Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by a Convention made between Her Majesty and Her Majesty the Queen of the Netherlands for defining the boundaries between the British and Netherland Possessions in the Island of New Guinea and signed at The Hague on the sixteenth of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five the following. Articles were amongst others agreed to.

ARTICLE I.

The boundary between the British and Netherland Possessions in New Guinen starts from the southern coast of the said Island at the middle of the mouth of the Bensbach River situated at about 141° 1' 47.9" of east longitude (meridian of Greenwich).

ARTICLE II.

The boundary proceeds to the north, following the meridian which passes through the said mouth, up to the point where that meridian meets the Fly River.

ARTICLE III.

From that point the waterway ("Thalweg") of the Fly River forms the boundary up to the 141st degree of east longitude.

ARTICLE IV.

The 141st degree of east longitude after this forms the boundary up to the point of intersection of the boundaries of the British, Netherland, and German Possessions.

And whereas certain small portions of territoryhave thereby been added to Her Majesty's. Possession of British New Guinea and it is: expedient that the laws of the said Possessionshould extend to the said portions of territory.

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act 1893" have been

complied with.

Now therefore Her Majesty by virtue and inexercise of the powers in this behalf by "The-British Settlements Act 1887" or otherwise in Her Majesty vested is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order and it is hereby ordered as follows.

The boundary set out in the above mentioned Articles of the Convention of the sixteenth of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five shall be the western boundary of Her Majesty's. Possession of British New Guinea and the laws of the said Possession shall extend to and be in force up to that boundary.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the power by the aforesaid Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the twentieth section of "The Finance Act, 1894," shall apply to the Colony of Sierra Leone.

W HEREAS by "The Dockyard Ports Regulation Act 1865," it is enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to make Regulations for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of Her Majesty's vessels, dockyards or property or to the requirements of Her Majesty's Naval Service.

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations were made by Order in Council dated the fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Plymouth.

And whereas the Regulations before mentioned were amended by Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and were further amended by Order in Council dated the 12th day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.

And whereas it appears expedient that the Regulations before mentioned should be further amended.

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect from the date hereof.

2. On this Order taking effect the following clause shall be inserted in the first schedule of the Order in Council of the fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hurdred and ninety, after clause nine, and shall be numbered 9a.

9a. No firearm nor air-gun shall be discharged from any boat or ship nor from the shore over the water within the limits of Hamoaze navigable for ships, from its southern limit to obreast Warren Point in the River Tamar and to abreast of Antony Ferry in the River St. Germans, nor in the shallow waters of St. Johns, Sango or Millbrook Lakes, outside an imaginary line joining Treval and Palmer Points, or in Weston Mill Lake outside the Cornwall Railway Viaduct, nor within two hundred yards of any ship or vessel in the remainder of the dockyard port, excepting always such discharge of firearms as may be necessary by Her Majesty's Naval and Military forces and the Metropolitan Police employed within the limits of the said port for drill or practice and for the protection of Her Majesty's ships and vessels and the Naval and Military magazines and establishments.

3. On this Order taking effect the clause substituted by Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, for clause twenty-one of the first schedule of the Order in Council dated the fifteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety, shall be cancelled and the following clause shall be substituted for such cancelled clause.

21. Every merchant or other private vessel, whether propelled by steam, sail, oars or by any other means, when passing the powder magazine at Bull Point shall keep outside the red buoys off it, and shall not pass between any powder ships (which are painted red) and the red buoys placed to guard them.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council made in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty, on the

joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the Regulations contained in the Schedule thereto should, so far as regards British Ships and Boats, be substituted for the Regulations contained in the First Schedule to an Order in Council made as aforesaid, and dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

And whereas by two O. ders in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid, and dated respectively the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, certain modifications and additions were made to the said Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council, of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, as regards British fishing vessels and boats.

And whereas by another Order in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid, and dated the eighteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, certain modifications and additions were made to the said Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, as regards Steam Pilot Vessels.

And whereas by the said Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it is, amongst other things, provided as follows:—

Art. 3.—A seagoing steamship when under way

shall carry-

- (a.) On or in front of the foremast, at a height above the hull of not less than twenty feet, and if the breadth of the ship exceeds twenty feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.
- (b.) On the starboard side, a green light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abast the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.
- (c.) On the port side, a red light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.
- (d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

And whereas by another Order in Council, made in pursuance of the said Act and on such

joint recommendation as aforesaid, and dated the thirtieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three the said regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, were further modified by the addition to the said recited Article 3 of the provisions contained in the Schedule to the said Order in Council now in recital and set out in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the said recited Order in Council of the thirtieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, should be rescinded to the intent that the modifications and additions made to the said recited Article 3, and set out in the Schedule hereto, should no longer continue in operation.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, on the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, by a *Provisional* Order within the meaning of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," to rescind the said Order in Council of the thirtieth January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been

complied with.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to rescind the said recited Order in Council of the thirtieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and to direct that from the date of this Order the provisions contained in the Schedule to the last-mentioned Order and to this Order shall cease to be in operation, and the said recited Article 3 of the said Regulations contained in the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall have effect as if the said Order in Council of the thirtieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, had never been made.

### SCHEDULE.

(e.) To ensure that the red and green side lights shall show an uniform light from right ahead of the ship to two points abaft the beam on the port and starboard sides respectively and shall not show across the bow of the ship itself, the said lights must be fixed and the screens fitted so that the rays from the red and green lights shall cross the line of the ship's keel projected ahead of the ship at a reasonable distance ahead of the ship.

