Lisbon, May 27.

THE Queen of Portugal was this day brought to Bed of a Prince, to the great Joy of this Court.

Turin, May 26. On the 23d instant the Duke of Savoy began to form his Camp within a mile of this place, 2 Regiments of Dragoons, and 4 of Foot, of his Royal Highness's own Troops, with two Battalions of French Protestants of de Loches and Muller arriving there that day, since which, 2 German Regiments of Foot, and 2 Regiments of Horse, in the Service of the Milanese, are likewise come into the Camp, and the rest of the Forces are marching thither, so that we hope in few days to have an Army together of between 20 and 24000 men; The Train of Artillery stands ready here. The French, we hear, are moving from Susa towards La Veillane.

Milan, May 30. Our new Governor the Marquis de Leganes arrived here on the 26th instant from Genoa, after having had a long Conference with the Duke of Savoy at Asti. The Count de Euenfolida, his Predecessor, gave up the Government to him the same day, and the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, have since made him their Compliments. He has already begun to reform several things, and has ordered Money to be sent for the payment of our Troops in Piedmont, whither the rest of the Forces designed from hence for his Royal Highness's assistance, are likewise on their march.

Vienna, June 7. Their Imperial Majesties, and the King of the Romans, went from hence yesterday towards Gony in Moravia, to see the Auxiliary Troops of Brandenburg in their march towards Hungary. Prince Louis of Bava will set out the next week. The Troops in the mean time are marching to the General Rendezvous, and will be all in a Body about the 18th of this month; The Count de Bathiani is on his march with 1000 Hungarians towards Essek, where 8 Companies of the Regiment of Sain, 10 of Beck, 5 of Nigredt, 12 of Arantz, 14 of Chizzala, 2 of Archinto, 9 of Harberfen, and 4 of Pass, are now in Garrison. We hear from Constantinople, that the Rasians, under the command of the famous Captain Antonio, have retaken the Island of Creta, and cut off a great number of Turks that were posted there, and that they afterwards made an Execution towards Argadin; The same news comes likewise from Essek, and we hope our next Letters will bring the confirmation of it. They write from Croatia, that the Enemies Troops, which lately approached towards their Frontiers, are retired again; And that the Governor of Dubitz, having from that and the neighbouring Garrisons of Zora and Cossaurza drawn together 1500 men, he marched with them as far as Masidm, a Turkish Garrison, and committed great Spoil thereabouts, but returning with their booty, they were set upon by a Body of Turks, with whom they had a very sharp Dispute; In the beginning of the Fight the Croats were forced to give way, and lost part of their Plunder, but they soon regained their Ground and their Booty, and put the Enemy to flight, of whom divers were killed, and many drowned in the River Gaurizza, near which this Action happened. The Advices from Turkey say, that the Ottoman Troops, which have their Rendezvous near Sapliza, would not decamp from thence till the 7th or 8th of this month; And that the Grand Vicer was not expected at Belgrade till towards the end of it. On the 5th instant Sir William Holfy, Ambassador from Their Majesties of Great-Britain, was received at Prague with great Honour and Respect, the Seraf

quier himself coming to Compliment him, and expressing no little Inclination to a Peace; And on the 10th, he parted again from thence by Water to Nicopolis.

Frankfort, June 13. The Troops of Saxony are arrived in Franconia, and in 2 or 3 days will have joined the Confederate Army, which lies encamped under the command of General Caprara at Wesselock, about 2 Leagues from Hudeberg. The French, to the number of about 10000 men, have lately appeared before Mentz, and made a shew as if they designed to post themselves there, but found to warm a reception from the Cannon of the Jews, that they were quickly forced to retire, with the loss of divers of their men. A great many French Defectors are come from the French Army to Mentz. The Grisons have granted passage through their Territories to the Imperial and Bavarian Forces that are going to Piedmont, who are to pass in several Bodies about 1000 at a time.

Cologne, June 15. The Landgrave of Hesse Cassel went through here this day to join his Forces, which are marched towards the Mouth. The Confederates fortify Dueren. From the Palatinate we have advice; that the Confederate Army lay at Wesselocke, composed of about 24000, and when the Saxons, who are 12000, with some other Troops that are yet to join them, are come up; they will make about 45000 men. The French have shewed themselves before Mentz, but they presently retired again, their design seeming to be only to ravage the Country.

Paris, June 15. The last Letters from Bress tell us, that they were making all the haste they could to get out the Men of War that lay ill there, and that they hoped to have them ready about the 20th of this month to join those that are already at Belle Isle. 'Tis reported here, that our Troops in Piedmont are marched to Camagnole, which is a place of no strength; and that they have demolished Rovi and La Veillane. But it seems we are at the same time not without our apprehensions from that side; seeing Orders are given for the fortifying of Camagnole. The Letters from Rome give us yet little prospect of the Election of a Pope.

