Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her

Majesty chapter eighty-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say ;
 " We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Mary Southampton in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, between that benefice and certain other benefices, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, which are mentioned in Column I. of the schedule to this scheme appended.

" Whereas the whole advowson of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton and of each of the said benefices which is mentioned in Column I of the Schedule to this scheme appended is vested in the Right Reverend Randall Thomas, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and in his successors bishops of the same diocese.

" And whereas the bishop of the said diocese of Winchester has represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls attached to each of the benefices mentioned in Column I of the schedule to this scheme appended by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

" And whereas the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton is now full of a clerk and the rector or incumbent thereof the Reverend William Durst Clerk in Holy Orders, is willing that the said apportionment shall be made accordingly and has executed this scheme in token of such his willingness.

" And whereas an aggregate sum of eight thousand eight hundred and twenty-three pounds seventeen shillings and seven pence two pounds fifteen shillings per centum Consolidated Stock is now standing in the books of the Paymaster-General in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice to the credit of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton as part of the endowments thereof.

" And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners hold in trust for the same benefice of Saint Mary Southampton and as part of the endowments thereof (1) a sum of thirty-two thousand pounds sterling being the proceeds of the sale of certain portions of the rectorial estates which formerly belonged to the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton (2) a sum of five thousand two hundred and nineteen pounds one shilling and seven pence two pounds fifteen shillings per centum Consolidated Stock (3) a sum of four hundred and twenty-seven pounds twelve shillings and four pence Local Loans three pounds per centum stock and (4) a sum of one thousand seven hundred and forty-six pounds one shilling and nine pence Metropolitan three pounds per centum Consolidated Stock.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury the Archbishop of the province within which the said diocese of Winchester and each of the aforesaid benefices are situate (in testimony whereof the said Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal) and with the consent of the said Randall

Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester acting as such bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of each of the aforesaid benefices (in testimony whereof the said Randall Thomas, Bishop of Winchester, has signed this scheme and sealed it with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said William Durst as the rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton (in testimony whereof he the said William Durst has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same the following arrangements shall be made that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette all those sepa-

rate sums of stock or cash which are respectively specified in Columns II, III, and IV of the schedule to this scheme appended and which at present form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton shall be transferred from the said benefice of Saint Mary Southampton to the respective benefices mentioned in Column I of the same schedule and set opposite to the sums of stock or cash so to be transferred and shall as from the day aforesaid be annexed to the same benefices and form part of the endowments thereof.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words following, that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the benefice of Cuddington in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Cuddington is vested in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Edward William Northey of Woodcote House Epsom in the said county of Surrey, Clerk in Holy Orders and his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas a new church has been erected within and for the parish and benefice of Cuddington and it is intended that such church shall be substituted for the old parish church which no longer exists, under the provisions of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy.

"And whereas the said Edward William Northey, in consideration of the provision of the aforesaid new church, is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Cuddington, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Winchester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Randall Thomas now Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester has executed this scheme as herein-after mentioned.

"And whereas under the circumstances thus set forth it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Cuddington which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists that is to say in the said parish of Cuddington.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward William Northey (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury (in

testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Cuddington now vested in him the said Edward William Northey and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid shall be transferred from him and them to the said Randall Thomas Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Randall Thomas, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter sixty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the district of Saint Basil Deritend in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twentieth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five and published in the London Gazette upon the first day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six ratifying a scheme of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England prepared under the provisions of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, a certain part of the parish of Aston-juxta-Birmingham in the county and diocese aforesaid was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and the same was called 'The District of Saint Basil Deritend.'