With regard to all vessels whose lights are inspected by the officers of the Board of Trade the red or green side light will not be deemed to be fixed and fitted in accordance with the Regulations unless it is so fixed and screened that a line drawn from the outside edge of the wick to the foremost end of the inboard screen of such light shall make an angle of four degrees or as near thereto as may be practicable with a line drawn parallel with the keel of the ship from the outside edge of the wick.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping
Act, 1894," it is enacted that Her Majesty
may, by Order in Council, from time to time

increase, vary, or reduce light dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon for the time being under the management of a General Lighthouse Authority, that is to say, the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, or the Commissioners of Irish Lights, provided that the light dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon which was existing on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, should not be made to exceed the amount which at any period previous to that date was received in respect thereof or to which they might have been raised during any part of that period.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one (which came into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two), Her Majesty was pleased to approve certain revised and amended New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, both the over-sea section with home trade, Elbe to Brest inclusive, as well as the coasting section, levied by said General Lighthouse Authorities, respectively, in the form thereunto appended, together with the several additions, reductions, variations, abatements, regulations and exemptions therein contained.

And whereas the North Sea and Baltic Canal has been recently opened for maritime traffic.

And whereas it is expedient to provide for the payment of light dues in respect of vessels proceeding from ports in the United Kingdom through the said canal or to ports therein or coming through the said canal or from ports therein to ports in the United Kingdom.

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been

complied with.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the recited Act and of every other power enabling Her in that behalf, doth by this Order in Council direct, order and declare as follows:—

That on and after the date of this Order there shall be paid in respect of all vessels, whether British or Foreign, proceeding from ports in the United Kingdom through the North Sea and Baltic Canal or to ports therein or coming through the said canal or from ports therein to ports in the United Kingdom the light dues or duties payable under the said New Consolidated Tables of Light Duties as for vessels proceeding from or to ports in the United Kingdom to or from ports in the Eyder.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Llandilo Fawr, of the parish of Llandy-feisant in the said county and diocese, and of the parish of Llansadwrn in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Llandilo Fawr, of the said parish of Llandyfeisant and of the said parish of Llansadwrn should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy

Trinity Taliaris situate as atoresaid.

Thursby Pelham as the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Llansadwrn (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Llandilo Fawr, of the said parish of Llandyfeisant and of the said parish of Llansadwrn which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, Taliaris situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Taliaris.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in

Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

'The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Taliaris, comprising:—I. All that portion of the parish of Llandilo Fawr in the county of Carmarthen and in the diocese of Saint Davids which is bounded upon the north-west for the most part by the hereinafter mentioned detached portion of the parish of Llandyseisant upon the north by the parish of Talley, upon the north-east by the hereinafter described portion of the parish

spiritual purposes out of the parish of Middleton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester and out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry district) of Saint Mary Birch in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Middleton and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Birch which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the

purposes of Divine wership.

"And whereas by a certain deed bearing date on or about the twelfth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five and made or expressed to be made under the authority of 'The New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844, and 1856' or some or one of them between the Reverend Thomas Ebenezer Cleworth, the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Middleton, of the first part Alfred Butterworth of Spring Bank Werneth near Oldham in the said county of Lancaster, the patron of the said rectory of the parish of Middleton aforesaid of the second part, the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocess of Manchester, of the third part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners of the fourth part (which deed has been or is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said Thomas Ebenezer Cleworth did grant and confirm unto and to the use of the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall have been appointed and licensed and his successors and when the said proposed district shall have become a new parish then to the incumbent of such new parish and his successors one clear yearly rent charge or net annual sum of one hundred and twenty pounds to be payable half-yearly on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year (a proportionate part of the first of such half-yearly payments to be made on such of those days as shall first happen next after an incumbent shall have been appointed and licensed to the said intended district) free and clear of all deductions taxes charges rates assessments and outgoing whatsoever (except on account of the tax on income or property if any) to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon all those the titles or tithe commutation rent charge or reut charges arising from and secured and payable out of the lands and hereditaments in the townships of Pilsworth, Thornham, and Middleton, within the original limits of the said parish of Middleton and belonging or appertaining to the said rectory of the same parish, the particulars of which tithes or title commutation rent charges are set forth in the Schedule to the said deed.

"And whereas in order to further augmenting the permanent endowment of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted a capital sum of one thousand pounds sterling has been contributed locally and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of Fingland by the Reverend George Frederick Ramsbottom Clerk in Holy Orders and we have in respect thereof undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said intended district or new parish when

he shall have been duly appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the above first-mentioned Act, the sum of thirty pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said yearly rent charge or sum of one hundred and twenty pounds has been so granted and confirmed as aforesaid and the said capital sum of one thousand pounds sterling has also been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said intended district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinaster recommended and proposed and as set forth in the deed above referred to.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that portion of the said parish of Middleton and also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Mary Birch which said portions are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Thornham with Gravel Hole.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of a minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Thomas Ebenezer Cleworth, the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Middleton, and his successors rectors or incumbents of the same rectory for ever.

"And we fur her recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of

Parliament.

"The District of Thornham with Gravel Hole

comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Middleton in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded upon the south by the new parish of Saint Matthew Chadderton in the said county and diocese upon the south-east by the new parish of Royton in the same county and diocese upon the east by the new parish of Saint Mary High Crompton in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north partly by the new parish of Saint Mary Balderstone in Rochdale and partly by the new parish of Saint Martin Castleton Moor both in the said county and diocese, upon the west by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry District) of Saint Mary Birch in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an
