligence, and are expected in 7 or 8 days on the *Neckar*. The French Forces, who drew together between *Landau* and *Neustadt*, marched to *Wintzingen*, and from thence to *Lambheim*; They are about 15000 strong, and commanded by the Marechal *de Loges*, who sent 2 or 3 days ago a Detachment of 3000 men towards *Mentz*. The Confederate Troops, to the number of about 20000, lye near *Eppingen* and *Sintheim*, where they are daily reinforced, and two Regiments are going from hence to joyn them.

*Hamburgh, May 29.* The Forces of the Duke of *Zell* and *Wolfenbuttel* are marching towards *Flanders*, between 10 and 12000 men strong.

*Cologne, June 1.* The Troops of *Hesse*, who have had their Quarters in the upper Diocess, are marching towards the *Meuse*, as are likewise the *Brandenburghers* from their Quarters at *Nurs, Huls, Ordingen, Kempen, &c.* The *Neuburghers* are likewise ordered to march towards *Dauen*.

*Paris, May 29.* The Duke of *Chartres* is gone to the Army in *Flanders*, which by our last advice was encamped at *Leffines*. The French Camp that's forming near *Thonon* on the Lake of *Geneva*, is, they say, to consist of 12000 men, Monsieur *Catinat* having sent that way several Regiments from his Camp near *Susa*. We are told, that Orders have been dispatched after the Marquis *de Nesmond*, who commanded the Convoy to *Ireland*, to return with all the haste he can to *Brest*; and that 8 Ships of the Count *d'Estree's* Squadron are ordered thither from the *Streights*. They work hard to get our Fleet to Sea; And because Seamen are extremely wanted, 'tis said, that all the Foreign Ships, which are in the Ports of this Kingdom, are taken up for two months, in order to employ the Men on board the Fleet.

*Brussels, June 4.* The French Army, commanded by the Duke of *Luxemburg*, passed the *Schelde* near to *Hantouze* on the 25th of the last month, and encamped at *Potte-Escumaffz*; The next day they marched to *Leffines*, where they stayed till the 28th, on which day they encamped between *Gamerige* and *Tohecke*; The 29th they advanced between *Engelen* and *Halle*, and encamped the 30th between *Halle* on the right, and *Cyfforgat* on the left Wing of their Army, which is compos'd of 32 Battalions, & 103 Squadrons.