"And whereas no church has yet been provided for or consecrated within the said district of Saint Basil, Deritend.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said district should be altered by way of extension so that they shall include the portions hereinafter described of the new parish of Saint Andrew Bordesley and of the new parish of The Holy Trinity Bordesley both in the said county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the district of Saint Basil Deritend in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester being:—

"I. All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Bordesley which is bounded upon the north-west by the new parish of Ashted in the said county and diocese, upon the west partly by the said district of Saint Basil, Deritend and partly by the new parish of The Holy Trinity Bordesley in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south

by the last named new parish and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said last named new parish from the new parish of Saint Andrew, Bordesley aforesaid at the point where Kingston-road, Adderley-street and Watery-lane all meet, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lower Dartmouth-street and with Lawley-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point at or near to the junction of such last-named street with Garrison-street upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew Bordesley from the new parish of Ashted aforesaid.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds

or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twelfth day of December last to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows; viz.:

SHERBORNE, DORSET.—Forthwith and entirely in the Congregational Chapel, Sherborne in the county of Dorset, and in the chapel-yard within three yards of the school and any dwelling; and in the rest of the chapel-yard except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapel-yard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the chapel-yard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz. widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

GREAT CLACTON, ESSEX.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Great Clacton in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relatives of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received a Note from the Japanese Minister stating that he has been instructed by telegraph to communicate to Her Majesty's Government:—

THE following Declaration which has been issued by the Japanese Government with regard to the position in Formosa of subjects, citizens, and vessels of Powers having Treaty relations with Japan:—

"Order and tranquillity having been established in Formosa, the Japanese Government grant to the subjects, citizens, and vessels of Treaty Powers being in, or resorting to Formosa, the following privileges and facilities, namely:—

"1. The subjects and citizens of Powers having commercial Treaties with Japan may reside and trade in Formosa at Tamsui, Kelung, Anping, Tainan Fu, and Takao, and the vessels of such Powers may visit and carry cargo to and from the ports and harbours of Tamsui, Kelung, Anping, and Takao.

"2. Notwithstanding the exceptional condition of affairs in Formosa, Treaties of commerce and navigation, tariffs and arrangements existing and now in force between Japan and other Powers, are, so far as they are applicable, extended to the subjects, citizens, and vessels of such Powers, being in, or resorting to, Formosa, at the same time it being understood that all persons availing themselves of the above enumerated privileges and facilities shall obey all decrees and regulations which may at any time be in force in Formosa."

The Japanese Minister for Foreign Affairs has informed Her Majesty's Minister at Tokio that the words "obey all decrees and regulations," &c., are not intended to impair rights of extra-territorial jurisdiction conferred by existing Treaties.

HER Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople the accompanying Memorandum, with regard to Trade Marks Regulations in Turkey:—

January 27, 1896.

MEMORANDUM.

AS to the law for the protection of industrial property, viz., Patents, Trade Marks, Indication of Origin, &c., in the Ottoman Dominions, as regards infringements of British rights:

- (a.) By Ottoman subjects.
 - (b.) By subjects of Foreign Powers other than Turkey.
 - (c.) By British subjects.
- The only law or regulation in the Ottoman

Dominions upon this subject is that first promulgated in 1870, entitled "Alameti Fariké Nizamnamesi." This regulation lays down the procedure to be followed by owners of Trade Marks to obtain protection for them, viz., by depositing two specimens thereof for registration in the Supreme Council of Justice.

Penalties of fine and imprisonment are prescribed for forgery of Trade Marks which have thus been registered, or for fraudulently placing on one's own goods Marks belonging to others; for selling or offering to sell forged Marks, or knowingly selling goods or merchandize on which another person's Mark is fraudulently placed; for fraudulently changing Marks; for using such fraudulently changed Marks, &c.; second conviction to be punished by double penalty provided for first offences, if committed within five years of each other; goods and merchandize bearing forged Marks, and the implements employed in making them, to be confiscated. In the case of infringement of British rights, for the protection of which the measures prescribed by the above mentioned Regulation have been taken by—

(a.) An Ottoman subject, resort must be had to the Ottoman Tribunals (see Art. XI).

(b.) By subjects of other Foreign Powers than Turkey, resort should be had in each case to the Consular Tribunal of that Power of which the defendant is a subject.

