The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majestyin Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the parish of Bovey Tracey, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified by his having signed and scaled this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Bovey Tracey which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Bovey Tracey.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edward Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical

Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Bovey Tracey being: -

"All that part of the parish of Bovey Tracey in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter which is bounded upon the south-west and upon the south by the parish of Ilsington in the said county and diocese and upon all other sides that is to say upon the east upon the north and upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Ilsington from the parish of Bovey Tracey aforesaid at a point on the southwestern side of the road which leads from Newton Abbot to Bovey Tracey distant thirty yards or thereabouts south-east of the milestone indicating a distance of four miles from Newton Abbot and one mile from Bovey Tracey and extending thence first eastward to a point in the middle of the last-mentioned road and then north-westward along the middle of the same road for a distance of forty-two chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries such road over the stream which flows from Newpark Woodand passing a little to the south of Wifford Lodge and Wifford Wood joins the River Bovey, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing first the road leading from Teigngrace to Bovey Tracey and then the More-

ton Hampstead Branch Line of the Great Western Railway) to the centre of Diptford Bridge which carries the accommodation road which leads from Jews' Bridge past Wifford Lodge aforesaid to-wards Bovey Tracey over the said stream and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned accommodation road for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction near Wifford Lodge aforesaid with the private road leading to the house called or known as Indio and continuing thence still northwestward along the middle of the said private road for a distance of twenty-three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath which leads past the north-eastern side of Indio Pond and continuing thence still northwestward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road which leads from the Recreation Ground at the northern end of Bovey Heath to the house called or known as Indio as aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of nine chains or there abouts to its junction with the road which leads from the said house called or known as Indio to Bovey Bridge and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its junction near Bovey Bridge aforesaid with the road which leads from Bovey Tracey past Five Wyches Cross and past Lowerdown Cross to Haytor Down and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of two miles and thirty-two chains or thereabouts to a point distant five chains or thereabouts to the north-east of the junction of the same road with the road leading from Haytor Down to Narrowcombe upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Bovey Tracey from the parish of Ilsington aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:—

In the Parish Churchyard of St. Helen's, Isle of Wight, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and

ninety-five.

In the Parish Churchyard of Hathern in the county of Leicester, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five. C. L. Peel.

THE Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration, that upon the decease of Skeffington James, Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, in the Peerage of Ireland, which happened on the 7th day of September, 1895, the dignity of Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal devolved upon James Frederick, now Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, as the eldest son of Robert Daly, Esq., commonly called the Honourable Robert Daly, who whilst living was the brother and heir presumptive of the said Skeffington James, Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sisters of the said James Frederick, Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, cannot enjoy that title, rank, place, and precedence which would have been due to them had their late father survived his brother and thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Florence Maria Daly and Elinor Gertrude Daly the sisters of the said James Frederick, now Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the title, rank, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as the daughters of a Baren, to which honour they would have been entitled had their father succeeded to the dignity of Baron Dunsandle and Clan Conal:

And to command that the said order and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT)
ORDER OF 1895.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Sheep from Canada and the United States of America.

1. Chapter 4 (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE) of the Foreign Animals Order of 1895 shall not after the commencement of this Order apply to sheep brought from Her Majesty's Possessions in North America or from the United States of America, and such sheep shall be subject to the provisions of Part I (SLAUGHTER AT PORT OF LANDING) of the Third Schedule to the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and to the provisions of Chapter 2 (FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER) of the Foreign Animals Order of 1895.

Revocation.

2. The Order described in the Schedule to this Order, to the extent described in that Schedule, is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or

any penalty incurred under, the said Order before the commencement of this Order.

Amended Article 22 of the Foreign Animals Order of 1895.

3. The following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of Article 22 of the Foreign Animals Order of 1895 and shall be deemed to be Article 22 of that Order (namely):

Conditions of Landing.

22.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or Iceland, or New Zealand, or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

Second. That, in the case of the landing of cattle or sheep, the vessel in which they are imported has not within twenty-eight days before taking them on board had on board any. cattle or sheep exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America.

Third. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered or been in any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

Fourth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than Her Mujesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the fifth condition of this Article), or Iceland, or New Zealand, or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man.

Fifth. That none of the cattle or sheep imported have while on board the vessel been in contact with any cattle or sheep exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals unless and until—

(a) the owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing couditions; and

(b) the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Interpretation.

4. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1895.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the Foreign Animals (Amendment) Order of 1895.

Commencement.

• 6. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety six.

SURREY BOROUGHS (MUZZLING OF DOGS) TEMPORARY ORDER OF 1895.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Extent and Enforcement.

1. This Order applies to and shall be in force in the Districts of the Local Authorities mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, and shall be enforced by each of such Local Authorities within their District.