Brussels, June 17. The King decamped this day from Anderlecht, and marched to Dignon about a League from this place. Our Governor-General, who had his Quarters near Wood, repaired likewise thither this morning. They write from Leige, that Count Sercheur de Tilly understanding, that the Marquis de Boursiers had repassed the Mosel with the Troops under his command, raised his Camp near Leige, and having left a good Garrison in thence, marched with 4000 Foot and 3000 Horse, in order to join the Confederate Army in Flanders. The Forces of Hesse, with the other German Troops under the command of the Count de Lippe, lie at present about Tongres. The King of Spain continuing

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dering the Zeal and good Services of the Prince de Vaudemont, has made him Governor of Arms in this Country, which is the next Post to the Governor in Chief.

From His Majesty's Camp near Berlehm-Abby, June 18. Yesterday, about 5 in the morning, the Army marched from *Anderlick*, and encamped the same day near a little Village called *D.ghom*, between *Brussels* and *Vil-word*, the King's Quarters being at the Castle of *Beaulieu*, belonging to the Prince of *Taxis*. This morning we de-camped again, and came to this place, which is about a mile from *Louvaine*. Two days before we left *Ander-licke*, 30 Spanish Dragoons foraging a little too near the Enemy, fell into their hands, and most of them were taken; And the next day 40 French Horse were met upon the same occasion by a Party of about 50 Brandenburghers, who killed 16 of them, and took several Prisoners; on our side one was killed, and 3 or 4 wounded. Some Deferters that came into our Camp on Saturday say, that the Marquis de *Boufflers* had joyned the Duke of *Luxemburgh*, who lyes still near *Halk*. It's believed we shall march again to-morrow towards the Enemy.

*Hague*, June 19. We have an account from *Flanagers*, that the King was encamped yesterday near *Louvain*, from whence His Majesty intended to march towards the Enemy, who continued about *Halle* and *Braine le Comte*. The Marquis de *Boufflers* has divided his Troops, having sent part of them back towards the *Moselle* and being gone with the rest to joyn the Duke of *Luxemburg*. And the Confederate Forces, that lately relieved the City of *Leige*, are thereupon likewise moving towards *Brabant* to joyn our Army, if it be thought necessary. From *Germany* they write, that the Saxon Forces were come within two days march of the Confederate Army, which lay near *Wisselocke*. And that the French had made a *Bravado* before *Mentz*, but that they soon retired again, having sustained some loss from the Cannon of the Town. We are assured, that part of the Imperial and Bavarian Forces, designed for the assistance of the Duke of *Savoy*, are actually on their march towards *Piedmont*, and that several Regiments are already advanced as far as the Lake of *Constance*. The Duke of *Zell's* Baggage set out from *Zell* on the 13th instant for *Flanders*, and his Highness intended to follow himself in 3 or 4 days.

*Dublin*, June 6. The Train of Artillery is arrived at *Mullingar* in very good order, and yesterday the Tin-boats or Pontons, that were here, were sent under a good Guard to the Army, which is believed to be now on its march. On the 4th, a Body of Horse was sent out, to summon, as 'tis supposed, *Balsmore*. The Prince of *Wirtemberg* is with the Forces under his command at *Thurles*, to observe the Enemy on that side. A Person, who is lately come from *Limerick*, assures us, that their new General, the Sieur de *St. Ruth*, issues out all his Orders in the French King's name, and has required several Officers to take new Commissions from the French King, pursuant to a design of Subjecting this Kingdom to *France*, that has been long carried on here in *Ireland* by the *Abbe Gravelle*, of which his own Letters to a great Minister in *France*, that have been intercepted, are a sufficient Evidence. This has raised great discontents amongst the Irish.

*Dover*, June 11. On Tuesday Admiral *Ruffel* anchored with the Fleet under his command off of this place; Yesterday morning they wayed, though it blew very fresh at S.W. and with the Tide of Ebb got beyond *Felkesten*. This morning they set sail again, and presently after there came up a handsome breeze at N.E. which still encreases; And the whole Fleet is now out of sight.

*Whitehall*, June 13. Their Majesties have been pleased to Nominate Dr. *Nicholas Kiddle*, Dean of *Peterborough*, to be Bishop of *Bath* and *Wells*; And Dr. *John Hall* to be Bishop of *Bristol*.

On Wednesday last the Dean and Chapter of *Ely* unanimously Elected, in pursuance of Their Majesties *Comge d'Honneur*, *Simon* Lord Bishop of *Chichester* to be Bishop of *Ely*. The Dean and Chapter of *Gloucester* have also with unanimous Consent Elected Dr. *Edward Fowler* to be Bishop of that See. And Their Majesties have been graciously pleased to grant their Royal Assent to both these Elections.