(c.) By a British subject, resort should be had to the British Consular Tribunals.

In all these cases, however, it would be advisable for an intending British litigant to take the advice of some local lawyer before actually commencing legal proceedings, as difficulties often arise as to the exact procedure to be followed, and as to which may be the competent Court of Jurisdiction.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The holding of markets, and of public and other sales or exhibitions of swine, fat or store, within the borough of Burton-upon-Trent is hereby prohibited.

2. If a market or a public or other sale or an exhibition of swine, fat or store, is held in the borough of Burton-upon-Trent in contravention of this Order, the person or company holding the same, and the occupier of the place or premises where the market or sale or exhibition is held, and the owner or consignee of each pig exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, and the person, if any, taking entrance-money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereat of any pig, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market or sale or exhibition to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six.

LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.

To the Vestry of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields;

And all whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section 15 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1893, it is enacted that the London County Council may from time to time for the purpose of elections of vestrymen, upon the application in writing of the vestry, or of not less than five hundred rated householders of a parish mentioned in Schedules A and B to the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, by Order under their seal, re-arrange the wards in such parish, and determine the number, extent, limits, and boundary lines of the new wards, but so nevertheless that no ward shall contain less than five hundred rated householders, and that the whole number of wards shall not exceed eight, and the Council shall, in making any such re-arrangement, apportion among the several wards the number of vestrymen to be elected for such parish, and shall in assigning the number of vestrymen to each ward have regard so far as practicable as well to the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in each ward as to the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated; and the number of vestrymen assigned to each ward shall be a number divisible by three; and it is also by the said Act enacted that any such Order may contain such provisions with reference to the election, rotation, and retirement of vestrymen (whether elected prior or subsequently to the date of the Order) as the Council may think necessary for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Order.

And whereas the parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields is a parish mentioned in Part II of Schedule A to the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, and pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, the said parish was divided into three wards.

And whereas the vestry of the said parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields hath applied to the London County Council to re-arrange the wards of the said parish pursuant to the provisions of

the said 15th section of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1893.

And whereas it appears from the rate books of the said parish prepared in the month of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, that the said parish contains two thousand four hundred and twenty-one rated householders, and that the ratable annual value of property in the said parish is five hundred and fourteen thousand six hundred and eighty-five pounds.

Now the London County Council having considered the said application, and having taken into consideration the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in each ward of the said parish, and the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated, and all the circumstances connected with such application, doth hereby order that the wards of the said parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields be and the same are hereby re-arranged in manner following, that is to say, that the said parish be divided into three wards, that the three wards be distinguished by the names mentioned in the first column of the undermentioned Schedule, that the extent, limits and boundary lines of such wards be those described in the second column of the said Schedule, and that the number of Vestrymen to be elected for each of the said wards be the number mentioned in the third column of the said Schedule.

And whereas the London County Council thinks

it necessary that this Order should, for the purpose of carrying out the foregoing provisions, contain the following provisions with reference to the election, rotation and retirement of Vestrymen ;

Now the said London County Council doth hereby further order as follows, that is to say—

(1.) That at the time appointed for the election of Vestrymen in 1896, all the Vestrymen then in office shall go out of office, and there shall be an election of the whole number of Vestrymen for each of the said wards.

(2.) That one-third of the Vestrymen then elected in each of the said wards shall go out of office at the time appointed for the election of Vestrymen in the year 1897, one other third of them at the time appointed for such election in the year 1898, and the remaining third at the time appointed for such election in the year 1899.

(3.) That the one-third who are respectively to go out of office in the years 1897 and 1898 shall be determined according to their place on the poll at the election, those Vestrymen who were lowest on the poll going out of office first. If there shall have been no poll, or if a question shall arise in consequence of an equality of votes between two or more Vestrymen, the vestry shall at some meeting before the time of the election in 1897 determine by lot which of the Vestrymen elected in 1896 shall constitute the one-third to go out of office in the years 1897 and 1898 respectively.