Commencement and Durotion.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-tive; and shall continue to operate and apply to each of the Districts mentioned in the Schedule to this Order until this Order is declared by further Order of the Board to cease to apply to such District.

Muzzling of Dogs.

3.—(1.) No dog shall be allowed to be in or on any public place unless such dog is muzzled with a cage muzzle so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while wearing the same to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent such dog from breathing freely or lapping water.

(2.) Provided that the provisions of this Article

shall not apply to-

(a) Packs of hounds or greyhounds while being exercised or used for sporting purposes, or other sporting dogs while being used for sporting purposes, or any dogs while being used for the capture or destruction of vermin, and in every case in charge of competent persons.

(b) Dogs while being taken to or from Exhi-

bitions, Shows, or other places if such dogs are confined in boxes, cages, crates, baskets, or hampers so constructed as to render it impossible for such dogs while so confined to bite any person or animal.

General Provisions of the Rabies Order of 1895.

4. Subject to the last pregoing Article of this Order, all the provisions of the Rabies Order of 1895 shall, so far as the same are applicable, continue to apply, during the continuance of this Order, to the Districts to which this Order applies

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Unmuzzled Pogs.

5.—(1.) Any dog found in or on any public place without being muzzled in manner prescribed by this Order may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority as follows:

(i.) If the dog is diseased it shall be forthwith

slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog is suspected it shall be detained and kept or otherwise dealt with as the Local

Authority think expedient.

- (iii.) If the dog is not diseased or suspected, it shall be detained in some proper place and be there kept for such period as the Local Authority think expedient: Provided that where the person having charge of or the owner of a dog so detained is known, the Local Authority shall cause notice to be forthwith given to such person or owner of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Order, be given up to such person or owner on payment of the reasonable expenses incurred in respect of su h detention.
- (iv.) If the dog so seized and detained has not been claimed by such person or owner within three days after the seizure, or, where such person or owner is known, within two days after the aforesaid notice has been given, the Local Authority may cause the dog to

be slaughtered or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the Local Authority deem expedient.

Offences.

6. If any dog is found in or on any public place without being muzzled in manner prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person allowing the same to be in or on such public place in contravention of this Order, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against 4he Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

7. In this Order-

"Public place" includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park garden or pleasure ground, common, uninclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being access:
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of

Animals Act, 1894:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1895.

8. This Order may be cited as the SURREY Boroughs (Muzzling of Dogs) Temporary ORDER OF 1895.

OTICE is hereby given, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Dover (hereinafter called "the Corporation") intend to apply to the Board of Trade, on or before the 23rd day of December, 1895, for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called "the Order") to be confirmed by Parliament in the ensuing Session for all or some of the following amongst other purposes (that is to

or any adjacent street, road, highway, or thoroughfare a substituted tramway or substituted tramways.

To empower the Corporation to lay down double in lieu of single lines and single in lieu of double lines.

To provide for the repair by the Corporation, their lessees or other persons, bodies, or authorities, of any streets, roads, highways, or thoroughfares in which any tramway may, for the time being, be laid, and for the use or disposition of any materials or things found in the construction or repair of any of the intended tramways.

To provide that so much of Section 34 of the Tramways Act, 1870, as limits the extent of any carriages used on any tramway beyond the outer edge of the wheels of such carriages shall not apply to carriages used on the said intended

To empower the Corporation and their lessees from time to time to work the said intended tramways by animal power, and by steam, mechanical, electrical, cable, compressed air or any other motive power, and partly by one power and partly by another, and for that purpose to erect, place, make, and maintain works, engines, machinery, dynamos, and apparatus for the production, storage, and supply of electricity, or other power, and to lay down, erect, construct, maintain above, upon, and below the surface of the ground, and to attach to houses and buildings mains, wires, pipes, conductors, cables, ropes, posts, brackets, boxes, apparatus, and things necessary or proper for the transmission of electricity or other power, and the working of the intended tramways or any of them, by electricity or other power.

respect of the use of such carriages.

To authorise the Corporation and their lessees or other the person or persons working the said intended tramways to levy tolls, rates, and charges for the use thereof, by carriages passing along the same, and the conveyance of passengers, goods, minerals, animals, merchandise, and other traffic upon the same, and to confer exemptions from tolls, rates, and charges.

To authorise the Corporation, and any Corporation, person, company, or body from time to time to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements for and in relation to the working, lease, sale, and purchase of the whole or any part of the tramways, in consideration of such gross sum, or sums, rent or rents, and generally upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed on between the contracting or agreeing parties, or as the Order may define, and to confirm any such contracts and agreements which may have been, or which during the progress of the Order may be, entered into.
